The Welfare Centre, Dandaswara, is the major current project. The main building and kitchen is now complete, and work has started fitting out.

Contribution made by volunteers	The Charity is run entirely by volunteers, and has no paid employees

Achievements and Performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.	Support Nepal UK began as the dream of Navin Gurung, to improve the lives of people living in the village of his ancestors, Dandaswara. The aims are to complete the construction of a Welfare Centre, to support the residents of Dandaswara and the broader Kolma Bahakot area, and support the maintenance of the building. Volunteer medical and allied healthcare professionals and gap year students will stay in the building while they work and gain valuable experience and explore Nepal. We seek to provide support in health, sports facilities and better education. During our third year of activity, we were able to contribute £6,000 towards the construction (compared to £14,000 in 2020/21). This enabled the completion of kitchen annex and water storage/supply system. The building is now essentially complete. Focus has now moved to painting, external paving and kitting-out. £520 was spent on camp beds for the Centre. In addition, £770 was given to a Covid oxygen appeal, and £400 for local schools.

Performance of fundraising activities against objectives set	We are able to tap in to a very generous community in Buckinghamshire, who enthusiastically supported our general fundraising, supported two lunches hosted by Polly and Richard and sponsored Dave and Josh for their cycle ride round Cornwall. Fundraising was, therefore, maintained at a good level

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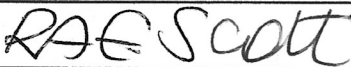
