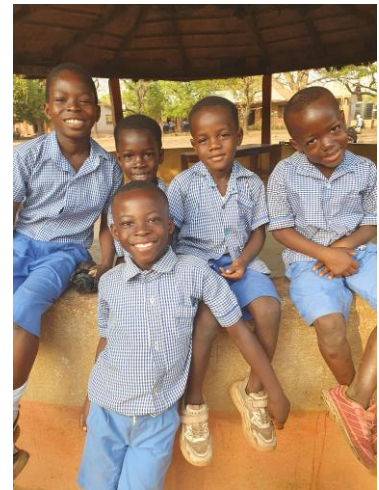

Objectives of the Charity

The objectives of The King's Village Ghana are for the benefit of the public:

- (a) The advancement of Christian education and education generally for the benefit of children and young people disadvantaged or marginalised by reason of economic, geographic or social circumstance in Northern Ghana by (but not limited to) the provision of schools.
- (b) The promotion of the physical and mental health and welfare, and the protection of lives for the benefit of anybody disadvantaged or marginalised by reason of economic, geographic or social circumstance in Northern Ghana by (but not limited to) the provision of:
 - i. a medical centre with maternity block
 - ii. a nutrition centre
 - iii. clean water and sanitation projects through education, provision of bore holes, filtration facilities and extending pipeline systems
- (c) The promotion of the Christian faith for the benefit of local communities in Northern Ghana by (but not limited to) the provision of religious material and the resourcing of evangelistic projects.
- (d) The prevention or relief of poverty in Northern Ghana by providing grants, items and services to individuals and/or charities working to prevent or relieve poverty.

Scope

The King's Village UK Charity exists to raise funds from supporters and send regular donations to our partner Ghanaian NGO The King's Village in Ghana.

All donations are aligned to our charitable objectives. The vast majority of the grants made to The King's Village are for specific projects e.g. education - child sponsorship, maternity block construction, nutrition centre resources etc. In addition, a small proportion of grants will be made to individuals to reimburse travelling expenses to Ghana when they bring expertise to the project from outside the country.

All of the projects supported will be for the public benefit. This is monitored by quarterly reporting from the Ghanaian NGO and annual inspection visits from the UK Trustees or delegated individuals.

Activities and Achievements

The King's Village Ghana has profiled the following projects during 2024:

The King's School & The King's Tehillah School



We are currently educating 560 children at our two school sites. The literacy rates in Northern Ghana are the lowest in the country and we are playing our part to change that. Many of the pupils come from families of subsistence farmers and their income levels are incredibly low which leaves them vulnerable to years of a failed harvest. By providing an education the wonderful students will get further study and job opportunities that will help them escape a multi-generational poverty trap. £15/month provides an education and transforms a child's life. The UK charity runs the online secure Child Sponsorship program. During 2025 9 classroom blocks were

built at The King's Tehillah School and this will enable The King's Village to start a Junior High School at that location and continue to provide an education to some of the most underserved communities in Northern Ghana.

The King's Village Youth Leadership program continues to teach leadership, entrepreneurial skills, and provide musical training for 20 young people who in turn mentor and serve 40 younger children that will enter the program when they are older..

Maternity Centre Building

The King's Village Ghana NGO is building a Maternity Centre, connected to their existing hospital to tackle mother and childbirth mortality rates in their region of rural Northern Ghana. 2024 was the first full year the Maternity Centre was operational. Over 120 babies are born every month at The King's Village and we have seen a 30% increase in anti-natal care visits from expectant mothers, plus a 9% increase in births provided by our medical team. Now that we are able to provide a better environment for mothers in labour we have seen a 9% reduction in Caesarean deliveries. The final objective of the project is to open a Special Care Baby Unit in 2025/6.



The King's Medical Centre

The King's Medical Centre provides 24:7 care to approximately 18,000 patients every year. It is the only significant health facility in a district of more than 160,000 people, providing emergency services and in-patient (58 beds) and out-patient care for 100+ people daily. The King's Medical Centre employs more than 200 staff including doctors, nurses and pharmacists. The UK Charity facilitated a formal 5-year partnership between The King's Medical Centre and Nottingham University Hospitals. Staff members of NUH visited The King's Village in 2024 to provide leadership training.



Nutrition Centre



495 malnourished babies' lives are being saved each year at our Nutrition Centre. Our dedicated and professional staff, provide medical care, high protein food and most importantly of all training for mothers and carers so they know how to provide as nutritional food as possible for their children, based on local ingredients. We love empowering mothers to care for their children.

Expedition from the UK

John Fahy, the Chair of Trustees led a team on 18 volunteers from the UK to visit The King's Village in October 2024. The volunteers led reading groups for school children, organised craft activities at the Nutrition Centre, joined church outreach programs and befriended the children in the child assessment centre.

Financial Review

The total income for 2024 of £123,484 was provided by the generous donations from supporters of The King's Village Ghana. This included restricted donations of £101,930. Expenditure for 2024 totalled £112,331. Careful monitoring of charity's income and expenditure meant that we ended 2024 with a year end balance of £23,051.



Many of the pupils come from families of subsistence farmers and their income levels are incredibly low which leaves them vulnerable to years of a failed harvest. By providing an education the wonderful students will get further study and job opportunities that will help them escape a multi-generational poverty trap. £15/month provides an education and transforms a child's life. The schools help girls stay in education longer which protects them from child labour or early marriage and therefore dramatically improves their equality of opportunity. The UK charity runs the online secure Child Sponsorship program.

2023 was the second year of The King's Village Youth Leadership program which teaches leadership, entrepreneurial skills, learning musical instruments and teaching children.

Maternity Centre Building

The King's Village Ghana NGO is building a Maternity Centre, connected to their existing hospital to tackle mother and child birth mortality rates in their region of rural Northern Ghana. A restricted fund has been set-up for supporters and this money is transferred to Ghana as the building work continues. 2023 has been a dramatic year for our maternity services. An incredible amount of building work and project management has taken place over the past year. Plus, many babies have already been born in the facility. The donations from our supporters are saving lives. In October 2023 the new dedicated maternity operating theatre was opened. The final objective of the project is to open a neo-natal high dependency unit in 2025.



The King's Medical Centre

The King's Medical Centre provides 24:7 care to approximately 18,000 patients every year. It is the only significant health facility in a district of more than 160,000 people, providing emergency services and in-patient (58 beds) and out-patient care for 100+ people daily. The King's Medical Centre employs more than 200 staff including doctors, nurses and pharmacists. The UK Charity is facilitating a formal partnership between The King's Medical Centre and Nottingham University Hospitals. The Global partnership that will enhance both organisations and a Memorandum of Understanding will be established.

Our dedicated and professional staff, provide medical care, high protein food and most importantly of all training for mothers and carers so they know how to provide as nutritional food as possible for their children, based on local ingredients. John Fahy, the Chair of Trustees led a small team of visitors and donors from the UK, to visit the project in October 2023. These visits from UK teams maintain the profile of The King's Village amongst the UK support base.

2022 has thankfully been a year of activity, success and development against a backdrop of Ghanaian (and global) economic challenge. Inflation has increased from 12% to 50% this year. The British Pound to Ghana cedi exchange rate also experienced dramatic fluctuation. We know this economic pressure impacts those living in poverty the most and we exist to serve and offer essential services to the region of Northern Ghana.

The King's Village Ghana has profiled the following projects during 2022:

The King's School & The King's Tehillah School



It was a delight for The King's Village NGO to be able to run a full academic year, not blighted by Covid. We are currently educating 600 children at our two school sites. The literacy rates in Northern Ghana are the lowest in the country and we are playing our part to change that. Many of the pupils come from families of subsistence farmers and their income levels are incredibly low which leaves them vulnerable to years of a failed harvest. By providing an education the wonderful students will get further study and job opportunities that will help them escape a multi-generational poverty trap. £15/month provides an education and transforms a child's life. The schools help girls stay in education longer which protects them from child labour or early marriage and therefore dramatically improves their equality of opportunity. The UK charity runs the secure Child Sponsorship program.

2022 saw the opening of a much improved computer classroom. The school now has 15 new PC's that can be used to bring the computer science syllabus to life. It is very rare to have this level of technology in a rural school, but computer skills are essential for the pupils.



2022 also saw us start a youth leadership program which teaches leadership, entrepreneurial skills, learning musical instruments and teaching children.

Maternity Centre Building

The King's Village Ghana NGO is building a Maternity Centre, connected to their existing hospital to tackle mother and child birth mortality rates in their region of rural Northern Ghana. A restricted fund has been set-up for supporters and this money is transferred to Ghana as the building work continues. 2022 has been a dramatic year for our maternity services. An incredible amount of building work and project management has taken place over the past year. Plus, many babies have already been born in the partially-opened facility. Building and opening the Maternity Block has been a gigantic task and we are in the final straight. The donations from our supporters are saving lives. Our Maternity fund will stay open as we hope to fully open the building with no debt in 2023.



Nutrition Centre



Hundreds of malnourished babies' lives are being saved each year at our Nutrition Centre. Our dedicated and professional staff, provide medical care, high protein food and most importantly of all training for mothers and carers so they know how to provide as nutritional food as possible for their children, based on local ingredients. We love empowering mothers to care for their children.

Expedition from the UK

Like many places around the globe, Ghana relaxed Covid-19 admission criteria for entering the country. In summary, all vaccinated adults were able enter Ghana without additional testing. As a result, in partnership with Operation Orphan we were able to run an expedition from the UK in October 2022. Our team of 9 included medics, teachers, social media volunteers and church members travelled to Ghana to support the work and staff of The King's Village Ghana.

Financial Review

The total income for 2022 of £115,510 was provided by the generous donations from supporters of The King's Village Ghana. This included restricted donations of £96,159. Expenditure for 2022 totalled £114,877. Careful monitoring of charity's income and expenditure meant that we ended 2022 with a year end balance of £11,577.

The vast majority of the grants made to The King's Village are for specific projects e.g. education - child sponsorship, maternity block construction, nutrition centre resources etc. In addition, a small proportion of grants will be made to individuals to reimburse travelling expenses to Ghana when they bring expertise to the project from outside the country.

All of the projects supported will be for the public benefit. This is monitored by quarterly reporting from the Ghanaian NGO and annual inspection visits from the UK Trustees or delegated individuals.

Activities and Achievements

The King's Village Ghana continued to be impacted by Covid-19 and the global pandemic during 2021 but thankfully services resumed through the year and John Fahy (Chair of Trustees) was able to visit and evaluate the work in October 2021.

The King's Village Ghana has profiled the following projects during 2021:



Child Sponsorship

After the enforced Government lockdown in 2020 the schools re-opened in January 2021. The King's Village Ghana NGO educates 522 children. The vast majority of the pupils returned to school and the school year now runs from January to January, rather than September to September. This change to the academic year was deemed



necessary by the Government and it is national change. The child education sponsorship program where individuals can sponsor a child for £15/month successfully continues.

Maternity Centre Building

The King's Village Ghana NGO is building a Maternity Centre, connected to their existing hospital to tackle mother and child birth mortality rates in their region of rural Northern Ghana. A restricted fund has been set-up for supporters and this money is transferred to Ghana as the building work continues. Building work was suspended for part of 2020 due to Covid-19 but resumed in late 2020. Significant progress was made in 2021. We launched a campaign to raise £40,000 to open a section of the building and see the first baby born in the new facility during 2021. The target was reached by August 2021 and the first baby was born on 15th December 2021.



Nutrition Centre



The King's Village Ghana NGO has served thousands of malnourished children in their nutritional centre. This includes admitting severely malnourished children and their mothers for six weeks of intense support and for at risk children and an outreach programme. The development of almost 40% of children in the district are stunted due to malnourishment. Since the nutrition centre opened in 2008 it has saved thousands of lives. During 2021 some huts at the Nutrition Centre were re roofed and the whole centre was painted.

Financial Review

The total income for 2021 of £86,749 was provided by the generous donations from supporters of The King's Village Ghana. This included restricted donations of £80,445. Expenditure for 2021 totalled £105,388. Careful monitoring of charity's income and expenditure meant that we ended 2021 with a year end balance of £10,944.

All of the projects supported will be for the public benefit. This is monitored by quarterly reporting from the Ghanaian NGO and annual inspection visits from the UK Trustees or delegated individuals.

Activities and Achievements

Covid-19 and the global pandemic caused The King's Village Ghana activities to look very different after March 2020 following lockdowns and restrictions in both Ghana and the UK. Our aim through this season was to serve the rural vulnerable community in Northern Ghana that surrounds The King's Village NGO. The Trustees noted that this has been the most challenging and unprecedented era, by some magnitude, in the running a charity but UK and Ghanaian Governments legislation was followed at all times.

The King's Village Ghana has profiled the following projects during 2020:

Ventilator & Covid-19 PPPE

When Covid-19 hit Ghana it became clear that PPE and sanitiser needed to be purchased quickly. Additionally, The King's Village NGO serves up to 200,000 people and there was only one ventilator in the region. UK donors responded rapidly and we were able to donate £1,500 in April 2020 to purchase PPE and in August 2020 we were

able to source an anaesthetic ventilator and Baby CPAP machine from Diamedica in the UK, costing £17,000. This equipment provides emergency intensive care support for those suffering from Covid-19 but can also be used by the hospital for general operations and care. Diamedica specialise in providing robust health equipment for the developing world and provided online training to the medical staff at The King's Village NGO. Medical staff at The King's Village visited rural villages to provide education on how to limit the spread of Coronavirus. Protocols were adopted at the hospital to triage patients in a socially distanced manner outside of the building to limit infection transfer.

Child Sponsorship



The King's Village Ghana NGO educates 522 children. The child education sponsorship program where individuals can sponsor a child for £15/month was continued even though the school went into lockdown. Instead The King's Village Ghana NGO used the teachers to provide remote lessons to the children when they were able to.



Maternity Centre Building

The King's Village Ghana NGO is building a Maternity Centre, connected to their existing hospital to tackle mother and child birth mortality rates in their region of rural Northern Ghana. A restricted fund has been set-up for supporters and this money is transferred to Ghana as the building work continues. Building work was suspended for part of 2020 due to Covid-19 but resumed in late 2020. Significant progress is expected in 2021.

Nutrition Centre



The King's Village Ghana NGO has served thousands of malnourished children in their nutritional centre. This includes admitting severely malnourished children and their mothers for six weeks of intense support and for at risk children and an outreach programme. The development of almost 40% of children in the district are stunted due to malnourishment. Since the nutrition centre opened in 2008 it has saved the lives of over 5000 acutely malnourished children. The families at The Nutrition Centre needed to return to their villages due to Covid-19 lockdown but the staff were able to offer remote support by visiting the villages.

Financial Review

The total income for 2020 of £73,880 was provided by the generous donations from supporters of The King's Village Ghana. This included restricted donations of £35,518. Expenditure for 2020 totalled £97,947. Careful monitoring of charity's income and expenditure meant that we ended 2020 with a year end balance of £29,583.
