TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Help The Persecuted is registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (number 1183327) and exists to strengthen, support and advocate for the persecuted Church. We provide direct practical and spiritual assistance to Christians in the most hostile regions of the world. We work to see persecuted Christians experience fellowship with the Body of Christ as their needs are met—and find renewed strength to follow Christ.

Objectives

The charitable objects are:

1. To advance the Christian religion around the world, in particularly but not exclusively, by enabling those who are victims of religious persecution to worship. This will include enabling pastoral activities, and encouraging Christians in their faith through biblical study and, therefore, strengthening the local churches where they exist.
2. To relieve poverty or financial hardship for victims of religious persecution anywhere in the world, by providing or assisting in the provision of grants, items, services, and programmes to individuals in need, and/or other organisations working to support persecuted populations.
3. To advance the education of the public, in particular in the subject of religious persecution.

Mission Statement

We are ministers of the Gospel who Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild the lives of persecuted believers.

Vision Statement

A world where the persecuted Church endures, flourishes and multiplies in hostile places.

Public benefit

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Constitution.

Financial risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets or investments ('the free reserves') held by the charity are sufficient to meet the ongoing work of the charity. This policy and the levels of reserves will be reviewed from time to time. The total level of reserves at the end of the year was £54,838. Based upon a review by the Trustees,

they have determined that the level of reserves at the year-end were adequate for the operations of the Charity.

Achievement and Performance

Review of Activities

Help The Persecuted exists to Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild the lives of persecuted Christians and works toward a vision where the persecuted Church endures, flourishes, and multiplies in the most hostile regions of the world. The Charity partners with other Help The Persecuted organisations internationally together with an indigenous staff team (the HTP Group) to identify and direct support to persecuted people. Our Theory of Change is based on the view that Christian individuals and families in hostile places endure persecution and require direct practical interventions and spiritual support. HTP Group methods are, therefore, geared toward identifying and assessing bone-fide cases of persecution and subsequently addressing both spiritual and practical needs to stabilize individuals and families, assisting in their journey of healing and rebuilding. We call this approach "Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild."

HTP Group staff receive case referrals from a range of local organizations concerning people living in poverty or distress because of religious persecution. Victims of religious persecution are often in need of immediate and extensive assistance, including needing a safe place to escape danger, support for basic living expenses, assistance with school fees, help with medical needs due to torture or abuse, and trauma counselling. Before agreeing to provide direct assistance, the case details are verified according to strict criteria, and a needs assessment is conducted to ensure that the person is in poverty or distress and to ascertain how best they can be helped. Once a case has been properly vetted, the HTP Group is then able to provide a wide range of relief and pastoral care, including:

- Emergency Safe House housing
- The provision of food, housing, rent and basic living needs
- Transportation and relocation expenses to secure and safe environment
- Livelihood support, such as small business grants and vocational training
- Construction assistance to rebuild homes and family businesses
- Medical expenses related to any form of torture or abuse, and medications
- Psycho-social help, such as trauma counselling
- Pastoral care, participation in our discipleship programs, and connections to a local church

Notable Achievements

During the financial period ending 30 June 2025, the HTP Group grew and strengthened operations in countries facing extreme persecution and directly helped over 104,184 beneficiaries in 15 countries. Starting with those that needed immediate help to get out of danger, direct support was provided including transportation, a place in a Safe House or legal counsel. Beyond these emergency needs, on-the-ground teams delivered direct support to persecuted people in various forms, including essential living expenses, needed medicines, trauma counselling, access to schooling (enabling displaced children to complete their education), and assisting persecuted individuals in finding new jobs and starting new businesses to foster independence.

Highlights include:

- **Enduring Livelihood:** Our investments over the past year have proved transformative in expanding this vital work. In FY25, 116 new businesses and 1 business training programme were funded (a 33% increase on the prior year), helping 642 persecuted Christians achieve economic independence. These family businesses can generate incomes over 80% higher than national average wages, breaking cycles of poverty and enabling people to move from dependence to dignity. From taxi services and bakeries to mushroom farms, these enterprises enable persecuted Christians to rebuild their lives while living in hostile locations.
- **Lebanon Crisis Response:** This comprehensive programme to keep Lebanon as a haven for the persecuted Church grew again in FY25. Since April 2023, we have provided help to 92,294 people. The Seeds of Hope Farm's 34 commercial-scale greenhouses across 1.3 acres have provided fresh vegetables to 19,596 people, while 37,491 received other supplemental food support. When the war intensified in September 2024, one million people fled Southern Lebanon. The Refuge Center and Safe Houses were at capacity. The crisis created further opportunities for the HTP Group Field Ministry Team to help people with supplies and the gospel message. The "Haven" multi-apartment facility was subsequently launched as a critical refuge for Syrian Christians fleeing renewed persecution after the fall of the Assad regime in December 2024.
- **Safe House Network:** Operating 21 safe houses across the MENA region, we provided immediate sanctuary for persecuted Christians facing death threats, torture, and family violence. Residents receive comprehensive care including medical treatment and counseling, with average stays enabling 61% improvement in ability to practice their Christian faith freely. "Help The Persecuted has been a great support. You gave shelter to me, my husband, and my son when even my own parents wouldn't take us in. You stood by us when we had nowhere else to turn." —Jana, Lebanon
- **Emergency Relief Kits:** Additional funds were deployed into the programme this year, enabling the HTP Group Field Ministry Team to distribute 15,145 Emergency Relief Kits (43% increase on the prior year). Each kit provides an average family of four with critical food essentials like rice, flour, and oil, alongside Bible and discipleship materials and the pastoral care of the team. Emergency Relief Kits also open the door for further support to be provided, from ongoing discipleship meetings to the provision of safe housing and more.
- **Widow's List:** This year we launched tailored support for highly vulnerable Christian widows facing poverty from persecution and employment barriers.

The achievements in the year were enabled partly by programme funding provided by Help The Persecuted and its supporters across the UK. The Trustees look forward to increasing the organisation's impact as the charity continues to grow.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

Trustees' responsibilities statement


The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations.

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the applicable Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations, and the provisions of the constitution. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR TO 30 JUNE 2025

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the second edition of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) the Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Income

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about either the timing of the grant or the amount of grant payable.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount incurred net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Highlights include:

- **Lebanon Crisis Response:** The HTP Group continued to work in an increasingly hostile environment, given the economic collapse and the ongoing war. Activity increased to address critical needs, such as food and medical insecurity for thousands of persecuted and vulnerable Christians. The Seeds Of Hope farm was doubled in size and a War Refuge Centre was opened to help those fleeing the war in southern Lebanon. One recent resident had to flee when the fighting began and was warmly welcomed by our team. As a Syrian Christian, he had previously faced persecution and humiliation, and said, "Thank you for providing safe accommodation without any discrimination. I am grateful for your care and service." During the last year, direct help was provided to 33,360 vulnerable beneficiaries—and since inception of this ministry programme, more than 63,305 people have benefitted.
- **Enduring Livelihood:** This aspect of the ministry was grown to create sustainable incomes for more persecuted Christians. Enduring Livelihood deals with the direct effects of persecution, specifically working to break cycles of poverty and dependency, by equipping beneficiaries to successfully own and operate their own small business – enabling them to provide for themselves and their families. Small family businesses, from grocery shops and mobile phone stores to car maintenance and appliance repair shops were funded once appropriate due diligence was completed. Job skills training for new work opportunities was also provided. Over 300 family businesses have been started so far, lifting nearly 2,000 people out of poverty.
- **Discipleship Programmes:** Actively trained 3,667 Christians and formed many new local church home discipleship groups.
- **Emergency Relief Kits:** Additional funds were deployed into the programme this year, enabling the HTP Group to distribute 10,572 Emergency Relief Kits. Each kit provides an average family of four with critical food essentials like rice, flour, and oil, alongside Bibles and discipleship materials and the pastoral care of the team. Emergency Relief Kits also open the door for further support to be provided, from ongoing discipleship meetings to the provision of safe housing and more.
- **Safe Houses:** 19 Safe Houses were operated this year – ensuring capacity to host vulnerable persecuted cases at very short notice. The Safe Houses provide not just a secure location, but a clean and comfortable place to heal and to be spiritually encouraged.

The achievements in the year were enabled partly by programme funding provided by Help The Persecuted and its supporters across the UK. The Trustees look forward to increasing the organisation's impact as the charity continues to grow.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR TO 30 JUNE 2024

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

1.2 Income

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.3 Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about either the timing of the grant or the amount of grant payable.

1.5 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount incurred net of any trade discounts due.

1.6 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.7 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.9 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Help The Persecuted is registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (number 1183327) and exists to strengthen, support and advocate for the persecuted Church. We provide direct practical and spiritual assistance to Christians in the most hostile regions of the world. We work to see persecuted Christians experience fellowship with the Body of Christ as their needs are met—and find renewed strength to follow Christ.

Objectives

The charitable objects are:

1. To advance the Christian religion around the world, in particularly but not exclusively, by enabling those who are victims of religious persecution to worship. This will include enabling pastoral activities, and encouraging Christians in their faith through biblical study and, therefore, strengthening the local churches where they exist.
2. To relieve poverty or financial hardship for victims of religious persecution anywhere in the world, by providing or assisting in the provision of grants, items, services, and programmes to individuals in need, and/or other organisations working to support persecuted populations.
3. To advance the education of the public, in particular in the subject of religious persecution.

Mission Statement

We are ministers of the Gospel who Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild the lives of persecuted believers.

Vision Statement

A world where the persecuted Church endures, flourishes and multiplies in hostile places.

Public benefit

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Constitution.

Financial risk management

they have determined that the level of reserves at the year end were adequate for the operations of the Charity.

Achievement and Performance

Review of Activities

Help The Persecuted exists to Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild the lives of persecuted Christians and works toward a vision where the persecuted Church endures, flourishes, and multiplies in the most hostile regions of the world. The Charity partners with other Help The Persecuted organisations internationally together with an indigenous staff team (the HTP Group) to identify and direct support to persecuted people. Our Theory of Change is based on the view that Christian individuals and families in hostile places endure persecution and require direct practical interventions and spiritual support. HTP Group methods are, therefore, geared toward identifying and assessing bone-fide cases of persecution and subsequently addressing both spiritual and practical needs to stabilize individuals and families, assisting in their journey of healing and rebuilding. We call this approach “*Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild.*”

HTP Group staff receive case referrals from a range of local organizations concerning people living in poverty or distress because of religious persecution. Victims of religious persecution are often in need of immediate and extensive assistance, including needing a safe place to escape danger, support for basic living expenses, assistance with school fees, help with medical needs due to torture or abuse, and trauma counselling. Before agreeing to provide direct assistance, the case details are verified according to strict criteria, and a needs assessment is conducted to ensure that the person is in poverty or distress and to ascertain how best they can be helped. Once a case has been properly vetted, the HTP Group is then able to provide a wide range of relief and pastoral care, including:

- Emergency Safe House housing
- The provision of food, housing, rent and basic living needs
- Transportation and relocation expenses to secure and safe environment
- Livelihood support, such as small business grants and vocational training
- Construction assistance to rebuild homes and family businesses
- Medical expenses related to any form of torture or abuse, and medications
- Psycho-social help, such as trauma counselling
- Pastoral care, participation in our discipleship programs, and connections to a local church

Notable Achievements

During the financial period ending 30 June 2023, the HTP Group directly helped over 81,978 beneficiaries in 13 countries. Starting with those that needed immediate help to get out of danger, direct support was provided including transportation, a place in a Safe House or legal counsel. Beyond these emergency needs, on-the-ground teams delivered direct support to persecuted people in various forms, including essential living expenses, needed medicines, trauma counselling, access to schooling (enabling displaced children to complete their education), and assisting persecuted individuals in finding new jobs and starting new businesses to foster independence.

Highlights include:

- **Lebanon Crisis Response:** The scale of the economic crisis in Lebanon reached unprecedented levels during 2021, with the World Bank ranking the country's economic crisis among the top three in the world in the past 150 years—resulting in shortages of food, fuel, electricity and medicines and an increase in political unrest. The HTP Group successfully launched a crisis response programme to address at scale critical needs, such as food and medical insecurity, which included the development of a large vegetable farm. By the end of FY23 over 24,000 persecuted and vulnerable Christians had been directly helped with supplemental food, medicines, medical help, and pastoral care.
- **Syria/Turkey Earthquake Crisis Response:** As a colossal earthquake rocked the Syria-Turkey border on February 6, 2023, Lightning Funds were immediately deployed with our local church partners to provide food, water, shelter, and heat to survivors. A pastoral care team was formed to support those grieving and traumatized. The HTP Group delivered practical care providing Emergency Relief Kits with food staples and hygiene vouchers to those left without access to showers and laundry and repairing the homes of those left displaced by earthquake damage. Over 12,000 people were rescued, restored, and empowered to rebuild.
- **Sudan Crisis Response:** When news of a political crisis and possible civil war surfaced, the HTP Group team in Egypt immediately began planning their travel to the northern border of Sudan to respond. Sudanese Christians, fleeing violent persecution and fearing for their lives, poured into Egypt. Hot meals, water, and medical care together with Gospel hope were provided to those who had lost homes, livelihoods, and family members. Over 5,000 people directly benefitted.
- **Enduring Livelihood Programme:** Increased our capacity to create sustainable incomes for vetted persecuted beneficiaries, supporting a wide range of small family businesses from grocery shops and mobile phone stores to car maintenance and appliance repair. Job skills training for new work opportunities was also provided.
- **Discipleship Programmes:** Actively trained 2,889 Christians and formed many new local church home discipleship groups.
- **Emergency Relief Kits:** Additional funds were deployed into the programme this year, enabling the HTP Group to distribute 7,167 Emergency Relief Kits. Each kit provides an average family of four with critical food essentials like rice, flour, and oil, alongside Bibles and discipleship materials and the pastoral care of the team. Emergency Relief Kits also open the door for further support to be provided, from ongoing discipleship meetings to the provision of safe housing and more.
- **Safe Houses:** The number of operational Safe Houses was increased during the past year — bringing greater capacity to host vulnerable persecuted cases at very short notice. The Safe Houses provide not just a secure location, but a clean and comfortable place to heal and to be spiritually encouraged.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

1.2 Income

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Help The Persecuted is registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (number 1183327) and exists to strengthen, support and advocate for the persecuted Church. We provide direct practical and spiritual assistance to Christians in the most hostile regions of the world. We work to see persecuted Christians experience fellowship with the Body of Christ as their needs are met—and find renewed strength to follow Christ.

Objectives

The charitable objects are:

1. To advance the Christian religion around the world, in particularly but not exclusively, by enabling those who are victims of religious persecution to worship. This will include enabling pastoral activities, and encouraging Christians in their faith through biblical study and, therefore, strengthening the local churches where they exist.
2. To relieve poverty or financial hardship for victims of religious persecution anywhere in the world, by providing or assisting in the provision of grants, items, services, and programmes to individuals in need, and/or other organisations working to support persecuted populations.
3. To advance the education of the public, in particular in the subject of religious persecution.

Mission Statement

We are ministers of the Gospel who Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild the lives of persecuted believers.

Vision Statement

A world where the persecuted Church endures, flourishes and multiplies in hostile places.

Public benefit

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Constitution.

Financial risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets or investments ('the free reserves') held by the charity are sufficient to meet the ongoing work of the charity. This policy and the levels of reserves will be reviewed from time to time. The total level of reserves at the end of the year was £54,838. Based upon a review by the Trustees,

they have determined that the level of reserves at the year end were adequate for the operations of the Charity.

Achievement and Performance

Review of Activities

Help The Persecuted partners with other Help The Persecuted organisations internationally together with an indigenous staff team (the HTP Group) to identify and direct support to persecuted people. Our Theory of Change is based on the view that Christian individuals and families in hostile places endure persecution and require direct practical interventions and spiritual support. HTP Group methods are, therefore, geared toward identifying and assessing bone-fide cases of persecution and subsequently addressing both spiritual and practical needs to stabilize individuals and families, assisting in their journey of healing and rebuilding. We call this approach “Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild.”

HTP Group staff receive case referrals from a range of local organizations concerning people living in poverty or distress as a result of religious persecution. Victims of religious persecution are often in need of immediate and extensive assistance, including needing a safe place to escape danger, support for basic living expenses, assistance with school fees, help with medical needs due to torture or abuse, and trauma counselling. Before agreeing to provide direct assistance, the case details are verified according to strict criteria, and a needs assessment is conducted to ensure that the person is in poverty or distress and to ascertain how best they can be helped. Once a case has been properly vetted, the HTP Group is then able to provide a wide range relief and pastoral care, including:

- Emergency Safe House housing
- The provision of food, housing, rent and basic living needs
- Transportation and relocation expenses to secure and safe environment
- Livelihood support, such as small business grants and vocational training
- Construction assistance to rebuild homes and family businesses
- Medical expenses related to any form of torture or abuse, and medications
- Psycho-social help, such as trauma counselling
- Pastoral care, participation in our discipleship programs, and connections to a local church

Notable Achievements

During the financial period ending 30 June 2022, the HTP Group directly helped over 47,000 beneficiaries in 14 countries. Starting with those that needed immediate help to get out of danger, direct support was provided ranging from transportation, a place in a Safe House or legal counsel. Beyond these emergency needs, on-the-ground teams delivered direct support to persecuted people in various forms, from essential living expenses, needed medicines, trauma counselling, access to schooling (enabling displaced children to complete their education), to assisting persecuted individuals in finding new jobs and starting new businesses to foster independence.

Highlights include:

- **Afghanistan:** As the United States military withdrew from Afghanistan, the country became engulfed in chaos. The Taliban insurgency that had been unable to capture even one of the 34 provincial capital cities over the past two decades, took control of the country with significant speed. The Organization was in a unique position to respond to the desperate requests for assistance from those whose lives were at extreme risk – over several months we evacuated more than 750 persecuted beneficiaries out of Afghanistan to secure locations. Working with partners on the ground, this operation included the large-scale

movements and safe housing of beneficiaries inside Afghanistan, as well as the chartering of multiple busses and aircraft. Ongoing work helped secure persecuted beneficiaries with safe passage to countries such as Canada and the United States.

- **Lebanon Crisis Response Program:** The scale of the economic crisis in Lebanon reached unprecedented levels during 2021, with the World Bank ranking the country's economic crisis among the top three in the world in the past 150 years - resulting in shortages of food, fuel, electricity and medicines and an increase in political unrest. The Organization successfully launched a Crisis Response Program to address at scale critical needs, such as food and medical insecurity for thousands of persecuted and vulnerable Christians across Beirut and wider environs. The program will be scaled during FY23 to reach additional beneficiaries.
- **Enduring Livelihood Program:** This aspect of work increased to create sustainable incomes for more persecuted beneficiaries. Small family businesses and income generating projects were funded once appropriate due diligence was completed. Job skills training for new work opportunities was also provided—including sewing, computer use and maintenance, appliance repair, farming, animal husbandry, and more.
- **Emergency Relief Kits:** Additional funds were deployed into the program this year, enabling the Field Ministry Team to distribute 7,900 Emergency Relief Kits. Each kit provides an average family of four with essential food items like rice, flour, and oil, alongside Bibles and discipleship materials and the pastoral care of the team. Emergency Relief Kits also open the door for further support to be provided, from ongoing discipleship meetings to the provision of safe housing and more.
- **Safe Houses:** The number of operational Safe Houses was increased during the year – bringing greater capacity to host vulnerable persecuted cases at very short notice. The Safe Houses provide not just a secure location, but a clean and comfortable place to heal and to be spiritually encouraged.

All of this work is set in the context of our deep desire to strengthen Christians physically and spiritually through discipleship, to grow the local Church and to proclaim the Gospel. The achievements in the year were enabled partly by project funding provided by Help The Persecuted and its supporters across the UK. The Trustees look forward to increasing the organisation's impact as we continue to grow.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021.

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1. To advance the Christian religion around the world, in particularly but not exclusively, by enabling those who are victims of religious persecution to worship. This will include enabling pastoral activities, and encouraging Christians in their faith through biblical study and, therefore, strengthening the local churches where they exist.
2. To relieve poverty or financial hardship for victims of religious persecution anywhere in the world, by providing or assisting in the provision of grants, items, services, and programmes to individuals in need, and/or other organisations working to support persecuted populations.
3. To advance the education of the public, in particular in the subject of religious persecution.

Mission Statement

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In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Constitution.

Financial risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets or investments ('the free reserves') held by the charity are sufficient to meet the ongoing work of the charity. This policy and the levels of reserves will be reviewed from time to time. The total level of reserves at the end of the year was £54,838. Based upon a review by the Trustees,

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they have determined that the level of reserves at the year end were adequate for the operations of the Charity.

Achievement and Performance

Review of Activities

Help The Persecuted partners with other Help The Persecuted organisations internationally together with an indigenous staff team (the HTP Group) to identify and direct support to persecuted people. The Organisations “Theory of Change” is based on the view that Christian individuals and families in hostile places endure persecution and require direct practical interventions and ministry support. HTP Group methods are, therefore, geared toward identifying and assessing bone-fide cases of persecution and subsequently addressing both spiritual and practical needs to stabilize individuals and families, assisting in their journey of healing and rebuilding. We call this approach “Rescue, Restore, and Rebuild.”

HTP Group staff receive case referrals from a range of local organizations concerning people living in poverty or distress as a result of religious persecution. Victims of religious persecution are often in need of immediate and extensive assistance, including needing a safe place to escape danger, support for basic living expenses, assistance with school fees, help with medical needs due to torture or abuse, and trauma counselling. Before agreeing to provide direct assistance, the case details are verified according to strict criteria, and a needs assessment is conducted to ensure that the person is in poverty or distress and to ascertain how best they can be helped. Once a case has been properly vetted, the HTP Group is then able to provide a wide range relief and pastoral care, including:

The provision of food, housing rent, clothing, and basic living needs.

- Emergency Safe House housing.
- Transportation and relocation expenses to secure a safe environment.
- Medical expenses related to any form of torture or abuse.
- Livelihood support, such as micro-business grants and training.
- Psycho-social help, such as trauma counselling.

During the financial period ending 30 June 2021, the HTP Group directly helped over 46,800 beneficiaries in 17 countries. Starting with those that needed immediate help to get out of danger, direct support was provided ranging from transportation, a place in a Safe House or legal counsel. Beyond these emergency needs, on-the-ground teams delivered direct support to persecuted people in various forms, from essential living expenses, needed medicines, trauma counselling, access to schooling (enabling displaced children to complete their education), to assisting persecuted individuals in finding new jobs and starting new businesses to foster independence.

Highlights include:

- Enduring Livelihood Programme: This aspect of our work was significantly increased to create sustainable incomes for more persecuted Christians. Small family businesses and income generating projects were funded once appropriate due diligence was completed. Job skills training for new work opportunities was also provided—including sewing, computer use and maintenance, appliance repair, farming, animal husbandry, and more.

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- **Emergency Relief Kits:** Additional funds were deployed into the program this year, enabling the Field Ministry Team to distribute 7,100 Emergency Relief Kits. Each kit provides an average family of four with critical food essentials like rice, flour, and oil, alongside Bibles and discipleship materials and the pastoral care of the team. Emergency Relief Kits also open the door for further support to be provided, from ongoing discipleship meetings to the provision of safe housing and more.
- **Safe Houses:** The number of operational Safe Houses was doubled during the year - increasing capacity to host vulnerable persecuted cases at very short notice. The Safe Houses provide not just a secure location, but a clean and comfortable place to heal and to be spiritually encouraged.
- **COVID-19 Response:** The pandemic has caused significant additional hardships and distress for the persecuted. Christian converts have been adversely affected, whether by being unable to flee dangerous situations, being unable to work, or in some cases being cut off from government aid due to their refugee status. The HTP Group has continued to provide vital pastoral care and other provisions to those affected, including educational literature and internet cards to enable people to maintain contact during lockdowns or isolation.

All of this work is set in the context of our deep desire to strengthen Christians physically and spiritually through discipleship, to grow the local Church and to proclaim the Gospel. The achievements in the year were enabled partly by project funding provided by Help The Persecuted and its supporters across the UK. The Trustees look forward to increasing the organisation's impact as we enter our third year of operation.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

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Trustees' responsibilities statement

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations.

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the applicable Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations, and the provisions of the constitution. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR TO 30 JUNE 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

1.2 Income

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.3 Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about either the timing of the grant or the amount of grant payable.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR TO 30 JUNE 2021 (continued)

1.5 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount incurred net of any trade discounts due.

1.6 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.7 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.9 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
