The objects of the CIO are to preserve and protect the health of women and relieve the distress and suffering experienced as a result of domestic abuse in, but not exclusively, South Manchester, by the provision of outreach and drop in services which include advice, guidance and practical support.

Organisation Structure

The structure of the organisation is regularly reviewed by Trustees.

The Trustees report a continued increase in referrals over the last 12 months and the organisation continues to respond accordingly. The growth is in response to survivor support needed due to the increase in reported incidents of Domestic Abuse.

Staffing levels have increased to:

1 full-time & 4 part-time staff, 2 short term contractors plus 15 Key Volunteers

Volunteer 1

Supports staff on a Wednesday and occasional Fridays whilst the Freedom Programme and Freedom Forever sessions are being delivered.

Role includes answering the phones, welcoming attendees, making drinks, washing up, stocking food and toiletry cupboards.

Volunteer 2

Supports staff for 2 hours on a Monday with the Positive Parenting Programme.

13 Key Volunteers support the centre externally in several ways:

Arranging local fundraising events

Collecting donated items

Sorting and washing donated items

Communicating with commercial partners

Collecting seasonal presents for families

The volunteers play a significant role in both the day to day running of the centre and future partnership/commercial development.

Grants from Wythenshawe Community Housing Group and the Broome Family Trust, together with donations from Commercial Partners, Casey's & Chiesi, continue to fund core expenses and the delivery of varied in-house sessions each week, maintaining the manageable number of individuals attending the centre.

COVID

Case Study 1

Year of birth: 1970

B arrived originally at the centre in tears. At this point in time, B was still with her partner who was extremely emotionally abusive towards her. The pair met at Alcoholics Anonymous and had continued their relationship thereon. Even at the beginning of their partnership, the perpetrator had given B a black eye.

However, since then, the abuse had begun to escalate, resulting in B's interest in attending the Freedom Programme. Each week, B would arrive to engage with the Freedom Programme and afterwards have a 1:1 session with Safespots support worker. This commenced in order to process what she had heard, as B evidently recognised the factors and traits of 'The Dominator' from each of the sessions within her own partner. The pieces clearly started falling into place as B would continuously underline aspects of the Freedom Programme booklet throughout the sessions.

Around April, B began to feel more positive within herself and how to handle her partner within their relationship. Despite this, her partner continued to act in a disrespectful manner – such as getting inordinately drunk at Easter. This continued within the pattern of leaving their home to get inebriated prior to coming back and behaving abusively – including being unresponsive to B and bashing loudly round the house. B came into the centre on the 30th of May relaying his conduct. She also shared that he had pinned her down upon their bed recently and stated that if she wanted him to leave, she would have to call the police.

The following day, the 31st of May, B arrived at the centre and had decided that she wanted him out of her life. Safespots helped B to report the perpetrator to the police. The police responded through coming into the centre to have a conversation with B, aided by Safespots support worker due to the language communication barrier. Following this, the police attended B's home and changed her locks, installed a ring doorbell and removed the perpetrator's possessions from the property. This, combined with providing the perpetrator with a warning, has meant that B has not had contact with him since.

Quote from B:

'You have saved my life; I would not be around if it was not for you (Safespots)'

Case Study 2

Year of birth: 1960

L left her husband after 20 years of marriage, taking nearly nothing in terms of possessions with her. Her perpetrator's behaviour was coercive, with him treating her as his slave – calling her his own 'secretary', prioritising alcohol over her wellbeing and expressing supportive views for paedophilia. Moreover, her husband knew of her desire to have children, yet waited until he knew it was too late for her to do so. Further, his actions were also physically abusive, demonstrated with him locking her within the house.

Following the separation, L relocated to Wythenshawe, where she felt much safer but was extremely lonely. After seeing advertising for Safespots, she decided to attend numerous coffee mornings here for company and decided to engage in the Freedom Programme. During the Freedom Programme sessions, L would often get triggered and have to leave the room. She was particularly affected by the dominator personality of the 'Bad Father' stating that this was 'not for her'.

Despite this, L continued to enjoy coming in for group work sessions for the sense of community. However, following leaving her marriage, L began to suffer from both PTSD, Fibromyalgia and Alopecia – acting as a barrier on numerous occasions to coming into the centre. This and her fear of accidentally seeing her husband in public – meant that she cancelled numerous 1:1 appointments due to this stress. Instead, Safespots arranged telephone appointments in order to continue providing her with the necessary support.

Ultimately, when L gradually improved mentally and physically – she entered the centre and said that returning 'felt like coming home.'

L had finished the Freedom Programme but was having problems with her family over in America, including illness and death, therefore Safespots continued providing emotional support.

L has found that Safespots and involvement within the Freedom programme has helped her life drastically, to the point where she now volunteers at the centre on Fridays to help improve other women's lives in the same way. Further, due to donations received recently, Safespots were able to arrange delivery of a kitchen dresser and other homeware products to L's home.

Quote from L:

'Coming back to Safespots felt like coming home.'

This unique organisation provides a bespoke, safe space with critical emotional and practical support for Domestic Abuse survivors

Case Study 1

R was a 27yr old single mum with a baby daughter when she was initially referred to us in May 2021. Her case had been heard at a multi-agency risk assessment conference (MARAC), resulting in the family being moved to a hotel for safety reasons relating to the domestic abuse and violence she had experienced with her ex-partner.

At her first appointment R was very nervous and visibly tearful and upset. She did not feel ready for any type of group work, so we worked one to one with her initially with a bespoke care plan to meet her specific needs. R has learning difficulties so our first job was to assist with pre-tenancy paperwork in order to move out of the hotel into temporary accommodation. The accommodation was outside Wythenshawe and R began to feel isolated and depressed. She had begun to reconnect with her family after the disruption caused by her abusive relationship and this was difficult in the new area. We continued to support finding local baby groups whilst helping source more appropriate long-term accommodation.

R received a court hearing notification stating that her ex-partner wanted to have contact with their daughter. She wanted to raise her concerns about this as she was aware that he was a drug user. Once she had accessed a solicitor, we were able to help R express these concerns and request that drug tests be taken prior to access being considered.

During this time R became stressed and was given to catastrophising about the outcome if contact was permitted. We undertook a programme of confidence building, encouraging YouTube workouts at home as she was unable to go to the gym. These became a focus in the evenings and gradually helped improve anxiety and boredom.

We supported R's legal aid application and continued to assist communication with the solicitor. We were able to support the family as they moved into a mother and baby unit in Wythenshawe, assisting with the application and providing a reference. Although R was more comfortable in this area and was closer to her family, it did result in several incidents where she saw her ex-partner when she was out in the community.

This, together with threats made by his brother, impacted R's confidence. She felt unable to go out and became isolated and withdrawn. At this time, we provided emotional support and helped her report the breach of her non-molestation order to the police. In addition, we undertook work around healthy relationships and boundaries, encouraging her to take part in some cooking lessons to improve her skills at home.

The court process required further hearings and we continued to support practically and emotionally. During this time there were further intimidating incidents involving her ex-partner both by email and in the community. This, combined with the CAFCASS interview for the court, triggered flashbacks and nightmares relating to the abuse she had experienced. We helped R with personal finances and budgeting as she established her new home with her daughter. Liaison with her GP, health visitor and Early Help support were all facilitated during our sessions.

The results of the drug tests revealed that her ex-partner had a more serious drug issue than R had thought. This caused her alarm and further upset. R was also suffering as her grandmother's health

deteriorated resulting in her move to a care home to keep her safe. Her grandmother was a key support and point of stability in R's life.

R began to settle into her new home, joining baby group and growing in confidence. She began to attend our coffee mornings and mixing with others which was a huge step. R commented that she was proud with herself as she had felt she would never be able to do this. We supported her through a further interim court hearing prior to a final hearing to be 6 months later.

R disclosed that she had begun a new relationship, but felt that it was becoming toxic, noting he had begun to blackmail her. She asked for our help to compose a text sending a clear message that she wanted no further contact with him. We continued to work on healthy relationships and warning signs at this time. We were delighted when R agreed to attend the 11 week Freedom Programme which is group work focusing education around domestic abuse. R was supported throughout the course by our staff.

We continued to support R as she experienced post separation abuse from her ex-partner. These incidents made her doubt herself, impacting her confidence and self-esteem. As we worked together around these issues, we supported R to review the CAF/CASS report and its recommendations. In the final hearing the judge ruled that her ex-partner would only be able to have indirect contact with his daughter. R was very happy and relieved with this result.

Following the hearing her ex-partner's family made threats towards R. However, this time she felt confident enough to report these issues to the Police herself, without support. We continued to work together on positive thinking, wellbeing, affirmations, meditation techniques and self-care practices. R enjoyed this work, and we began to see more positive results reflected in her thinking and choices. We began to see her take an active role in group work, sharing her journey and expressing her opinions in the group.

Since this time, we have continued to support R to find a nursery placement for her daughter and to overcome difficulties with safeguarding issues in her accommodation. We have been able to provide emergency food supplies for the family, together with clothing as her daughter grew. This reflects a big change as previously R would ask for this type of help.

During challenges we have noted that although R is often initially upset, she has shown new levels of resilience, bouncing back quickly. We have seen R grow and become confident in her parenting skills. She has established a good routine with her daughter and has just started potty-training.

R's grandmother recently passed away and, although we provided emotional support at this difficult time, once more we have been aware of R's increased resilience. We continue to support her with administrative tasks which are challenging due to her learning difficulties, recently assisting her to send evidence of increased rent to the benefits agency.

R came to our service as a nervous young girl, with little confidence and uncertain as a parent. We are able to celebrate her growth as she now presents as a confident, assertive woman who believes in herself as a parent. She understands and has begun to process her abusive experiences and has a framework for healthy relationships. As a result of her recent experiences she is also capable of problem solving, leading

to good decision making and is confident asking for help. *“What would I have done without Safespots? You have helped me cope with some of the most difficult times in my life. Thank you”*

Case Study 2

The Freedom Course

The Freedom Programme is an 11-week certificated course which examines the roles played by attitudes and beliefs on the actions of abusive men and the responses of victims and survivors. The aim is to enable an understanding of what has been experienced rather than being overwhelmed by it. The Freedom Programme also describes in detail how children are affected by being exposed to domestic abuse, together with how their lives are improved when the abuse is removed. The sessions have explored identifying controlling and coercive behaviours, warning signs and red flags indications of abusers.

K presented as highly anxious, evidenced by picking at her fingers, making them bleed. Always pulling on the neck of her clothing, she was paranoid about a mark received from being strangled. This lady was very quiet, found it hard to engage in group work and didn't feel comfortable around people.

We felt K would benefit from a Ring doorbell as she was feeling threatened by her abuser's family and this brought her a huge sense of security and put her mind at ease. We gave her a second doorbell for the back of the house as the garden was not secure. K was moved up to band 1 priority with the housing authority so that she could be moved more quickly for her own safety. She waited around 4 months for a new house in the area close to her mum, which she wanted as this was very important to her. She moved, with our support by providing removals transport, and was able to use both ring doorbells at the new house.

She slowly engaged in all group work, which included craft sessions and weekly coffee mornings. She completed the 'Freedom Programme' and is currently on the 'Freedom Forever Programme' which she says has changed her life.

K has come a long way from when she first walked through our doors and now presents as a much more confident, less anxious, happier person, attending the local gym regularly.

She feels very safe with her children in the new home and says she will always know where we are when she needs us.

Feedback from Mum:

“I learnt so much in the Freedom Programme and my graduation will stay in my memory forever. I love my photo against the tree in the purple cap and gown and that's the first certificate I've ever received, it's now up on my wall – thanks to Safespots I feel safe. I feel like I have a life again and can finally be myself.”

Case Study 3

E was referred by Family Action in September 2023.

E has been through mental, physical and emotional abuse and has been taken to court by her abuser as he wishes to have contact with their 2 children.

E had no confidence, was extremely lonely and felt that she wasn't good enough. She felt that she couldn't ever truly leave her abuser as he had mentally abused her into feeling like she couldn't survive without him. He had completely broken down her confidence about her looks, job and parenting, by calling her names and telling her awful things that have really stuck with her. E felt trapped with nowhere to go, as none of her friends and family understood because, in their culture, women are told that they should stay and put up with their husband's abuse.

E has come a long way since first coming in to see us. She enjoys all of our group sessions, developing good relationships with the staff as she feels they all understand and don't judge her. The sessions help build her self esteem and self confidence by being around and talking to other people. She is starting to speak and engage with other ladies after being really quiet over the last few months and really looks forward to the sessions.

Feedback from Mum:

"Last Christmas was the best I've ever had with my children, and I have you all here at Safespots to thank. I'm really looking forward to coming back to the weekly craft sessions in the New Year, making beautiful things and chatting with friends over a cup of tea (or two)!"

In conclusion:

This unique organisation provides a bespoke, safe space with critical emotional and practical support for Domestic Abuse survivors

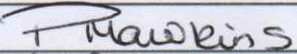
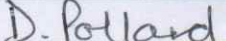

Objects

The objects of the CIO are to preserve and protect the health of women and relieve the distress and suffering experienced as a result of domestic abuse in, but not exclusively, South Manchester by the provision of outreach and drop in services which include advice, guidance and practical support.

The Trustees report a significant growth of the organisation over the last 12 months. The growth is in response to survivor support needed due to the increase in reported incidents of Domestic Abuse.

Staffing levels have increased from:

- 1 full-time & 2 part-time to **2 full-time & 2 part-time employees PLUS a contractor and 11 volunteers**

The organisation utilised part of the National Lottery funding on a strength review, which was completed by two independent parties. The final report was extremely positive and highlighted the great work undertaken by the organisation.

The National Lottery also provided funding for addition professional growth training for employees, enabling them to complete accredited facilitator training for the delivery of several weekly in house courses.

The Tudor Trust grant has been used to support the delivery of more and varied in-house sessions each week, thus increasing the number of individuals attending the centre.

Ring Doorbells

Ring doorbells provide at home security for the families we work with. In addition, they act as a deterrent and can provide evidence to progress cases. Their impact is huge and immediate.

We provided a doorbell for a young mother in her new home, previously she and her children had been in refuge. She had separated from her abusive partner following domestic abuse and violence. She was still experiencing difficulties with him around contact with her two young children. Mum was extremely anxious and had developed trauma related responses which were now impacting her life and that of the children. They had been living in refuge prior.

Whilst working with Mum it became apparent that she had also been exposed to adverse childhood experiences due to domestic abuse as a child. One clear memory involved a knock at the door resulting in her mother telling the children to hide under the table. This memory had triggered a fearful response from Mum if there was an unexpected knock at the door. She was distressed not only at her own response and inability to cope, but also seeing her fear reflected in her children. Both children were upset and fearful when someone knocked at the door. This made things even more difficult for Mum as she realised their response was based on her reaction.

The ring doorbell allowed Mum to see who was at the door before opening it. This allowed her to take a breath, reduce her own anxiety and make a safe decision about answering the door. By role modelling a different behaviour the children became calmer and less anxious when someone called at the front door. The calmer they became the happier and more relaxed Mum became. After a short time, Mum reported she felt more confident and had noticed a considerable improvement on the children's responses too. This particular Mum also benefited from attending the Freedom course.

Feedback from Mum:

"I was referred through by Family Action after being relocated to the area. I had been living in a refuge for 4 months with my 2 children in Jan 2022. I plucked up the courage to press the famous bell. I was in a bad broken point in my life and needed support. After my first visit I felt I could finally breath and didn't feel alone anymore.

I now attend on a weekly basis, can answer my phone and know I have a strong support system. I now realise that abuse is not normal in any way, and by doing the freedom programme it has taught me to recognise the signs of a bad relationship.

I'm able to talk about things, I don't suffer in silence, I've learnt that earth angels do exist, I always feel better when I leave. There's not other services like it. The environment feels like home and my children feel safe. I'm now in a better life (place)."

The Freedom Course

The Freedom Programme is an 11 week certificated course which examines the roles played by attitudes and beliefs on the actions of abusive men and the responses of victims and survivors. The aim is to enable an understanding of what has been experienced rather than being overwhelmed by it. The Freedom Programme also describes in detail how children are affected by being exposed to domestic abuse, together with how their lives are improved when the abuse is removed. The sessions have explored identifying controlling and coercive behaviours, warning signs and red flags indications of abusers.

Below is feedback from one of our graduates:

“In November 2021 I left my abusive marriage after 16 years. The first six months I coped surprisingly well but then I began to struggle with the loneliness of the separation. I was seriously thinking about reconciling with my husband and so initially I reached out to Manchester Women’s Aid and asked for help and support. They provided me with one weekly phone call for 4 weeks. These calls were quite impersonal and felt very much like a box ticking exercise rather than the support I was looking for. After the 4 calls they suggested I complete the Freedom Programme. I don’t drive and the session they offered was an hour and a half away on public transport which meant that I would have to take a day’s leave from work each week to attend them.

I looked online for more local facilitators and found Wythenshawe Safe spots. I called the number and was immediately offered a place on the course and asked to come in for a chat. I was very apprehensive before my first visit to Safe spots because I was still in a lot of denial about some the abuse within my marriage and so I didn’t really see myself as ‘worthy’ of the support they offered. The very first time I walked in the door I was greeted with such warmth, kindness, care, and understanding from all of the workers and it immediately felt like I belonged there. Being in an abusive relationship for such a long time is extremely isolating so to have that feeling of belonging was invaluable to me at a time when I was considering reconciling with my ex-husband.

“I was very desensitised to the extreme abuse I was experiencing, and so taking part in the Freedom Programme and talking with the workers has helped me to recognise and understand the different types of abuse that I was being subjected to. This in turn has helped me to understand that I did not cause and am not responsible for the abusive behaviour of my ex-husband and most importantly that I cannot change his behaviour. Gaining this understanding is the reason I have not and will not reconcile with my ex-husband.

Initially, the more open I became about the abuse I suffered, the more shame and embarrassment I felt about the things that happened to me and the ways in which I reacted to some of the things my ex-husband did. The non-judgemental support and encouragement given by the workers at Safe spots has helped me to understand that my reactions at the time of the abuse were coping mechanisms to help keep me safe. This has helped me to feel less ashamed and to recognise just how strong and resilient I am which has really helped to build my confidence and encouraged me to keep going on the days when I am struggling.

Most importantly, Safe spots have helped me to see that I am not alone. Knowing that the workers understand what you’re going through and have first-hand experience of recovering from abusive relationships themselves makes their support feel so much more sincere.

The support provided by Safe spots has helped me find the strength I needed to ensure that I did not reconcile with my husband and so ultimately, the main difference to my life is that I am now safe. I am safe from being physically, mentally, emotionally, and sexually abused on a daily basis.

Taking part in the freedom Programme has helped me to understand different types of abuse and recognise abusive behaviours that I once thought were normal. This has had a huge positive impact on me and has enabled me to maintain my boundaries during any contact I have with my ex-husband and has again, ensured I am safe. I feel that completing the course will also help me to recognise these behaviours in any potential future relationships I might have and help me to understand what a healthy relationship should look like.

The first day I made the first made the call to Safe-spots I remember feeling absolutely terrified of the future and completely broken. The support and encouragement I receive from every single person at Safe spots is helping me to build myself back up week by week and I can finally see and look forward to a safe and happy future for me and my son.”

Parenting Course (AWNTY) AreWeNearlyThereYet?

AWNTY is a five week certified course designed for those who care for children aged 4-10 years. The sessions are helpful, fun and practical. They use an informal, workshop style with lots of relevant content, and plenty of time for discussion and laughter about our role as parents. It's designed to help you thrive – not just survive.

Session topics:

- My family – ready for the journey
- Heart foundations – ours and theirs
- Setting loving limits – discipline
- Encouraging good choices on the journey
- Keeping sane and planning ahead

Feedback from our graduates:

“The course felt peaceful and supportive

I enjoyed being able to talk and share other thoughts”

“I not only enjoyed the course, but learnt so many new techniques.

I enjoyed everyone else’s experiences and knowing I wasn’t alone.”

“I have enjoyed everything, especially learning how to be a better parent.

The course was organised and presented very well.

One of the graduates is a mother of two primary school age children. She had been in an abusive marriage for over 10 years, experiencing coercive control and physical abuse. The children are also survivors of coercive control from their father. Safeguarding at school referred Mum to us for support. We were able to support her and the children to leave the relationship successfully. In addition to completing the Freedom Course Mum has recently graduated from AWNTY Parenting course. Mum has recognised the continued coercive control from Dad during contact and has been able to ask questions and receive support specifically around this.

This has helped Mum re-establish boundaries for successful parenting after very difficult circumstances. Having applied some of the suggestions from the course Mum is calmer and has noted that her relationship with the children has improved, she feels more empowered to care for them.

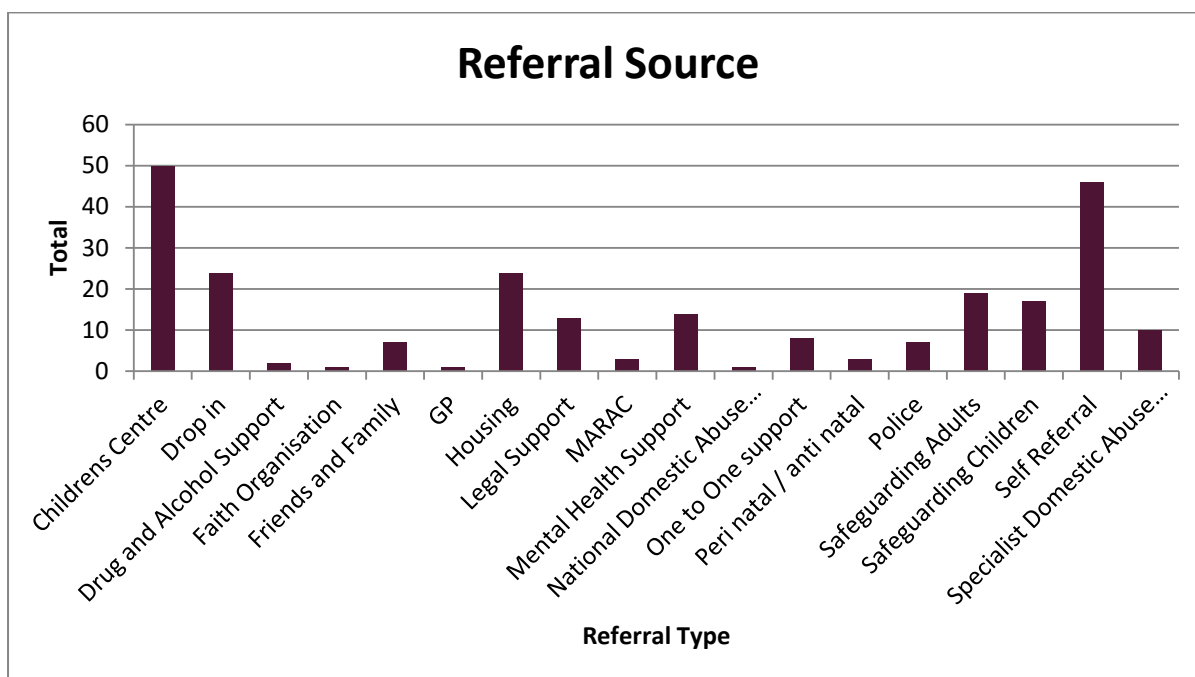
