Principal activity and objectives 2022 – 2023

Youmanity seeks to devise, drive and deliver cultural projects for the benefit of communities globally. Promoting social inclusion, equality and human rights; projects can be part of a planned calendar or on ad-hoc community basis. Most notable amongst the projects is the annual photography award, where stories on themes ranging from human trafficking, gender and age discrimination to disability are shared by photographic entries from around the world. Entries are selected by a panel of judges and subsequently showcased in exhibitions in London and beyond.

World Mental Health Day

To mark World Mental Health Day Youmanity celebrated the world's first mindfulness train carriages. This was the result of a close cooperation between KeolisAmey Docklands (KAD), operators of Docklands Light Railway (DLR) and Youmanity which saw the deployment of the 'Inner Journey' passenger trains to support passenger wellbeing and mental health. This project was supported by Brain Recharge - a self-guided meditation app developed for use on DLR trains and designated relaxation areas located in Canary Wharf, Tower Gateway, Woolwich Arsenal DLR stations.

Report of the Trustees
For the Year Ended 30 June 2023

The final stage of the Entrepreneurs for Autonomy, Self-development+Equity (EASE) under the Erasmus+ programme for the empowerment of refugee women ended in this financial year. The project is funded by the consortium member for UK National Agency starting from Sep 2019 for a duration of 36 months.

Financial Review

The trustees review annually the financial resources and endeavor to pursue the charity's objectives without eroding the value of the capital endowment. The incoming resources of the charity in 2023 was £98,940 (2022: £52,968), and the expenditure was £63,408 (2022: £83,774), giving a surplus of £35,531. The incoming resources include a grant from the British Council for the Entrepreneurs for Autonomy, Self-development + Equality under the Erasmus + Programme.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Trustees' Responsibilities in Relation to the Financial Statements

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of the company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards. The law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure for the accounting period.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- * Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- * observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- * make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- * state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures, disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- * prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps to the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.


Basis of independent examiner's report

1 Basis of preparation

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK (FRS 102), the Company Act 2006, and with the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. There are no key judgements that the charity has made which have a significant effect on the accounts. The Trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

1.3 Accounting policies

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met. It is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to specific headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the

Restricted funds can only be used for restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1.4 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimated and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects both current and future periods.

1.5 Fund accounting

Restricted funds can only be used for restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or value, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Computer and Equipment : 10% pa. on a straight line basis

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and carrying value of the asset and is recognised in net income/expenditure for the year.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with bank, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of the kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2. Taxation

Financial Review



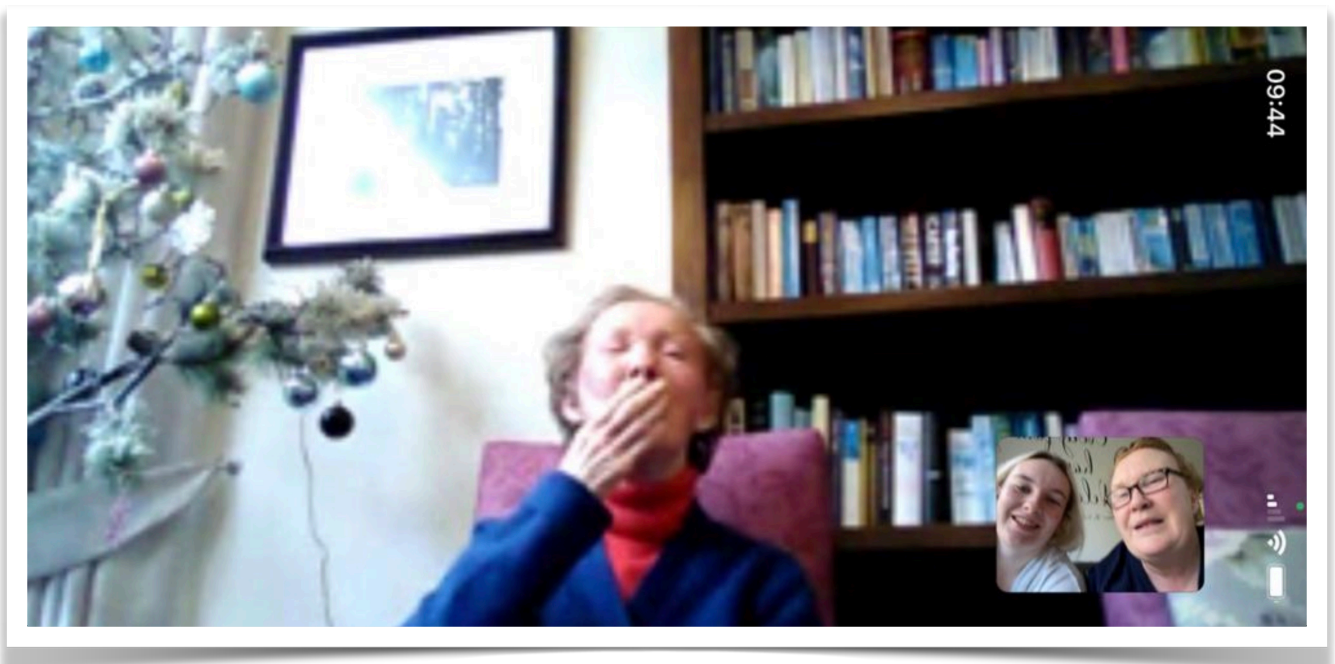

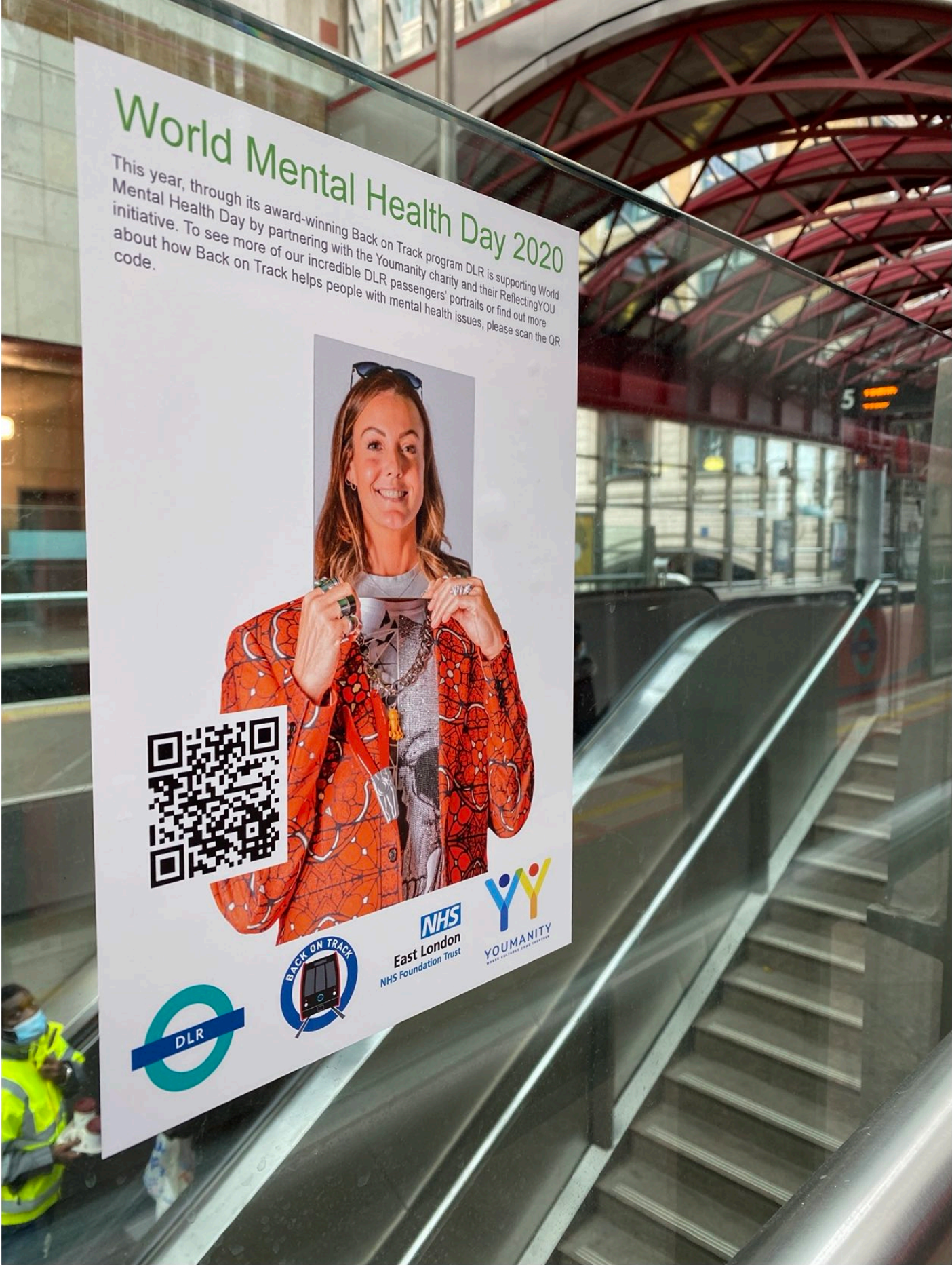

camera at an angle that allowed passengers' head and body combined in a single composite image. ReflectingYOU explored the idea that humans share far more characteristics than they would like to think.

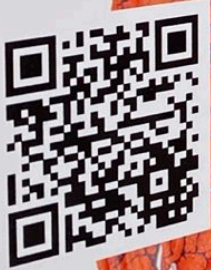

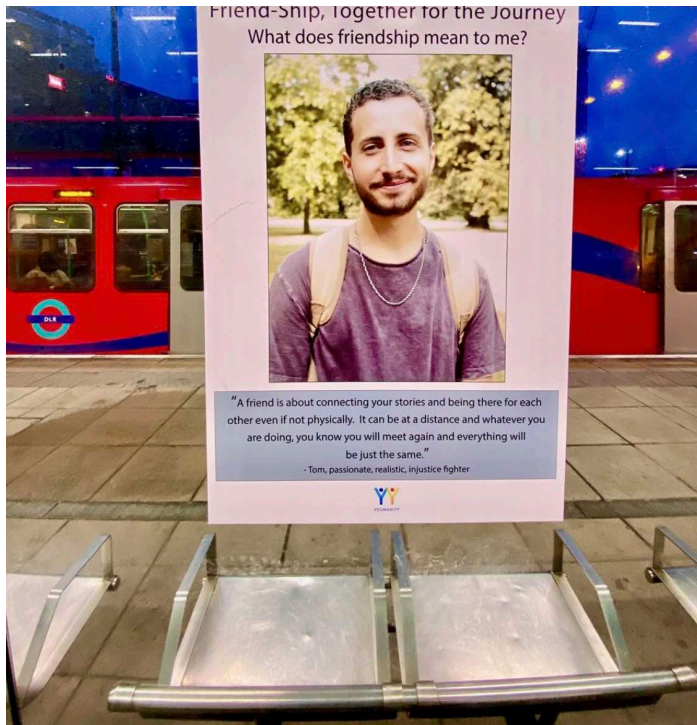

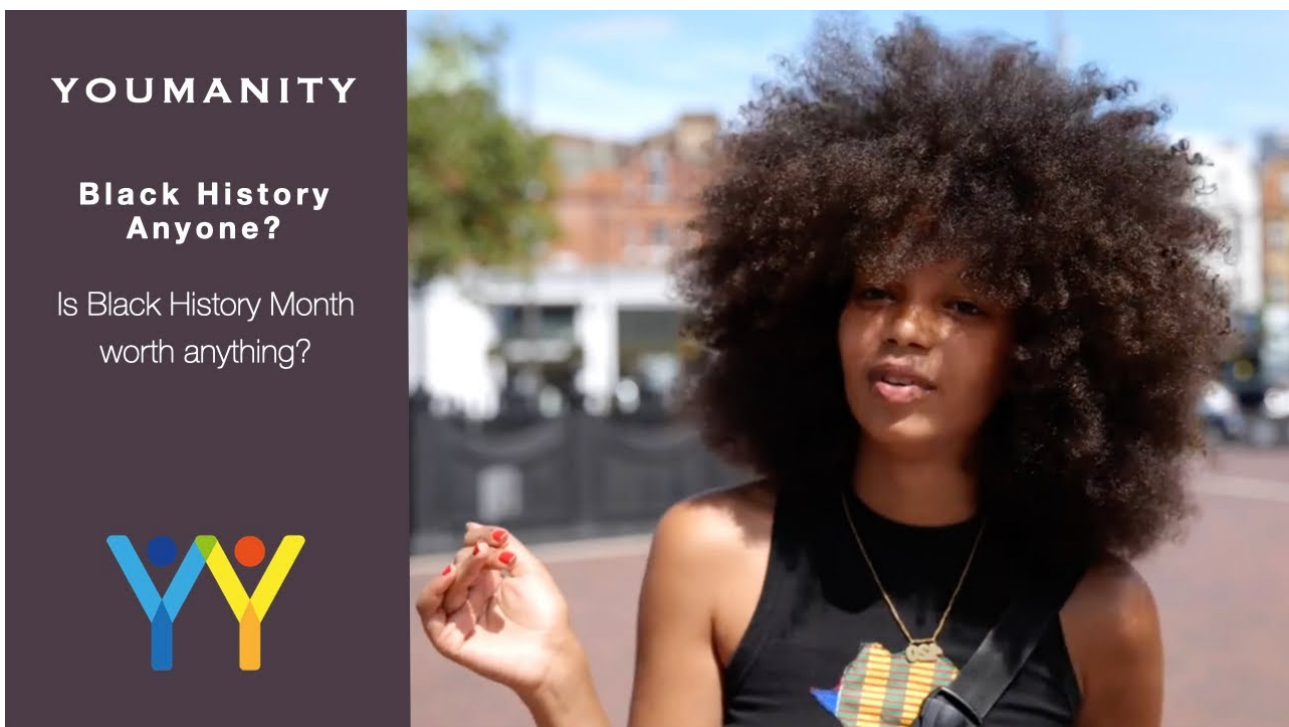

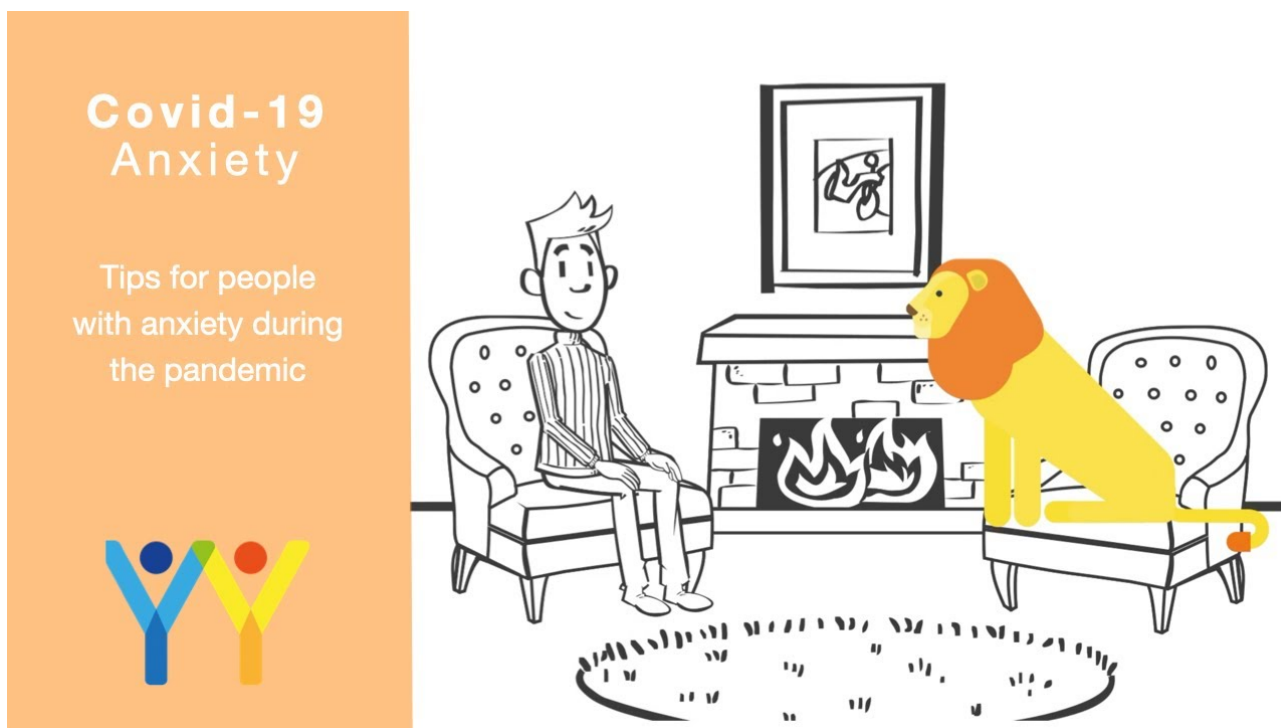
CARTOONS

Entrepreneurs for Autonomy Self development and Equality (EASE)

2SMILE Project

Youmanity champions 2Smile, a pioneering project to develop a student-centred teaching approach for youths at risk of abandoning education. In September 2018 Youmanity was awarded a grant from the European Commission – Erasmus Plus+ program KA204. Project partners are from Ireland, Portugal, Greece, Finland, Romania and Italy. Since the project began, 2Smile encouraged an exploratory conversation among local communities and policy makers in all partner countries. The project has since developed a tool kit to be able to assess students' needs based on perception of the school system. Students are being tested before and after the introduction of the student-centred approach in their class. We have now reached the final stage of the project. This involves the implementation of the 2Smile tool kit in all participating schools across seven countries. Our partner school in the UK is Abbey Manor College in London. Unfortunately the pandemic caused this final stage of the project several delays as partner countries entered lockdown at different times. Zoom meetings then developed an online version of the pilot to be able to conclude this important project. Pilots in all seven countries have now been completed with partners now drafting a detailed report. Questionnaires will follow to evaluate the whole project.







1 Basis of preparation

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK (FRS 102), the Company Act 2006, and with the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. There are no key judgements that the charity has made which have a significant effect on the accounts. The Trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

1.3 Accounting policies

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met. It is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to specific headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the

Restricted funds can only be used for restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1.4 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimated and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects both current and future periods.

1.5 Fund accounting

Restricted funds can only be used for restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or value, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Computer Equipment : 10% pa. on a straight line basis

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and carrying value of the asset and is recognised in net income/expenditure for the year.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with bank, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of the kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2. Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.
