TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Crossroads Fun & Friendship Centre was originally registered as a charity, number 1136344 on 15 June 2010. On 20 November 2017, a Charitable Incorporated Organisation ("CIO") was formed number CE011788, named "Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre". On 21 November 2017 it was registered as a charity number 1175834. At a Trustees meeting held on 18 December 2017 it was resolved to transfer all the assets of the existing charity (1136344) to the new CIO (1175834). This transfer was formally effected on 1 April 2018, immediately following the 31 March 2018 year end of the existing charity.

PRINCIPLE OBJECTS OF THE CIO

The principle objects of the new CIO are similar to those of the existing charity; to relieve the needs of people with mild to moderate mental health support needs in the city of Plymouth.

It aims to do this by:

1. Operating, maintaining and developing a centre with facilities tailored to the requirements of such people enabling them to relax, learn social skills and develop self-confidence in a positive and uplifting environment that accepts and welcomes them all as individuals in line with the ethos statement.
2. Providing such people with a range of therapeutic and skills based activities focussed on mental health recovery
3. Fostering links with other organisations, including local authorities, other charities and commercial entities, in order to raise awareness and / or funds
4. Delivering high quality help and support to its members within the local and national guidelines of mental health whilst following the principles of good practice, thus ensuring an environment of physical and emotional safety.
5. Ensuring all members feel welcome and valued in accordance with the equal opportunities policy with an awareness of the recognised complaints procedure and the opportunity to be involved in the development and decision making of the charity
6. Informing all of the implications of the Equality Act 2010
7. Challenging discrimination, prejudice and stigma by endeavouring to increase the wider community's understanding of mental health issues
8. Observing confidentiality within the local and national guidelines in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998 and the more recent GDPR legislation.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES IN THE YEAR – CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The activities undertaken are to further the charity's purposes for the Public Benefit. The trustees confirm that they have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's published guidance on the Public Benefit under the Charities Act 2011.

This year, Crossroads Fun & Friendship Centre celebrates its 28th Anniversary. This is a tremendous achievement and a great vindication to the vision and faith of our founder Hywel Jones.

During this past year I have again been very impressed by the enthusiastic and dedicated efforts to constantly improve on the quality of services offered at Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre by the Project Manager, staff and volunteers. The realisation that the vision of

Crossroads is not only for our generation of today but for generations to come is both refreshing and vital.

These past years Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre has had to face up to numerous challenges which are part and parcel of operating in a 'Free Market of Health Provision'. These challenges have been met and overcome. In my report of 2019 I wrote *'No doubt the next twelve months will be no different in that we will have to face up to and overcome new challenges. The continuation of providing a high standard of quality service will be vital in achieving this aim.'* Little did I realise the great challenge that presented itself in the form of the coronavirus19. Like all other organisations Crossroads Fun & Friendship Centre had to stop operating as a 'drop-in-centre' in March 2020.

The test of a good organisation is its ability to adapt to the changing needs and requirements that are compatible to the age in which it is operating. It would be all too easy for Crossroads to lament and concentrate on the services and activities that we can no longer offer owing to the restrictions arising from the coronavirus. I am delighted to report that Project Manager Len supported by Charlotte has concentrated on the services and activities that WE CAN OFFER.

We at Crossroads have to see this time of uncertainty as an opportunity for renewal and reform. Len and Charlotte have displayed great vision and creativity in reorganising the physical layout of the premises to adapt to social spacing. A new programme of activities has been formulated and contact with members and volunteer staff has been maintained through social media and telephone conversations. Under its new format Crossroads has been open since July 2020. We are confident in this time of uncertainty that Crossroads will and is indeed rising to the challenge.

Sadly, we had to say farewell to Charlotte Williams in January. Charlotte has been a tremendous asset to Crossroads over the past three years - first as a student from Plymouth University, then as a volunteer helper and then as a support worker. Charlotte has taken up a full time job in the north of England and we wish her well in her new career. We are delighted to welcome Tracey Archman to Crossroads. Tracey has a wealth of experience in working in the mental health sector and will be a great addition to the Crossroads team. It was also good to welcome John Tregaskis on to the Trustees Board. John has been associated with Crossroads for many years as a volunteer and as a support worker.

We are once again very grateful to Plymouth City Council for providing their continual support and funding to the Centre. However, we must not get complacent. Funding in this day and age will always be an issue. We have to constantly remind ourselves that we are in a competitive free market for health provision. At the same time we must remain true to the ethos and motivation of Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre.

It is therefore imperative that the Trustees continue to set good examples in reviewing their contributions to the work of Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre in striving to provide fresh vision and ideas – backed up with action. Trustees need not only to share their ideas and vision for the future but also to encourage everyone associated with the Centre – the Project Manager, staff, volunteers and members to express and share their ideas and visions. Crossroads Fun & Friendship Centre is of course more than just a centre, more than just an organisation. It is in fact a living out, the realisation of the vision of Hwyl Jones. It is all about reaching out and meeting the needs of people. It is all about ensuring that people feel valued, accepted and loved for who they are.

In short, everyone has a role to play in ensuring that Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre is constantly evolving in its quest to provide better and better quality provisions.

I take this opportunity to thank Project Manager Len Russell for another year of dedicated hard work and for his encouragement and patience towards me. Finally, a thank you to all the staff and volunteers of Crossroads Fun and Friendship Centre for all your loyalty, dedication and hard work and also to Morice Baptist Church for their support and prayers.

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TRUSTEES / COUNCIL OF MEMBERS

The CIO is administered by a board of trustees as set out on page 1.

ANNUAL AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Statement of Financial Activities shows a net surplus for the year to 31 March 2022 of £5,738 (2021 deficit of £1,382). Reserves stand at £65,179 in total.

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets should ideally be six months of the resources expended, which equates to approximately £17,000 for redundancies and £33,000 for running costs in the year ended 31 March 2022. At this level the Trustees feel they would still be able to carry on the Charity's activities for a few months in the event of a significant fall in funding. At the present time these funds stand at £65,179, which is broadly at the required level.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees are alerted to operational and financial risks at their periodic meetings and are fully aware of the need to maintain free reserves at the levels stated above to continue the work of the Charity and the aspirations for the future. Through this medium of periodic reporting the Trustees are exercising an active review of major risk.


STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources during the year. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity and the group will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

I report on the accounts of the charity / CIO for the year ended 31 March 2022, which are set out on pages 6 to 10 below.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. They consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(1) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is needed. It is my responsibility to:
