OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in equitation in the RAF at all levels. The primary objective of the Association is to promote the efficacy of the RAF by enabling personnel to derive the benefits from participation in equitation, which enhances personal qualities of courage, determination, and initiative as well as physical and mental well-being and working as a team.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons.

Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

Inter Station League (ISL): The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at a suitable riding school.

Junior, and Junior Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'Equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each other's experiences.

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a four-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing, plus Combined Training (dressage plus show jumping). The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, London International Horse Show, Cricklands SJ finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the UK Armed Forces Dressage Championships, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Champs, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

POLICY ON GRANT MAKING

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers to help staff jumping arenas, secretaries' tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

RAF EQUITATION ASSOCIATION SEASON REVIEW SUMMARY OF RAFEA ACTIVITY AT MILITARY COMPETITIONS IN 205

The RAFEA held 61 fixtures during 2025, these covered all 3 of the disciplines: dressage, show jumping and eventing and included participants across all levels from grassroots to senior. Additional regional training was held for senior, development and grassroots riders across the country throughout the year.

1. RAF CHAMPS 13-16 APR 2025 SPARSHOLT COLLEGE

Loriners Dressage leg: 1st placed individual and 1st placed team.

2. ROYAL WINDSOR HORSE SHOW 17 MAY 2025 AT WINDSOR CASTLE

In May, two RAF teams were entered into the Royal Windsor Horse Show in Show Jumping rounds set in the ground of Windsor Castle. Half of the riders were new to the team with it their first Windsor whereas it was one individuals 13th. After a fabulous jump off by one new member one Team placed 1st, the first RAF win in living memory.

3. UKAFDC 17/18 MAY 2025 AT WESTON LAWNS FARM EQUESTRIAN CENTRE

From 12 RAF riders attending UKAFDC we had 19 riders placed within the top 5 of their level and 5 of those were 1st placings. We secured UKAFDC Champion 2025, UKAFDC Reserve Champion 2025, 4th, 5th, 7th & 9th placings in the championship out of the 10 allocated. ROR winner, Highest Score winner. Over all Intro winner, Overall intro 3rd place, Overall Prelim winner, Overall 2nd place Novice, Overall Elementary Winner, Overall Elementary 2nd place, Overall Medium Winner, Overall Advanced Medium Winner. Making a very successful outing for the RAFEA Dressage team.

4. RN CHAMPS 14-16 AUG 2025 AT DAVID BROOME EVENT CENTRE, MONMOUTHSHIRE

Loriners SJ leg: 1st Placed team

5. UKAFEC 15-17 SEP 25 AT BURY FARM, SLAPTON, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

Loriners Combined Training leg results. For the second year running the RAF won the Interservice competition, beating the Navy and Army in 3 out of the 3 competitions throughout the season, and claiming individual 1st place in 3 of those as well.

6. LONDON INTERNATIONAL HORSE SHOW, EXCEL CENTRE, LONDON

3 RAF riders qualified, the highest number in memory.

Riders competed in uniform at several civilian events over the year, providing opportunities for promotion and engagement with the public.

Alongside these events, RAFEA members also took part in numerous British Eventing, British Dressage and British Show Jumping events around the UK.

GOING CONCERN

As disclosed earlier within this report, the Trustees of the Association have determined that it is in the best interests of the charity to merge with the Royal Air Force Central Fund. As of the date of transfer the Association will no longer exist as a standalone entity but will operate and deliver its activity within the charitable operating framework of the Royal Air Force Central Fund.

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

All Executive Committee members receive written Terms of Reference, which are signed by both the Chair and the member.

Informal training is conducted during the handover process between members when personalities change.

SERIOUS INCIDENTS

There were no serious incidents requiring reporting in this financial year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for 2025 was £44,825.10 (2024: £43,552.62). All equitation events were available for our riders to participate in throughout the year. General Funds at the year-end were £25,091.76 (2024: £22,596).

The charity holds minimal reserves, which have accumulated as a result of unspent funds from previous allocations by the RAF CF and by any minimal profits raised by Champs. There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose; however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches. Due to an unexpected change in venue for our RAF Equestrian Championships FY26, it will be necessary to use some of these funds to support unbudgeted costs to ensure the event is a success.

General Funds at the year-end were £25,091.76 including debtor of £75 (£24,091.18 including property of £800) with zero Restricted Funds.

The charity depends on sufficient volunteers of suitable experience and calibre to run this large and growing Association and deliver high risk sport safely.

Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the CIO. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the CIO and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2025

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

As noted under the Reserves and Going Concern sections of the Trustees Report and in Note 16, the CIO has merged with the RAF Central Fund, with an effective date of 1st January 2026. This will mean that the CIO's operations will cease with Royal Air Force Equitation Association CIO, but will continue to operate and deliver its activity within the charitable operating framework of the Royal Air Force Central Fund.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees confirm, in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisations (General) Regulations 2012, that at the year end the CIO did not have any outstanding guarantees to third parties nor any debts secured on assets of the CIO.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

The CIO currently has no tangible fixed assets.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in equitation in the RAF at all levels. The primary objective of the Association is to promote the efficacy of the RAF by enabling personnel to derive the benefits from participation in equitation, which enhances personal qualities of courage, determination, and initiative as well as physical and mental well-being and working as a team.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons.

Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

Inter Station League (ISL): The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at a suitable riding school.

Junior, and Junior Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'Equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each other's

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a four-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing, plus Combined Training (dressage plus show jumping). The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, London International Horse Show, Cricklands SJ finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the UK Armed Forces Dressage Championships, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Champs, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

POLICY ON GRANT MAKING

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers to help staff jumping arenas, secretaries' tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

Total income for 2024 was £43,552.62 (2023: £38,849). All equitation events were available for our riders to participate in throughout the year.

The charity holds minimal reserves, which have accumulated as a result of unspent funds from previous allocations by the RAF CF and by any minimal profits raised by Champs. There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose, however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches.

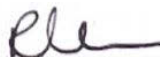

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees confirm, in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisations (General) Regulations 2012, that at the year end the CIO did not have any outstanding guarantees to third parties nor any debts secured on assets of the CIO.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in equitation in the RAF at all levels. The primary objective of the Association is to promote the efficacy of the RAF by enabling personnel to derive the benefits from participation in equitation, which enhances personal qualities of courage, determination, and initiative as well as physical and mental well-being and working as a team.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons.

Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

Inter Station League (ISL): The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at a suitable riding school.

Junior, and Junior Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'Equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each other's

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a four-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing, plus Combined Training (dressage plus show jumping). The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, London International Horse Show, Cricklands SJ finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the UK Armed Forces Dressage Championships, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Champs, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

POLICY ON GRANT MAKING

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers to help staff jumping arenas, secretaries' tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

The RAFAE held 53 fixtures during 2024, these covered all 3 of the disciplines: dressage, show jumping and eventing and included participants across all levels from grassroots to senior. Additional regional training was held for senior, development and grassroots riders across the country throughout the year.

1st place also in Prelim, Novice, Elementary and Medium sections.

Loriners Eventing leg, results: 1st placed individual, 2nd placed individual and 1st placed team.

Other classes: Numerous top-6 placings.

5. RN CHAMPS 16-18 AUG 2024 AT DAVID BROOME EVENT CENTRE, MONMOUTHSHIRE

Loriners SJ leg: 2nd Placed team

Intro, Novice and Intermediate Champions secured.

6. UKAFEC 14-16 OCT 24 AT BURY FARM, SLAPTON, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

Loriners Combined Training leg results. For the first time in 14 years, the RAF won the Interservice competition, beating the Navy and Army in 3 out of the 4 competitions throughout the season, and claiming individual 1st place in 3 of those as well.

SERIOUS INCIDENTS

There were no serious incidents requiring reporting in this financial year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for 2024 was £43,552.62 (2023: £38,849). All equitation events were available for our riders to participate in throughout the year.

The charity holds minimal reserves, which have accumulated as a result of unspent funds from previous allocations by the RAF CF and by any minimal profits raised by Champs. There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose, however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches.

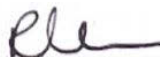

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees confirm, in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisations (General) Regulations 2012, that at the year end the CIO did not have any outstanding guarantees to third parties nor any debts secured on assets of the CIO.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

Financial Controls

It is important to regularly review internal controls to ensure they are strong and robust, and Trustees are meeting their statutory duties. You may find the enclosed internal financial controls checklist useful, to ensure your processes and procedures remain so. The Charity Commission recommend that the checklist is completed at least annually.

Trustees Meeting Minutes

You supplied us with the July 2024 and January 2025 Trustee meeting minutes and confirmed that during 2024 there was no requirement for any additional meetings to held (in a formal capacity) outside of the usual rhythm. Thank you for supplying these.

You also confirmed that Trustees were contacted by the Chair on regular occasions throughout the year as required.

Regular Board contact is important for good governance and oversight, and you have confirmed your commitment to this.

Documentation retention

On one occasion, I was unable to verify a payment of £70 to an invoice, although I have seen the credit card machine slip showing this amount was paid. You explained that the rider did ask for a receipt from Sparsholt at the time, but it was always very difficult to get this type of document from them in a timely manner after the event. You acknowledged that the rider did attend the event and that this was deemed an appropriate refund.

I was able to verify the Sparsholt invoice to other riders that I selected to verify, so this therefore appeared to be an isolated occurrence.

Please continue to endeavour to retain an invoice, receipt or other form of supporting documentation for all transactions.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in Equitation in the RAF at all levels.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons.

Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

Inter Station League (ISL): The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at a suitable riding school.

Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. In 2014, RAFEA introduced dressage and show jumping to bridge the gap from grassroots to senior level and have now expanded into Eventing at development level too. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'Equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each other's experiences.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES (continued)

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a four-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing, plus Combined Training (dressage plus show jumping). The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, London International Horse Show, Cricklands SJ finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the UK Armed Forces Dressage Championships, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Chaps, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers to help staff jumping arenas, secretaries' tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

Other Executive Committee members are volunteers, approved by the Chair or Deputy Chair and formally ratified by the full committee at the AGM.

Trustees are formally appointed the AGM.

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

All Executive Committee members receive written Terms of Reference, which are signed by both the Chair and the member.

Informal training is conducted during the handover process between members when personalities change.

SERIOUS INCIDENTS

There were no serious incidents requiring reporting in this financial year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for 2023 was £38,849 (2022: £31,029). All equitation events were available for our riders to participate in throughout the year.

The charity holds minimal reserves, which have accumulated as a result of unspent funds from previous allocations by the RAF CF and by any minimal profits raised by Champs. There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose, however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches.

General Funds at the year-end were £22,032 including property of £1,200 (2022: £20,077 including property £1,600) with zero Restricted Funds.

The charity depends on sufficient volunteers of suitable experience and calibre to run this large and growing Association and deliver high risk sport safely.

Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the CIO. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the CIO and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees confirm, in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisations (General) Regulations 2012, that at the year end the CIO did not have any outstanding guarantees to third parties nor any debts secured on assets of the CIO.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

13. RISK ASSESSMENT

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated, combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

14. RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of financial commitments held. The trustees aim to ensure the charity will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income or unexpected expenditure. The trustees will endeavour not to set aside funds unnecessarily.

15. PUBLIC BENEFIT

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT ON THE ACCOUNTS

I report to the trustees on my examination of the accounts of the Royal Air Force Equitation Association Charitable Incorporated Organisation ("the CIO") for the year ended 31st December 2023.

As the CIO's trustees, you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in Equitation in the RAF at all levels.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons. Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

ISL: The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at our Home for Sport at RAF College Cranwell or if this is not available then at suitable riding school.

Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. In 2014, RAFEA introduced dressage and show jumping to bridge the gap from grassroots to senior level and have now expanded into Eventing at development level too. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each others experiences.

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a three-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing. The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, Olympia Horse Show, Cricklands SJ and dressage finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Chaps, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

The trustees have been mindful of the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES (continued)

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers (Air Cadets and local PJC) to help man jumping arenas, secretaries tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

Our Saddle clubs have continued to grow and it was amazing to see clubs think outside the box when face to face training was not possible due to COVID restrictions including online training with their instructors. We hosted 4 grass roots camps encouraging some new riders into the sport while also pushing more established riders out of their comfort zones.

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

All Executive Committee members receive written Terms of Reference, which are signed by both the Chair and the member.

Informal training is conducted during the handover process between members when personalities change.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for 2022 was £31,029 (2021: £14,738). With COVID restrictions removed, all equitation events were available for our riders to participate in once again. General Funds at the year-end were £20,077 and Zero Restricted Funds at the year-end.

The charity holds minimal reserves, which have accumulated as a result of unspent funds from previous allocations by the RAF CF and by any minimal profits raised by Champs. There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose, however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches.

The charity depends on sufficient volunteers of suitable experience and calibre to run this large and growing Association and deliver high risk sport safely.

Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the trust. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the trust and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

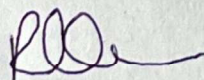

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees confirm, in accordance with the Charitable Incorporated Organisations (General) Regulations 2012, that at the year end the CIO did not have any outstanding guarantees to third parties nor any debts secured on assets of the CIO.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

13. TRANSACTIONS WITH TRUSTEES AND OTHER RELATED PARTIES

No payments were made to trustees or any persons connected with them during this financial period. No material transaction took place between the organisation and a trustee or any person connected with them.

14. RISK ASSESSMENT

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated, combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

RAFEA AIM: To encourage and facilitate involvement in Equitation in the RAF at all levels.

There are 4 main levels within RAF Equitation as defined in the overarching JSP660 – Defence Sport Policy and the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association's Competition Policy. There are three Cat 2 disciplines defined in JSP 660 that RAFEA actively supports and enables – Dressage, Show Jumping and Eventing – through the following:

Grassroots: The aim is to promote the sport to those who would like to try the various disciplines without the cost of horse ownership. Station Saddle Clubs predominantly deliver this level through local events and lessons.

Personnel are encouraged to attend grassroots development courses run at significant discount, compared to civilian counterparts, at military establishments, especially the Army Saddle Clubs who have better support in terms of military instructors and horses. Grassroots riders can participate in the Inter Station League (ISL) and competition classes at the RAFEA Annual Championships (RAF Champs) on hired horses.

ISL: The RAFEA Committee runs an ISL each year. This competition series was established in 1978 to promote riding within the RAF and to encourage more novice (now called grassroots) riders to gain experience and challenge themselves through competing. The country is split into regions with 3-4 RAF Station Saddle Clubs in each region. Regional competitions take place between April and October. Regional winners and runners up then compete in a Final in November normally at our Home for Sport at RAF College Cranwell or if this is not available then at suitable riding school.

Development Squad: Development definitions for all three disciplines are set by the UK Armed Forces Equitation Association. In 2014, RAFEA introduced dressage and show jumping to bridge the gap from grassroots to senior level and have now expanded into Eventing at development level too. There are classes for this level at many of the RAFEA and UK Armed Forces Equitation competitions throughout the year, all of which are classed as duty events for those participating. The deputy Chef d'equipe works with Saddle Clubs and individuals to maximise their awareness of these opportunities and participation by helping them understand and negotiate the RAF bureaucracy to get the necessary authorisations to attend. Personnel who show potential to make the squad are encouraged to be active on the civilian competitive circuit and will be invited to attend one of the RAFEA training and selection events. We carry out training as a mix of all levels and select events that both Dev team and senior squad members can attend together to encourage a cohesive organisation that supports people at all levels and learns from each others experiences.

Senior Squad: Definition of this level – those that form the RAF representational team – is set in the UK Armed Forces policy. Senior riders generally own or have regular access to a horse to establish the partnerships needed to compete at this level. Personnel selected for the senior squad will have the opportunity to represent the RAF at events listed below:

- **Inter-Services Competition.** The LORINERS, a three-leg competition against the Army and Royal Navy, is held at different locations with each leg hosted by a different Service. The competition comprises all three core disciplines of dressage, show jumping and eventing. The overall scores decide the annual champions.
- **High profile/civilian events.** Royal Windsor Horse Show, Olympia Horse Show, Cricklands SJ and dressage finals and, for dressage riders BD Team and Individual Quest.
- **Military Events.** The UK Armed Forces Equestrian Competition, the Royal Tournament (Army Champs), the Royal Navy Chaps, and the RAF Championships.

The RAF Championships (RAF Champs):

This annual event serves to encourage those from a basic ability to proficiency in equitation to compete in all three disciplines (dressage, show jumping, and cross country) at all levels (grassroots, development and senior). It is partly self-funded and partly supported by the Central Fund bid allowing subsidies to be applied in entrance fees thus encouraging a large turnout. Personnel are able to hire horses if required, further opening the competitive pool.

The trustees have been mindful of the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

RAFEA delivers equitation in the RAF in accordance with Defence policy as follows:

Centrally set for all Defence Sports by the UK Armed Forces Sports Board through Joint Service Publication (JSP) 660;
Set for the RAF by the DRS through Air Publication 3415;
Set for equitation through the UK Armed Forces Equestrian Association.

RAFEA does not award financial grants. It uses grants awarded to it by the Central fund to subsidise cost of entries and participation in competitions for the development level, representational senior team and the ISL. It provides in part corporate clothing to eligible senior and Dev riders and their horses and committee members in accordance with DRS policy.

It is acknowledged that sport in the RAF is delivered through the aegis of the Sports Associations and the willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Executive Committees and in the associations. The delivery of RAF competition would not be possible without officials, all of whom are volunteers. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents.

RAFEA delivers its outputs solely through willing, enthusiastic volunteers who undertake roles on the Association Committees, Saddle Clubs, and at events. The contribution in these roles is highly valued and much appreciated and recognised as a duty activity in Service policy documents. Committee members provide feedback on more junior members to their chain of command for inclusion by reporting officers in individuals' annual reports.

The RAF Championships draws heavily on a wider pool of volunteers (Air Cadets and local PJC) to help man jumping arenas, secretaries tent, run the additional stables and generally run a major event comprising some 560 separate competition entries from 150 riders and 90 horses.

- Army Equestrian Association.

SEASON REVIEW

The RAFEA had a great year in 2021, seeing loads of new riders competing at all levels. 2021 saw our highest amount of new members for many years, most were new to the RAF and when we chatted to one rider she said that the reason she had joined the RAF was so she could compete her horse for the RAF Team! Below is a list of all results from the military competitions; however we supported riders across all disciplines at various civilian shows with great success.

Our Saddle clubs have continued to grow and it was amazing to see clubs think outside the box when face to face training was not possible due to COVID restrictions including online training with their instructors. We hosted 4 grass roots camps encouraging some new riders into the sport while also pushing more established riders out of their comfort zones.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income for 2021 was £14738 (2020: £9,303). The Grant we were given of £10,000 in 2019 had to be repaid as due work not being able to be carried out because of Covid. General Funds at the year end were £16,695.

General Funds at the year end were £16,695 and Zero Restricted Funds at the year end.

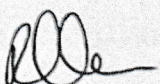

There is no specific policy regarding the holding of reserves for any defined purpose, however, the Association utilises these funds to occasionally underwrite in-year activities whilst awaiting funding tranches.

The charity depends on sufficient volunteers of suitable experience and calibre to run this large and growing Association and deliver high risk sport safely.

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with: the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Charities Act 2011.

The CIO constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

INCOME**Recognition of Income**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the CIO becomes entitled to the income;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP).

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the CIO has provided the related goods or services or met the performance related conditions.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind for use by the CIO are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Directors' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Insurance claims

Insurance claims are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS 102 SORP) and are included as an item of other income in the SoFA.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the CIO to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the CIO gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

Where there are no conditions attaching to the grant that enables the donor CIO to realistically avoid the commitment, a liability for the full funding obligation must be recognised.

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date

ASSETS

Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued at initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors

Debtors (including trade debtors and loans receivable) are measured on initial recognition at settlement amount after any trade discounts or amount advanced by the CIO. Subsequently, they are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

2. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £1,000. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the CIO on receipt.

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated at a rate to write off their cost on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

The RAF Equitation Association currently holds no tangible fixed assets.
