

As people moved onto their own house or flat arranged by Wolverhampton council we continued to provide support throughout the initial pandemic lockdown by delivering regular food parcels direct to their home.

As the pandemic began to recede in severity we continued to provide support for those who were in accommodation but struggling, particularly as the cost of living crisis began to be felt more keenly.

We also saw a large reduction in the number of volunteers during this period with some people still cautious of Covid but we continued to provide our services with a handful of volunteers, including trustees.

During Covid many of our volunteers stopped volunteering for various reason, including the health risk and changes in our provision leaving just a handful still volunteering, including trustees.

As the pandemic caused by Covid began to recede, many former volunteers didn't return. And we are beginning the process of winding down the charity and disbursing funds to organisations with similar aims,




