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# **Tourettes-Syndrome, Inclusion in the Community (T.I.C)**

## **Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 28 October 2023**

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The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 28 October 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Tourettes-syndrome Inclusion in the Community (T.I.C.) is the only charity based in Yorkshire that supports people affected by Tourettes Syndrome and tic disorders.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Like most small charities, TIC was born from struggling parents coming together with the ideology of creating a better world for their children.

In 2013 after receiving a diagnosis of Tourette's Syndrome for her then 6-year-old child, needing more information, Kim attended a local support group. Finding it helpful hearing other people's stories she became a regular and within the year found herself facilitating the groups. The group was held every 3 months and was fairly small as it wasn't advertised anywhere at that time, members just filtered through from the national charity.

When explaining her child had Tourette's to others, she was often met with comments such as "he doesn't swear" and very little understanding on the condition, one day whilst out with her son, Kim experienced an incident that has stayed with her ever since, her son ticcing quite badly at traffic lights, attracted the attention of a man who stared so rudely at him it left Kim shaken up. Deciding to fight this head on, Kimi reached out to the local paper to help spread awareness of the condition.

After the paper went to print more families began to attend the meetings, Bev joined the group in 2014 and they became much needed support for each other. Between 2016 and 2018 more and more families came through the doors at the meeting feeling frustrated and lost. They were hitting brick walls when it came to support and understanding both by the medical professionals and at school. Kim and Bev attended training from multiple sources and putting everything together that they had learnt, developed a school talk that they felt much happier about. Taking it a step further they gathered a group of volunteers together to become trustees and set up Tourettes-syndrome, Inclusion in the Community (TIC) as a charity.

Since October 2018 TIC's main objective has been "To promote social inclusion of people affected by Tourette's syndrome and tic disorders in hull and Yorkshire who are socially excluded from society, or parts of society, as a result of their medical condition by.

- Providing a safe and comfortable environment to meet other people affected by tourettes syndrome.
- Raising funds to support people affected by tourettes syndrome; and
- Providing awareness talks in schools, colleges, and workplaces.

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#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

Social media is where everyone connects in today's society and TICS Facebook group continues to be the main source of contact for individuals and families seeking support in the area. With currently over 700 members on the Facebook group, 60 members in sibling support group and 203 member in the ADHD support group. We also have 1086 followers on our Facebook page, and there is also a large following on Instagram, Twitter and Linked in.

The website was developed by one of TIC's members and went live in 2019. Footfall now averages over 2000 visitors per month.

In May 2022 TIC invested in new software called upshot, which allows the charity to safely store information on its members at their discretion and allows monitoring of activities and recording of feedback. Currently we have 538 of our members who have signed up to upshot. This is made up of 41 adults with TS, 10 partners, 180 parents / 3 carers, 90 children with tics/Ts, 32 children with ADHD and 72 siblings.

The need for training in schools continues to grow. Currently TIC has delivered awareness talks to 100 schools and colleges across Hull, Yorkshire, and Lincolnshire, educating approximately 1400 teachers. We have also delivered assemblies educating 430 young people.

We started our TIC friends campaign at the start of 2023, educating local businesses, public spaces and work places on Tourettes and how to support those who access their services, currently we have over 11 venues listed as TIC friends which include Humberside police, the early help team, the deep and hull truck theatre to name a few.

The support groups now consist of a group for adults with tics, a youth group for children with tics, a youth group for children with ADHD and a youth group for siblings of children with SEND.

Monthly support groups are held in Hull and Doncaster and work has been carried out to get one up and running in Grimsby.

100 sessions were held over the last year for children families and adults, with between 10 and 20 children attending every youth group, an average of 9 adults attending the adult group and between 15 and 70 individuals attending each monthly group.

TIC has amazing volunteers Yasmin and Bea who work tirelessly side by side with Kim and Bev to ensure training and groups are delivered to a high standard. Susan volunteers in the kitchen on monthly meets and events where refreshments are needed. She also empties people's pockets of money for raffles. We have 6 youth advocates who have worked hard, learning new skills, promoting tic and advocating for themselves and others at venues such as Hull Truck theatre and The Deep.

TIC has its very own mascot, Teddy TIC who visits individuals taking with him his leather-bound journal full of messages from each household he stays with. This has become a firm favourite amongst the members and helps the whole family understand more about Tourettes.

TIC was nominated for the National Diversity awards for the 4th year in a row, and it was a privilege to be acknowledged. Votes came in from families, teachers, NHS staff and other charities, but unfortunately the charity was unsuccessful this time but there is always next year!

We were successful in receiving recognition from the benefact group. Our members had voted each month for us to receive one of their donations and in October we received £1000 and was interviewed by Radio Humberside to discuss the charity and what difference the money would make.

At TIC our aim is to listen to our members and find ways to meet their needs. This means that services are adapted whenever needed. Building self-confidence has always been a priority along with providing a safe place to be themselves.

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**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

TIC's biggest fundraiser of the year was a team of 16 taking part in the Yorkshire 15k tough mudder. The team raised over £4200.

We also held a summer fair raising over £500.

Donations and monthly groups increased our fundraising total to £7,399.76.

**Reserves Policy**

TIC currently holds 6 months average expenditure in reserve to ensure the continuation of the charity should there be a significant downturn in income recited. Average expenditure for 6 months has been around £30,081 up until the current financial year, in which 6 months expenditure decreased slightly to £28,415. Reserves have increased in the year and are now in excess of this policy. The required minimum reserves for the charity is £5,000.

The charity applies for grants continually to secure funding for specific projects and to cover service costs to maintain the sustainable financial position of the charity. The amount of reserves held at the year end was £34,092 of which £19,168 was restricted. (£22,442 - 2022).

**FUTURE PLANS**

Now services have resumed, TIC plans to continue the monthly support groups in Hull and Doncaster.

These sessions bring in new members and provide support existing people within the support groups.

A symposium was held last year which was a success attended by over 100 people, the team plans to hold a symposium in the next year with talks from doctors, teachers and individuals living with tourettes.

As the need for training on schools grows TIC plans to expand its talks to schools across Yorkshire and Lincolnshire to help teachers and education professionals across the counties with their understanding and how they can support students with tourettes.

**STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

The board of trustees are a group of volunteers who have a shared interest in supporting the charity. Each trustee brings their own set of skills. Trustees can be voted in at any time and can serve on the board for as long as they wish. The roles of the trustees remain the same unless someone steps down.

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**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**Basis of preparing the financial statements**

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

**Estimates and judgements**

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Although these estimates are based on the Directors' best knowledge of the amount, events or actions, actual results ultimately differ from these estimates. The Directors do not consider there to be any material estimates and judgements.

**Income**

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income is derived from a combination of donations, which are unrestricted, and grants, which are restricted to specific funds.

Income received for services provided is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Donations, gifts and legacies are included in the income and expenditure as received. Any significant non-cash donations are included in the income and expenditure account at the trustees estimate of market value at the time received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

Grants and other funding of a revenue nature are deferred and released to the income and expenditure account over the period to which they relate.

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on an accrual basis.

**Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

**Tangible fixed assets**

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment        - 25% on cost

**Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

**Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.
