Trustees:

Barton Community Band is a brass band comprising around 25 players. It is managed by a committee of volunteers, headed by a chairperson with an operating document of terms of reference by which it is run. The committee holds meetings every month, at which minutes are taken, and an Annual General Meeting to which all the playing members of the band are invited. The band also runs a Training Band which is organised by committee members and supported by a Band Leader and the Senior Band Musical Director. Players in the Training band are recruited at sessions held by the band in conjunction with the local council in school holidays and are part-financed by generous donations.

The band has organised a number of concerts during the year, playing to supplement funds, and also as charity events. It is also booked to play locally at events organised by the local town council. Engagements during the summer of 2024 saw the band play as far North as Burnby Hall near York and South at Metheringham in Lincolnshire.

The bands objectives are to build on their local reputation as an enjoyable band to listen to and to improve its prospects at the area contest of the National Brass Band Championships.

In March 2025 the band secured fourth place at the North of England Area Brass Band Championships. Throughout the year the band has been seen locally on Remembrance Day and at Christmas.

Financial accounts are kept by the Band Treasurer and accounts are audited annually to the required level. The band does not have a Reserves Policy and no funds are held by or for custodian trustees.

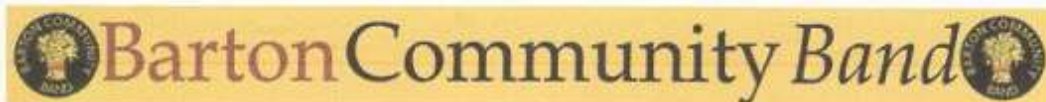

Trustees' Annual Report for 2024

History

In 2010 the Community Band was developed so players retiring from the Barton Brass Band would still have somewhere to play. In 2019, the organisation registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO)

In addition to performing in its own right, the Barton Community Band branched out by encouraging young people to learn instruments and become part of the band. Part of the band's mission is to provide music education for the local community. It is hoped that a scheme to offer music tuition can be developed further so that all children and young people have the opportunity that music can bring

The Barton Community Band is an intrinsic part of the Barton community. In addition to performing in concerts, they get involved in various projects, such as playing for the elderly residents in care homes at Christmas and supporting Armistice Day.

Purpose

- 2) To support such other charitable purposes as the committee in its absolute discretion should, from time to time, determine.

This year Barton Community Band has continued to promote its aim.

Volunteers

The CIO continues to be run entirely by the trustees and volunteers. All share the charities aims and objectives. They work together to provide administrative and fundraising support to enable the bandleaders to teach, train, and encourage all playing members.

Achievements and performances

This year has seen a full calendar of engagements. The band hosted another band Camp for young people in collaboration with the North Lincolnshire Council HAF Fuelled Up Programme and The Imaginarium Gastro Lounge. All our sessions were successful and enjoyed by a number of young people in our community.

Funding

The band's main income is derived from subscriptions from playing members and supplemented through a monthly (internal) draw. The organisation also profits from public concerts, engagement fees and fundraising events.

The band's financial footing is sound, and there is no outstanding debt or financial threats.

Principal risks

There are no immediate risks to the CIO. The only long-term risk is the potential for limited recruitment of new players. We are addressing this through our youth recruitment and educational projects.

Trustees report 2023

The band has had a full programme of events this year.

The bands engagements began in March with the annual regional band contest. The band gave a very good performance but did not get the result they felt they deserved and subsequently have been relegated from the 2nd to 3rd section.

The wide variety of concerts for the year have included Burnby Hall in Pocklington, a concert for the Queens jubilee in Baysgarth park Barton, Messingham show, Armed forces day at Brumby Hall Scunthorpe, music in the park and picnic in the park in Baysgarth park Barton, a joint concert with the York Philharmonic choir at Queen Margarets school Escrick fundraising for the Ukranian appeal, Normanby Hall, The Driffield show, and Oktoberfest at the Nelthorpe Arms.

The band supported the towns annual remembrance parade and service at the Cenotaph and St Marys church.

The band were pleased to accompany one of our euphonium players Phillipa when she played a euphonium concerto as part of her degree in music. The concerto was performed and recorded in Middleton Hall at the University of Hull and submitted for appraisal. This performance itself achieved a First and an overall mark of 2:1.

The band were asked to support `George`s day in Barton which was a day of football tournaments. The idea behind George`s day was to remember the good times a soldier, George, had with his friends in his short life that was lost to suicide, and also raise awareness of mental health and promote mental health well-being through sport.

The day was a great success and raised £3697.00 that will be used to support mental health in Army veterans.

Th band participated in the North Lincs Council HAF fuelled up summer programme in August. The band offered 2 weeks of music tuition and activities to local children. The days also provided hot food for the children that attended.

A local saxophonist Snake Davis joined the band for an amazing concert in St Marys church. The evening included a great mix of music, solos and duets with band members and was a resounding success.

The band supported the towns annual remembrance parade and service at the Cenotaph and St Marys church.

The Christmas season included many carolling dates at local eateries, supermarkets, nursing homes and local drinking establishments.

The annual Carols in the park (Baysgarth park) was changed from outside to the local evangelical church due to the inclement weather.

Our Christmas concert held in St Marys church Barton also celebrated the bands 150th anniversary. This is an amazing achievement for any band. The evening included a slide show of photos of past and present members. Mulled wine and

mince pies were served along with the obligatory raffle. A commemorative programme that included photos and a history of the band was available to purchase. The concert included some band members music choices, and included Christmas and none Christmas music.

We said a sad farewell to William in September as he started his music career in the Royal Corps of Army Music. William had been in the band since he was 8 years old.

The band has been fortunate to welcome several new players throughout the year including cornets, horns, euphonium, basses and percussion. The new players will hopefully stand the band in good stead for the forthcoming contest and concerts this year.

Trustees annual report 2021

It has been another challenging year for the band again due to the ongoing covid pandemic. We tried to continue with rehearsals when possible but at times these had to be cancelled.

We were very excited when covid restrictions were lifted and we were able to have our first concert in a very long time. This was held in August at Burnby Hall. Further concerts and activities followed with beer festivals, Remembrance parade and service, Christmas carolling at supermarkets, nursing home, village turning on of lights, local café and a carol service in Baysgarth park.

Our Christmas concert in St Mary`s church was a great success and was very well attended.

Despite the ongoing covid challenges we have welcomed several new players into band which is no mean feat when brass player availability is dwindling generally.

When restrictions prevented the band meeting we continued with our online quizzes and social evenings to continue our camaraderie and contact.

Fiona has continued the education programme teaching juniors, and again we have welcomed new players following an open morning where children could just come and have a blow and try instruments. When restrictions were such that it was not possible to meet face to face Fiona again provided online lessons.

In November 2 members in the band, Helen and Stuart, were finally able to get married after the original date had had to be cancelled due to covid. And we all look forward to celebrating with them in the near future in a postponed evening do.

The annual regional contests did not take place in 2021, however we have started our rehearsals and are looking forward to attending the contest in March 2022.

Unfortunately, the band has continued to run at a loss this last year as again we have been restricted to minimal concerts and activities in 2021.

We were most fortunate to receive a £500 donation from Phillips 66. One of our players, Leeann Tomlinson, put our name forward to the company for the charity donation.

Looking forward, the band have a full diary for concerts this coming year including their 150th anniversary concert and a concert for Barton Arts week.

Trustees 2nd Annual Report 1st January – 31st December 2020

2020 has been a challenging year for the band as with everyone due to Covid-19.

The band had a full diary of concerts this year but unfortunately all concerts have been cancelled again due to Covid. With the cancellation of all concerts the band is running at a loss each month as currently the only income is band subscriptions and children`s lessons. The Corn Exchange has required the monthly rental payment whether rehearsing or not, and Garry and Fiona have required payment for rehearsals and lessons. However, the band did manage to take part in the 2nd Section of the regional finals prior to the country`s lockdown.

To try and ensure some kind of communication and camaraderie within the band we held a weekly online quiz which was great fun. It is amazing what can be achieved online.

The band were also able to put together an online recording of hymn tunes and carols recorded individually at home and then put together by the very talented Fiona and Zak Fensome-Phillips.

The band and committee were resourceful in finding ways in which the band could rehearse once lockdown was eased and we could meet in groups of 6. We commenced rehearsals with 6 players meeting outside in Andy Noones beer garden and Helens mum`s garden. (the lengths some determined bandsmen will go to).

As the band are a registered charity and provide education, we were allowed to meet in larger groups back in the bandroom as lockdown was eased further. This involved writing a risk assessment and pre planning to ensure everyone was 2 metres apart and followed the strict BBE guidance.

As well as returning to some type of governed rehearsal format, the band has taken every opportunity possible to support community activities throughout the restrictions experienced by everyone in the country. This has been achieved in various ways throughout the year with various band members participating in the national Thursday evening applause and appreciation of essential workers throughout April And May in Barton. Along with the applause, band members played a variety of tunes outside their homes. Players supported important national events by playing in the streets for such as the May 8th V.E. Day and Remembrance Day.

The band`s education programme has also been drastically reduced due to the Covid situation however Fiona has taken every opportunity to keep supporting the current young members by coaching, encouraging and delivering online lessons whenever possible.

As Christmas approached, some members of the band played Christmas carols in a socially distanced risk assessed way outside residential care homes to try and bring a little joy and entertainment to residents who also must have had a very challenging year with limited visitors.
