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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES: For the Year Ended 31 March 2021

OBJECTIVE AND SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES

ECVYS has been an active, trusted and established voice of voluntary youth organisations in Essex for over 30 years and we are proud that in June 2018 we became a registered charity.

Object: *To promote the youth voluntary sector for the benefit of the public in Essex through advocacy and representation and promoting good practice within the sector.*

"Voluntary sector" is defined as "charities and voluntary organisations".

Charities are organisations, which are established for exclusively charitable purposes in accordance with the law of England and Wales.

Voluntary organisations are independent organisations which are established for purposes that add value to the community as a whole, or a significant section of the community, and which are not permitted by their constitution to make a profit for private distribution. Voluntary organisations do not include local government or other statutory organisations.

We will achieve this object through

a.) Advocacy and representation

ECVYS will engage and enable voluntary youth organisations so that they can be an active, relevant and independent voice at the forefront of local and national youth issues & policy making.

This voice will also allow us to facilitate conversations & partnerships that will strengthen & grow the voluntary youth sector & thereby enhance the development of young people in Essex.

b.) Promoting good practice & a sense of 'togetherness' within the sector

ECVYS will help facilitate good practice & provision of youth work by voluntary youth organisations in Essex. We will do this through networking, training & sharing resources, updates, funding & any other information we see as being relevant to the sector & the development of young people.

Board of Trustees

Our board of trustees is made up from our member organisations; their role is important, making sure that ECVYS stays relevant and answerable to the voluntary organisations that it is set up to serve.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES



ECVYS overview 2020-21

- The ECVYS network reaches over **244,000** children & young people (over **6000** youth clubs in Essex) 145,557 young people & 99,165 children
- So far this year we have enabled training for over 400 people in the voluntary youth & community work sector (not including those from statutory services who also attended training & networking.)
- Matched funding towards activities this year ***£10,000**
*Estimated value of ECVYS trustees and volunteers giving their time to ECVYS
- The ECVYS network resource & empower over **28,000** volunteers in children's & youth work in Essex

Overview: This year has been a tough year for many organisations. For ECVYS to support those working with young people through a pandemic has been challenging, but very worthwhile. This year our workload, representation & involvement has increased and we are excited that the work this year means we can look forward to growth within the ECVYS staff team very soon.

Activities that we have been involved with-

Training and Training grants:

This year we were unable to hold any face to face training, but people have still been accessing the online training that we provide.

Trauma perceptive practice: This year we have also worked with EMHWS to provide an online awareness workshop around TTP (Trauma Perceptive Practice- the Essex approach to understanding behaviour and supporting emotional wellbeing) and how an understanding of this might be helpful for those in the voluntary children's and youth sector.

This workshop saw over 50 people from the voluntary children's and youth sector attend and many were interested in the full training. As a result of this, the TTP team are soon running the full training for our groups too.

Healthy relationships and consent: We are also worked with wellbeing and public health to provide those in the sector with free training for them by Brooke. This bespoke offer for the sector was around healthy relationships and consent. There was a session aimed at volunteers and one at paid staff



working with children and young people in the voluntary sector. 26 volunteers and 47 paid staff took part in the training.

Training grants & training online were able to offer topics such as-

- 1.) Level 2 Food safety & Hygiene
- 2.) Health and Safety at work
- 3.) Personal safety for lone workers
- 4.) Safeguarding and leadership (at times and venues more accessible to volunteers)
- 5.) Youth Leader Training skills
- 6.) Trauma perceptive practice
- 7.) Healthy relationships and consent
- 8.) Resilience and communication
- 9.) Training focused in specialised areas for the Boys Brigade and their Queens Badge- leadership skills, personal development, risk assessments, social media issues, volunteering theory and volunteering experience.
- 10.) Training focused in specialised areas for Chelmsford Diocese and their leadership skills course-
leadership styles, teamwork, how to balance the joys and hard parts of leadership, building skills and tools for resilience, communication, leading youth group sessions online.

We have also been involved this year in the Essex Police's training for their new children's and youth officers. ECVYS was involved in a session about engaging with the voluntary sector and forming partnerships.

Over all 60+ organisations have actively engaged with training and networking this year, and many more were also engaged through our ECVYS youth voices projects, the work with the VVU and through the grassroots re-mobilisation grant that we managed on behalf of ECC District councils.

ECC: Remobilising Grassroots organisations: ECVYS were commissioned by ECC to run a funding pot for them to help grassroots children's & youth clubs get started again after the pandemic. This work started in February 2021 and will continue into the next financial year. 100's of organisations have already been helped through this fund and it has been a great piece of work. Essex Boys & Girls clubs also worked with us on this project to supply some invaluable support and advice for groups who needed a bit of extra help to re-open.

Listening projects:

We have been involved in a few listening projects this year and with over 800 people (600 of these were young people). These projects were-

'Young people in lockdown', funded by the Essex Community Foundation & the #iwillfund.

'Young people's views on youth violence & vulnerability in Essex' and 'Residents views on youth violence & vulnerability in Essex', these were run through the Essex Violence & Vulnerability Unit.

We also worked with EBGC to run a listening project with ECC to engage with young people about levels of confidence in returning to school in September 2020 and further a campaign about having confidence to return to schooling after the pandemic.

Representation:

ESCB: Our CEO sits on the ESCB executive board and this vital role helps voluntary groups make sure that their children and young people are resilient and have stable and thriving families. It also helps groups make sure that they are inclusive and have supportive communities and safe and accessible groups. We are able to update groups as to any safeguarding changes as and when they happen, and



input into meetings on behalf of the sector. We have ECVYS voluntary representatives at each of the stay safe groups who in turn can feed into the exec group through our CEO and vice versa. This has been such an important aspect of our work in enabling organisations to keep young people safe from harm and be safe in their communities, community groups and neighbourhoods.

The Essex Compact: Our CEO is the joint vice chair of the Essex Compact. The aim of the group is help organisations make sure that their tenders are fair and that all groups get an equal chance at applying. The Compact also run mediation for any organisations that have fallen short of the compact. We are currently recruiting for a new chair to develop the group further. This role helps make sure that community groups and the statutory sector are being inclusive and supportive- not only to each other, but for the benefit of the groups they are set up to serve.

The Children's partnership board: Our CEO sits on the County children's partnership board as a representative of the sector. It is a central hub for statutory groups who work with children & young people in Essex and being a part of this group allows us to feed in issues from the voluntary sector and to also let our groups know of rising concerns, new policies or important updates.

We have ECVYS voluntary representatives at each of the quadrant partnership boards to make sure that local and Countywide are as joined up as they can be and remain relevant.

SET parenting group: This year we have been involved with the SET (Southend, Essex & Thurrock) parenting group, which has enabled ECVYS to speak on behalf of the sector and engage with community groups about campaigns that their members and their member's families might be interested in.

The violence & vulnerability Unit: Part way through this year our CEO started working one day a week for the Violence and vulnerability unit. This was quickly upped to two days to represent the workload. This involves running the unit's stream of work called 'The voices of the Community' and helping to manage a couple of community grant funding pots.

Our CEO also spoke at the Essex Community foundations online conference about how young people are coping with the pandemic and the importance of supporting groups with vision rather than short term funding. This input came directly from groups who we engage with.

Our ability to represent groups, engage with statutory services and enable a conversation about needs and partnership is one of the massive advantages of ECVYS and makes a trusted Umbrella organisation within the children and youth voluntary sector.

Detached youth work: From September of 2020 ECVYS pulled together some of our amazing partners who deliver face to face youth work to work on a project around detached youth work for 10-14yr olds in Essex, Southend & Thurrock. The project worked in Basildon, Southend, Thurrock, Colchester & Tendring for 6 months and was funded by the Violence & vulnerability unit & Active Essex. Our partners (Essex Boys & Girls Clubs, Red Balloon, Bar'n'Bus, Essex YMCA, Southend YMCA, Teen Talk & Colchester HomeStart) were able to work with over 2000 young people throughout the pandemic and we are really excited to be developing this work even further in the next academic year.

ECVYS networking: Our networking meetings are held in each quadrant, and this year we have had to adapt and run these meetings over Zoom instead. We regularly get between 40-50+ people at these meetings and they have been an extremely useful source of information, discussion and sharing. The usual set up of these meetings includes updates from The children and young people's partnership board, The ESCB, The youth services, Childrens and families leads, and other county wide services as and when they have things they would like to update the sector on. It is a great network of voluntary organisations coming together and these meetings have really been both a support and source of information at this time. These groups are vital to our members in helping them to do what they do best in their face to face work with children and families in Essex.



Our CEO is also the secretary for the NCVYS group that is currently meeting over zoom. We have engagement from all over the UK and it is a great partnership of voluntary groups like ECVYS.

Mailshot: Our mailshot reaches 100's of voluntary groups in Essex and is passed on to many more through Umbrella bodies. The mailshot covers all our ECVYS work, any updates, funding, information, campaigns, vacancies, volunteering opportunities and much more. We also send out individual emails of noteworthy information/ campaigns that we feel may benefit our groups.

Comments about ECVYS training and support in 2020-21

'Two of the young people who participated in the training we provided with a grant from ECVYS in 2019 have this year taken on a leadership role in training the new cohort of young people. They have also participated in shaping and influencing conversations at a more strategic level, including the recruitment of a new Bishop of Chelmsford.'

'ECVYS has been a great help and support this year. It has not been an easy year for us, but ECVYS has helped us find support and funding.'

'The ECVYS grant has allowed us to take a cohort of participants on an excellent residential weekend and allowed us to make it a really good experience for them.'

Comments from young people who attended training

'Now that I have finished the course I feel more confident and find it easy to express my feelings and thoughts.'

'I have really developed my team work skills by meeting all the new people on the programme and working with them on fun activities and projects.'

'I feel like I've grown as a person and am more confident in myself.'

'I feel as if I have a deeper understanding of a good leader and how to be successful not only in leadership but in life. I feel happy and content.'

'I enjoyed taking part and have gone on to organise events for children and raise money for charity'

FUTURE PLANS

In the next financial year we are able to continue our detached project with the Violence & Vulnerability unit, Active Essex & our partners and we will also be working in 2 new districts (Harlow & Chelmsford).

Our CEO will continue working 2 days a week with the violence and vulnerability unit and we will continue to offer our youth voices projects as ways for groups to engage effectively with young people.

We are also looking to expand our ECVYS team and create a post that will enhance the network and links with statutory & voluntary organisations.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

Report to the trustees of Essex Council for Voluntary Youth Services (ECVYS) on accounts for the period ended 31st March 2021 set out on pages 9 to 17.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation of the accounts

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2015 and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular future projects or commitments.

Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- income from membership subscriptions received in the nature of a gift are recognised in Donations and Legacies. Membership subscriptions which give a member rights to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.
- receipts received during the year which are not to be expected until after the balance sheet date are not recognised as income for the year and are included in funded charitable income deferred.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

Accounting Policies (*continued*)

Resources expended (*continued*)

- expenditure on raising funds includes the cost of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by the charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- where income on charitable funds has been recognised and the related expenditure is known and committed, the expenditure is recognised as a funded charitable activity accrual and is included in expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably, in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Investments held for resale or pending their sale and cash and cash equivalents with a maturity date of less than 1 year are treated as current asset investments.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amounts advanced by the charity. Subsequently they are measured at the cost or other consideration expected to be received.

Current asset investments

The charity has investments which it holds for resale or pending their sale and cash and cash equivalents with a maturity date of less than one year. These include cash on deposit and cash equivalents with a maturity date of less than one year held for investment purposes rather than to meet short term cash commitments as they fall due.

They are valued at fair value except where they qualify as basic financial instruments.
