## **Report of the trustees for the period ended 31 March 2025**

The trustees of EKAM UK (the 'charity') present their 7th annual report and financial statements as a charitable incorporated organization (CIO) for the charity's period ended 31 March 2025.

Information relating to governance & administration in pages 6-7 and policy statements in Annexure 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's constitution and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities – SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

The charity was registered with the Charity Commission as a CIO on 14 December 2017.

### **Objectives and activities**

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aim and objectives and in planning its future activities, in particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

### **Purpose and aims**

The charity was established for the promotion and protection of good health for public benefit by providing financial and technical assistance and support to charities, social organisations, medical centres and non-profit organisations in UK and India who are involved/engaged in providing health care, education care and support to neonates, infants, young adults and mothers including providing food, medicines, equipment, training, research grants/facilities and knowledge sharing.

We aim to support projects primarily related to saving lives of babies, young children and young mothers, ranging from 0-19 years. We do so, by partnering with organisations who provide medical treatment and health care and by providing various types of support.

We seek out partnerships with organisations who put vulnerable babies and young children/mothers at the centre of their work, as well as responding to requests for funding that come to us via various channels (e.g., website, emails, references).

We will fund or apply for grants for both new and existing charities and organisations, small, medium, or large, provided they can demonstrate the difference they are making.

We aim to, from our interactions and references provided, develop a network with a view to connecting people through shared values. This would further provide opportunities for subject matter experts to share their skills and knowledge. Not only to help a particular project, but also provide a way to reduce the operational costs for organisations by sharing resources.

We also aim to partner with organisations who can provide vocational and technical training to vulnerable children post treatment to enable them to return to normalcy. To further these objectives, we aim to connect with corporates for their support via their CSR initiatives or for subsidies, to a wider donor community for financial support and with training institutes/organisations.

The charity welcomes applications for joint work with other organisations and will work in partnership with other grant-makers wherever possible.

To ensure full transparency, we aim to ensure that 100% of donations/funded grants reach the intended recipient/organisation and will pursue other channels (e.g., sponsorships, Corporate CSR, crowd funding, goodwill payments etc.) to support our administration process. We will do this by sharing resources with partners, and enlisting volunteers as much as possible.

### **Financial review**

The results for the charity were in line with the trustees' expectations, as the charity's operations are in initial stages. No material donations or commitments were made in consideration of the ongoing assessment of opportunities and completion of due diligence for wider UK based charities

The charity will continue to focus on project-based funding, i.e., applying for grants or undertaking fundraising activities based on the projects identified and agreed with the recipient partner. Fundraising for general funds will continue to be through social networking and events.

### Strengthening Maternal and Child Health in Virudhunagar (EKAM Foundation)

The EKAM Health Model in Virudhunagar district, an Aspirational District, is a collaborative initiative aimed at strengthening maternal and child healthcare, with a particular emphasis on the Kariapatti Block. Operating across the Mallankinar Block Primary Health Care Centre, six Health Sub-Centres, 30 ICDS centres, and 33 villages, the project served a population of 30,420, working closely with local stakeholders and the government to address gaps in healthcare delivery, nutrition, and awareness among mothers, pregnant women, and young children.

Key interventions included providing vital equipment such as a Thyroid Analyzer and growth monitoring devices, benefitting hundreds of mothers and children by improving early detection and management of health issues while reducing financial burdens. Thirty Anganwadi Workers received training on essential maternal and child health topics, supported by lactation kits and job aids to enhance counselling and follow-up. Stakeholder convergence was fostered through regular meetings, strengthening interdepartmental coordination and leading to more effective resolution of maternal and child health issues.

Extensive outreach activities promoted healthier behaviours, with 51 awareness sessions reaching over 1,100 women and targeted school programmes improving hygiene and nutritional awareness among children and adolescent girls. The combined efforts of the Government of Tamil Nadu and Ekam resulted in a notable reduction in Infant Mortality Rates in Kariapatti Block, demonstrating that a coordinated, systems-based approach anchored in community engagement and frontline capacity building can achieve sustainable improvements in maternal and child health outcomes.

### Sai Sure – Nutrition (Sri Sathya Sai Annapoorna Trust, Karnataka, India)

Towards commitment to support projects in India, working with NGOs, not-for-profit establishments, medical centres, and other organizations that share similar values, EKAM UK partnered with the Sri Sathya Sai Annapoorna Trust to provide essential morning nutrition to government schoolchildren in Karnataka.

As part of the initiative for the academic year 2024–25, approximately 3,206 children across 49 schools in the Kodagu district were selected to benefit from the program. Under this collaboration, the children received SaiSure Millet Multi nutrient health mix along with milk, served on alternate school days, totalling around 110 nutrition days for the year.

Many children arrive at government schools on an empty stomach, which directly affects their ability to focus and learn. By offering a nourishing start to the day, this initiative addresses hidden classroom hunger, enhances concentration, and makes a meaningful contribution to the holistic development of India's future generation.

The Sri Sathya Sai Annapoorna Trust, in partnership with the Government of Karnataka, has been leading such efforts across India, ensuring that no child is deprived of learning due to a lack of nutrition.

The partnership between EKAM UK and the Sri Sathya Sai Annapoorna Trust is an example of how collaborative efforts can create a lasting impact in the lives of children. Addressing morning hunger through effective nutritional interventions strengthens the foundation for a brighter, more educated future.

With shared values and a common purpose, EKAM UK and Annapoorna Trust are helping build a healthier and more empowered

### Cuddalore Government Hospital

In August 2024, Shrada Gopalakrishnan, representing EKAM UK's Share a Smile (SAS – for the children, by the children) initiative, visited Cuddalore Government Hospital to assess how a donation of £150 could best support the hospital's needs. Following consultation with hospital staff and a review of the official quotation, EKAM UK and SAS charity provided six flow meters with humidifiers and two vein detectors, directly enhancing the quality of newborn care at the facility. EKAM UK encourages young people to actively participate in charitable initiatives, fostering a spirit of generosity and community engagement.

### Outlook and Opportunities

In the short term, EKAM UK, as part of the initiative (theme) towards Saving Lives, has identified the following projects:

1. Support in providing nutritious food and drinks to children
2. Support in providing gap support (equipment, working supplies etc.), towards maternal health awareness, kangaroo maternal kits, emergency treatment and relating community health.
3. Training & knowledge share sessions

EKAM UK will continue looking towards opportunities in areas of heart health, hypertension, juvenile diabetes, cancer, skin diseases etc.

EKAM UK aim to, in the medium to long term, identify areas in terms of providing technical training / support projects including as subject matter experts sharing information & involvement in intervention, expansion & including educational projects.

- Digital outreach - Focussing on moving digitally and exploring hybrid solutions to bridge the gap, with learnings from the global pandemic.
- Fostering exchanges visits of specialists, consultants, doctors, and nurses from (resource & skills) abundantly rich countries like India to the UK or wherever the demand needs to be strategically met.
- Kindle more number of entities across the UK & India to be a vital part of combating child healthcare financial constraints that are being a barrier.
- Towards capacity building and bridging between the countries and the needy

- Closer Home projects in UK (select charities) – to support mental health, heart care, juvenile diabetes as examples.
- Supporting infrastructure projects (e.g., hospitals, medical colleges which are linked to social programs, and related community health, research, technical training, knowledge share.
- Provide Health Consulting in areas of knowledge share by subject matter experts, community health program implementation, risk management and governance, medical infrastructure, operational best practices & financial management.

### Challenges faced

Access to funds is the most important challenge coupled with awareness, training and building sustainable healthcare.

Health, hygiene, and sanitation play a very crucial role in the disease prevention and the maintenance of toilet facilities is a big challenge in schools and hospitals.

### **Public benefit**

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties. The public benefit of the charity's activities is supporting and enablement of efforts in saving lives of babies, young children and mothers and these were achieved principally by the award of grants and donations.

### **Funds materially in deficit**

There are none to report.

### **Risks**

Due to the initial stage of the charity, the trustees have assessed the key risks to be operations and finances and are satisfied that process is in place to manage these risks as follows:

#### Operations

- The key operational risk is damage to the charity's name due to incorrect selection of partners or inadequate utilisation of grants.
- This is addressed by due diligence checks done (i) through references obtained by trustees prior to engagement with external parties and (ii) by obtaining project status reports from grant receivers.
- A grant and operations committee is being established to ensure trustee oversight over potential donor/grant recipients, funding sources and potential service providers.

#### Finance

- The key financial risk is insufficient funding to meet grant or operational expenses.

- This is addressed by trustees focussing on collaborative projects for fundraising and diversify revenue streams to ensure there is no overreliance on income from one source.
- In addition, Trustees would be looking towards wider dissemination of opportunities and projects towards fund raising. Aligned to this, increasing members would be a focus area that would allow for spreading of information, including using social media.

## **Governance & Administration**

### **Trustee selection & appointments**

Trustees are identified from the medical community, accounting/management professionals and persons with links to the corporate community and experienced in strategy and operations, finance, fundraising, donor management, social media, communication, and campaigning.

Trustees will be responsible for the overall work of the charity, including internal administration and compliance with all laws and regulations in the UK. Trustees will meet periodically and decide on fundraising, invite proposals, evaluate proposals, arrange for fund transfer through banking channels and monitor outcomes.

Initial trustees are appointed for a term of 3 years (subject to re-appointment). New trustees are appointed for an initial term of 3 years. Trustee appointments and renewed appointments are by way of resolution passed at the trustee meeting. The charity will have a minimum of 3 and maximum of 12 trustees as per its constitution.

### **Remuneration policy for trustees**

No payments were made to trustees in the reporting period.

## **Report of the trustees for the period ended 31 March 2023**

The trustees of EKAM UK (the 'charity') present their 5th annual report and financial statements as a charitable incorporated organization (CIO) for the charity's period ended 31 March 2023.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's constitution and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities – SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

The charity was registered with the Charity Commission as a CIO on 14 December 2017.

### **Objectives and activities**

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aim and objectives and in planning its future activities, in particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

### **Purpose and aims**

The charity was established for the promotion and protection of good health for public benefit by providing financial and technical assistance and support to charities, social organisations, medical centres and non-profit organisations in UK and India who are involved/engaged in providing health care, education care and support to neonates, infants, young adults and mothers including providing food, medicines, equipment, training, research grants/facilities and knowledge sharing.

We aim to support projects primarily related to saving lives of babies, young children and young mothers, ranging from 0-19 years. We do so, by partnering with organisations who provide medical treatment and health care and by providing various types of support.

We seek out partnerships with organisations who put vulnerable babies and young children/mothers at the centre of their work, as well as responding to requests for funding that come to us via various channels (e.g., website, emails, references).

We will fund or apply for grants for both new and existing charities and organisations, small, medium, or large, provided they can demonstrate the difference they are making.

We aim to, from our interactions and references provided, develop a network with a view to connecting people through shared values. This would further provide opportunities for subject matter experts to share their skills and knowledge. Not only to help a particular project, but also provide a way to reduce the operational costs for organisations by sharing resources.

We also aim to partner with organisations who can provide vocational and technical training to vulnerable children post treatment to enable them to return to normalcy. To further these objectives, we aim to connect with corporates for their support via their CSR initiatives or for subsidies, to a wider donor community for financial support and with training institutes/organisations.

The charity welcomes applications for joint work with other organisations and will work in partnership with other grant-makers wherever possible.

To ensure full transparency, we aim to ensure that 100% of donations/funded grants reach the intended recipient/organisation and will pursue other channels (e.g., sponsorships, Corporate CSR, crowd funding, goodwill payments etc.) to support our administration process. We will do this by sharing resources with partners, and enlisting volunteers as much as possible.

#### Network / Partnerships

We will partner with organisations who share our vision that no child should be denied the right to appropriate, life-saving health care due to financial or systematic constraints. The trustees and their network will initially identify and reach out to organisations in the UK and India who have aligned objectives to identify opportunities to work together. Through an expanded network and introductions made via networking, presentations will be made to create awareness and identify projects/avenues where the charity and its partners can provide aid or assistance.

We will formalise key partnerships via a formal MOU, recognising the need for inter-organisational co-operation to identify, communicate and interact with UK based institutional funding bodies, corporations, organisations, doctors and other professionals introduced by our associates and partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.

For example, an MOU would cover:

- Applying for financial assistance (grants) on behalf of a charity (for its projects)
- Providing financial assistance to and/or fund raising on behalf of a charity
- Conducting research
- Facilitation of training, exchange programs
- Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training
- Consulting services for specific objectives (e.g. cost reduction, process optimisation, Health Management & Training practices, Health Advisory, Community Reach, Risk Management, Financial Management etc.)

## **Policy on grant making**

Applicants can apply via email, schedule on-site meetings, filled-in applications, referral organisations (hospitals, charities, social organization, foundations etc.), website etc.

- Trustees will evaluate each request on a case to case basis prior to taking a decision to ensure (a) the reasonableness of the assistance sought and (b) the alignment with the charity objectives
- Trustees will evaluate proposals based on a number of criteria and information from applicants, including:
  - Number of beneficiaries – neo-nates, children, expectant mothers
  - Nature of preventive programs, scope and coverage
  - Cost of treatments of each type of treatment/reasonableness of charges.
- The nature of grants would typically:
  - provide funds for specific projects or towards general activities carried out by charities, social/not-for-profit organizations in the UK and India
  - approve fund raising activities to support the charity's projects.

Trustees will work closely with chosen organisations to prepare and present proposals to grant-making bodies and corporates for aid towards the identified projects in the UK and India

## **Outlook and Opportunities**

### UN Projects

Action Line 8 towards economic growth (by empowering support groups involved in health and social care generate surplus which provides for their sustenance as well as towards community programs:

EKAM aims to promote economic growth through the empowerment of support groups in the health and social care sector. These support groups may be able to generate surplus revenue through their operations, which can be used to sustain the group and also contribute to community programs.

This approach to economic growth is focused on supporting and empowering local organizations and communities, rather than relying on top-down, centralized efforts. By enabling these support groups to generate surplus revenue, they can become self-sustaining and potentially even expand their operations, which can contribute to the overall economic development of the community.

This approach can help to increase access to high-quality health care and support the development of effective and innovative treatments and technologies.

There are several ways that this program could be implemented, depending on the specific needs and priorities of the community or region. For example, the program could provide grants to support research and development efforts in areas such as disease prevention, treatment, and public health. It could also provide funding for the purchase of medical equipment or the enhancement of primary care facilities, such as clinics and hospitals.

It is important to ensure that any grants or funding provided through this program are used in an effective and efficient manner, and that they are targeted towards addressing the most pressing health needs in the community. It may also be helpful to establish clear goals and metrics to measure the success of the program and track its impact on health outcomes.

EKAM is focused on improving health and well-being by increasing funding for research and development, supplying medical equipment, and enhancing primary care medical facilities.

#### Participation in Healthcare system – Opportunities

The pandemic and fast changing technological environment in healthcare system is presenting a lot of opportunities and the challenges in the following areas. It has

also brought to the fore importance of Public Healthcare Support Systems including Vaccination, Digital Infrastructure, Trained resources and quick access to community volunteers.

- Providing quality and affordable healthcare for all and especially for the rural and inaccessible areas.
- Healthcare system asset management in view of the increased energy costs.
- Health care information system management and most importantly
- Knowledge, training, and management of healthcare providers.

### Focus Areas

EKAM UK will be looking towards opportunities in areas of heart health, hypertension, juvenile diabetes, cancer, skin diseases etc.

EKAM UK will aim to identify areas in terms of providing technical training / support projects in short / medium term) including as subject matter experts sharing information & involvement in intervention, expansion & including educational projects.

Hypertension, or high blood pressure, is a condition where the force of the blood against the walls of the arteries is consistently too high. If left untreated, it can lead to serious health problems, including heart disease and stroke.

Type 2 diabetes is a chronic condition where the body doesn't produce enough insulin or can't properly use the insulin it produces. Insulin is crucial for regulating blood sugar levels, and when this process is impaired, it leads to high blood sugar.

EKAM UK will look to conduct free health camps in major towns and cities in UK as part of commitment to promote health and well-being in 2024.

### Challenges faced

Access to funds is the most important challenge coupled with awareness, training and building sustainable healthcare.

Health, hygiene, and sanitation play a very crucial role in the disease prevention and the maintenance of toilet facilities is a big challenge in schools and hospitals.

### Others

- Building NUTRI gardens in health centres
- MITS (Mother and Infant Tracking System)
- Dear Child (*Chella Pilla*) scheme in which the babies discharged from SNCU are monitored closely with Village health nurse
- Awareness and Training programmes for adolescent girls
- Equipment supports to government hospitals

- Create immediate impact and along with direct fund support to the babies treatment
- Building mentors across geographical areas with livelihood support, scholarship and incentivisation model who in turn can run awareness and training programmes
- Making EKAM website as one stop trustworthy knowledge provider for Mothers and Children by integrating experts, govts and community

#### Other opportunities

- Digital outreach - Focussing on moving digitally and exploring hybrid solutions to bridge the gap, with learnings from the global pandemic.
- Fostering exchanges visits of specialists, consultants, doctors, and nurses from (resource & skills) abundantly rich countries like India to the UK or wherever the demand needs to be strategically met.
- Kindle more number of entities across the UK & India to be a vital part of combating child healthcare financial constraints that are being a barrier.
- Exploring technology and tools that enables & delivers better understanding of vital health indicators, provides for storing and retrieving medical records, dissemination of information and for use in medical research & training.
- Towards capacity building and bridging between the countries and the needy
- Closer Home projects in UK (select charities) – to support mental health, heart care, juvenile diabetes as examples.
- Supporting infrastructure projects (e.g., hospitals, medical colleges which are linked to social programs, and related community health, research, technical training, knowledge share.
- Continue drive for C-19 response
- Provide Health Consulting in areas of knowledge share by subject matter experts, community health program implementation, risk management and governance, medical infrastructure, operational best practices & financial management.

#### **Ongoing Programs**

- Friends of EKAM', providing a platform for the supporters of the charity to be actively involved in technical work, research, discussions, and fundraising.
- EKAM continues to be a mentor of Young Ambassadors, as a as a platform for youngsters to get involved in the charity's projects and mentor of Share A Smile (SAS), an initiative from UK's children group.
- EKAM will support artists / subject matter experts in various disciplines by engaging with them to promote EKAM cause

#### **Achievements and performance**

##### Partnerships

We had entered a MOU with EKAM Foundation, India in 2018. The charity and EKAM Foundation share the vision that no child should be denied right to appropriate,

lifesaving healthcare due to financial or systematic constraints. The MOU has been further extended till Mar 2026.

The said MOU provides for:

- Jointly exploring grant opportunities/aid towards projects and events carried out in India towards caring and saving lives of babies, children and young mothers, recognising the need for inter organisational co-operation for identification, communication and interaction with UK based organisations, doctors and other professionals of Indian Origin, introduced by EKAM Foundation or its other partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.
- Building on network developed & organic reach via the above activities.
- The following specific areas of work and support:
  - Providing financial assistance and/or fundraising
  - Conducting research
  - Facilitation of training, exchange programs
  - Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training

During the reporting period, an amount equivalent to £ 20,002 was incurred towards providing equipment and books. This was implemented by EKAM Foundation and included under payments.

This included providing a video bronchoscope equipment and accessories to Aurangabad Government Medical College and Hospital, Maharashtra, which is used in the treatment and management of various respiratory illnesses.

This hospital is recognised as a dedicated Covid-19 hospital for Aurangabad and nearby districts, with 900 beds for management of Covid patients.

Medical equipment is an essential health intervention tool used by medical professionals for prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of disease and for rehabilitation of patients.

## **Initiatives**

We continue to support the following ongoing initiatives

### **Nurture Early for Optimal Nutrition (NEON) (The 1<sup>st</sup> 1000 Days)**

The first 1,000 days of a child's life are an important period for growth & cognitive development. Effective intervention in early life have potential to reduce the growth of short- & long-term conditions such as nutritional deficiencies, obesity, heart disease and diabetes.

The NEON programme is an NIHR-funded multiphase project with an aim to optimise infant feeding, care, and dental hygiene practices of South Asians (SA) infant in East London using the WHO-recommended PLA cycle. NEON comprises of the following phases, with interaction with academics, experts in PLA cycle & multilingual community-facilitators.

- Formative and feasibility study
- Intervention Development (ID) – development of PLA cycle toolkit in partnership with communities eg development of culturally tailored recipe book led by communities
- Pilot Randomised Controlled Trial (RCT) in in East London (London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Newham, and Waltham Forest

The NEON programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner, and we will be providing support in engagement with community in East London, advisory role being part of the NEON steering team & providing inputs on policy making.

### **Children in Homeless Accommodation Managing Pandemic Invisibility Or Non-inclusive Strategies (CHAMPIONS)**

Champions is a national initiative (national project) funded by Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) to study the impacts of COVID-19 on children and their families in temporary accommodation (TA) conditions experiencing homelessness & come up with recommendations. It is led by University College London alongside De Montfort University in partnership with EKAM UK, Public Health Arts & US, The Children's Society, the British Association for Community Child Health, and others. The project is funded by the UK Economic and Social Research Council and others.

Together with families and professionals, the team will co- develop a website to share knowledge about the impact of Covid-19 on the children and families and recommendations for health, education, housing services and to influence policy.

The Champions programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner. EKAM will also be involved in community engagement and participation in policy writing & an active role in the steering committee.

### **Public benefit**

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties. The public benefit of the charity's activities is supporting and enablement of efforts in saving lives of babies, young children and mothers and these were achieved principally by the award of grants and donations.

### **Funds materially in deficit**

There are none to report.

## Risks

Due to the initial stage of the charity, the trustees have assessed the key risks to be operations and finances and are satisfied that process is in place to manage these risks as follows:

### Operations

- The key operational risk is damage to the charity's name due to incorrect selection of partners or inadequate utilisation of grants.
- This is addressed by due diligence checks done (i) through references obtained by trustees prior to engagement with external parties and (ii) by obtaining project status reports from grant receivers.
- A grant and operations committee is being established to ensure trustee oversight over potential donor/grant recipients, funding sources and potential service providers.

### Finance

- The key financial risk is insufficient funding to meet grant or operational expenses.
- This is addressed by trustees focussing on collaborative projects for fundraising and diversify revenue streams to ensure there is no overreliance on income from one source.

## **Structure, governance, and management**

### Financial review

The results for the charity were in line with the trustees' expectations, as the charity's operations are in initial stages. The charity will continue to focus on project-based funding, i.e., applying for grants or undertaking fundraising activities based on the projects identified and agreed with the recipient partner. Fundraising for general funds will continue to be through social networking and events.

### Trustee selection & appointments

Trustees are identified from the medical community, accounting/management professionals and persons with links to the corporate community and experienced in strategy and operations, finance, fundraising, donor management, social media, communication, and campaigning.

Trustees will be responsible for the overall work of the charity, including internal administration and compliance with all laws and regulations in the UK. Trustees will meet periodically and decide on fundraising, invite proposals, evaluate proposals, arrange for fund transfer through banking channels and monitor outcomes.

Initial trustees are appointed for a term of 3 years (subject to re-appointment). New trustees are appointed for an initial term of 3 years. Trustee appointments and renewed appointments are by way of resolution passed at the trustee meeting. The charity will have a minimum of 3 and maximum of 12 trustees as per its constitution.

## **Report of the trustees for the period ended 31 March 2022**

The trustees of EKAM UK (the 'charity') present their 4th annual report and financial statements as a charitable incorporated organization (CIO) for the charity's period ended 31 March 2022.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's constitution and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities – SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

The charity was registered with the Charity Commission as a CIO on 14 December 2017.

### **Objectives and activities**

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aim and objectives and in planning its future activities, in particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

### **Purpose and aims**

The charity was established for the promotion and protection of good health for public benefit by providing financial and technical assistance and support to charities, social organisations, medical centres and non-profit organisations in UK and India who are involved/engaged in providing health care, education care and support to neonates, infants, young adults and mothers including providing food, medicines, equipment, training, research grants/facilities and knowledge sharing.

We aim to support projects primarily related to saving lives of babies, young children and young mothers, ranging from 0-19 years. We do so, by partnering with organisations who provide medical treatment and health care and by providing various types of support.

We seek out partnerships with organisations who put vulnerable babies and young children/mothers at the centre of their work, as well as responding to requests for funding that come to us via various channels (e.g., website, emails, references).

We will fund or apply for grants for both new and existing charities and organisations, small, medium, or large, provided they can demonstrate the difference they are making.

We aim to, from our interactions and references provided, develop a network with a view to connecting people through shared values. This would further provide

opportunities for subject matter experts to share their skills and knowledge. Not only to help a particular project, but also provide a way to reduce the operational costs for organisations by sharing resources.

We also aim to partner with organisations who can provide vocational and technical training to vulnerable children post treatment to enable them to return to normalcy. To further these objectives, we aim to connect with corporates for their support via their CSR initiatives or for subsidies, to a wider donor community for financial support and with training institutes/organisations.

The charity welcomes applications for joint work with other organisations and will work in partnership with other grant-makers wherever possible.

To ensure full transparency, we aim to ensure that 100% of donations/funded grants reach the intended recipient/organisation and will pursue other channels (e.g., sponsorships, Corporate CSR, crowd funding, goodwill payments etc.) to support our administration process. We will do this by sharing resources with partners, and enlisting volunteers as much as possible.

### Network / Partnerships

We will partner with organisations who share our vision that no child should be denied the right to appropriate, life-saving health care due to financial or systematic constraints. The trustees and their network will initially identify and reach out to organisations in the UK and India who have aligned objectives to identify opportunities to work together. Through an expanded network and introductions made via networking, presentations will be made to create awareness and identify projects/avenues where the charity and its partners can provide aid or assistance.

We will formalise key partnerships via a formal MOU, recognising the need for inter-organisational co-operation to identify, communicate and interact with UK based institutional funding bodies, corporations, organisations, doctors and other professionals of Indian Origin introduced by our associates and partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.

For example, an MOU would cover:

- Applying for financial assistance (grants) on behalf of a charity (for its projects)
- Providing financial assistance to and/or fund raising on behalf of a charity
- Conducting research
- Facilitation of training, exchange programs
- Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training
- Consulting services for specific objectives (e.g. cost reduction, process optimisation, Health Management & Training practices, Health Advisory, Community Reach, Risk Management, Financial Management etc.)

## **Policy on grant making**

Applicants can apply via email, schedule on-site meetings, filled-in applications, referral organisations (hospitals, charities, social organization, foundations etc.), website etc.

- Trustees will evaluate each request on a case to case basis prior to taking a decision to ensure (a) the reasonableness of the assistance sought and (b) the alignment with the charity objectives
- Trustees will evaluate proposals based on a number of criteria and information from applicants, including:
  - Number of beneficiaries – neo-nates, children, expectant mothers
  - Nature of preventive programs, scope and coverage
  - Cost of treatments of each type of treatment/reasonableness of charges.
- The nature of grants would typically:
  - provide funds for specific projects or towards general activities carried out by charities, social/not-for-profit organizations in the UK and India
  - approve fund raising activities to support the charity's projects.

Trustees will work closely with chosen organisations to prepare and present proposals to grant-making bodies and corporates for aid towards the identified projects in the UK and India

## **Outlook and Opportunities**

### UN Projects

Action Line 8 towards economic growth (by empowering support groups involved in health and social care generate surplus which provides for their sustenance as well as towards community programs:

EKAM aims to promote economic growth through the empowerment of support groups in the health and social care sector. These support groups may be able to generate surplus revenue through their operations, which can be used to sustain the group and also contribute to community programs.

This approach to economic growth is focused on supporting and empowering local organizations and communities, rather than relying on top-down, centralized efforts. By enabling these support groups to generate surplus revenue, they can become self-sustaining and potentially even expand their operations, which can contribute to the overall economic development of the community.

It is important to ensure that any support provided to these groups is done in a way that is fair and transparent, and that the surplus revenue generated is used in a responsible and accountable manner to benefit the community. It may also be helpful to establish clear goals and metrics to measure the success of the program and track its impact on economic growth.

Action Line 3 for good health and well-being by identifying sources & providing more grants towards research & development, supply of medical equipment or enhancing primary care medical facilities:

EKAM aims to improve health outcomes by identifying and addressing key sources of health problems, and providing support for research and development, medical equipment, and primary care facilities. This approach can help to increase access to high-quality health care and support the development of effective and innovative treatments and technologies.

There are several ways that this program could be implemented, depending on the specific needs and priorities of the community or region. For example, the program could provide grants to support research and development efforts in areas such as disease prevention, treatment, and public health. It could also provide funding for the purchase of medical equipment or the enhancement of primary care facilities, such as clinics and hospitals.

It is important to ensure that any grants or funding provided through this program are used in an effective and efficient manner, and that they are targeted towards addressing the most pressing health needs in the community. It may also be helpful to establish clear goals and metrics to measure the success of the program and track its impact on health outcomes.

EKAM is focused on improving health and well-being by increasing funding for research and development, supplying medical equipment, and enhancing primary care medical facilities.

#### Participation in Healthcare system – Opportunities

The pandemic and fast changing technological environment in healthcare system is presenting a lot of opportunities and the challenges in the following areas. It has also brought to the fore importance of Public Healthcare Support Systems including Vaccination, Digital Infrastructure, Trained resources and quick access to community volunteers.

- Providing quality and affordable healthcare for all and especially for the rural and inaccessible areas.
- Healthcare system asset management in view of the increased energy costs.
- Health care information system management and most importantly
- Knowledge, training, and management of healthcare providers.

### Challenges faced

Access to funds is the most important challenge coupled with awareness, training and building sustainable healthcare.

Health, hygiene and sanitation play a very crucial role in the disease prevention and the maintenance of toilet facilities is a big challenge in schools and hospitals.

### Others

- Building NUTRI gardens in health centres
- MITS (Mother and Infant Tracking System)
- Dear Child (*Chella Pilla*) scheme in which the babies discharged from SNCU are monitored closely with Village health nurse
- Awareness and Training programmes for adolescent girls
- Equipment supports to government hospitals
- Create immediate impact and along with direct fund support to the babies treatment
- Building mentors across geographical areas with livelihood support, scholarship and incentivisation model who in turn can run awareness and training programmes
- Making EKAM website as one stop trustworthy knowledge provider for Mothers and Children by integrating experts, govts and community

### Other opportunities

- Digital outreach - Focussing on moving digitally and exploring hybrid solutions to bridge the gap, with learnings from the global pandemic.
- Fostering exchanges visits of specialists, consultants, doctors, and nurses from (resource & skills) abundantly rich countries like India to the UK or wherever the demand needs to be strategically met.
- Kindle more number of entities across the UK & India to be a vital part of combating child healthcare financial constraints that are being a barrier.
- Exploring technology and tools that enables & delivers better understanding of vital health indicators, provides for storing and retrieving medical records, dissemination of information and for use in medical research & training.
- Towards capacity building and bridging between the countries and the needy
- Closer Home projects in UK (select charities) – to support mental health, heart care, juvenile diabetes as examples.
- Supporting infrastructure projects (e.g., hospitals, medical colleges which are linked to social programs, and related community health, research, technical training, knowledge share.

- Continue drive for C-19 response
- Provide Health Consulting in areas of knowledge share by subject matter experts, community health program implementation, risk management and governance, medical infrastructure, operational best practices & financial management.

### **Ongoing Programs**

- Friends of EKAM', providing a platform for the supporters of the charity to be actively involved in technical work, research, discussions, and fundraising.
- Established a program called 'Young Ambassadors', as a platform for youngsters to get involved in the charity's projects (e.g., to create awareness of the charity's work, conduct events, showcase their skills, identify local expertise, merchandising etc.)
- EKAM is a mentor of Share A Smile (SAS), an initiative from UK's children group.
- EKAM will support artists in various disciplines by engaging with them to promote EKAM cause

### **Achievements and performance**

#### Partnerships

We had entered a MOU with EKAM Foundation, India in 2018. The charity and EKAM Foundation share the vision that no child should be denied right to appropriate, lifesaving healthcare due to financial or systematic constraints. The MOU has been further extended till Mar 2026.

The said MOU provides for:

- Jointly exploring grant opportunities/aid towards projects and events carried out in India towards caring and saving lives of babies, children and young mothers, recognising the need for inter organisational co-operation for identification, communication and interaction with UK based organisations, doctors and other professionals of Indian Origin, introduced by EKAM Foundation or its other partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.
- Building on network developed & organic reach via the above activities.
- The following specific areas of work and support:
  - Providing financial assistance and/or fundraising
  - Conducting research
  - Facilitation of training, exchange programs
  - Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training

## **Initiatives**

We continue to support the following ongoing initiatives

### **Nurture Early for Optimal Nutrition (NEON) (The 1<sup>st</sup> 1000 Days)**

The first 1,000 days of a child's life are an important period for growth & cognitive development. Effective intervention in early life have potential to reduce the growth of short- & long-term conditions such as nutritional deficiencies, obesity, heart disease and diabetes.

The NEON programme is an NIHR-funded multiphase project with an aim to optimise infant feeding, care, and dental hygiene practices of South Asians (SA) infant in East London using the WHO-recommended PLA cycle. NEON comprises of the following phases, with interaction with academics, experts in PLA cycle & multilingual community-facilitators.

- Formative and feasibility study
- Intervention Development (ID) – development of PLA cycle toolkit in partnership with communities eg development of culturally tailored recipe book led by communities
- Pilot Randomised Controlled Trial (RCT) in in East London (London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Newham, and Waltham Forest

The Participatory Learning and Action (PLA) cycle is a low-cost bottom-up approach that mobilises communities to identify, prioritise, implement, and evaluate their needs and solutions through culturally sensitive group discussions led by community facilitators.

The NEON programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner, and we will be providing support in engagement with community in East London, advisory role being part of the NEON steering team & providing inputs on policy making.

## **Update**

The NEON three-arm pilot RCT study began in July 2021 and is expected to run until May 2023. The study is mainly divided into two phases – the intervention development phase (July 2021 – April 2022) and the intervention delivery phase (March 2022 – May 2023).

## **1<sup>st</sup> Phase**

Members from within the community were recruited as facilitators to collaboratively work with researchers and experts to develop a culturally sensitive NEON intervention toolkit. The tool kit consists of a facilitator manual, picture cards detailing recommended and non-recommended feeding, care and dental hygiene practices with solutions to address these, healthy infant cultural recipes, community asset maps including list of resources and services supporting infant feeding, care and dental hygiene practices.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Phase

3 arm pilot RCT was completed and delivered in Newham and Tower Hamlets. This involved:

- 2 intervention arms (face-to-face and online) & 1 control arm (usual care).
- The intervention is being delivered by trained multilingual community facilitators to their respective ethnic/language groups
- 263 participants were recruited through multiple channels such as GPs, midwives, health visitors and facilitators during Mar 2022 to Sep 2022. The participants are mothers of 0–2-year-olds from Indian, Bangladeshi, Pakistani and Sri Lankan communities.

PLA sessions were commenced in October 22 & run till February 2023.

- Each session involves 7-8 participants in both the face-to-face arm at children's centres and the online arm.
- 5 of these 8 sessions have been completed so far
- Each session covers various topics and activities over child nutrition are being delivered based on the toolkit.
- Data is being collected on feeding practices through surveys, height and weight measurements of the children and feedback from the participants at different timepoints from Oct 2022 to April 2023. This data will then be analysed to assess the retention of participants, acceptability and feasibility of the intervention (sessions delivered), impact compared to those in the control arm and key learnings to adapt for a successful largescale definitive RCT.

### **Children in Homeless Accommodation Managing Pandemic Invisibility Or Non-inclusive Strategies (CHAMPIONS)**

Champions is a national initiative (national project) funded by Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) to study the impacts of COVID-19 on children and their families in temporary accommodation (TA) conditions experiencing homelessness & come up with recommendations. It is led by University College London alongside De Montfort University in partnership with EKAM UK, Public Health Arts & US, The Children's Society, the British Association for Community Child Health, and others. The project is funded by the UK Economic and Social Research Council and others.

Together with families and professionals, the team will co- develop a website to share knowledge about the impact of Covid-19 on the children and families and recommendations for health, education, housing services and to influence policy.

Children experiencing homelessness (especially those under age 5) are at increased risk of morbidity & mortality and at risk of health, development, emotional, behavioural, mental, and social problems due to the environment they live and the impact of moving frequently from their homes. Further, families in such a situation have difficulties accessing support services in a timely manner.

The Champions programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner.

EKAM will also be involved in community engagement and participation in policy writing & an active role in the steering committee.

Champions Research has been critical for providing evidence and informing the APPG call for evidence on temporary accommodation. They have recently launched a policy brief that they will share with policy makers and influences of change.

### Update

The research team is working alongside families and the professionals working with them to co-develop recommendations for future support and best practices. These are grounded in research evidence in order to support families’ recovery after the pandemic and enable professionals to prepare for future health crises.

4 initial work packages were completed in September 2022 and additional projects have been funded by University College London internal funds, partner De Montfort University internal funds and the Rosetrees Trust.

Scoping Review	Examination of public health projects around the world to identify effective strategies for reaching marginalised and excluded children under 5, and for improving their access to, and use of, early child health programmes. This review summarises 10 years of literature from around the world on improving access to, coverage, and use of healthcare for children in these populations. It is due to be officially launched online on the website by the end of January 2023.
Needs Analysis	The evidence-generation involved primary co-production work with children under 5 and their families, with an additional focus on peer relationships and young people developed later as we discovered a need during the pandemic for including the views of this age group as well. We are planning to publish our final Needs Analysis Report in early 2023 via an official launch online on our website.
Feasibility Study	Findings from the interviews and a survey with professionals working for the NHS, local authorities, charities and other groups that support families affected by homelessness with young children, via an official launch online on our website in early 2023.
Knowledge Exchange	<p>Sharing the results of the work with policymakers, local authorities and families, and advocating for their application in policy, such as in UK child health programmes or assistance for families in temporary accommodation to deal with COVID-19.</p> <p>This has been implemented via our interactive website at <a href="https://www.championsproject.co.uk">https://www.championsproject.co.uk</a>, which includes sections on our study and partners, study news and dissemination nationally and internationally, outputs from our work with our lived experiences participant panel and a public health messaging-tailored section of the website which includes public service worker stories in addition to participant artwork.</p>

### Ongoing

The design and implement parenting support programmes for families living in temporary accommodation. This is due to be submitted to the Economic and Social Research Council in the next 6 months in collaboration with our national consortium

of partners including De Montfort University, EKAM UK, Public Health Arts & US, The Children's Society, the British Association for Community Child Health, and others. Our key proposed project will involve setting up a mobile health and wellbeing bus, co-designed with families and children affected by homelessness or living in temporary accommodation, in order to supplement direct support access to the most vulnerable families and children affected.

#### Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties. The public benefit of the charity's activities is supporting and enablement of efforts in saving lives of babies, young children and mothers and these were achieved principally by the award of grants and donations.

#### Funds materially in deficit

There are none to report.

#### Risks

Due to the initial stage of the charity, the trustees have assessed the key risks to be operations and finances and are satisfied that process is in place to manage these risks as follows:

#### Operations

- The key operational risk is damage to the charity's name due to incorrect selection of partners or inadequate utilisation of grants.
- This is addressed by due diligence checks done (i) through references obtained by trustees prior to engagement with external parties and (ii) by obtaining project status reports from grant receivers.
- A grant and operations committee is being established to ensure trustee oversight over potential donor/grant recipients, funding sources and potential service providers.

#### Finance

- The key financial risk is insufficient funding to meet grant or operational expenses.
- This is addressed by trustees focussing on collaborative projects for fundraising and diversify revenue streams to ensure there is no overreliance on income from one source.

### **Structure, governance, and management**

#### Financial review

The results for the charity were in line with the trustees' expectations, as the charity's operations are in initial stages. The charity will continue to focus on project-based funding, i.e., applying for grants or undertaking fundraising activities based on the

projects identified and agreed with the recipient partner. Fundraising for general funds will continue to be through social networking and events.

#### Trustee selection & appointments

Trustees are identified from the medical community, accounting/management professionals and persons with links to the corporate community and experienced in strategy and operations, finance, fundraising, donor management, social media, communication, and campaigning.

Trustees will be responsible for the overall work of the charity, including internal administration and compliance with all laws and regulations in the UK. Trustees will meet periodically and decide on fundraising, invite proposals, evaluate proposals, arrange for fund transfer through banking channels and monitor outcomes.

Initial trustees are appointed for a term of 3 years (subject to re-appointment). New trustees are also appointed for a term of 3 years. Trustee appointments and renewed appointments are by way of resolution passed at the trustee meeting. The charity will have a minimum of 3 and maximum of 12 trustees as per its constitution.

#### Remuneration policy for trustees

No payments were made to trustees in the reporting period.

#### Investment policy

Due to the currently small size of the charity and scale of its operations, there is none to report at the time of this report.

#### Reserves policy

The charity does not have a reserves policy as its operations are in its early stages. The excess of income over expenditure is included within the general reserve of and is represented as balance in bank account.

## **Report of the trustees for the period ended 31 March 2021**

The trustees of EKAM UK (the 'charity') present their 3rd annual report and financial statements as a charitable incorporated organization (CIO) for the charity's period ended 31 March 2021.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the charity's constitution and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities – SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

The charity was registered with the Charity Commission as a CIO on 14 December 2017. The first report covered the period of activities from this date to 31 March 2019. The charity's bank account was opened in early 2018 and financial activities commenced from May 2018.

### **Objectives and activities**

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aim and objectives and in planning its future activities, in particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

### **Purpose and aims**

The charity was established for the promotion and protection of good health for public benefit by providing financial and technical assistance and support to charities, social organisations, medical centres and non-profit organisations in UK and India who are involved/engaged in providing health care, education care and support to neonates, infants, young adults and mothers including providing food, medicines, equipment, training, research grants/facilities and knowledge sharing.

We aim to support projects primarily related to saving lives of babies, young children and young mothers, ranging from 0-19 years. We do so, by partnering with organisations who provide medical treatment and health care and by providing various types of support.

We seek out partnerships with organisations who put vulnerable babies and young children/mothers at the centre of their work, as well as responding to requests for funding that come to us via various channels (e.g., website, emails, references).

We will fund or apply for grants for both new and existing charities and organisations, small, medium, or large, provided they can demonstrate the difference they are making.

We aim to, from our interactions and references provided, develop a network with a view to connecting people through shared values. This would further provide opportunities for subject matter experts to share their skills and knowledge. Not only to help a particular project, but also provide a way to reduce the operational costs for organisations by sharing resources.

We also aim to partner with organisations who can provide vocational and technical training to vulnerable children post treatment to enable them to return to normalcy. To further these objectives, we aim to connect with corporates for their support via their CSR initiatives or for subsidies, to a wider donor community for financial support and with training institutes/organisations.

The charity welcomes applications for joint work with other organisations and will work in partnership with other grant-makers wherever possible.

To ensure full transparency, we aim to ensure that 100% of donations/funded grants reach the intended recipient/organisation (i.e., zero cost overheads) and will pursue other channels (e.g., sponsorships, Corporate CSR, crowd funding, goodwill payments etc.) to support our administration process. We will do this by sharing resources with partners, and enlisting volunteers as much as possible.

### Network / Partnerships

We will partner with organisations who share our vision that no child should be denied the right to appropriate, life-saving health care due to financial or systematic constraints. The trustees and their network will initially identify and reach out to organisations in the UK and India who have aligned objectives to identify opportunities to work together. Through an expanded network and introductions made via networking, presentations will be made to create awareness and identify projects/avenues where the charity and its partners can provide aid or assistance.

We will formalise key partnerships via a formal MOU, recognising the need for inter-organisational co-operation to identify, communicate and interact with UK based institutional funding bodies, corporations, organisations, doctors and other professionals of Indian Origin introduced by our associates and partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.

For example, an MOU would cover:

- Applying for financial assistance (grants) on behalf of a charity (for its projects)
- Providing financial assistance to and/or fund raising on behalf of a charity
- Conducting research
- Facilitation of training, exchange programs
- Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training
- Consulting services for specific objectives (e.g. cost reduction, process optimisation)

## **Policy on grant making**

Applicants can apply via email, schedule on-site meetings, filled-in applications, referral organisations (hospitals, charities, social organization, foundations etc.), website etc.

- Trustees will evaluate each request on a case to case basis prior to taking a decision to ensure (a) the reasonableness of the assistance sought and (b) the alignment with the charity objectives
- Trustees will evaluate proposals based on a number of criteria and information from applicants, including:
  - Number of beneficiaries – neo-nates, children, expectant mothers
  - Nature of preventive programs, scope and coverage
  - Cost of treatments of each type of treatment/reasonableness of charges.
- The nature of grants would typically:
  - provide funds for specific projects or towards general activities carried out by charities, social/not-for-profit organizations in the UK and India
  - approve fund raising activities to support the charity's projects.

Trustees will work closely with chosen organisations to prepare and present proposals to grant-making bodies and corporates for aid towards the identified projects in the UK and India

## **Achievements and performance**

### Partnerships

In September 2018, the charity entered into a MOU with EKAM Foundation, India for an initial period of three years. The charity and EKAM Foundation share the vision that no child should be denied right to appropriate, lifesaving healthcare due to financial or systematic constraints. The said MOU provides for:

- Jointly exploring grant opportunities/aid towards projects and events carried out in India towards caring and saving lives of babies, children and young mothers, recognising the need for inter organisational co-operation for identification, communication and interaction with UK based organisations, doctors and other professionals of Indian Origin, introduced by EKAM Foundation or its other partners including International Chapters, well-wishers and associates across the world.
- Building on network developed & organic reach via the above activities.
- The following specific areas of work and support:
  - Providing financial assistance and/or fundraising
  - Conducting research
  - Facilitation of training, exchange programs
  - Exchange of best practices, including on-site & off-site training

## Activities

- Established a program for 'Friends of EKAM', providing a platform for the supporters of the charity to be actively involved in technical work, research, discussions, and fundraising.
- Established a program called 'Young Ambassadors', as a platform for youngsters to get involved in the charity's projects (e.g., to create awareness of the charity's work, conduct events, showcase their skills, identify local expertise, merchandising etc.)
- EKAM is a mentor of Share A Smile (SAS), an initiative from UK's children group.
- An event was organised by NETG to raise funds for EKAM's India projects.

## Initiatives

Some of the initiatives that the charity is currently working on include:

### Nurture Early for Optimal Nutrition (NEON) (The 1<sup>st</sup> 1000 Days)

**Purpose** The first 1,000 days of a child's life are an important period for growth & cognitive development. Effective intervention in early life have potential to reduce the growth of short- & long-term conditions such as nutritional deficiencies, obesity, heart disease and diabetes.

**Project & approach** The NEON programme is an NIHR-funded multiphase project with an aim to optimise infant feeding, care, and dental hygiene practices of South Asians (SA) infant in East London using the WHO-recommended PLA cycle. NEON comprises of the following phases, with interaction with academics, experts in PLA cycle & multilingual community-facilitators.

- Formative and feasibility study
- Intervention Development (ID) – development of PLA cycle toolkit in partnership with communities eg development of culturally tailored recipe book led by communities
- Pilot Randomised Controlled Trial (RCT) in in East London (London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Newham, and Waltham Forest

The Participatory Learning and Action (PLA) cycle is a low-cost bottom-up approach that mobilises communities to identify, prioritise, implement, and evaluate their needs and solutions through culturally sensitive group discussions led by community facilitators.

NEON is led by Prof Monica Lakhanpaul and Dr Logan Manikam with academic colleagues at UCL and a multidisciplinary research team. The approach can also be adapted for other communities and health issues. If successful, a cluster RCT will follow in East London with subsequent scale up across the UK.

Our involvement The NEON programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner, and we will be providing support in engagement with community in East London, advisory role being part of the NEON steering team & providing inputs on policy making.

Children in Homeless Accommodation Managing Pandemic Invisibility Or Non-inclusive Strategies (CHAMPIONS)

Purpose CHAMPIONS is a national project funded by Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) to study the impacts of COVID-19 on children and their families in temporary accommodation (TA) due to experiencing homelessness & co-create recommendations to address the challenges they face.

Together with families and professionals, the team have co-developed a website to share knowledge about the impact of Covid-19 on the children and families and recommendations for health, education, housing services and to influence policy.

Children experiencing homelessness (especially those under age 5) are at increased risk of morbidity & mortality and at risk of health, developmental, emotional, behavioural, mental, and social problems due to the environment they live in and the impact of moving frequently from their homes. Further, families in such a situation have difficulties accessing support services in a timely manner.

Project & approach The project has developed an innovative digital platform to facilitate engagement with participants and stakeholders, dissemination of public health messages, and giving a voice to families through their lived experiences. Policy briefings, newsletters, and other materials relevant to stakeholders are also hosted on the platform.

The project is conducting interviews and surveys with families in TA and the professionals that support them, the information from which will be used to develop recommendations.

The project is led by Professor Monica Lakhanpaul (UCL) and was co-led by Diana Rosenthal (UCL) until April 2021. The rest of the team consists of multidisciplinary experts from UCL, De Montfort University and third sector organisations. They have engaged with other organisations in this area, as well as policymakers.

Our involvement The CHAMPIONS programme supports the EKAM vision to improve maternal and child healthcare needs in a cost efficient, community oriented and sustainable manner. EKAM is also involved in community engagement and participation in policy writing & has an active role in the steering committee.

## Opportunities

- Digital outreach - Focussing on moving digitally and exploring hybrid solutions to bridge the gap, with learnings from the global pandemic.
- Aligning to and prioritising with United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals:
  - Action Line 8 towards economic growth (by empowering support groups involved in health and social care generate surplus which provides for their sustenance as well as towards community programs
  - Action Line 3 for good health and well-being by identifying sources & providing more grants towards research & development, supply of medical equipment or enhancing primary care medical facilities
- Fostering exchanges visits of specialists, consultants, doctors, and nurses from (resource & skills) abundantly rich countries like India to the UK or wherever the demand needs to be strategically met.
- Kindle more number of entities across the UK & India to be a vital part of combating child healthcare financial constraints that are being a barrier.
- Exploring technology and tools that enables & delivers better understanding of vital health indicators, provides for storing and retrieving medical records, dissemination of information and for use in medical research & training.
- Towards capacity building and bridging between the countries and the needy
- Closer Home projects in UK (select charities) – to support mental health, heart care, juvenile diabetes as examples.
- Supporting infrastructure projects (e.g., hospitals, medical colleges which are linked to social programs, and related community health, research, technical training, knowledge share.
- Continue drive for C-19 response

## Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties. The public benefit of the charity's activities is supporting and enablement of efforts in saving lives of babies, young children and mothers and these were achieved principally by the award of grants and donations.

## Funds materially in deficit

There are none to report.

## Risks

Due to the initial stage of the charity, the trustees have assessed the key risks to be operations and finances and are satisfied that process is in place to manage these risks as follows:

### Operations

- The key operational risk is damage to the charity's name due to incorrect selection of partners or inadequate utilisation of grants.
- This is addressed by due diligence checks done (i) through references obtained by trustees prior to engagement with external parties and (ii) by obtaining project status reports from grant receivers.
- A grant and operations committee is being established to ensure trustee oversight over potential donor/grant recipients, funding sources and potential service providers.

### Finance

- The key financial risk is insufficient funding to meet grant or operational expenses.
- This is addressed by trustees focussing on collaborative projects for fundraising and diversify revenue streams to ensure there is no overreliance on income from one source.

## **Structure, governance, and management**

### Financial review

The results for the charity were in line with the trustees' expectations, as the charity's operations are in initial stages. The charity will continue to focus on project-based funding, i.e., applying for grants or undertaking fundraising activities based on the projects identified and agreed with the recipient partner. Fundraising for general funds will continue to be through social networking and events.

### Trustee selection & appointments

Trustees are identified from the medical community, accounting/management professionals and persons with links to the corporate community and experienced in strategy and operations, finance, fundraising, donor management, social media, communication, and campaigning.

Trustees will be responsible for the overall work of the charity, including internal administration and compliance with all laws and regulations in the UK. Trustees will meet periodically and decide on fundraising, invite proposals, evaluate proposals, arrange for fund transfer through banking channels and monitor outcomes.

Initial trustees are appointed for a term of 3 years (subject to re-appointment). New trustees are also appointed for a term of 3 years. Trustee appointments and renewed appointments are by way of resolution passed at the trustee meeting. The charity will have a minimum of 3 and maximum of 12 trustees as per its constitution.

Remuneration policy for trustees

No payments were made to trustees in the reporting period.

Investment policy

Due to the currently small size of the charity and scale of its operations, there is none to report at the time of this report.

Reserves policy

The charity does not have a reserves policy as its operations are in its early stages. The excess of income over expenditure, totalled £ 7,190 for the accounting period and is included within the general reserve of £ 10,159 and is represented as balance in bank account.

### Objectives of the charity

- 1) To save children and expectant mothers from poorer sections of the society, by providing appropriate and timely medical help.
- 2) To undertake epidemiological, anthropological, translational and cross-cultural research concerning women and children's medical needs as well health delivery institutions.
- 3) To help train medical and paramedical personnel in the delivery of preventive and curative health care.
- 4) To facilitate medical professional partnership between the UK and India.
