The management committee is made up of 7 people:

The Chair, Treasurer, Secretary, one non office bearing trustee and three non-trustees: the Co-ordinator, a member of the Street Pastor Team and a member of the Prayer Support Team.

The committee meets at least 4 times a year.

Trustees must be the three main office holders.

One non-office holding Trustee was also appointed.

All trustees are re-elected every three/four years at the AGM held in January each year. (First elections due January 2022)

Charitable purpose:

- To provide public pastoral care services to help people on the streets and other public places, giving guidance, support and signposting which assist in preserving public order and avoiding anti-social behaviour.
We are an ecumenical group of volunteers who wish to be out in the community, caring, listening and helping people.
- We patrol the local village of Uppermill once a week on a Friday or a Saturday evening. The village has a very lively night-time economy which can result in anti-social/drunken behaviour and can leave members of the public vulnerable. We also patrol during community events such as the Whit Friday band contests and the Rush cart festival where a calming influence and a positive presence is beneficial to the public and fosters community safety.

- We liaise with the security staff and publicans. We aim to help and support them and act on their assessments of the situation in the village so we can go to areas where we will be most helpful.
- We liaise with the local police delivering regular reports of our patrols. This supplies the police with information about local issues/ incidents they may be unaware of, helping them to secure public order.
- Street Pastors patrol in a set uniform distinguished by the street pastor logo. This sometimes elicits questions from the public about our Christian faith. When asked to, we share our faith in Jesus and his love for everyone. We provide pastoral care as the “Church in action” in public places. We support the spiritual, social, emotional, physical and mental well-being of all individuals who are in need of care – this is of public benefit.

We began with a fully operational bank account (at last) with a balance of 4930. Most of this money had come from local churches and individuals had made donations.

We need to pay £800 annually to Ascension Trust for insurance. The recruitment and training of new Street Pastors costs approximately £150pp and we do provide all volunteers with the required uniform. The decision was made to fund these outgoings for all SPs although if individuals wished to contribute, they would have the opportunity to do so.

Our bank balance at the end of the year was £3,300.00 The decision was made to use the company 31Eight to provide our DBS checks. The annual fee is £120 and then each individual check costs £34.

We send reports on our patrols to the local police sergeant. We can supply information about local issues/ incidents which they may be unaware of. Our contact with the police on the street is minimal -they are not able to patrol regularly. When we do see them, they are encouraging and supportive.

We have dealt with some drug related incidents, where youngsters have become very unwell and needed assistance. We provide bottles of water and flip flops when required! The reaction to our presence has been encouraging and many people do express their gratitude for our efforts. We liaise with the security staff

We also sent reports to the police about the traffic congestion which occurs when taxis park on double yellow lines then do 3 point turns in the road just as buses, cars and people attempt to get past. Street Pastors patrol in a set uniform distinguished by the street pastor logo. This sometimes elicits questions from the public about our Christian faith. Para 1.20	<u>Aims, activities, achievements and public benefit</u> In January 2020 we anticipated a busy 12 months ahead as the team was to be formally commissioned on 23rd April at a special church service which would include the "graduation" of the newly qualified Street Pastors. We aimed to patrol every Friday evening, raising awareness of our existence and purpose. Building good relations with the public and strengthening links with publicans, door staff and bar staff is a key objective. Where needed we will offer help and support to anyone who needs it. Patrols continued on Friday evenings in Uppermill with the possibility of moving to a Saturday in the future. Throughout January, February and March the village had remained particularly quiet. We experienced a fair number of very wet patrols but had some encouraging conversations with people who appreciated our presence in the village. There was a general feeling that our being around meant people felt safer and drug use was noticeably reduced. During this time, we got to know the publicans and the door staff. Some regular customers were also ready to chat at any opportunity. We built up strong, positive relations with the police who were particularly keen that we continue to patrol the village as they did not have the personnel to do so themselves. Unfortunately, the planned graduation and commissioning

	service did not take place as COVID led to a lockdown (from April onwards) and all patrols were cancelled. Our management meetings in the summer were held via Zoom. The Manchester area remained under stricter lockdown rules than many other areas of the country. Ascension Trust advised each local group to do a risk assessment and decide on the feasibility of patrols before resuming duties. The decision to resume patrolling presented us with a dilemma. Some members of our team were vulnerable or shielding partners. Like many SP teams we have a significant cohort of older volunteers who were reluctant to resume any activities. However, we did begin a new patrol in September on a Wednesday afternoon. The local secondary school children were released early on Wednesdays and then proceeded into the village and “created mayhem” We stationed ourselves outside the Co-op supervising the queue of children who were only allowed to enter two at a time. Our presence was very much appreciated by the manager of the shop and the staff of the school. We helped with the bus queue outside the local pub, making sure that the children were masked up and as far as possible following the regulations. (We continued to do this patrol during term times until July 2021 when the school’s policy changed and an early finish on a Wednesday was stopped.) We did resume patrolling on Friday evenings on 16th October 2020 although restrictions were still in place, drinks could only be served with meals and all establishments had to close by 10.00pm. We did patrol over the Christmas and New Year period. We continued to get to know the publicans and offered as much help as we could in the circumstances. Businesses were clearly struggling and as 2020 came to an end there was talk of another lock down. The rumours proved to be correct and as soon
