CHAIRLADY`S REPORT

The last 12 months have been very successful for the Kenya Hope Charity. Under the stewardship of Apostle Edward Watta and his YAWASOP Charity, myself and trustees Brian Humphreys, Martyn Dinsmore, hosted Apostle Edward in the UK last March 2025. This was a very successful mission which included Apostle Edward joining in with the St Annes school sponsored walk in Hewish and the West Wick site raising £1,134 for Kenya Hope Charity supporting Malanga school in Kenya. More toilet blocks were built and play equipment for outside along with food relief was provided. Apostle Edwards visit also brought clarity and acknowledgement to the Kenya Hope Charity through his talks and visits to a variety of different groups during his visit.

This has been the first full year I have now been Chairlady and after a few challenges at the start things are now running more smoothly, along side our trustees, Brian Humphreys, Martyn Dinsmore, June Ford, Shaun Rowlands, Kevin and Laura Smith. And our treasurer Rob Chitty who I would like to thank for working so hard to get all our accounts up to date and in order.

With in this year, we have grown our turnover with extra successful fundraising events, such as St Annes Walk, Marvin sold out concert, Elvis's night, Quiz and curry event, summer BBQ, Craft stall, our first hosted winter fair at Locking Castle Church with a large hamper raffle and attending other Christmas fairs, along with some generous donations.

We have also gained more sponsors for the children on the programme alongside losing a few due to financial difficulties.

We have increased our income by almost £6,000 April 24-25 compared to last financial year April 23-24.

23–24-year turnover £28,251 with £26,902 sent to support the poor widows and orphans in Kenya.

24–25-year turnover £31,737 with £23,158 sent to support the widows and orphans in Kenya. With £4,243 for flights, food on mission to Kenya. This included Our own donation towards the mission and fundraising for the mission. Also, money for children in the program a party and craft bought to sale on return.

So far our next financial year is looking very good 25-26 year.

With another mission being planned for June/July 2026.

All money sent to Kenya has been documented with receipts and photographs of any work done. Money has been sent for school uniforms and resources like books, school fees term 1,2 and 3. Food relief program feeding the poor and the children in school, office equipment for the Kenya team in Kenya to continue the work efficiently, parties for the sponsored program children twice a year and support for the widow groups.

We still have two mission partners Locking Castle Church and St Peters Church along with St Annes primary school supporting a child through the last part of his schooling and raising funds for a Kenyan school Malanga.

We have much room for ongoing improvement and growth as well as the challenges faced in Kenya to overcome, but with the passion from all our trustees and supporters I am positive Kenya Hope Charity has many more successful years of growth and support to the poor in Kenya.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank God for all the trustees, treasurer , mission partners, loyal supporters and our child sponsors along with our fantastic team in Kenya, Apostle Edward Watta, Bishop Nicholas, Pastor Peter and our social worker Steven for all your hard work, dedication and passion for the charity and many years of hard dedicated work.

May Kenya Hope Charity continue to thrive and grow in God`s love for the poor and needy in Kenya.

KENYA HOPE CHARITY AGM: 26/11/2023

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The last 12mths have been very successful for Kenya Hope Charity. Under the stewardship of our host Pastor Edward Wata and his YAWASOP Charity, myself and trustees Martyn & Lorraine Dinsmore visited Kenya in May/June and during a hectic 15-day visit, we met our Kenyan committee, widow's groups, youth groups, tree nurseries, partied with most of our sponsored children, took part in 2 seminars - and distributed another 1,000 trees taking us up to 2,500 trees planted. Before this mission, apart from June 5yrs ago, no-one else on the committee had been to Kenya so my committee had to support my reading of situations and my assessment of the people involved when making important decisions. Now 3 trustees, myself and Martyn & Lorraine have visited our work in Kenya, met the people involved, and are happy with all of my judgements. We are sending many thousands of £££s to Kenya, and the 3 of us have scrutinised photos, receipts and reports of the work done and seen most of it with our own eyes. Due diligence is being met, the money you donate is being wisely used to change many lives. At a time when I was feeling burned out and ready to stand down, I also want to thank them for their enthusiasm and energy that has helped me to keep going.

Back to this year's mission, we also visited Malanga Primary School to survey the field that we had paid to be ploughed, top-dressed and planted using money provided by the children of both St Anne's Schools who took part in a sponsored walk - our best ever fundraiser - that raised over £2,000 to help feed the 500 Malanga pupils who were not being fed because the school food programme had collapsed. The crop of maize we saw in the fields was over 6ft tall and during the following months, we built the school a new kitchen, the crop that was weeded and watered by the headmistress and Malanga pupils was harvested, and now the 500 hungry children are being fed. A perfect example that when good seeds of hope are sown, the Lord can produce a good harvest. The 2 St Anne's Schools, having watched videos of thanks and videos of the Malanga pupils being fed, have already set a date for next year's walk. All our fund-raising events have been well supported, thanks everyone. This year we had an Elvis concert, next year we have a Marvin concert on 17th February.

With all of original children finally being sponsored, for the first time, we added another 12 desperately needy children including 2 with special needs, and our Child Sponsorship Programme has been improved in 3 ways, firstly our qualified Kenyan social worker has undertaken an assessment of the families of all sponsored children, over 80% of the widows/caregivers are in table-banking schemes which allow them to start and support their own small businesses, and most UK sponsors have received one or two letters/messages from their sponsored child, and up-to-date photos.

Of course, there is room for operational improvement and there will always be new challenges in Kenya to overcome, but we have the financial strength, flexibility and experience to grow and increase our support for poor communities in Kenya thanks to you, our loyal band of supporters.

As we prepare for a year of growth, if you would like to be part of our journey, if you feel you have 'committee experience' and/or organisational/secretarial skills or just a heart for what we are doing (and of course a spare couple of hours once or twice a month), then please let me or any of my committee know.

Last but not least, we are starting to plan next year's mission and already have 5 or 6 interested people. If it is on your heart to come on mission next year, please let a committee member know.

I would like to finish by thanking my fellow trustees and treasurers for their hard work throughout the year. Special thanks also to Locking Castle Church for keeping us as a mission partner, and a special thank you to all our child sponsors and supporters, we couldn't do it without you.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The last 12mths have been very successful for Kenya Hope Charity. With Covid-19 finally under control and air-travel finally available, myself and Tom Yacomeni, lead minister with Locking Castle Church, visited Kenya in February to re-connect with our Kenyan communities after a 3yr absence.

During a hectic 12 days visit, we met our Kenyan committee, widow's groups, youth groups, most of our sponsored children, we painted our first newly-built school and equipped it with new tables and chairs, we officially opened our second 'nearly-completed' school and also visited four tree nurseries. In addition, we paid the rent on a field that became a community farm which produced 30 sacks of maize for the widows who worked it.

Under the stewardship of our guest Pastor Edward Watta and his YAWASOP Charity, our area of influence has grown from 2 villages to 14 villages and I had the honour of planting our 1,000th fruit tree in school compounds. We have planted many more fruit trees since then, but this time in the gardens of poor families as we aim for our next target of 2,000 trees.

After 5yrs, our Child Sponsorship Programme has produced our first graduate. This year, Christine Akoth completed college and her dream of becoming a fully-trained teacher is now a reality; and with another 2 children at college and another 2 at university, expect more success stories in the near future.

Of course, there is room for operational improvement and there will always be new challenges in Kenya to overcome, but if we can deal with and overcome major global challenges such as Covid-19, then we have the strength and flexibility to grow and increase our support for poor communities in Kenya whatever challenges life throws at us, thanks to you, our loyal band of supporters who give us a firm foundation.

Finally, I would like to thank my fellow trustees: Irene Humphreys, Shaun Rowlands, June Ford, new trustees Martyn and Lorraine Dinsmore, treasurer Martin Purnell and associates Kat and Andy Watts for their hard work throughout the year. Special thanks also to Locking Castle Church for keeping us as a mission partner, and a special thank you to all our child sponsors and supporters, we couldn't do it without you.
