To advance the Christian faith in such parts of Asia and the world for the benefit of the public in accordance with the statements of belief appearing in the schedule by:

- 1. The training, discipling and mentoring of young adult Christians in a variety of skills that will enable them to deliver the social out-workings of Christianity and to be agents of change in their home communities and for their people (in particular, but not necessarily exclusively, the Dyak tribes of Borneo);*
- 2. Providing such young people with opportunities to receive ministry into their own lives so as to receive healing and release from childhood and young adult emotional and spiritual wounds, thus enabling them to live lives of freedom and confidence in their identity in Christ;*
- 3. Working to see such young people fully integrated into the local church, actively living as part of the local Body of Christ, and so preparing them to have active supportive ministries in their home communities; which will enable them to fulfil their destiny and calling from God, so that they may be a light to the world, salt to the earth, thus being more effectively able to demonstrate the personal and social out-workings of Christianity.*

Additional details of objectives and activities

Hope For Life was started in August 2015 by Chris Tapp whose desire was to provide a means for young adults from the Dyak tribes of Borneo to have the opportunity to grow in a relationship with God, to be disciplined and mentored in the Christian Life, and to have opportunities to receive training and education at an appropriate level to give them a firm foundation onto which they could build their lives and be able to provide for their future families and give into and enhance their community.

From this Hope For Life was formally inaugurated as a UK Charity on July 27th 2019.

Hope For Life continues to support 1 student at school and 5 students at university (partially or fully).

Hope For Life continues to provide medical care for its beneficiaries, and also for some close family members.

Hope For Life has provided training meetings in the Foundations of the Christian Faith, together with many ad-hoc teaching and mentoring sessions. This year HFL arranged for 4 of our students to attend the 3 day School of Healing seminars in Jogya and Jakarta organised by Yasan Duta Pembaharuan. All students attended the level 1 course.

Hope For Life works closely with several local Indonesian pastors to ensure its beneficiaries receive ongoing and appropriate pastoral support as part of their commitment to church life.

Chris Tapp was able to briefly visit Indonesia in December 2024 to meet our beneficiaries to encourage them and teach in some local churches. Unfortunately a longer visit for February 2025 had to be postponed.

All of the above are designed to fulfil our charitable obligations to benefit the public.

Future Growth

The charity continues to operate at (beyond) full capacity and is not currently in a position to support further individuals. Any future individuals that HFL may support would undergo an Application process by invitation of the trustees; would need to have been known to at least one of the trustees for at least a number of months, and be recommended by their local pastor. The trustees would consider any such applications on their merit, and in the light of sponsorship and funding available. The decision of the trustees will be absolute and binding.

HFL continues to seek further volunteers who could support us in our work, and in particular anyone with website and / or Social Media skills. We also continue to seek support in fund raising (including approaching grant-making charities) and developing appropriate sponsorship programmes.

SCHOOL SUPPORT

HFL continues to support Sah Roni's nephew Endruw at school. He completed his Junior High School this year and will transfer to SMA (Senior High School) in August 2025.

He has continued to work very hard and passed his Junior High school with good grades.

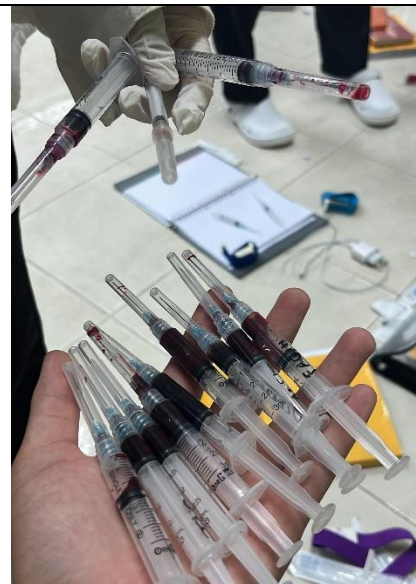
ADDITIONAL TRAINING

HFL supported Vera in a one week course on Basic Trauma and Cardiac Support. She was awarded best Student on the course.



UNIVERSITY SUPPORT

Tio HFL have agreed to sponsor Tio to study for a degree in Nursing at Pontianak. This is a 4 year course, starting September 2024 with a possible 5th year to obtain the Professional Qualification. His family are supporting his accommodation and living costs. Tio is very committed to his faith and was elected Chairman of the Christian Union. He has consistently obtained A grades in his first year. The photo opposite is from their laboratory experiment to practice administering intracutaneous, subcutaneous, intramuscular and intravenous drugs.



Katerin Katerin is a long term friend of Vera's and was previously at LWV. She has been working in Pontianak for several years teaching English to young children. Her father had promised many times to support her at university but has failed to do so.

In July her parents died in very tragic circumstances and HFL have supported her in coming to terms with her grief. Part of this was enabling her to attend SOH in April 2025.

Katerin would like to study English and eventually teach English at university level. HFL have agreed to sponsor her for her 4 year course, starting September 2024.








Yorem Yorem has continued to achieve high grades (4As + 2Bs in his 4th semester). HFL helped him purchase a laptop for his internship and final thesis.


During March – July 2025 we supported him with accommodation and living expenses during his internship. He was assigned to a village to help with palm trees. Here he is applying fertiliser and harvesting palm fruits.

He finished semester 6 with 6 grade As. Well done!

Vera was able to join on behalf of HFL. The photo shows our good friend Pastor Mustakim with him and Vera. HFL also enabled Silwanus to enjoy a celebration meal with his family.</p> <p>Silwanus then moved away from Sintang to the Sayan area and is serving as a pastor in a local church.</p> <p>In the photo he is encouraging and praying with an elderly woman from his church who has skin cancer on her face. He wasn't able to take our motorbike due to the bad roads, however HFL have supported him with a donation towards and also a loan to enable him to buy a more powerful second hand motorbike.</p>

SOH	(School of Healing)	
	<p>Bambang, Titus & Desi were able to attend the school of Healing in Yogya in October and Katerin was able to attend in Jakarta in April 2025. Lusi and Geona accompanied Bambang because it wasn't safe for them to remain alone in the remote café.</p> <p>HFL sponsored the trip, including the travel costs.</p> <p>They all testified to the benefit and blessing they received from this as God began to minister into some of the deeper wounds and needs. It is very difficult to find good teaching in Indonesia, (especially from Indonesians), where there is an understanding of the effects of generational issues, relationship ties and the occultic nature of many of the tribal traditions and lifestyles -</p>	

OTHER NEWS

<p>Adi & Eska</p>	<p>Adi & Eska continue to do well. Adi continues to work at the truck garage which is hard work, but he is now a very experienced mechanic.</p> <p>In February HFL helped with medical expenses for Adi's younger brother's son, though sadly he died. This was very tragic and largely due to mis-diagnosis and lack of facilities at the local hospital.</p> <p>In April they began extending their house so as to be even more available to help and support others. (During this year they have had Eska's father with them most of the time, Takas (Adi's nephew), Keke and Lira (Eska's nieces) as well as sick people from the village who come to Sintang for medical treatment.</p> <p>Takas helped with the building project.</p>

Bambang, Lusi and Geona

Bambang & Lusi have had a difficult year after the death of Lusi's father. The café was hard work for only limited reward.

Bambang spent time maintaining their palm trees.

Bambang was encouraged by SOH – see photo as they travel to Yogya. (Lusi is planning to attend in October 2026).

I was able to meet them briefly in December and was able to discuss possible ways forward.

Lusi's Mum wanted them to move out from the café. In February Bambang began working for Partly and in May they finally moved to a rented lockup on the main road from Nanga Pinoh.

Bambang now has reliable wifi for his work and Lusi runs a small café. Geona continues to grow fast!



Handono

This has also been a challenging year for Handono. He had an accident on his bike in July, and this damaged a front tooth. He was already in need of dental treatment.

HFL sponsored significant dental treatment over several months. After a time of no work he also started to work for Partly in July. He has also spent time planting and maintaining palm trees on his land.

He has also supported one of his brothers (Nadi) over the past year by trying to establish a palm oil distribution business. His brother owns a truck and Handono has supported him with managing money to buy palm fruits from several neighbouring villagers and then taking this and selling it the processing plant. The project had serious setbacks when the truck needed major engine work in January and February. (Photo of Nadi and Handono with truck engine)

During this time HFL supported with short term loans to buy the fruit which was then repaid a few days later, this continued for several months to build up capital.

I was able to spend time with him in the Philippines whilst we were both attending Nathan & Jan's Philippines' wedding celebration.



Roni David & Yuni (+ William)

Roni David and Yuni settled back in Roni's village and Roni has worked hard with his father developing their own palm and chocolate trees. Yuni became pregnant and their son William David was born on 3rd November.

I was able to stay in their house in December, though unfortunately Roni was in the village helping with the Leadership elections.

Roni has helped HFL to support Yogi by buying palm seeds on our behalf and supporting Yogi in germinating and growing the seeds.







Sah Roni

Sah Roni spent most of this year in his village supporting his family and working with their palm trees. During this time HFL supported him in various ways including keeping his motorbike on the road!

I met him in December and discussed how HFL could support him to find work. He moved to Pontianak and HFL supported his accommodation and living costs for 3 months to enable him to find a suitable job. In March he started working with Partly



<p>Sarik</p>	<p>HFL have continued to support Sarik’s chicken farm by providing money to buy chicken food. He has to travel 4 hours to Sintang to buy this – and when it has rained the roads can be very challenging!</p> <p>Egg laying started later and more slowly than expected and by September he was only producing about 25 eggs a day. This meant he was not able to repay any of the investment.</p> <p>In January Nathan and I had a vc with him to try to establish why the egg production was so low and to advise on how this could be improved.</p> <p>In February his wife was sick and so HFL provided money to buy medicines. By mid March egg production was at 45 eggs / day. This provided just enough money for Sarik & his wife to live, but was still well below the initial expectations.</p>	   
<p>Vera</p>	<p>Vera has taken over from Roni David in taking responsibility for distributing some of the HFL money. She also liaises with the university students to check when fees are due.</p> <p>In August she represented HFL at Silwanus’ graduation in Sintang. In August she applied for a hospital job in Sintang but didn’t accept due to the very low salary.</p> <p>HFL continued to support her as she looked for a Nursing position.</p> <p>In October she attended a training course in Pontianak and then in October she successfully obtained a position in the new hospital in Sanggau processing medical insurance claims.</p>	

Yefta & Rachel

Yefta and Rachel have continued supporting friends and people from more remote villages. They considered teaming up with World Outreach International and for a time had an informal connection with them.

In October HFL supported **Rachel** to attend a Women's Conference in Bali designed to encourage and build up young married women. This was a pivotal time for her. It was also possible for Yefta and Rachel to meet up with Yanti and her boyfriend at this time to encourage them. (See top 2 photos).

Unfortunately Rachel had a motorbike accident in Bali, but recovered well after a few weeks.

I was able to meet them briefly in Sintang in December. They were on their way to spend Christmas in Yefta's village and sort out some land issues. It was a great opportunity to catch up and Rachel translated for me at a Youth conference at the Sintang Theology College.

Yefta continued working on some design projects until January.

In February he began working for Partly.

In May HFL supported him to take part in the Men's camp in Bali designed to mentor and disciple young married men, he found this to be very inspirational and helpful. There will be another conference in October that HFL may be able to send other young men to.

Rachel has also now joined the Partly team.



LOANS TO BENEFICIARIES

During this year HFL have made various loans to beneficiaries for medical purposes, to buy laptops for university study, to buy motorbikes and to help consolidate expensive loans to credit agencies. These loans are repaid on a monthly basis and enable essential items to be available immediately without costly bank loans.

MY TRIP

In November I was privileged to attend Nathan and Jan's Philippine wedding celebration and so took the opportunity to travel to Indonesia for one week on the way home.

I had intended to visit Indonesia again for a month in February however that had to be postponed for personal reasons.

I was able to meet Titus and Desi with Yeftha (Titus' brother) in Sintang. We had a good time catching up and encouraging Titus & Desi.

Pastor Mustakim took me to meet the young children learning English – this is one of the initiatives he is involved with in Sintang to encourage children from poor backgrounds. I spent an hour with them encouraging them to put their trust in God.

There was also an opportunity to meet Sarik and his wife. Vera joined me so we could discuss how to improve egg production at the chicken farm, and also to help Sarik develop a simple accounting system.



Renjos and his wife (Evi) and daughter also came to Sintang. They had had a difficult time. Renjos' contract was not renewed and they have been back in Evi's village where Renjos had been trying to set up a small business buying meat from Sintang and selling in the village. We discussed how HFL might help with this, but later Renjos received a job offer from a palm oil company and decided to take that.



As well as preaching at Ps Mustakim's church I was able to stay with Adi and Eska for 2 days and several of our other young people came. I was able to share with them and encourage them in their Christian walk.



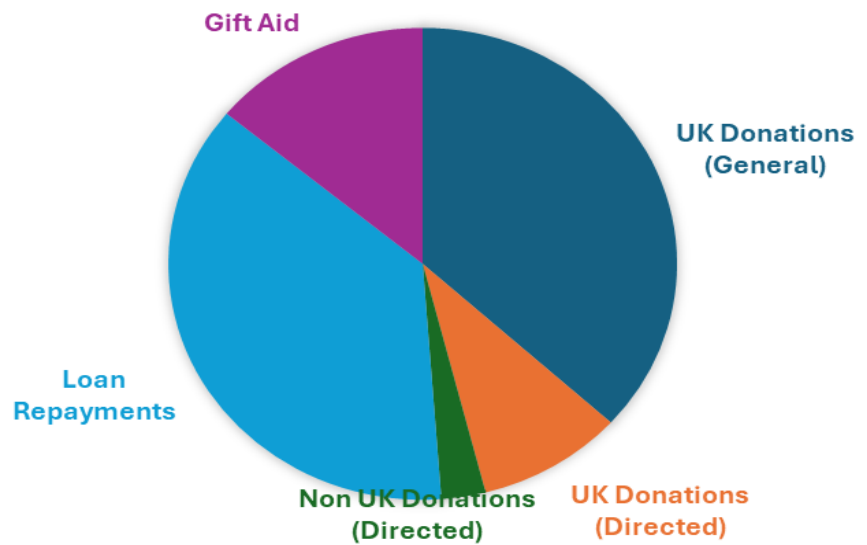
This year HFL made a number of loans to its beneficiaries to help them purchase essential motorbikes and to start businesses. This is designed to encourage them and help reduce otherwise high credit interest they would otherwise incur. These loans are being repaid, though in some cases individual circumstances have changed, making this more difficult and at a slower rate than anticipated. At various times during the year loans have again been made to the charity, however more of the previous loans have been repaid. At the end of June 2025 the outstanding debt had increased from the previous £5713 to £6794. In the next financial year the charity needs to continue to make efforts to repay substantial portions of the loans it has received, and ensure loans it has made continue to be repaid in a timely manner.

During this financial year the only source of income was from personal sponsorship / donations made by various individuals. HFL did not receive any grants or funding from any other charities or public bodies.

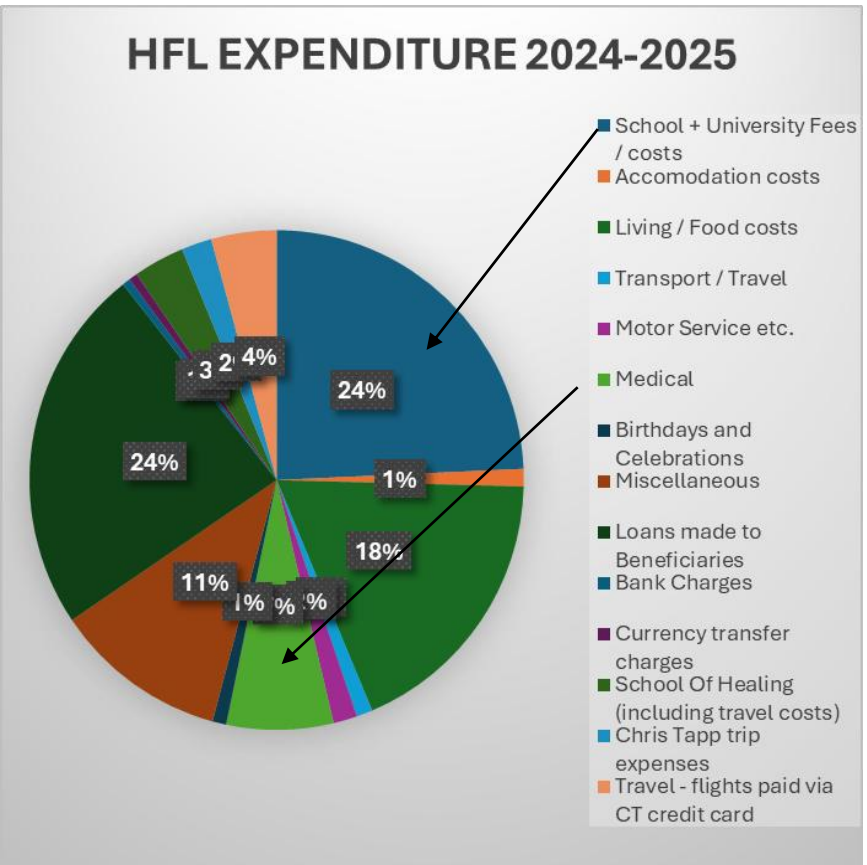
HFL benefitted from Gift Aid payments of £3786, an increase on the previous year's £1891, and the trustees wish to record their gratitude to those individuals who allowed us to claim the GA rebate on their gifts.

HFL received (restricted) sponsorship specifically for 5 of our beneficiaries for university expenses, (including relocation, accommodation and living expenses for 2 of them) together with additional directed support for 1 beneficiary to enable him to maintain a motorcycle, and 1 beneficiary to help with the purchase of a motorcycle, this amounted to £3265 in total. Those that contributed in this way are welcome to contact the Treasurer to receive a full breakdown of how their sponsorship was used.






To advance the Christian faith in such parts of Asia and the world for the benefit of the public in accordance with the statements of belief appearing in the schedule by:

- 4.1. *The training, discipling and mentoring of young adult Christians in a variety of skills that will enable them to deliver the social out-workings of Christianity and to be agents of change in their home communities and for their people (in particular, but not necessarily exclusively, the Dyak tribes of Borneo);*
- 4.2. *Providing such young people with opportunities to receive ministry into their own lives so as to receive healing and release from childhood and young adult emotional and spiritual wounds, thus enabling them to live lives of freedom and confidence in their identity in Christ;*
- 4.3. *Working to see such young people fully integrated into the local church, actively living as part of the local Body of Christ, and so preparing them to have active supportive ministries in their home communities; which will enable them to fulfil their destiny and calling from God, so that they may be a light to the world, salt to the earth, thus being more effectively able to demonstrate the personal and social out-workings of Christianity.*

Additional details of objectives and activities

Hope For Life was started in August 2015 by Chris Tapp whose desire was to provide a means for young adults from the Dyak tribes of Borneo to have the opportunity to grow in a relationship with God, to be disciplined and mentored in the Christian Life, and to have opportunities to receive training and education at an appropriate level to give them a firm foundation onto which they could build their lives and be able to provide for their future families and give into and enhance their community.

From this Hope For Life was formally inaugurated as a UK Charity on July 27th 2019.

Hope For Life continues to support 1 student at school and 6 students at university (partially or fully).

Hope For Life continues to provide medical care for its beneficiaries, and also for some close family members.

Hope For Life has provided training meetings in the Foundations of the Christian Faith, together with many ad-hoc teaching and mentoring sessions. This year HFL arranged for 11 of our students to attend the 3 day School of Healing seminars in Jogya and Jakarta, organised by Yasan Duta Pembaharuan. 8 students attended the level 1 course, and 3 the level 2 course.

Hope For Life works closely with several local Indonesian pastors to ensure its beneficiaries receive ongoing and appropriate pastoral support as part of their commitment to church life.

Chris Tapp was able to visit Indonesia in January / February 2024 to meet our beneficiaries to encourage them and teach in some local churches. He was also able to attend Roni David and Yuni's wedding, and also Tono and Kerisi's wedding.

All of the above are designed to fulfil our charitable obligations to benefit the public.

Future Growth

The charity continues to operate at (beyond) full capacity and is not currently in a position to support further individuals. Any future individuals that HFL may support would undergo an Application process by invitation of the trustees; would need to have been known to at least one of the trustees for at least a number of months, and be recommended by their local pastor. The trustees would consider any such applications on their merit, and in the light of sponsorship and funding available. The decision of the trustees will be absolute and binding.

HFL continues to seek further volunteers who could support us in our work, and in particular anyone with accounting or website skills. We also continue to seek support in fund raising (including approaching grant-making charities) and developing appropriate sponsorship programmes.

HFL has continued to be busy this year, and all its activities have been designed to support, encourage, motivate and mentor its beneficiaries so that they continue to grow and mature as young adults ready to face their future with a God-given confidence.

HFL have decided to give all of our beneficiaries the opportunity to attend the SOH. There are 3 levels, progressively leading attendees into a deeper relationship with God and helping them to address barriers to Spiritual growth, including generational, relational and traumatic events. HFL sees these seminars as an integral part of our beneficiaries' connection with us. SOH provides excellent teaching by mature Indonesian nationals who can therefore communicate effectively on a heart to heart level. All those who have attended have testified to the significant benefit they have received.

The seminars are held several times a year in different locations. HFL sponsors each person to attend by paying the course fees and travel costs. Where possible each person will attend the 3 levels in successive years, although level 3 is only available on a more limited basis.

Yefta: I thought before that my life was ok, but He changed many things like the bitterness in my heart and the wound from the past, it affected me in many aspects including my marriage, now It has been healed and I can face my marriage like the way God has teaches in the Bible,

Marten: Marten wrote about how he had become very resentful towards me and ashamed of some issues in his life. However he was able to face up to these issues and receive forgiveness for himself and release his resentment. This led to a complete reconciliation and now I release all forgiveness to daddy and I ask for forgiveness for everything I have done that is not pleasing to him. And I release forgiveness to the Lord Jesus and ask for forgiveness from God because I always blame God for every problem in my life.

And I hope that God will always strengthen me in every problem in my life and bless my little family.

Darlin: I realized that SOH is an institution that is not only directed at ourselves but also how we can help others after we have been helped that's why the theme given is served to serve.

When I was a child I felt that my parents could not be a protector for me, so the thought arose that God was also the same - He was unfair and I felt that God was also not a safe place for me to take refuge. My grandmother who used to be my neighbour was a very talkative person and there were some words she said that hurt me so that it made me think that I was a lowly person, and it caused a great sense of shame that made me feel when I met new people. I have forgiven my parents and also my grandmother and forgiven myself for every mistake I have ever made and I know that the things above that I told are some of the deceptions that the devil designed to trap me, so that unconsciously I carry my childhood wounds that can destroy some of my life if not healed.

Yorem:

I knew how I had to let go of my problems and I also helped other people to let go of their problems too, Before I was born, when I was still in my mother's womb, my father left my mother, me and my two brothers, so I had time to say to God why I got a

Level 2 – June 2024 - Yogya

Yefta & Rachel and Silwanus attended



Yefta and Rachel:
God revealed many wounds, unmet emotional needs, and the life themes each of us has. We learned that many of our negative reactions, which we thought were harmless, were actually caused by our parents' patterns and past dysfunctions.

During the four days of SOH, we learned how to pray to break free from our parents' patterns. Rachel prayed about the abuse she experienced as a child, forgave the person who abused her, as a result, Rachel had struggled with accepting Yefta's touch. Despite being married, Rachel often rejected his touch. After praying and addressing the root cause, Rachel began to accept Yefta's touch as a form of love.



For Yefta, many things were revealed, including his bitterness towards his father. Yefta's father was harsh and abusive during his childhood, causing Yefta to fear many things, including failing as a husband/ father. After praying and breaking free from the dysfunctional family patterns, Yefta now feels much freer and without fear. Our relationship has gradually healed.

Silwanus:

The activity really helped me understand more about how the Holy Spirit works for everyone who receives Him.

By surrendering to God the Holy Spirit himself will explain His intentions for humans without coercion from other people or individuals, all because God leads.

This activity is very effective in serving in the church with the congregation.

Business Developments:

It has been a disappointing surprise to see that many of our beneficiaries struggled to find good jobs. In Indonesia it appears that you need a family member or close friend already in a good position in a company or organisation to be able to get employed. Even when they have been able to get jobs the salary is often extremely low. For this reason HFL have sought to encourage our beneficiaries to set up their own businesses where possible. Some own land and so cultivating the land is an obvious choice.

HFL cafe

We opened the cafe in September 2022. It provided an income for Darlin for nearly 1 year until she left to get married. Regrettably despite many efforts we were not able to generate enough income to justify continuing for another year. Although it covered day to day costs we were not able to recover the initial outlay of rental or set up. However, many lessons were learned and we hope that it might be possible to start another café in due course. Sadly, we closed the café in September 2023.

Bambang café and wood business

Bambang and Lusi have had a difficult year. Their café business has not brought as much income as they had hoped, although it provides for their daily needs they have not been able to repay as much of the HFL investment as was planned.



When I visited in January Bambang discussed what he believed to be an exciting opportunity to develop a wood – perfume oil business with his father in law. Bambang would learn the business to continue in the future. Unfortunately this did not work out as planned due to mismanagement by his father in law. HFL invested in this, however this investment was then repaid, but without the expected profit. Bambang then realised he needed to increase his income so he applied for several jobs, however they all meant him living away from home – HFL advanced a loan for him to buy a motorbike, but just before he accepted a position Lusi’s father tragically suddenly died. This changed all the plans, and exposed a deep family rift.

Bambang Palm trees



Previously Bambang and Lusi had bought land with palm trees. This was to be an investment for the future, and will provide a good income in about 3 years time.

Another piece of land became available near theirs. HFL have invested in this land which Bambang will manage. It is hoped this will generate a future income to further support the work of HFL and in due course enable local Indonesians to continue to support young

Dyak people.

Sarik Egg Farm

It was clear that Sarik needed to be based in his village to support his family. There was also a need for eggs. Sarik proposed setting up an Egg farm to provide him with an income, and to be able to supply eggs to his village and other local villages.

HFL set up an appeal for sponsorship and are very grateful to those who donated funds to this project. In November Sarik began to build a substantial hen house, with associated equipment to provide electricity for lighting, and water. At the end of December he purchased 150 chickens to rear for egg and meat production. During this time HFL paid Sarik a monthly salary and continued to provide funds to buy chicken feed and vitamins.

Eggs should have begun by the end of April, however the chickens didn’t produce. (NB. Egg production began in September). However, from April chickens were sold for meat. Additionally Sarik bought meat in Sintang and kept it in a freezer to sell to villagers.

This year HFL helped with a number of relatively minor medical issues. Handono's Mum needed an operation and Renjos' baby girl was born by caesarean section, the operations were funded by Government insurance, but HFL helped with medication. Handono needed dental treatment for an abscess and will need further treatment in due course.

Chris' visit to Indonesia – January – February 2024

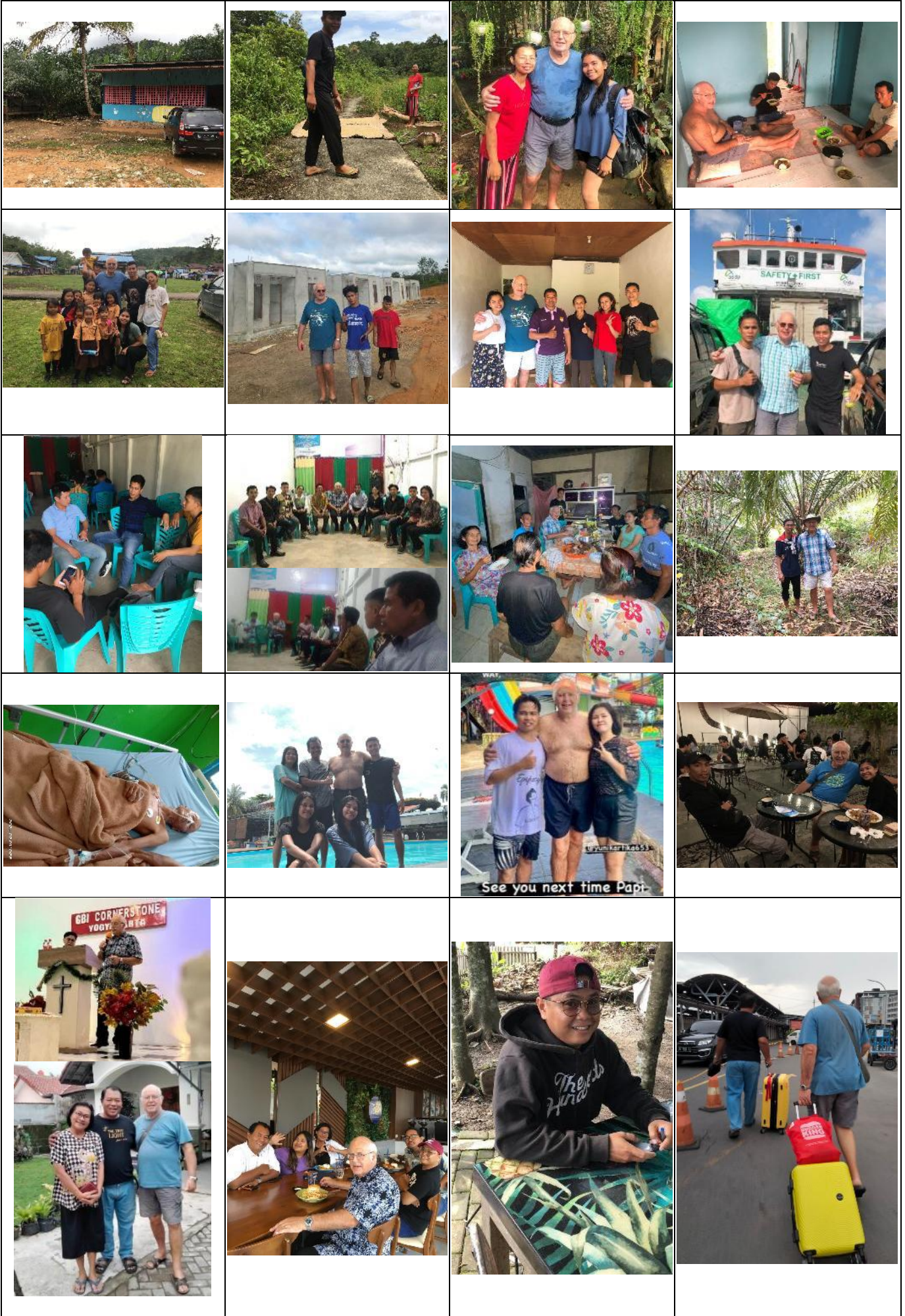

Handono



It hasn't been an easy year for Handono. He has been fortunate in having a well paid job for most of the year, however this is not long term and he has many family commitments and is trying to plan for his future life. He set up a fish farm on his land, but it proved unsuccessful. He has land and has spent time clearing this and planting palm trees. HFL made a loan to him to enable him to buy a small piece of land from a family member who needed money for school fees. He bought it to help another brother Nadi who has struggled to find good work and has a family to support.



The trees on the land will provide Nadi with an income. In September his mum was ill and needed an operation. We supported with medication costs (although the operation was covered by Government insurance). In December he was unsuccessful in an attempt to obtain a Government position – the competition is extremely fierce and Handono made a very credible attempt. In March he needed dental and began to make plans to build a house. He was able to pay his brother Nadi to begin the building process – this was win-win – Nadi received income and Handono was able to make good progress. HFL helped with some of the costs.

Vera finally graduated with her Professional Nursing qualification in October. She lived in Pontianak in the family house and was responsible for caring for her younger brother and sister. HFL helped with a loan to buy a motorbike to enable her to get around Pontianak. It proved to be very difficult to get a job – even with the highest Nursing qualification.

I was very grateful for her support in January and February when she (& Sah Roni as driver) accompanied me as translator and guide for the 3 weeks I was in Kalimantan.



In May Vera was still applying for jobs in a large private hospital in Pontianak. Despite completing her Professional training she had needed one final short course and HFL sponsored her for it. Also at this time she was helping Handono find a good dentist for his treatment and accompanied him for treatments.

Sah Roni moved to Sanggau in July and shared a koste with Handono. From time to time he helped Handono with collecting palm fruit, whilst working for Nathan. He was able to return to his village and prepare some palm seedlings ready to plant on his land the following year. He also unsuccessfully applied for the Government exams. He was my driver in January and February. The work with Nathan finished and he was unsuccessful in securing another job. I had suggested he should move to Sintang where I believed there would be work, however he felt he needed to support his family and so returned to the village and also to his sister and family in Sosok

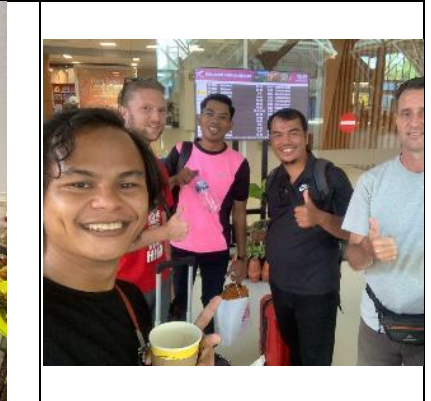

Adi & Eska continue to work hard. Adi now earns good money as a mechanic and Eska has continued her training as well as having 2 jobs. Eska travelled to Pontianak several times for the practical sessions in her training. They still have 4 or 5 people living with them at any one time, including Eska's father. Keke helps them by cooking and looking after the house; Takas is continuing his studies. Eska's niece Lira joined them in April. She has a job and is hoping to train as a midwife, starting in August 2025, however HFL are currently not able to commit to helping her. Adi & Eska are trying to raise funds to support her. In August Adi decided that they should buy a house, and they have managed to obtain a 15 year "mortgage". They moved in in April, Adi has plans to extend the house to make a second bedroom and bigger kitchen. He has already started this – see photo below. Later he intends to build another bedroom. This is so that he can continue to support family and other villagers who often need to come to Sintang for medical treatment and need somewhere to stay. Adi helped me with driving on my visit and I enjoyed 3 days stay in their rented koste – see photo to right.

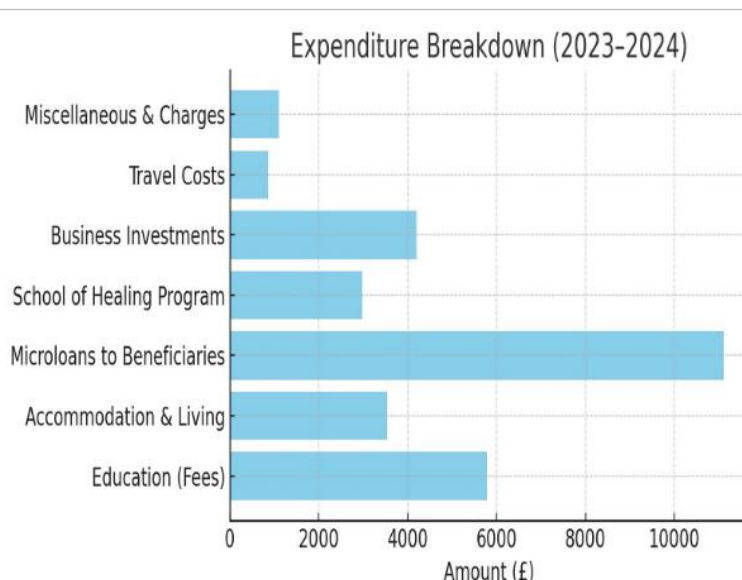
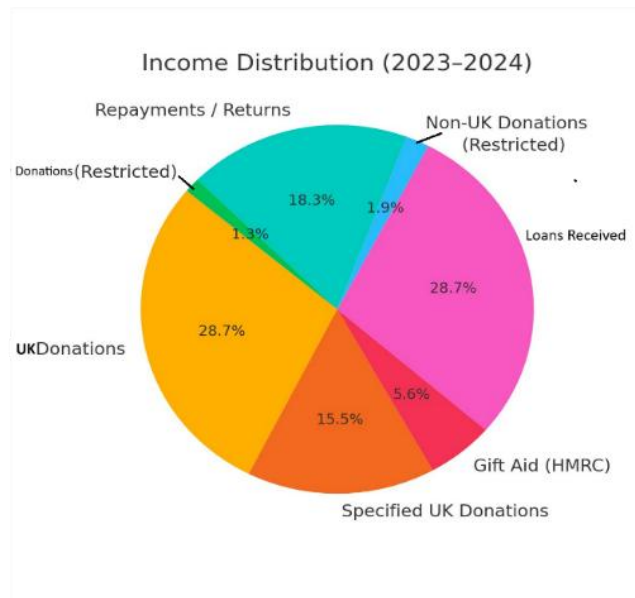
Financial review

This year HFL made a number of loans to its beneficiaries to help them purchase essential motorbikes and to start businesses. This is designed to encourage them and help reduce otherwise high credit interest they would otherwise incur. These loans are being repaid, though in some cases individual circumstances have changed, making this more difficult and at a slower rate than anticipated. At various times during the year loans have again been made to the charity, however more of the previous loans have been repaid and at the end of June 2024 the outstanding debt had been reduced from the previous £11,599 to £5713 (though this assumes that outstanding loans made by HFL to beneficiaries will continue to be repaid). In the next financial year the charity needs to continue to make efforts to repay substantial portions of the loans it has received, and ensure loans it has made continue to be repaid in a timely manner.

During this financial year the only source of income was from personal sponsorship / donations made by various individuals. HFL did not receive any grants or funding from any other charities or public bodies.

HFL benefitted from Gift Aid payments of £1891, a reduction on the previous year's £2962, and the trustees wish to record their gratitude to those individuals who allowed us to claim the GA rebate on their gifts.

HFL received (restricted) sponsorship specifically for 3 of our beneficiaries for university expenses, together with additional directed sponsorship for SOH and Sarik's Egg Farm, this amounted to £7537 in total. Those that contributed in this way are welcome to contact the Treasurer to receive a full breakdown of how their sponsorship was used.






To advance the Christian faith in such parts of Asia and the world for the benefit of the public in accordance with the statements of belief appearing in the schedule by:

- 4.1. The training, discipling and mentoring of young adult Christians in a variety of skills that will enable them to deliver the social out-workings of Christianity and to be agents of change in their home communities and for their people (in particular, but not necessarily exclusively, the Dyak tribes of Borneo);*
- 4.2. Providing such young people with opportunities to receive ministry into their own lives so as to receive healing and release from childhood and young adult emotional and spiritual wounds, thus enabling them to live lives of freedom and confidence in their identity in Christ;*
- 4.3. Working to see such young people fully integrated into the local church, actively living as part of the local Body of Christ, and so preparing them to have active supportive ministries in their home communities; which will enable them to fulfil their destiny and calling from God, so that they may be a light to the world, salt to the earth, thus being more effectively able to demonstrate the personal and social out-workings of Christianity.*

Additional details of objectives and activities

Hope For Life was started in August 2015 by Chris Tapp whose desire was to provide a means for young adults from the Dyak tribes of Borneo to have the opportunity to grow in a relationship with God, to be disciplined and mentored in the Christian Life, and to have opportunities to receive training and education at an appropriate level to give them a firm foundation onto which they could build their lives and be able to provide for their future families and give into and enhance their community.

From this Hope For Life was formally inaugurated as a UK Charity on July 27th 2019.

Hope For Life continues to support 4 students at school and 10 students at university (partially or fully).

Hope For Life has provided medical care for its beneficiaries, and also for some close family members.

Hope For Life has provided training meetings in the Foundations of the Christian Faith, together with many ad-hoc teaching and mentoring sessions. This year HFL arranged for 5 of our students to attend a 3 day School of Healing seminar in Jakarta, organised by Yasan Duta Pembaharuan. This seminar will take place in July 2023 and will be reported on in the next annual report.

Hope For Life works closely with several local Indonesian pastors to ensure its beneficiaries receive ongoing and appropriate pastoral support as part of their commitment to church life.

Chris Tapp was able to visit Indonesia in December 2022 to attend Adi & Eska's wedding and to meet our beneficiaries to encourage them and teach in some local churches.

All of the above are designed to fulfil our charitable obligations to benefit the public.

Future Growth

The charity continues to operate at (beyond) full capacity and is not currently in a position to support further individuals. Any future individuals that HFL may support would undergo an Application process by invitation of the trustees; would need to have been known to at least one of the trustees for at least a number of months, and be recommended by their local pastor. The trustees would consider any such applications on their merit, and in the light of sponsorship and funding available. The decision of the trustees will be absolute and binding.

HFL continues to seek further volunteers who could support us in our work, and in particular anyone with accounting or secretarial (minute taking) skills. We also continue to seek support in fund raising (including approaching grant-making charities) and developing appropriate sponsorship programmes.

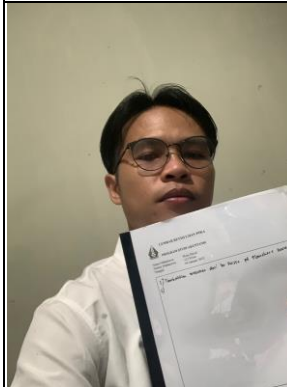

Sarik (pictured with his sister Mira) continues to progress well with his Agrotechnology degree. These are his formal university clothes. This year he has undertaken the practical project and is writing his final dissertation. He hopes to complete his degree by August.

Silwanus



Silwanus continues to get very good grades with his Theology degree. He wants to be able to pastor a church

when he finishes. He is also supported by Ps Mustakim, and lives with his family. He is actively involved in Ps Mustakim's church, and helps out with many practical aspects.

Takas



Takas continues his course in Government Administration and consistently obtains exceptionally high grades. He is the son of Adi's older brother. He is here with his Mum and sister outside their house. He is actively involved in church life and plays keyboard in the village church during his vacations.

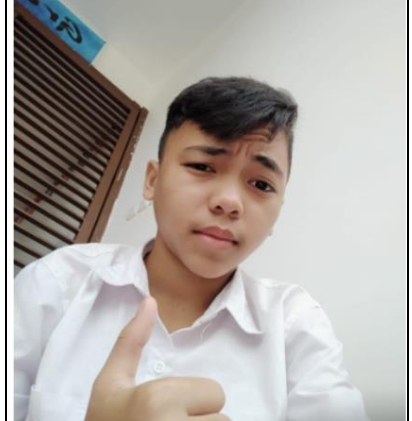
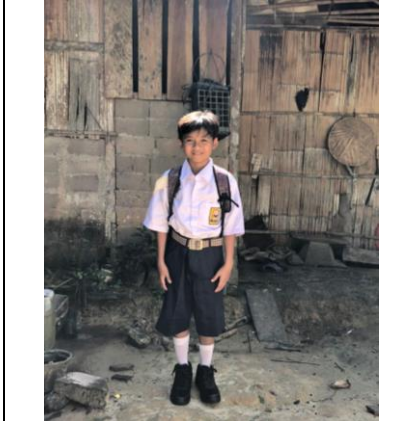

In May he had a motorbike accident and needed hospital treatment. HFL supported him through this, and thankfully he made a full recovery.

In January he announced his engagement to Desi and they were married in June.

Bambang and Luci live in Anjungan which is about 1 hour away from Pontianak. Bambang's job is going well – he is manager of the JT Express parcel company branch in Anjungan. The company provided them with a place to live. Geona is growing up and is very sweet. I had a good time staying with them for 3 days in December.

In January Bambang decided it was time to move on – they had been in Anjungan for 2 years and he had gained a lot of business experience. Luci's parents used to run a café in their own village that was quite successful so Bambang & Luci decided to take it over, renovate it and live there. This enabled them to be much closer to Luci's family – her dad was experiencing some health problems. They moved in March to set up the new café and HFL have invested in this. Bambang's desire is that in the longer term he can support HFL from this to continue its work in Borneo.

Handono has had a busy year. In July Nathan visited and Handono acted as his guide around Borneo. After that he returned to Yogya with his parents and Vera for the graduation ceremony.

Handono's mum has been ill during this year and HFL have been able to support with medical costs. She is now much better.

He has applied for many jobs but without success, he is a strong candidate but corruption is so rife that it is almost impossible to get any decent job unless you have family or a close friend already in the company / government office who can get you in!!

Another problem has been land issues in the village. A corrupt senior leader had effectively given away all the village land to a palm oil company – Handono has been working hard, with some success, to retain their land and other land belonging to the villagers.

He has also been able to buy a really good motorbike and HFL have supported with a loan to enable him to do this. He has been very faithful in making the agreed monthly repayments. In this way HFL can help provide longer term support, rather than short term fixes.

In January he went to Sintang to help with the café and gave some advice to Darlin and the others. Regretfully this was not fully acted upon and the cafe continued to struggle.

In February we tried to get visas so he could attend the Ellel NETS course in the UK, but despite 2 attempts these were denied.

After this he was able to engage in some out work with Nathan's company and this has been a real blessing. For the last few months Handono has focussed on supporting his family and renovating the family home, and also developing his own palm tree plantation on his land. Although it has been disappointing that he has not been able to obtain full time work there is a real sense of God's provision for him and a realistic expectation that on due course he could be elected as a senior leader within his village area.

Sah Roni got a job in Pontianak in August. It was an admin job in a large bakery company. It was long hours, and the pay wasn't very good. After a few months we began to encourage him to look for something better. During this time HFL continued to support hm and also arranged a loan to enable him to buy a decent motorbike.

In December he met me from the airport and I was able to stay one night with him. He couldn't travel with me because of his job but Roni David escorted me and shared some of the driving. Later S-R was able to get 2

days holiday to attend Adi's wedding in the village and so we were able to meet up, and also finally on my last day in Pontianak.

In April HFL began supporting his nephew for school, and also later offered support with medical costs for his cousin who had an ectopic pregnancy. He also was able to visit Titus in hospital and offer support and bring him food.



Very sadly in May he was effectively forced to finish his relationship with Desi due to family cultural expectations. He would have had to travel to her home island and pay a huge bride price to be able to marry her. He was very heart broken over this, and it is a tragic reminder of how parental control is still very significant in many of the families.

In June he finished his job in Pontianak and moved to Sanggau to share a koste with Handono, he also began to work for Nathan's company.

THE STORY BEHIND

My name is Yefta, and my wife Rachel, we embarked on a new chapter of our lives on the beautiful island of Bali. We filled with a deep love for each other and a burning passion to serve God.

I had been working tirelessly for an NGO called YASBA, dedicating my time and energy to making a difference in people's lives. However, I felt a calling to do more, to reach out to the unbelievers and share the love of Christ with them. After much contemplation and prayer, I made the courageous decision to resign from his job.

With newfound freedom and a shared desire to make a greater impact, me and Rachel embraced a freelancing lifestyle. This change not only provided us with the flexibility to manage our time-

but also opened up doors for us to invest more in their ministries.

We began organizing outreach events, follow up new believers, Mission Prayers, Youth GPB and fellowship gatherings for the unbelievers in our community. We poured our hearts into sharing the message of hope and salvation, extending the hand of friendship to those who needed it most.

Their story serves as a reminder that when we step out in faith, relinquish our plans, and allow God to guide our steps, incredible things can happen. In the beautiful island of Bali, me and Rachel's love, faith, and ministry continue to shine brightly, illuminating the hearts of those in need of God's grace. And we believe island by island we can go tough with God Grace!

Adi & Eska are doing well. Eska moved to live in the HFL cafe with Darlin and Keke in September 2022, but after their marriage Adi & Eska rented their own koste in Sintang. Adi works as a mechanic in a large truck garage. Eska continues to work as a nurse and also in the pharmacy as well as helping in the café whilst also continuing her S1 Nursing degree on line. She visited Pontianak 2 or 3 times for practical work. She is progressing well and should complete her S1 in December 2023. They are given to hospitality and support of their families. Eska's niece Keke lives with them as does Takas, Adi's nephew. This also involves supporting them for their food. Many Indonesians have a strong sense of family commitment to help each other, especially amongst the poor tribal village communities. The photo was taken on Eska's birthday in April. Adi is very romantic and always goes out of his way to bless Eska.. (Eska with Adi on her birthday →)

Sarik continued to work hard on the practical project for his degree, and we also agreed to partially support his sister Mira with university expenses. Sarik has no family support – he supports his grandparents and sister! HFL have continued to support him to help with motorbike repairs, rent in Sintang and general living expenses throughout the year. In September he had a blood clot in his eye and HFL helped with advice and medical expenses to resolve this.

Sarik presented a plan to keep and raise chickens in his village later in the year. HFL would be interested in supporting this and asked him to put together a proper plan., at various times he was able to get temporary employment.

HFL supported him to buy plant seed for this practical work for his final thesis. He finished his degree work in February and was then able to get a job harvesting palm fruits with a company near his village.

He will join Sah-Roni, Roni David and the others in SOH in Jakarta in July.

Later I was able to meet Tono and an old friend, Karib who I had known at LWV. Karib now acts as a driver and support for Tono in his Area Leader role.

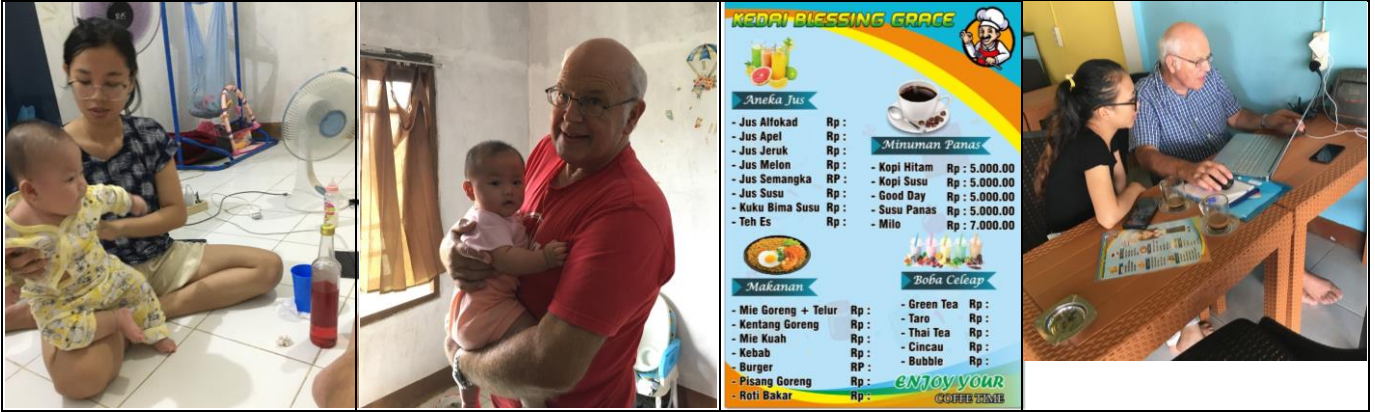
We spent some time at the HFL café in Sintang helping Darlin with the spreadsheet accounting and giving advice about the café.

This has again been a busy year for HFL with many challenges and demands. At various times during the year loans have been made to the charity, which have then been partially repaid. However, at the end of June 2023 there was an outstanding debt of £11,599. In the next financial year the charity needs to make efforts to repay substantial portions of these loans.

During this financial year the only source of income was from personal sponsorship / donations made by various individuals. HFL did not receive any grants or funding from any other charities or public bodies.



The training, discipling and mentoring of young adult Christians in a variety of skills that will enable them to deliver the social out-workings of Christianity and to be agents of change in their home communities and for their people (in particular, but not necessarily exclusively, the Dyak tribes of Borneo);*
- 4.2. Providing such young people with opportunities to receive ministry into their own lives so as to receive healing and release from childhood and young adult emotional and spiritual wounds, thus enabling them to live lives of freedom and confidence in their identity in Christ;*
- 4.3. Working to see such young people fully integrated into the local church, actively living as part of the local Body of Christ, and so preparing them to have active supportive ministries in their home communities; which will enable them to fulfil their destiny and calling from God, so that they may be a light to the world, salt to the earth, thus being more effectively able to demonstrate the personal and social out-workings of Christianity.*

Additional details of objectives and activities

Hope For Life was started in August 2015 by Chris Tapp whose desire was to provide a means for young adults from the Dyak tribes of Borneo to have the opportunity to grow in a relationship with God, to be disciplined and mentored in the Christian Life, and to have opportunities to receive training and education at an appropriate level to give them a firm foundation onto which they could build their lives and be able to provide for their future families and give into and enhance their community.

From this Hope For Life was formally inaugurated as a UK Charity on July 27th 2019.

In July 2021 Hope For Life was supporting 1 student at school and fully supporting 8 students at university, whilst paying university fees for 3 others. During the year 7 students completed their studies and Supi discontinued his studies. HFL also began supporting Sylwanus and Takas with university fees.

So by June 2022 HFL was fully supporting 2 university students, and paying fees for 3 others. HFL also continued support for Yogi's school fees, and Yanti's living costs.

Hope For Life has supported 4 of its beneficiaries in relocating and transitioning from university to work. This has included the purchase of 2 motorbikes in Kalimantan in January 2022, whilst selling 2 of the motorbikes in Yogya in April 2022 that were no longer needed.

Hope For Life has provided medical care for its beneficiaries, and also for some close family members.

Hope For Life works closely with several local Indonesian pastors to ensure its beneficiaries receive ongoing and appropriate pastoral support as part of their commitment to church life.

Chris Tapp was able to visit Indonesia in April 2022 for 5 weeks for the first time since the covid pandemic.

All of the above are designed to fulfil our charitable obligations to benefit the public.

Future Growth

The charity is still operating at (beyond) full capacity and is not currently in a position to support further individuals. Any future individuals that HFL may support would undergo an Application process by invitation of the trustees, would need to have been known to at least one of the trustees for at least a number of months, and be recommended by their local pastor. The trustees would consider any such applications on their merit, and in the light of sponsorship and funding available. The decision of the trustees will be absolute and binding.

HFL continues to seek further volunteers who could support us in our work, and in particular anyone with accounting or secretarial (minute taking) skills. We also continue to seek support in fund raising (including approaching grant-making charities) and developing appropriate sponsorship programmes.

Marten Graduation: Marten completed his Diploma in August and returned to Kalimantan. Graduation ceremonies were still on-line. HFL facilitated his parents and brother to travel to Pontianak to watch the ceremony in September and also to have formal photographs and a celebration. Marten returned to his village but found the job he was hoping to take required a full degree. Regrettably the option to upgrade was no longer available and so Marten looked for alternative jobs. For a time he worked in the gold mines. In January there was the opportunity for

him to apply for the role of leader in his village and he was duly elected in January. This is a (poorly) paid Government post. Marten continues to be busy in this role.

All our Yogya students were able to join in with the photo-shoots and celebrations afterwards. It was unfortunately impossible for Adi, and for Eska's dad and family to attend and so a second photo shoot was arranged in Sanggau Kalimantan. Eska left Yogya at the end of October, and Adi and her family met her in Sanggau. Eska then returned to her village for 2 weeks. In her village she contracted



typhus, and then returned to Sintang. Here she had to register with the local authority and looked for a job. She then had measles!

Dani graduation Nov 21. Dani had returned to his village and married. However, he returned to Pontianak and then Yogya and HFL supported him to complete his degree. He graduated on-line in Nanga Pinoh and his parents were able to attend. He is now living in Central Kalimantan and is working in a business organisation.

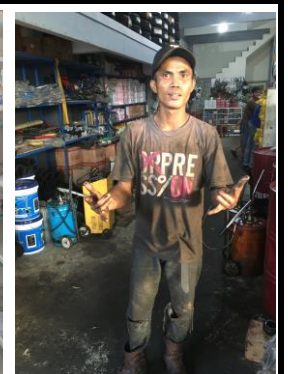
Our guys enjoyed a time of celebration over Christmas and were actively involved in CornerStone church activities. HFL was able to send them each a small Christmas gift –



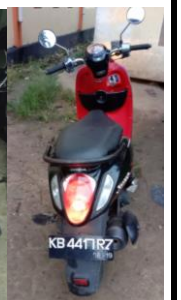
some card games to help them spend time together and bond more with each other. Christmas day was a special occasion at church. Pastor Surya and his wife sent Christmas greetings to us all.

During most of the year Chris continued to hold regular video calls with our young people and taught and disciplined them in basic Christian principles. Topics such as Foundations of our faith, Salvation, Forgiveness, Emotional Healing and Growth, the Father Heart of God and others were covered. This provided valuable additional support to their church commitments at a time Chris was unable to visit due to covid restrictions.

In April Handono completed his degree. He had worked particularly hard during his final semester to complete his thesis in Government Administration. The first picture shows him on a visit to the village community project he was involved in.



I (Chris) was able to visit Indonesia in April – May as soon as the borders were open. After a 2 day delay in Doha I arrived in Bali (the only way in at the time) and was able to meet Yanti for the first time. She is studying Theology along with Pawi and Ali from Roni David's village. They proudly showed me around the Cornerstone campus (Ps Surya was able to arrange scholarships for them). It was also a great surprise and joy to meet up with Melia who had stayed at our house for a time at LWV. There was much to catch up with, and learn especially as she was in a time of transition. I stayed with Ps Ongky and his family. In 2 short days I was off to Yogya and then onto Kalimantan, accompanied by Sah-Roni. We hired a car in Kalimantan and Sah-Roni was my co-driver and chaperone for the first week, then Adi supported me for the remainder of the time in Kalimantan. It was great to meet up with Adi and Eska, and also Renjos.

The time flew by, but I was also able to meet Ps Mustakim and pray



With him over land he had just purchased to build a school and Asrama. It was also good to meet Sylwanus and to speak at their campus. Ps Mustakim s one of the lecturers.



On Good Friday I was able to speak at Cornerstone church and it was a time of great blessing, with many prayed for after the service. Then it was time to return to Java, via Jakarta where I met up with Ps John Peter and spoke at his church. I was also able to spend a day with him meeting up with some

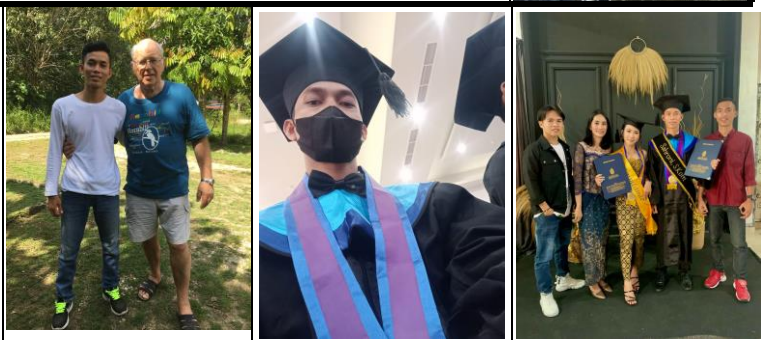

One of the challenging experiences is being asked to pray for elderly people in hospital. Conditions are often far from ideal, and usually all the family is present hoping for a miracle. I usually try to convey that I will pray for God to bring peace to the person and an assurance of salvation. This dear man died 2 days later. (End photo below – I was able to go with Renjos to his wife’s village – this is the first time I had met her, and also it is the village of Junaidi who was part of the original electrical team at LWV – great to meet him and his wife and now 5 year old daughter. 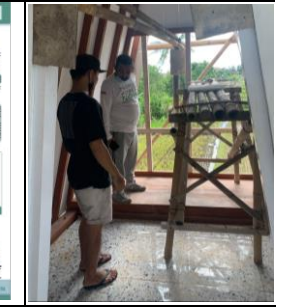

Financial

At various times again during the year loans were made to the charity. Unfortunately, these have increased considerably this year and the charity is in real terms in a worse finance position than the previous year. Outstanding loans now stand at over £7000. However, it is anticipated that with fewer beneficiaries in 2022-2023 that this debt can be reduced, providing the present level of income is maintained or hopefully increased.

Flight costs have increased this year, though the costs of Chris Tapp's flights to Indonesia are included in the Charity accounts. The credit card payments shown in the accounts are due to administrative restraints in booking flights and so these are paid for personally by Chris Tapp, and then refunded by the charity. The charity funds each beneficiary who is studying away from home once a year with either a one way (where the family are able to help) or return flight to allow them to return to their families and villages. This year there were additional costs involved to enable family members to attend Graduation Ceremonies.



Section C Objectives and activities

To advance the Christian faith in such parts of Asia and the world for the benefit of the public in accordance with the statements of belief appearing in the schedule by:

- 4.1. The training, discipling and mentoring of young adult Christians in a variety of skills that will enable them to deliver the social out-workings of Christianity and to be agents of change in their home communities and for their people (in particular, but not necessarily exclusively, the Dyak tribes of Borneo);*
- 4.2. Providing such young people with opportunities to receive ministry into their own lives so as to receive healing and release from childhood and young adult emotional and spiritual wounds, thus enabling them to live lives of freedom and confidence in their identity in Christ;*
- 4.3. Working to see such young people fully integrated into the local church, actively living as part of the local Body of Christ, and so preparing them to have active supportive ministries in their home communities; which will enable them to fulfil their destiny and calling from God, so that they may be a light to the world, salt to the earth, thus being more effectively able to demonstrate the personal and social out-workings of Christianity.*

Additional details of objectives and activities

Hope For Life was started in August 2015 by Chris Tapp whose desire was to provide a means for young adults from the Dyak tribes of Borneo to have the opportunity to grow in a relationship with God, to be disciplined and mentored in the Christian Life, and to have opportunities to receive training and education at an appropriate level to give them a firm foundation onto which they could build their lives and be able to provide for their future families and give into and enhance their community.

From this Hope For Life was formally inaugurated as a UK Charity on July 27th 2019.

Hope For Life continues to support 1 student at school and 10 students at university (partially or fully).

Hope For Life has provided medical care for its beneficiaries, and also for some close family members.

Hope For Life has provided at various times weekly training meetings in the Foundations of the Christian Faith, together with many ad-hoc teaching and mentoring sessions.

Hope For Life works closely with several local Indonesian pastors to ensure its beneficiaries receive ongoing and appropriate pastoral support as part of their commitment to church life.

Hope For Life also links with American missionaries in Yogya who provide more intensive Discipleship Training

Chris Tapp has been unable to visit Indonesia during this year due to covid restrictions,

All of the above are designed to fulfil our charitable obligations to benefit the public.

Future Growth

The charity is still operating at (beyond) full capacity and is not currently in a position to support further individuals. Any future individuals that HFL may support would undergo an Application process by invitation of the trustees, would need to have been known to at least one of the trustees for at least a number of months, and be recommended by their local pastor. The trustees would consider any such applications on their merit, and in the light of sponsorship and funding available. The decision of the trustees will be absolute and binding.

HFL continues to seek further volunteers who could support us in our work, and in particular anyone with accounting or secretarial (minute taking) skills. We also continue to seek support in fund raising (including approaching grant-making charities) and developing appropriate sponsorship programmes.

Section D Achievements and performance

HFL has continued to be busy this year, and all its activities have been designed to support, encourage, motivate and mentor its beneficiaries so that they continue to grow and mature as young adults ready to face their future with a God-given confidence.

Achievements and performance

This was an on-line ceremony and so he had already moved to Pontianak. There are numerous photo studios set up for these events and some of the “official photos” are included here. HFL was able to support Bambang’s brother Wardiru, and his Mum and Step-Dad to travel to Pontianak to attend the ceremony and photo shoot, A very proud moment for his Mum in particular who has only ever known very primitive village life. Luciana (Bambang’s girlfriend) and family were also able to attend.

Gati graduated in May 2021. HFL has helped him at various stages during his final schooling and university career, His family were able to support him for much of the time but the covid pandemic meant they had no money. Gati is hoping to get a job with a law firm as an intern, and then possibly take further legal qualifications. He has a real heart to help others and during his holidays helped with soccer training and teaching children in the local villages.

Dani returned to Yogya for 2 months to complete the final stage of his degree. He finally received his degree on 23rd June. Dani has returned to his wife in his village and is hoping to find a good job in Central Kalimantan.



This has been an important year for Bambang! He moved to Pontianak in September 2020, and after several interviews and some frustrations he was selected from a large group of candidates to be the Manager of a team of people for a large parcel delivery company. He has now completed his training and earns a good salary (by Indonesian standards).

In December Bambang travelled to Lusi’s village and he and Lusi became engaged! It was obviously a very proud moment. Bambang and Lusi have known each other for many years. Lusi’s village is near the village where Bambang grew up. Roni David’s dad took part in the official engagement ceremony.

In February he graduated on-line. We had hoped that he would be able to do this in person, and that I would also be able to attend, however covid prevented all of that.

Finally in June Bambang and Lusi were married in the village. Lusi’s family is quite wealthy and so there were high expectations. Traditionally Indonesians take ceremonies such as engagements and weddings very seriously and there is a lot of pressure to make it a very memorable event.

HFL began to support Yanti in September 2020. (Yanti is Adi's cousin). We enabled her to come to Yogya and then Adi took her to Bali. She has a scholarship from Cornerstone church, and HFL help her with some basic living expenses. She is studying at the Cornerstone College to teach Christian Religion. When she finishes she plans to teach in her village. She has very full programme. Tuesday to Thursday there are lectures in the afternoon at the campus. Friday night there is a service. They reach out to the Kelugkung district, and there are 3 worship sessions each week.



Sarik continues to very well in Sintang, though this was a sad year for him. His father, Sembeling, passed away in April after a long battle with throat cancer. This has released Sarik somewhat from the responsibility of caring for him, although he now needs to care for his grandparents. In the village he barter for food, exchanging with other village people. He also works hard to help with village projects. He looks very smart when he is in his formal university clothes. He is on course to finish August 2022.

Section D Achievements and performance

This has been another busy year for HFL with many challenges and demands. There have been some increased costs associated with travel due to the covid pandemic. Additionally HFL has been able to provide high performance laptops for Supi, Sah-Roni and Yefta to enable them to undertake the practical work associated with their subjects. HFL loans laptops to its beneficiaries whilst they are studying. However on Graduation HFL gifts the laptops to the beneficiary.

It has been very encouraging to see the students grow in their faith and life skills, as well as performing well at university. HFL is committed to supporting them all until the end of their studies, and to help them transition into secure jobs. We hope that they will then be in a strong position to develop their lives, and to form strong Godly relationships as the foundation to married and family life, whilst being able to support and encourage their own local and wider communities.

Section E Financial review

At various times again during the year loans were made to the charity. Taking into account the overpayment of £250 from the previous year, and repayments made during the year, there is an outstanding debt of £1170.

Last year the charity ended the year with an outstanding debt of £1505 for expenses incurred, predominantly in respect of flight tickets purchased. These have been cleared during the year, and all expenses for flights this year have been paid by the charity. (Due to administrative restraints in booking flights these are paid for personally by Chris Tapp, and then refunded by the charity.) The charity funds each beneficiary who is studying away from home once a year with either a one way (where the family are able to help) or return flight to allow them to return to their families and villages. This year there were additional costs involved due to the covid pandemic.

Further financial review details

The charity's main source of income continued to be from personal sponsorship / donations made by various individuals, there were also smaller donations made by church groups. HFL did not receive any grants or funding from any other charities or public bodies.

HFL benefitted from Gift Aid repayments of £2606 and the trustees wish to record their gratitude to those individuals who allowed us to claim the GA rebate on their gifts.

HFL received (restricted) sponsorship specifically for 8 of our beneficiaries, this amounted to £4208. Those that contributed in this way are welcome to contact the Treasurer to receive a full breakdown of how their sponsorship was used.

Section F Other information

Hope For Life continues to seek support from churches or other organisations sympathetic to its aims. The trustees would welcome any opportunity to present the work of the charity to any interested group or individual.



