RALPHH Chairman's Report for the Year 2024-25

It has been a record-breaking year for the Robert Allen Life Promotion and Healthy Hearts (RALPHH) Trust as the reputation of the charity continues to grow.

A remarkable 29 defibrillators were given to the sports department of schools and to sporting clubs. Expanding from previous sports areas, RALPHH has assisted clubs in horse riding, canoeing and cricket for the first time. However, rowing continues to be the largest area of focus. The geographic reach of all of this partnership work now extends from Gateshead in the North East to Fowey, Cornwall as well from Colwyn Bay and Chester to King's Lynn, Eastbourne and the Isle of Wight. We have also been able to enhance the support for sport for disabled people in the last year. So much of this progress has been possible thanks to the donations of pre-owned defibrillators from a major facilities management group which have then been refurbished as necessary by the charity. Therefore, there has been no need for RALPHH to make any financial grants linked to defibrillator availability in the last 12 months. A considerable over-performance against plan has also had the consequence of a sizeable rise in costs linked to travel, but Trustees are fully aware of the position and the reduction in assets was at least in-part anticipated at the start of the financial year.

The year also saw a doubling in the cardiac testing schemes sponsored by RALPHH. The testing programme run through British Rowing attracted RALPHH support for a third consecutive year, whilst a new programme linked to a collection of schools in the Windsor area happened in January.

The on-line information contained on the RALPHH website has again been accessed by many people and was confirmed as being just as relevant and important by a cardiac specialist, as had been the case when first written in 2020. We welcome the reinforcement of the relevance of this material by professional cardiologists.

The investment made in the previous year in improving our on-line presentation has led to increased popularity, ably supported by improvements in the use of social media.

In 2024-25 both Andrew Beard and Susmita Brockhizen stepped down as trustees. It is questionable whether RALPHH could have become as properly established at its instigation without Andrew's welcome guidance. We wish him and Susy well in the future. Joining the Board have been Edmund Green and Connor Rawlins, both of whom having made an immediate impact in the cause of the charity.

A key challenge in the year ahead will be to increase fund-raising, after several years of grants and expenditure exceeding income. Most of this was pre-planned by the Trustees but fund-raising must assume a much higher priority, whilst continuing to build defibrillator numbers and adequately supporting the other objectives of the charity.

RALPHH has ongoing benefit from the extensive volunteer efforts made. As a charity we continue to work exclusively by drawing upon the efforts of concerned people and organisations who, whilst very keen that people of all ages and abilities have access to exerting sport, do so in a manner which includes the appropriate care for their safety and well-being.





RALPHH CHAIRMAN'S REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2023/24

The financial year has been one of considerable achievement for the RALPHH charity. All targets in our business plan were surpassed and there are encouraging signs that 2024/25 will carry forward this momentum.

RALPHH helped make possible the installation or availability of valuable defibrillation equipment in 13 different locations. These included the first hockey and rugby clubs to work with the charity as well as with the organisers of an all-ages Fun Run. The spread across England has again been considerable, with partnerships in East Anglia, the North East as well as stretching to the Isle of Wight. These have taken one of two forms. We have been able to donate pre-owned but unused defibrillators to those who meet the criteria of both need and commitment to keep such equipment in good, workable condition. The second approach continues RALPHH's long-standing strategy of providing grants for equipment that are displayed and maintained in outdoor locations, contained within weatherproof and vandal proof containers.

Once again, our partnership with British Rowing led to RALPHH sponsorship of cardiac and circulatory testing for those being considered for inclusion as part of the GB Rowing Squad. This took place at the National Watersports Centre, near Nottingham in March. RALPHH is keen to create further such partnerships in other sports but costs through existing channels make this difficult.

In December the charity relaunched its website, which now makes it easier to research where and how RALPHH has helped sporting clubs and schools since its formal instigation in August 2019. Part of this work remains devoted to information advising how an individual can step back in a managed way from competitive sport, limiting the prospect of causing harm in the process. We believe that this continues to be well-used and respected and part of the plan for the next financial year is to complete a review and update of stated best practice.

Our fund-raising activities were greatly assisted by a donation from the IT software company VMware and from the efforts of many others that included a floral and vegetable event; a quiz night at a rowing school; and general donations from those supportive of RALPHH aims and in memory of Robert Allen, whose early death inspired the formation of the charity.

Whilst working hard to keep the expenses of the organisation as low as possible, our target for this was marginally exceeded, not least because our activity and impact levels well exceeded those contained in our original business plan.

In looking to the programme for 24/25, a key element will be increasing the distribution of the pre-owned defibrillators, ensuring that each of these have a good life span before needing any maintenance cost for the recipients. We believe that uptake on this will be stimulated by a recent mailing to affiliated British Rowing clubs as well as new links forged with Hockey Wales. We also look to provide more help to schools and universities. A Government decision to provide a defibrillator in every state school is to be applauded, but the issue remains that in many larger schools with playing facilities this is insufficient. A school office or central place within school buildings will often be too far in distance for effective use at somewhere like a sports or watersports area. We would therefore like to see more schools – such as Diss High School and Chester's Queen's Park High School in the past – work with RALPHH to address this shortcoming, and safeguard more lives.

It remains a difficult time for calling upon the generosity of the public in support of so many good causes. RALPHH realizes this situation and is therefore tailoring its plans for the following year to the expectation that fund-raising will be no better or easier than in 2023/24.

The Trustees believe that RALPHH continues to perform a highly valid charitable purpose and will continue to do so for many years to come.

This map shows at the start of June 2024 the sporting locations where RALPHH has either gifted defibrillation equipment or provided grants to make this possible.





Chairman's Report

THE ROBERT ALLEN LIFE PROMOTION AND HEALTHY HEARTS TRUST ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2022-23

The previous 12 months have been a period of considerable success for the charity, which finishes the financial year on a much stronger note than the year previously. All targets set at the start of the year by the trustees have been met and preparations are well advanced for further partnership activity in 2023-24.

Results in the year against the stated charitable objectives are:

- Five applicable sporting locations now have defibrillation equipment, thanks to support and partnership work from RALPHH.
- A cardiac and circulatory testing programme was run in association with British Rowing, aimed at those shortlisted for potential national honours.
- Use of information on the RALPHH website addressing personal step-down from exerting sports continues to be appreciated and referenced.

In September 2022, the Trustees were delighted to welcome Susy Broekhuizen as a member of the Board. There are now four Trustee Board members, each bringing a complementary range of experience and skills to the charity

The first priority in the year that has concluded was to build the financial resources. This has been achieved through diverse ways in raising donations, but absolutely key was a sponsored row in September by students, staff and alumni of Kingston Grammar School from Henley to Thames Ditton that contributed £20,100. Many thanks are due to those organising and others taking part. Additionally, RALPHH has benefited from fund-raising concerts performed by three community choirs, as well as gifts resulting from a wedding and funeral. Continuing support is coming from employees of VMware in Britain and RALPHH's inclusion on giving websites.

The charity was also a partner in helping to fund defibrillator installations at five locations in England. The five new locations to be equip with a defibrillation due to RALPHH funding includes a first sailing club which resulted from closer relations with the management of British Sailing. A further interesting installation was at an outdoor activity centre for young people with special educational needs. Already for the following year we have completed the groundwork for three new defibrillator installations in the early part of Summer 2023 and will be engaged in a number of sporting partnerships in growing RALPHH-supported locations.

In all of our work we have attempted to keep expenses to a minimum, but the progress continuing to be achieved would not have been possible without considerable travel in this country. The Board does not see this abating in the foreseeable future but a new partnership with an independent business supporter does mean that we may be able to supply without charge defibrillation equipment that will be useful to amateur sporting venues. The shape of these arrangements in yet to be concluded but this is an exciting new development and illustrates the impact that RALPHH has already had since its inception in 2018. We therefore look forward to the future with encouragement.

Annual Report of the Registered Charity RALPHH (Robert Allen Life Promotion and Health Hearts) Trust for the Financial Year 2021-22.

The charity has had a good year in terms of activity in support of one of its key aims – to provide improved access to defibrillation equipment at schools and amateur sporting locations. However, financial reserves have declined and work in driving forward ECG testing for young people starting on strenuous sporting activity has once again been a casualty of the COVID19 pandemic and the implications this has had on National Health Services

Although paid for in the previous financial year, the installation and launch of the defibrillator at the Boathouse of Queen’s Park High School, Chester had to be delayed until May 2021. This is ideally positioned to meet any emergency requirement of School students; the neighbouring canoe club and scouts; as well as walkers on the towpath alongside the River Dee. Local media coverage of this initiative was extensive. A second installation took place and was launched in early July at Honiton Community College, Devon. This is conveniently positioned for school games and private adult classes, which include dancing.

Although arranged earlier in the summer, delays in defibrillation equipment supply meant that installations at Sidmouth College and West Buckland School, near Barnstable had to be postponed until early November. As at Honiton, the Sidmouth installation has the benefit of providing cover for student sports as well as adult use of College facilities in the evenings and weekends. West Buckland has enormous school grounds where previously just one defibrillator was available. Thanks to RALPHH support coverage is much improved.

Working in partnership with Kingston Grammar School, protected defibrillation equipment has been installed on the exterior of one wing of the premises that overlooks a popular sporting and recreational facility. This has also plugged a gap in local provision, since the closure of a local leisure centre in January 2019.

A final defibrillator installation has been agreed and a grant already provided by the charity to Diss High School, Norfolk. This has again been delayed by equipment availability, but a launch date has now been set for late April 2022.

In the coming year a priority has to be a formal review of the RALPHH website dealing with information on the best approach to leaving participation in an exerting sport. This will involve appropriate health professionals. Further attempts will be made to help fund ECG testing for young people and more attention is needed to help supplement existing efforts on fund raising to help meet defibrillator demand. On this latter point, the continued interest of personnel from VMware is much appreciated and we would hope to build upon similar support from corporate business. Improvement made throughout the year in the use of the RALPHH website should be continued to help supplement this strategy.

Annual Report of the Registered Charity RALPHH (Robert Allen Life Promotion and Health Hearts) Trust for the Financial Year 2020-21.

As for so many other companies and institutions, the last year has been highly disrupted by the impact of the COVID19 pandemic. Activity has been far below the expectations at the start of the year and basic contact with those who could best benefit from partnering with RALPHH has been impaired.

The year began on a disappointment when Kingston Rowing Club returned a grant cheque because they found themselves unable to meet the contractual requirement under which the grant had been previously agreed. This related to maintenance of planned grant-supported equipment purchases, but we hope that the Club may be able to resolve this matter in the future and re-establish an agreement with RALPHH.

During the summer period, when travel and meeting restrictions were less tight, a meeting and agreement took place with Queen's High School, Chester to part-fund defibrillation equipment. This subsequently led to the equipment being installed as agreed in the early part of 2021. It is now planned to make arrangements for a launch event in Spring 2021 and to promote this extensively, so as to raise contact levels with other school and sporting club potential partnership, as well as stimulating further charitable giving to the organisation.

At the start of the report period, the charity took the decision to invest some funds in a bank deposit account. With interest rates being so low this has produced only a modest return. The Trustees also decided to have all accounts of RALPHH subject to an independent audit, although this has not been a requirement from The Charity Commission. The plan is to continue on this basis.

Many annual events, for which RALPHH had plans to participate, were cancelled or restricted due to Covid19 restrictions and this certainly adversely impacted on a strategy for giving to the charity, but the reduced activity level than was planned and anticipated meant that over the twelve-month period assets at the end of the financial year have risen. The Trustees would particularly like to thank the staff and corporate help received from VMware through Global Giving, without whose help matters would have been far less positive.

In planning for the next 12 months, RALPHH will be increasing activity on social media and will also be seeking at least six partnerships with schools or clubs in the year with the consistent aim of improving the health and safety of people participating in sporting activity.
