In operating our charity, the trustees have regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on providing a public benefit.

Our main activity is to provide a point of contact for members of the public and veterinary practices in Warwickshire and adjoining borders who has found a hedgehog they are concerned about.

Rehabilitators are distributed throughout south Warwickshire, and there are links to several veterinary practices who provide advice and support.

Our rehabilitators will provide care and, where appropriate, treatment for the hedgehog until it can be released back to the wild or handed to one of our foster carers to provide continuing care in preparation for its release. In the late autumn, hedgehogs that are considered too small to be released, or who are late arrivals still requiring treatment, will be overwintered with us until such time as the weather has improved and they reach an appropriate release weight. There may be small number of hedgehogs each year are not suitable for release and these are found long term homes suitable to their condition.

Members of the organisation are all volunteers who have been helping hedgehogs, as a cohesive group, since the formation of the organisation in 2014. Some members of the group have worked with hedgehogs independently for many years prior to that date.

The task of nursing a hedgehog back to health can be a lengthy process, sometimes taking a number of months. This involves, at a minimum, daily feeding, cleaning, medicating, keeping records of care, vet visits and communicating with finders.

During the year we are often invited to attend events to raise public awareness about supporting hedgehogs, and to give talks to a variety of groups, including schools. We have a display stand and educational material to support the team on these occasions.

Volunteers form the backbone of the charity and donate their time, personal funds and expertise for the benefit of the public and Warwickshire's hedgehogs. Thanks to them, the charity continues to generate goodwill amongst the hedgehog loving public. It is that goodwill, often accompanied by generous donations of money and supplies that enables us to continue our work.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

During 2025 our rehabilitators received around 600 sick or injured hedgehogs. The number of admissions is significantly down on last year and, sadly, this has been reflected by many other rescues around the UK.

Approximately 48% of those admitted recovered fully and were released back to the wild. Sadly, some hedgehogs with serious injuries or advanced medical conditions could not be saved.

Changeable and wide-ranging environmental conditions through the year, along with urban development, intensive farming and traffic have all potentially contributed to declining hedgehog numbers in the area and around the country.

Public awareness of the threat to hedgehogs has increased thanks to national and local campaigns, social media and the availability of information about what to do if they find a sick or injured hedgehog.

We continue to work to improve our social media presence, using the platforms for inform and educate members of the public and liaise with fellow rescues.

During the last three years the trustees have developed, reviewed and agreed policies covering the following areas of business:

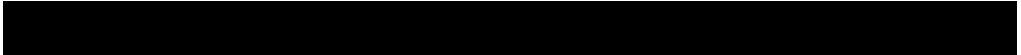

During 2024 our rehabilitators received over 800 sick or injured hedgehogs, a slight decrease on the previous year.

Approximately 50% of those admitted recovered fully and were released back to the wild. Sadly, some hedgehogs with serious injuries or advanced medical conditions could not be saved.

Changeable and wide-ranging environmental conditions through the year, urban development, intensive farming and roads, which have fragmented their habitat all affect hedgehog numbers.

In October 2024, European hedgehogs were listed as “near threatened” on the International Union for Conservation of Nature's red list after a decline in numbers of at least 30% over the past decade across much of their range. We will do all that we can to support hogs in need in our area.

Public awareness of the threat to hedgehogs has increased thanks to national and local campaigns, social media and the availability of information about what to do if they find a sick or injured hedgehog. We continue to work to improve our social media presence, using the platforms for inform and educate members of the public and liaise with fellow rescues.

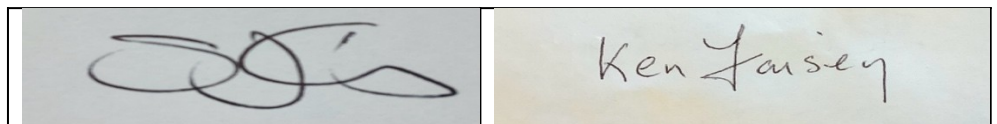

In operating our charity, the trustees have regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on providing a public benefit.

Our main activity is to provide a point of contact for members of the public and veterinary practices in Warwickshire and adjoining borders who has found a hedgehog they are concerned about.

Following a telephone triage process, any hedgehog who is deemed to be requiring in person assessment and/or intervention will be brought to one of our rehabilitators. If a hedgehog is deemed not to require assessment or intervention, appropriate advice will be given to the finder about supporting the hedgehog in the environment where it was found, generally the finders garden.

The rehabilitator will provide the rescued hedgehog with safe housing, artificial heat, when necessary, food, water, bedding, closed monitoring and any required treatments. If the hedgehog has a condition requiring intervention by a vet, it will be taken to one of our hedgehog-friendly veterinary practices nearby.

Rehabilitators are distributed throughout Warwickshire, and each uses a veterinary practice near him or her. It would be impossible for us to continue our work without the support of vets on whom we rely to:

1. Advise on difficult/unusual medical conditions;
2. Recommend treatment for stubborn or complex problems;
3. Supply medication for use by rehabilitators;
4. Examine and, if possible, treat hedgehogs with serious injuries or conditions
5. Euthanise hedgehogs that are very ill or badly injured.

We provide, 24-hour care. Our rehabilitators will provide care and, where appropriate, treatment for the hedgehog until it can be released back to the wild or handed to one of our foster carers to provide continuing care in preparation for its release. In the late autumn, hedgehogs that are considered too small to be released, or who are later arrivals still requiring treatment, will be overwintered with us until such time as the weather has improved and they reach an appropriate release weight. There may be small number of hedgehogs each year are not suitable for release and these are found long term homes suitable to their condition.

Members of the organisation are all volunteers who have been helping hedgehogs, as a cohesive group, since the formation of the organisation in 2014. Some members of the group have worked with hedgehogs independently for many years prior to that date.

The group comprises 9 rehabilitators and many foster carers, dedicated to making a positive impact on the survival of the Warwickshire hedgehog population. All operate from their homes and gardens in Warwickshire where they provide, between them, a wide range of rescue facilities. Rehabilitators are trained in the care of hedgehogs and, specifically, the administration of medication and specific treatment to sick or injured hedgehogs. Foster carers, typically, provide shelter, food, care to the hedgehog during the recovery period until they are at an appropriate release weight. Many of the rehabilitators and some of the foster carers have attended the Vale Wildlife Hospital and Rehabilitation Centre where they have completed the First Aid, Care and Rehabilitation of Hedgehogs Course.

The task of nursing a hedgehog back to health can be a lengthy process, sometimes taking a number of months. This involves feeding, cleaning, medicating, keeping records of care, vet visits and communicating with finders.

During the year we are often invited to attend events to raise public awareness about supporting hedgehogs, and to give talks to a variety of groups, including schools. We have display stands and educational material to support the team on these occasions.

Volunteers form the backbone of the charity and donate their time, personal funds and expertise for the benefit of the public and Warwickshire's hedgehogs. Thanks to them the charity continues to generate goodwill amongst the hedgehog loving public. It is that goodwill, often accompanied by generous donations of money and supplies, that keeps our doors open and the trustees wish to thank all our volunteers and supporters for their generosity of spirit.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year**

During 2023 our rehabilitators received over 900 sick or injured hedgehogs, an increase of 28% on the previous year. Public awareness, widely fluctuating weather conditions and other environmental factors may have accounted for some of the increase. However, the admission area widened as a result of the limited availability of one nearby rescue and the closure of another.

Approximately 55% of those admitted recovered fully and were released back to the wild. Sadly, some hedgehogs with serious injuries or advanced conditions could not be saved despite, where necessary, veterinary intervention. The environmental conditions in 2023 made it a very difficult year for hedgehogs and our rehabilitators received record numbers. We received many hedgehogs with severe problems as well as more babies and juveniles than previous years. In the autumn, the admissions arrived with complex parasitical and bacterial problems. We continue to develop our practices to respond to these changing circumstances.

Our native European Hedgehog is still identified as a species vulnerable to extinction. Public awareness of the threat to hedgehogs has increased thanks to national and local campaigns, social media and the availability of information about what to do if they find a sick or injured hedgehog. We have worked to improve our social media presence in recent years and now have a large number of followers on our Facebook and Instagram sites. Users are directed to our website [www.warwickshirehedgehogrescue.org](http://www.warwickshirehedgehogrescue.org) where educational material and contact information for rehabilitators can be found.

We have seen an increase in expenditure over the last year which has been driven by the significant increase in the numbers of hedgehogs being treated and the increasing costs of essential medication and food.




Our rehabilitators received into care nearly 700 sick and injured hedgehogs in 2022. About 60% of these recovered fully and were released back to the wild. Sadly, some hedgehogs with serious injuries or advanced conditions could not be saved despite, where necessary, veterinary intervention. The very hot and dry conditions in 2022 made it a very difficult year for hedgehogs. We received many hedgehogs with severe dehydration as well as more babies and juveniles than previous years. In the autumn, the admissions arrived with complex parasitical and bacterial problems. We continue to develop our practices to respond to these changing circumstances.

Hedgehog numbers nationally continue to decline, mainly due to loss of habitat, although the numbers of hedgehogs we receive into our care is increasing. This is due to the raised awareness amongst members of the public about what to do if they find a sick or injured hedgehog and national and local press and social media campaigns. We have worked to improve our social media presence this year and now have a large number of followers on our Facebook and Instagram sites. Users are directed to our website [www.warwickshirehedgehogrescue.org](http://www.warwickshirehedgehogrescue.org) where educational material and contact information for rehabilitators can be found.

During the last two years the trustees have developed and agreed policies covering the following areas of business:

The charity is pleased to report that income has continued to be healthy, with donations and grants coming from individuals, businesses, and charitable trusts. Income is on a par with 2021 and has resulted in our reserves increasing by over 45% despite an increase in expenditure of nearly 30%. This increase has largely been due to providing additional equipment to improve the ability of our rehabilitators and foster carers to care for sick and injured hedgehogs but also includes essential medical supplies and food.

**Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)**

In operating our charity, the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on providing a public benefit.

For the public benefit, our main activities include accepting into our care hedgehogs that have been found by the public and that we deem require our intervention to survive.

Generally, we are contacted by a member of the public who has found one or more hedgehogs. After a telephone screening process, a hedgehog is brought to us, whereupon we examine it and treat it with the medication appropriate to the condition(s) under direct supervision of a veterinarian. During the initial rehabilitation period, a Rehabilitator provides the patient with safe housing and artificial heat where necessary, food, water, bedding and close monitoring. While the hedgehog is under the care of the Rehabilitator, any other conditions arising will be diagnosed and treated with the appropriate medication. Should the services of a vet be required the hedgehog is transported to one of our hedgehog-friendly veterinary practices nearby.

Rehabilitators are distributed throughout Warwickshire therefore each uses a veterinary practice local to him or her. It would be impossible for us to continue our work with hedgehogs without the support of the vets on whom we rely to:

1. Advise on difficult/unusual medical conditions;
2. Recommend treatment for stubborn or complex problems;

3. Supply medication for use by Rehabilitators;
4. Examine and, if possible, treat hedgehogs with serious injuries e.g. broken leg or jaw, strimmer wounds;
5. Euthanise hedgehogs that are very ill or badly injured e.g. head injuries, broken spine or pelvis, deep tissue-infections, multiple broken legs.

Occasionally, the hedgehog requires, and we provide, twenty-four hour care. During the treatment phase our Rehabilitator cares for the patient until it has improved to the point where it can be re-released into the wild or handed to one of our Foster Carers who provides continued care, sanctuary and support for the hedgehog, for example in gaining weight, in preparation for its release. In the Autumn, hedgehogs that are healthy, but underweight for hibernation, are 'overwintered' with our Foster Carers. During that period, the hedgehog is offered sanctuary, is monitored, kept warm, fed, watered and cleaned. Once the hedgehog has reached a suitable weight it may hibernate. Upon awakening in springtime, after hibernation, the hedgehog remains in care until its weight is deemed appropriate to allow it to be re-released into the wild.

We find permanent homes for some hedgehogs that would not survive in the wild. In these homes they are provided with secluded, enclosed, outdoor facilities and are fed, watered and monitored.

We are all volunteers who have been helping hedgehogs, as a cohesive group, since the formation of the organisation in 2014. Several members of the group have worked with hedgehogs independently for many years prior to that date.

The group comprises ten Rehabilitators and many Foster Carers, all operating from their homes and gardens within the county of Warwickshire, where they offer rescue facilities. Rehabilitators are those volunteers who are specially trained in the care of hedgehogs and, more specifically, in the administration of medication to sick or injured hedgehogs. On the whole, Foster Carers care for the hedgehogs during the recovery period. Their job involves feeding the hedgehogs and cleaning their pens whilst continuing to observe and record the hedgehog's health and weight.

Five of the ten rehabilitators have received training at Vale Wildlife Hospital & Rehabilitation Centre where they attend the First Aid, Care & Rehabilitation of Hedgehogs Course.

The task of nursing a hedgehog back to health is a lengthy process with one hedgehog requiring, on average, three months of care that involves feeding, cleaning, medicating, vigilance, recording, vet visits and, the other side of the coin, receiving the public into our homes and communicating with the public. Multiple tasks requiring time and expertise of a few dedicated individuals. We are a small team dedicated to making a positive impact on the survival of Warwickshire's hedgehog population.

During the summer months we may decide to have display stands at events such as Village Fetes, National Trust events, and open days at local attractions, e.g., Charlecote Mill.

We raise small sums for the charity at these events, and generate much interest from the public, both children and adults alike. These gatherings are educational opportunities allowing us raise awareness of the plight of the hedgehog and to share information and stories about hedgehogs. We answer questions and provide information for example, on feeding and providing 'houses' for wild hedgehogs, the annual life-cycle of hedgehogs including breeding and hibernation times, the management of gardens to reduce hazards and increase opportunities for hedgehogs, the reasons for the rapid decline of hedgehogs and what to do if someone finds a sick hedgehog. Visitors may take our contact details, leaflets and flyers from our stand, and the pictures on display are reliable conversation starters.

Over the past two years, these events have been severely curtailed by COVID restrictions and the opportunities to join such events have been far fewer.

It is important to acknowledge that we are staffed entirely by volunteers and that our objects and activities would fail to be achieved without them. Volunteers donate their time, their personal funds and their expertise for the benefit of the public in general and, on their behalf, Warwickshire's hedgehogs.

Volunteers form the backbone of Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue. Thanks to them, the Charity continues to generate goodwill amongst the hedgehog-loving public, and it is that goodwill that keeps our doors open. The trustees wish to thank all volunteers for their generosity of spirit.

**Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year**

Our Rehabilitators received into care more than five hundred sick hedgehogs in 2021. Most hogs recovered fully and were released back to the wild, while some were settled into safe gardens belonging to a member of the public who offers food and shelter. Sadly, some hedgehogs with serious injuries or advanced conditions could not be saved despite, where necessary, veterinary intervention. We continue to record a significant increase in hedgehogs with severe injuries (broken legs, strimmer wounds, etc.) and infections, and to see the presence of intestinal fluke that is proving recalcitrant to treatment and thus causing the time in care to be extended.

Over the past decade, we have received increasing numbers of hedgehogs. The cause is unlikely to be that there is an increasing number of hedgehogs but may be driven by the media attention that has raised awareness of the decline of hedgehogs and their habitat and promoted hedgehog rescue centres. These days the public is much better educated about what to do if they find a sick or injured hedgehog or find a hedgehog out in the day.

In 2021, the Charity's awareness campaign continued to be affected by national safety measures, due to the coronavirus outbreak, preventing us from participating in talks, presentations, fundraising events and calendar production. This potential drawback did not discourage enquiries from members of the public and did not lead to a reduction in hedgehogs being received into care. In addition, new volunteers came forward to train as Rehabilitators and Foster Carers.

The Charity is pleased to report that donations from the general public more than doubled in 2021 and grants from charitable trusts increased by almost 270% on the previous year. For these grants the Charity gives its thanks to: The Lennox Hannay Charitable Trust, The Shirley Pugh Foundation for The Welfare of Animals, Dumbreck Charity, Beryl Evetts and Robert Luff Animal Welfare Trust Limited, Hickman Animal Trust, Animal Friends Insurance, The Rose Animal Welfare Trust, Betty Phillips Charitable Trust, RVJ Cadbury Charitable Trust, The Robert Clutterbuck Charitable Trust, CB & HH Taylor 1984 Trust.

Total expenditure for 2021 showed a 6% increase, which is to be expected given that the charity rescued more hedgehogs than any previous year.

The Trustees are grateful for the ongoing support of *Kenilworth Books* who raise funds for the Charity each year and raise awareness of the plight of hedgehogs in Warwickshire.

The Charity finished 2021 by more than doubling its reserve from 2020. A phenomenal achievement! Thanks go to **everyone** for their support.
