Key Activities and Programmes (2025) 1. Telephone Counselling and Emotional Support Throughout 2025, COPS provided confidential telephone counselling to individuals experiencing emotional distress, grief, anxiety, and crisis. Our trained counsellors and volunteers offered: Immediate emotional support and active listening Guidance during periods of grief, trauma, or uncertainty Referrals to additional services where required This service proved vital for individuals unable to access in-person support, particularly the elderly, widows, single mothers, and those facing sudden loss. 2. Hostel Visits COPS conducted regular visits to hostels housing vulnerable individuals, including the homeless and those in transitional accommodation. These visits focused on: Emotional and psychosocial support Needs assessments and referrals Distribution of care packages and essential items Our presence helped foster trust, reduce isolation, and provide a consistent support system within these communities. 3. Hospital Visits Hospital outreach remained a cornerstone of our compassionate care approach. Volunteers visited patients and families to: Offer emotional comfort during illness and recovery Support individuals without family presence Provide reassurance and COmpanionship These visits were especially impactful for elderly patients and those facing long-term or critical illness. 4. Funeral Attendance and Bereavement Support COPS attended funerals to support grieving families and individuals who lacked adequate support networks. This included: Presence and emotional support during services Follow-up counselling for bereaved widows, orphans, and families Ongoing check-ins to assist with the grieving process Our bereavement support ensured that no one had to grieve alone. 5. Elderly Visits Recognising the growing issue of loneliness among the elderly, COPS prioritised regular home and community visits. These visits aimed to: Provide companionship and emotional reassurance Monitor wellbeing and identify urgent needs Connect elderly individuals to additional support services This programme significantly reduced social isolation and improved emotional wellbeing. 6. Care Packages for the Homeless In 2025, COPS distributed 500 care packages to individuals experiencing homelessness. These care packages included: Food parcels Sanitary products Basic hygiene essentials Distribution took place during outreach visits, hostel engagements, and community drives, ensuring dignity and immediate relief for recipients. 7. Urgent Care and Support for Single Mothers, Widows, and Orphans COPS responded to urgent cases involving single mothers, widows, and orphans facing sudden hardship. Support included: Emergency food and essential supplies Emotional and counselling support Referrals to longer-term assistance programmes These interventions helped stabilise families during critical moments and offered pathways toward recovery and resilience. Impact Summary (2025) Continuous telephone counselling provided throughout the year Regular outreach through hostels, hospitals, homes, and community spaces 500 care packages distributed, including food and sanitary products Sustained emotional, practical, and bereavement support for vulnerable group. Volunteers and Partnerships Our work in 2025 was made possible by dedicated volunteers and supportive partners. Their time, skills, and generosity enabled COPS to extend its reach and maintain a high standard of compassionate service.

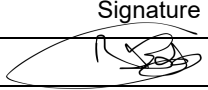

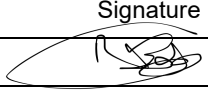
