Friends AGM report by Secretary 17.2.25

We thank all of our Friends, whether they live locally or far away, for their continuing support of St James Church: their support is invaluable and greatly appreciated, as is that of our Trustees. Our new members are Sue Briars, Peter and Nicole Morrish, Adrian and Sarah Russell and the Rev. John Ewington. In 2024 the Friends published two booklets: a new church guide by Fr David Chance and a new introduction to the Rev John Russell by Philip Dalling. These are a fine addition to our offer to church members and visitors and we heartily thank the authors.

Our Spring Q&As featured Alison Mills, director of the Museum of Barnstaple & North Devon, who gave us a tour of North Devon in 100 Objects, Josh Horswill who explained the Large Hadron Collider and why we should be interested in it, and Paul Henderson, our county councillor focused on media manipulation and technique of persuasion plus his own life story from the media to mayoral duties.

The Autumn Q&As featured our Patron, Lady Arran on her 'Life, work and public duties'. This talk marked the completion of Lady Arran's long period of office as Deputy Lord-Lieutenant of Devon, and the beginning of her new role as a Lady of the Royal Household, was most informative but also highly entertaining. Katie Drew, Executive Officer of the Melanesian Mission, spoke on the remarkable work of the mission, especially in a time of climate change from which island peoples in the Pacific are suffering severe consequences. Susannah Baker MBE was unable to join us to speak on her work at the Pickwell Foundation, one of the UK's leading charities for refugees and asylum seekers. However, her husband Steve was able to deputise most effectively on a memorable evening. These well-attended talks are a valuable part of our community outreach and we are greatly indebted to all who generously give their time and expertise.

Parson Jack's Studio Café has been greatly enjoyed by many during the year, thanks to a devoted team including Brenda Dyer, Philip Dalling, Jinny Dallyn, Iris Hawkins, Susie Hind, Mary and Richard Fardon, David Netherway and Rev. Cathy. This is a much-valued part of our outreach to the community as a church.

With the help of Ted Picken, we have moved the church WiFi, paid for by the Friends, to a lower tariff (though this is about to rise by £3 to £32.99 per month. The Wifi serves the Contactless Donation Point installed in the church with Ted's kind help. This enables easy donations by visitors and congregations and also payments for our new booklets and, in the run-up to Christmas, our cards.

The Friends maintain the church website and opened an account with Ticket Tailor to sell tickets online for the Medieval Music Concert on 1 March. Two other evening events have been organised to celebrate the restoration of the Gothic pulpit, expertly managed by David Netherway.

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FRIENDS OF ST JAMES CHURCH SWIMBRIDGE Trustees' Report for 2023

The Friends held lots of valuable social events for our community – notably the popular Parson Jack's Studio Café coffee mornings, which give so much pleasure and fellowship: warmest thanks to all involved, especially Brenda Dyer and Philip Dalling, Mary and Richard Fardon, David Netherway, Caroline Gatehouse and Susie Hind, plus the musicians including Matt Blüge and Peter Caine. These special occasions also raise good revenue for the Friends. The same goes for the Swimbridge Q&As. The Spring series featured members of our village with interesting life stories to share – Ruth Bateman, Matt Blüge, Mike Clift and Ted Picken – while Philip Dalling explored the foundation and history of the Exmoor Society. The Autumn series was 'Four talks on Lives in Faith', in which we heard about the spiritual journeys of Dr David Chance, Andrea Chance, the Rev Preb Cathy Scoffield and the Venerable Verena Breed – one of our most illuminating and memorable sets of talks. Our works included an improved and reprinted Friends' leaflet and a Xmas card showing the church and village under snow (in January 2010), which has sold well, leaving us with more cards to sell in future years. David Netherway oversaw new signage in the churchyard including the contact details of our new incumbent, the Rev Preb Cathy Scoffield. Rev Cathy now takes the chair at our Friends' Trustees' meetings – many thanks to Richard Fardon for ably chairing for us on many occasions. David Netherway has been working on refurbishing the Old School Room and on the restoration of the pulpit – many thanks to him for leading on these and also dealing with electrical and plumbing problems in the church and the Old School Room, as well as the annual maintenance of the church clock. On 7 October we held our second 'Open Day', when we welcomed the community into the church and churchyard to hear about its history, including new discoveries about servants of the Rev John Russell made by Janet Patton and an appreciation of the role of the Smyth family (owners of the tannery) as benefactors to our church. This time we introduced paddleboards with information on 'Ten Top Things to See' in our church, written and photographed by MH-B and kindly fabricated by Janet Patton. These will, we hope, help visitors enjoy the church and its outstanding furnishings. The occasion raised £110 for the Devon Historic Churches Trust and also helped to bring us several new members of the Friends from Landkey – Cynthia Shaddick and Nicola and Peter Soper. Sadly, we lost Friends in 2023 too – the much-missed Maureen Hawkins and Mary Sumner. Membership is currently 56 members. 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Friends of St James Church, Swimbridge Annual Report by Secretary and Treasurer for 2022

We welcomed new members this year – Teresa Turner (no. 74) and Ted and Kate Picken (nos. 75-76). Members of the Friends have continued to make generous financial contributions this year, including through Gift Aid, which have been greatly appreciated. Warmest thanks to the Trustees: Philip Dalling, Brenda Dyer, Mary and Richard Fardon, John Hayes, with myself as Secretary and Treasurer. .

We continued with our programme of works to maintain and improve the church and its curtilage, which David Netherway has overseen and will describe in a separate report. Many thanks to David for all his good works.

We held two Q&As in the Spring: ‘The life of the louthier by Rebecca Houghton’. Rebecca lives in Landkey but has now become widely known thanks to appearances on the Repair Shop. She is an expert maker and restorer of violins and spoke fascinatingly on the craft. The audience was limited (13) because of Covid fears. An audience of 25 – including our Patron Lady Arran – heard a new member of the congregation, Peter Morrish, give us an eye-opening guided tour of ‘Hi-tech businesses in North Devon’. The Autumn Q&As featured no less than eight speakers in a new format of half hour talks. These described interesting careers, vocations and projects: Andy Hind on *Working for the UK Defence Industry* and Teresa Turner on *The Power of Listening and Supporting*, about the work of the Samaritans; Nick Turner spoke on life as a chartered surveyor and Nicola Brewer about her role as project manager for new buildings at the North Devon Hospital; Tim Watts on his role as a genomist and Philip Dalling on his life in journalism; Ruth Bateman on *Adventure cycle touring and the John Muir award: the art of the possible!* And Nicky Margieson on *Freediving* – Freediving is breath-hold diving without the aid of any diving equipment. This provided a dramatic conclusion to our extended season of Q&As. We are most grateful to all our speakers and our appreciative and generous audiences.

Parson Jack’s Studio Café attracted grateful patrons throughout the year. The refurbished Old School Room provides a delightful venue for these regular gatherings which really benefit our community. The delicious cakes and fine coffee are augmented by displays from the Mervyn Dalling Archive, plus works by local artists. The events also raise substantial amounts for the Friends. Warmest thanks to Philip Dalling, Brenda Dyer, Mary Fardon and Caroline Gatehouse.

Our first Open Day, on Saturday 24 September, was held in support of the Devon Historic Churches Trust. We invited the community in to hear about the church and its furnishings, about the Rev John Russell (for and against), to hear organ music by local composers and poetry by some of the greats, plus a tour of the churchyard and Streamside Garden – recently awarded a £100 prize as Best Community Wildflower Meadow. We shall repeat the Open Day next September. Finally, we helped host the Xmas Crafts Fair in November which used the WiFi system installed in church during lockdown and brought good revenue.

Annual Report by Secretary and Treasurer for 2021 - tabled at the AGM on 2.2.22

We welcomed new members this year - Dr Richard Westcott (no. 70), Caroline Gatehouse (No.71) and Mr and Mrs Ron and Chris Johnson (Nos. 72-73). We also welcomed new Trustees, to whom we are most grateful - John Hayes, Philip Dalling and Brenda Dyer.

In addition to members' much appreciated and generous subscriptions, we also received special donations from Mrs Anne Benham (for general funds) and from the Rev. Prebendary Peter Bowers (for conservation of the pulpit), plus a bequest of £500 from our late Captain of Bells Perce Saunders. Friends have continued to make generous financial contributions this year, which have been especially helpful when so much revenue-creating church activity had to stop because of Covid regulations.

We continued with our programme of works to maintain and improve the church and its curtilage, which David Netherway has overseen and will describe in a separate report. David also organised the most enjoyable and profitable Duck Race held in July - a truly communal event. Many, many thanks to David for all his good works.

We held two Q&As in the Spring via Zoom: my own talk, 'The Listed Buildings of Swimbridge' and Paul Scott's talk 'From Slums to Suburbia: a Family History Journey'. These talks were well-attended and prompted generous donations via the Donation Buttons on our church website. The website was initiated and is paid for and maintained by the Friends. Donors are now able to choose whether to give to the Friends or to specific projects of ours, such as the Streamside Garden, the Refurbishment of the Old School Room or the Conservation of the Pulpit.

The autumn Q&As returned to face to face meetings, held in the church as it is well ventilated and spacious. The talks featured the Rev David Chance (11 November) on Beckett's tomb at Canterbury Cathedral, which he vividly reconstructed in a watercolour informed by his detailed research into the monument, which was destroyed in 1540 during the Henrician Reformation. Andrea Chance spoke fascinatingly on 25 November on the painting of Icons and their symbolism. Considering cautiousness about Covid at the time, both talks were well attended. We are most grateful to all our speakers and our appreciative and generous audiences.

In addition to paying for maintenance works such as guttering and roof repair, the Friends paid for the new CCTV, church clock maintenance and repair and the church website. We were also able to contribute £2000 to the PCC to help with the bill for insurance of the church, its contents and curtilage. Renewed thanks to everyone who helps the Friends carry out their mission: 'to preserve, maintain and enhance for the public benefit

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Secretary's annual report

1. Talks programme

We cancelled our Spring programme shortly before the first lockdown was announced. We were able to hold two of the three Spring talks in the autumn via Zoom. The third was impossible to hold as it involves musical instruments – we look forward to scheduling it when face to face meetings resume. We have two new members – David and Andrea Chance – who are both experienced speakers: we shall schedule their talks also when we can meet again face to face. The autumn talks, both by Zoom, were Mark Haworth-Booth on Museum Life and Dr Alison Evans on Mindfulness. These attracted good audiences and generous donations via the new Donations Button on the church website.

2. Donations Button

This was installed by our webmaster and MH-B in July. £305 had been donated by the end of the year. The system is recommended by Parish Buying and involves Give a Little as the service provider, who take a small percentage of each donation. The service offers a Gift Aid option. It has proved to be invaluable as a way for those attending Zoom talks to offer support. We have managed to make up the shortfall from donations at face to face talks thanks to the Donations Button.

3. Website

Our webmaster, Colin Jones, has future-proofed the website so that if he is for some reason suddenly unable to continue his role clear instructions will ensure that the website continues to be updated. The webmaster's fee is paid by the Friends. The Friends' Secretary is liaison and provides the webmaster with updates on eg Services plus news items and information on events. This year's financial report shows two payments to Colin Jones – £90 and £125. He would normally have received the first payment the previous f.y. The second payment is higher than usual because Colin has upgraded the security of our site so that users no longer see a 'Site Insecure' notice when they enter it.

4. Membership

This year we lost one of our founding members, Arnold Bradbury. Arnold was a generous supporter and a regular attender of our meetings. He gave a memorable account of his life and career (on conversation with MH-B) in Spring 2017. Arnold joined us on Zoom for MH-B's talk ('My Museum Life') on 15 October. He was in very good spirits and was joined by his daughter, his son and daughter-in-law. He asked a very good question. That was, it seems, Arnold's last public appearance. He will be much missed. We also lost Rita Woodhead, who has moved back to Surrey, where she will be closer to family and friends. She gave a great deal to the parish in her short time here, including helping David Netherway make such a success of Parson Jack's Studio in the Old School Room. We also lost Perce Saunders, who was not a member but always interested in Friends' events: Perce has left the Friends £500 in his will. This year we added three new members (66, 67 and 68) – John Harland and David and Andrea Chance. We also received generous donations in memory of Mrs Harland.

5. Supporting St James Church

The Friends pay annual maintenance contracts for both the church clock and the church CCTV system (introduced after the vandalism of the pulpit and paid for by the Friends). David Netherway will report in a separate item on Friends' projects, which we are all most grateful to him for overseeing so effectively.

The Friends of St James Church

Report on projects to the AGM 16th February 2021

The Friends' Projects in a year of Covid19

2020 Began with confidence for a year of progress ahead with several projects the Friends were championing for the church, Old School Room and Streamside Garden and churchyard.

The Old School Room

Funding had been obtained in the previous year for the refurbishment of the Upper Room in the Old School Room. Grants, enthusiastic volunteers and local business support resulted in a really well received upgrade of the room and set it up for hosting more events and art exhibitions. This was happening with the growing popularity of the Parson Jack's Studio Café events, (with many thanks to the drive of Rita Woodhead) and art display – further events were booked and art exhibitions planned.

Unfortunately, as with everything in 2020, it all had to stop. We all hope 2021 and beyond will be better.

Work on the planning of the major upgrade of the Old School Room and the local community and Jack Russell archive has continued. By the end of the year plans had been agreed. The complex problems of balancing the importance of the historic fabric with the need to meet the needs of the 21st C – including accessibility plus a proper toilet for the church, Upper Room and Preschool – had been agreed. Planning Consent and a Diocesan Faculty have been obtained for the work.

The challenge now is to obtain the funding. This is a bigger challenge now as most of the major funders reduced or paused their grants and focused on Covid recovery. Normal fundraising events have been impossible. However, let us not despair. We have all the plans and consents in place to start work as soon as funds are there. We have had an offer to meet the cost of the new kitchen. There may be ways to break the project up into smaller elements delivered over time. With local help there are ways that cost could be trimmed. Funders are beginning to open up again. The popular Antiques Road Trip TV show last year focused on Jack Russell and his terriers and gave some welcome publicity to the village and our heritage.

Maintenance work goes on, of course. A faulty tap was replaced in the lower room thanks to funding from the Friends and the helpful village plumber Matt Cullen. However, a new boiler may be needed sometime as the present one (20 years old) is beginning to show its age. It has been kept going free of charge by the gas engineer Malcolm Whitton.

Throughout the pandemic the Preschool has operated within the Covid rules to provide for our village young children. This is a service the church is happy to support.

The Churchyard and Streamside Garden

Volunteers, working within the Covid rules, kept the churchyard and Streamside Garden looking well cared for. A generous private donation and support from the Friends enabled maintenance work to be done – before the lockdown – on the yew trees and the trees along the stream boundary. As this work affected trees with preservation orders, or within the Conservative Area, local authority consent was required. This had delayed the work from the previous year. Lower branches of the yews were encroaching on graves beneath. The trees were tidied up and brambles and ivy removed. Large alders on the riverbank were thinned out, letting in more light and allowing views of the church. Dead elms were removed. Funds donated to the Friends in memory of Anne Hayes, and from an earlier Open Gardens fundraiser, were used to replace a dying cherry tree with a crab apple. A new Stepping Stone Path was installed in memory of Anne Hayes: the stones are engraved with the words of the hymn ‘One more step along the road I go’.

Snowdrops donated a few years ago by Jessica Duncan, a member of the Friends, Jessica Duncan, put on a fantastic display this January.

Covid restrictions meant that some maintenance work to the Streamside fence has had to wait. However, the Friends have funded a new outside tap, thanks again to plumber Matt Cullen.

The Pulpit

Trustees and members will know that structural problems and an act of vandalism meant that repair and maintenance work are needed on the medieval carved stone pulpit.

The Friends organised, and with the help of a ChurchCare grant, paid for investigation and reports by McNeilage Conservation. After negotiations and advice from the Diocese a faculty was granted later in 2020. The cost will be about £12,500 (plus recoverable VAT) including work on the mediaeval paintwork. Grants have been offered from ChurchCare, Devon Historic Churches Trust, Swimbridge Ecclesiastical Charity and the Archdeacon's Fund. These total £8000. Other applications are waiting for responses. Any suggestions for fundraising welcome are, of course, very welcome.
