Objectives and Activities

Bark Charity was established to support and care for vulnerable children in Zimbabwe. Our charitable purposes are to relieve poverty, advance education, and promote wellbeing through direct community-based support. During the year, volunteers continued to provide hands-on care for children in Zimbabwe. This included day-to-day support, mentoring, and ensuring that children's immediate needs for food, clothing, and guidance were met.

Achievements and Performance

This reporting year saw limited financial or operational movement. However, the continued dedication of our volunteers ensured that children in Zimbabwe received consistent care and attention. While resources were stretched, our small team of volunteers demonstrated resilience and commitment, ensuring that the charity's core mission continued in practice, even with minimal funding or staff support.

Financial Review

The charity experienced very little financial activity this year. Expenditure was limited to direct costs of supporting volunteers' efforts in Zimbabwe, and no significant fundraising took place during the period. The trustees recognise the need to strengthen the charity's funding base and increase staff and volunteer numbers in order to grow activities and deliver more sustainable support.

Future Plans

Looking forward, the charity intends to: - Recruit additional staff and volunteers in the UK and Zimbabwe. - Develop fundraising initiatives to strengthen financial stability. - Explore partnerships with local organisations in Zimbabwe to maximise impact.

Structure, Governance and Management

Bark Charity is a registered charity in England & Wales (charity number 1185317). It is run by a board of trustees who are responsible for governance, compliance, and strategy. The charity is dependent on volunteers for much of its activity and is currently seeking to expand its capacity through new staff and trustees.

Performance and Achievements

In the year ended 31st January 2022, Bark as; -

45 students from 45 different households are being sponsored on the school fees scholarship.

Epworth is a peri-urban settlement located south east of metropolitan Harare, the capital city

of Zimbabwe. It started as an informal settlement and gradually the settlement was formalized

under Ruwa Local board to become a satellite settlement mainly domiciled by the poor. The

fees program is run at Open Tribe Foundation, an informal school that operates from the

founder's residential stand with make-shift structures consisting mainly of simple shades

without walls. It is a primary school that has ECD to Grade 7 and is not a school public examinations center. The teaching staff is all voluntary and the school runs from purely donations, for example, stationery, school uniforms, shoes and food handouts. The intention is to have the whole school assisted because by the

measurement of the UN sustainable development goals, the whole community is extremely poor.

The adverse impact of the Covid -19 has affected all stakeholders and inevitably resulted in intermittent halting of some programs in the year running. The government's restriction on movements in compliance with the World Health Organization Protocols to combat the pandemic saw a reduction in physical visits and closure of the schools at some point as the world responded to the new phenomena. Resultantly,

many of our volunteers migrated to rural areas. A marked number of school dropouts were

recorded and our children on sponsorship were not spared either. We paid varying amounts

for the complete school terms of 2022. During the Covid-19 term breaks, focus was on provision

of Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs), awareness campaigns and provision of food

handouts. We also supported a competition and fun day at Open Tribe Foundation. Children

competed in dancing, poems, quiz and singing.

We ran an empowerment programs for our volunteers. This has become an annual activity that is now alive on our calendar meant to motivate unpaid volunteers. In liaison with the

Vehicle Inspectorate Department, we coordinated provisional driver license courses for 10

volunteers.

To support the initiative of empowering the youth and woman during covid-19, donations

were sourced through fund raising and a 40ft contained as shipped to Zimbabwe. Varying

items of clothing (new and Old), surgical gloves, facemasks, sanitary ware, foodstuffs, sports

ware, shoes, sewing machines etc, were donated to Zimbabwe. Because of the Covid -19,

there were changes in shipping, forwarding and aviation legislation, hence there was a general

delay in the movement of cargo. Countries enacted new rules and regulations that would aide

health officials in combating the spread of Covid-19, thus a lot of goods in the container

needed import permits from specific government ministries in Zimbabwe. The costs ranged

from shipping, storage, import licenses, appeals, clearing agent fees, duty, inspections, fuel

and communication. Because of lockdowns, physical visits to offices were not permitted.

Processing queries online was also hectic as systems were down most of the time. There was

skeleton staff in all government institutions where import permits were processed and

signatures of designated officers could hardly be found as most of them operated from home

in a move to decongest offices. External documentation is verified by the respective signatures

and date stamps. Organizations were asked to apply for permission to be exempted from

travelling restrictions during lockdowns and the process produced an exemption certificate if

granted. Not-For-Profit organizations were not automatic recipients of the exemption if the

organization's objectives had nothing to do with humanitarian work. A vetting process was in

place for the process hence processing of imports became a nightmare though BAK Charity

acquired the certificate after a long period of waiting.

By the time when all paperwork was in place the storage Bill was beyond reach,

negotiations are still on going to get the container at about £5.5K. If released, there are a lot of

goods in the container that will empower beneficiaries, for example, sewing machines, PA System, sports equipment, cooking and baking utilities. The donated cargo is still at Manica Freight. The duty of the bus has been reviewed upwards twice by the Revenue Authority. We have rescued the bus twice from being

auctioned. There is need to raise duty for the bus and goods that did not qualify for rebate.

PROGRESS WITH OUR OBJECTIVES

We are operational mainly basing and focusing on our founding objectives which include, but not limited to empowerment of marginalized children, youths and women. The United Nations

refers to them as a special population. Our objectives

are also in compliance with the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.

Goal Number 1: - No hunger

In as a much as we focus on sustainable initiatives in our programmes in hunger alleviation,

the past year because of Covid-19, no outdoor activities were allowed as at some point we had

a total shut down. We had to increase food handouts in household where our scholarship kids

are living.

Goal Number 2: - Promoting self-sufficiency

We were running empowerment programmes for women and the youth. Some women were

trained to trade in agriculture produce. Covid-19 protocols limited trading business. The ban

on movement meant women could not go out selling or re-stock. Some were trained on tailoring

skills for uniforms. As schools were closed, this pointed out that business for them was shut

also. The youth were trained in videography, photography, t-shirt and cooperate wear

branding. Industry closed because of restrictions, hence loss for business. Gatherings for

social events like weddings, parties etc were restricted and many youths failed to breakthrough

in the business.

Goal Number 4: - Quality Education

We paid school fees for 45 children in the year running. We bought 200new-curriculum

textbooks for school from Grade 1 to Grade 7.

Most educational institutes relied on the internet to impart knowledge to the school going

kids because of the lockdowns. The children and the volunteer teachers do not have electricity and the

gadgets that are used to access internet. No smart phones, no electricity or solar systems, no

WIFI and even money to buy data bundles. The school children are mainly orphans being taken

care of either by a single parent, a grandmother, grandfather, a close or distant relative and

some live in child-headed households. Regrettably, these children have no choice but to resort

to menial jobs for money and food handouts. Dire is their situation.

Evaluation of the Project: Hope in the Streets Project (London)

The project was carried out by Bark Charity UK and the key objective was ensuring homeless

people get improved access to mental health services and improved knowledge of mental

health issues. The program started in May 2021 and ended on the 31st of August 2021 in

Merton and Coventry. The project commenced and ended during the Covid-19 induced lockdowns. The World Health Organization proposed international protocols which governments adopted and implemented. Homeless people did not benefit much from the protocols as restricted movements and total closure of shops and restaurants meant that food was hard to come by for them. There was no human traffic in the streets and begging could not yield anything for them. Households were inaccessible as homeowners did not entertain strangers.

We also run Mental Health First Aid Courses that have become very popular as the people that

attend go away armed with tools to help themselves and many more.

Highlights

45 students received school fees scholarships. One female student who is a beneficiary of the school

fees bursary program graduated from Bindura University of Science Education with an Honors Degree in Sport Science and Administration.

We also saw one of the beneficiaries creating a musical band following the release of his debut album the previous year.

The supporting BAK Charity football team received kit and a pitch to play at Churchill Boys High School.

Operations

No meaningful donations have been received for the period under review. We have failed to repair the Head Office for BAK Zimbabwe where the perimeter wall got damaged by falling trees because of

a storm. The gazebo where BAK Fridays are held at the premises was also severely damaged as

it was brought down. The general yard needs landscaping and driveways. The swimming pool

project is not yet complete.

The four objectives explained in the report and “The plans for The Future’ which will be

highlighted as the report is concluded exhibit that the scope of this humanitarian work is

exceptionally and purely for Public Benefit as enshrined in the dictates of the relevant statutes.

This work is made possible by the consistent stream of support from Bark Charity UK,

individuals and other organizations.

The Trustees and Director have considered this report and concluded that: -

- The aims and objectives of the organization to remain purely charitable work.
- The benefits are for public
- The charitable work by the organization continues to touch lives through these acts of

random kindness without any discrimination of any form.

- There is no detriment or harm (physical or emotional) arising from the organization's

activities, hence need for continuous adherence to standard operational guidelines that are internationally recognized.

Financial review

For the period under review, BAK Zimbabwe account show that the fundraising activities by

Bark Charity UK and their grant helped achieve key objectives in all the programs that were

undertaken.

Our Barclays Bank Account is up and running. We still have the challenge of sending money

through would remit without it going through a personal account. This is being looked at with other

banks if a more convenient transacting process is established.

Plans for the Future

Self -sufficiency - ensuring that all self-help projects deliver for sustainability purposes. The

aim is to ensure projects survive beyond the intervention period.

Life-enhancing programs - to ensure program participants influence change in communities in

programs involving water, sanitation and Covid-19 care and prevention.

We need to look at more systems that allow continuous fundraising.

There is need to create a paid post in order to seek grants and reach out to companies

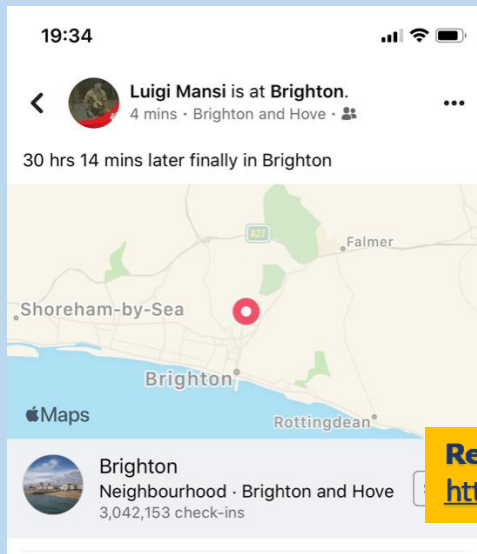
Luigi's walk for BARK

Tadenda Taibu

The youngest cricket Test captain in history continues to provide leadership

Sport is often seen as a somewhat frivolous activity, yet it is actually underpinned by themes basic to the human condition: heroism, drama, competition, hierarchy, morality and perhaps most important of all, the quest for greatness. Most of these are difficult to absorb for even the meanest and most committed competitor. Imagine then, being thrust into the crucible of world-class sport at the age of only 20 as well as having to cope with the additional aspect of captaining your country - one operating within the most precarious of political frameworks.

For Tadenda Taibu, the call-up to international level in 2001 was the culmination of the Zimbabwe Cricket Union's development program to grow the game in that country - an equal opportunities exercise that sought to prove that it was possible to come from an impoverished background and reach the heights of Test cricket.

It was a hand-up that anyone with a talent for cricket but not the means to pursue it meaningfully would have reached for. Growing up in a township Taibu knew that opportunities were limited and was ambitious enough to seize the opportunities on offer whilst being mindful - even at such a young age - of the world of inequality and white privilege that he was entering.

Sport and Politics

Although long-standing ethnic divides that permeated the national team were being weeded out it remained a side that resisted the notion to prove sport as the great unifier. For Taibu it would not simply be a case of scoring runs with a shared cricket bat (starkly illustrating Zimbabwe's poor facilities and lack of finance) but also navigating the undulating and harsh political landscape that the team existed within. In time his initial belief that sports and politics should not mix was quickly disabused, and his experiences at the 2003 World Cup - when black and white factions united in protesting their anger at the Mugabe government - were the final grim realisation that they can never be separated.

The aftermath of that tournament had seen captain Andy Flower and star bowler Henry Olongo forced to flee the country after they wore black armbands during matches to highlight the death of democracy under president Robert Mugabe. It was into this turmoil that Taibu stepped - a captaincy vacuum that he filled whilst barely out of his teens. Two years later he launched his own protest: refusing to play for the national team until the cricketing authorities offered their players better financial support. It was less of a political action but his stand against inequality and the corruption of administrators was a more lonely one - lacking the oxygen of international media coverage - and was met with equal resistance.

Taibu and his wife had already been threatened by activists from Mugabe's ruling Zanu-PF party so when he was summoned in 2005 by a government minister to be simply shown a selection of photos of corpses (presumably the result of state action) it was a message that was not difficult to understand. Or understate. It was the culmination of a concerted effort by the ruling party to limit the power that Taibu did not realise he had as a black captain of a national sport. Eventually the constant intimidation forced the 24 year old to flee the country and suspend his Test career.

He returned 2 years later to a slightly more relaxed environment although political influence was so entrenched that combined with poor results and financial woes, the country did not compete within the Test arena from 2005 to 2011. It meant Taibu's prime years were spent in sporting wilderness despite being a brave and skilful wicket-keeper batsman of enough promise to prompt arguments about his place amongst the world's elite. Even so, in 28 Tests spread over 11 years he averaged a credible 30.31 in a perennially struggling team.



Today, his Test career over and settled in Crosby on Merseyside with his wife and two children, he maintains ties to his home country - overseeing an academy to help Zimbabweans develop as cricketers. He also assisted in the country's failed attempt to qualify for the 2019 World Cup - one factor being antipathy and demotivation that were the result of unpaid wages. Old issues had still not been resolved but Taibu was sanguine enough to realise that it might have been a blessing in disguise; that the country was still not politically mature enough to support a successful cricket team: "maybe it will make people on the outside look at our situation more closely" he explained with the maturity of wisdom that has always characterised him.

Term report 2020

Spring Term

The month was a busy one despite intermittent bad weather and learning sessions progressed well. Most children have shown good progress in their school work although a few continue to struggle.

On 7th February some were privileged to partake in Inter House competitions held at Churchill Boys High. New experiences and skills were gained and new interactions made through playing different sports and the participation left many with a zeal for hard work and a desire to maximise opportunities.

Major challenges remain relating to the purchase of stationery and revision textbooks. For those sitting grade 7 examinations this year the application of registration fees (\$44 bond per child per term) and centre fees (\$200 bond per child) continue to prove challenging. Nevertheless, many thanks are due to BARK UK and BAK Zimbabwe for paying school fees, educational trips and empowerment programmes that you are offering to us.

We wish to thank the BARK Director for pledging his Chadcombe house so that it can be used for Bark Fridays. Your support is much appreciated.

Summer Term

The term started well with enrolment of 236 children.

Despite disturbances because of the rains lessons progressed well although the poor state of the shades resulted in rainwater ingress and temporary structures will be needed to resolve this.

However, teachers continued to work whole-heartedly and lessons continued to be delivered. In addition feeding schemes were initiated in mid-term with the children fed rice and soya.

Unfortunately the Coronavirus outbreak necessitated closure of the school and as result end of term examinations were not held. An awareness campaign of the disease was run and as of today all children are safe.

Scarcity of stationery and textbooks remains problematic but new challenges faced include inadequate school toilets which are now in very poor condition. At one point the toilet pit even collapsed although it was quickly renovated. Even so, this puts the health of the children at risk. In addition, a spate of vandalism left writing boards, toilets and shades damaged or stolen. This was due to a missing durawall and is therefore a priority to fix.

Nevertheless, we were still able to use some monies to pay centre fees for grade 7 pupils as well as registering 11 pupils (out of 19) to write grade 7 examinations this year.

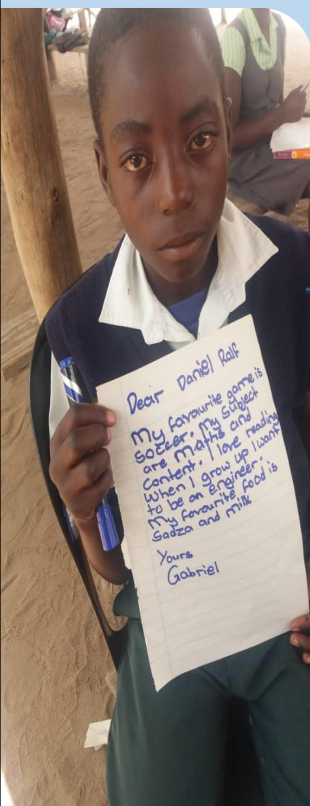
Thank you Bark for paying school fees and sponsoring 23 children : a positive end to a wonderful term.

Coronavirus Update

BAK Zimbabwe had the opportunity to attend a one-day training workshop on Covid-19 in Milton Park, Harare - a government certified programme which laid out World Health Organisation guidelines for all frontline personnel in fighting the pandemic. This multi-sectoral approach included social change agents and at BAK Zimbabwe we have been at the forefront working in marginalised communities disseminating information as to how the spread of the disease can be controlled.

Although rates of infection in Zimbabwe remain relatively low there is still a lack of equipment and supplies within the country. Unfortunately communities remain in need of basics such as soap, hand sanitizers and pamphlets to promote hygiene and awareness respectively.

The world is a very different place than it was six months ago and yet many issues still remain. The education of our children is not a subject that can be suspended as we all enter lockdown. And it is thanks to your support we have been able to continue to maintain school lessons in spite of the Coronavirus pandemic.

Minibus transportation

In September 2018 a minibus belonging to Hinchley Boy Scouts was donated to BARK - a wonderful gesture on their part. The van itself is in good working order albeit it is inevitably showing some signs of wear having been used extensively by a youth organisation.

Nevertheless, the hope now is to transport the van to Zimbabwe in order that it can be used in the enrichment projects run by the charity, particularly in transporting children to various activities.

Transporting the van half way across the world is no mean feat. It would be over 8,000 miles to actually drive across 3 continents and deliver the minibus by hand and that is probably not realistic ! It is also the case that we would wish to load the van with various goods donated by Surrey Sports, Reeds School and other well-wishers that can be used by the charity in Zimbabwe.

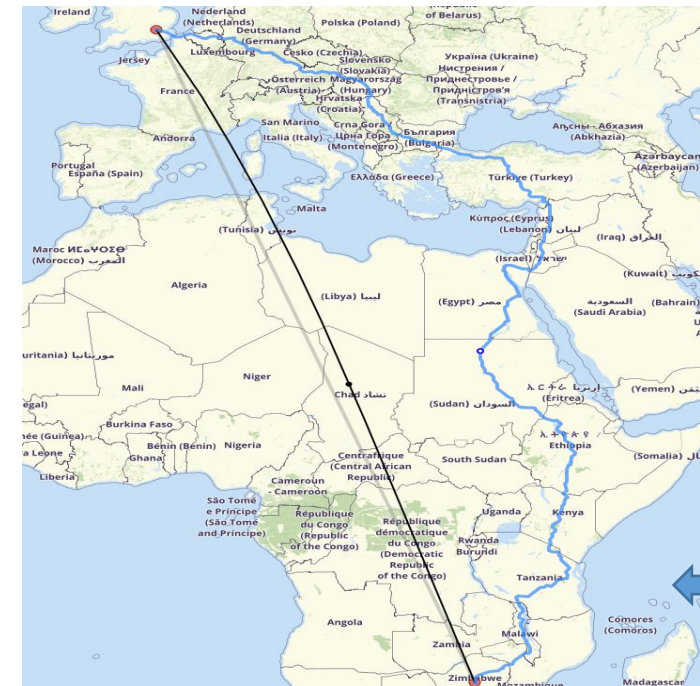

Therefore, the most appropriate way to transport the vehicle would seem to be via shipping container - the advantage being that there would be more space in order to send any other donated items that are required to be transferred.

However, the costs of this would be extremely expensive. Indeed, we estimate these costs at approximately £5,000 - a substantial sum.

As such BARK is launching an appeal to try and raise funds in order to hire a transportation container that can be shipped across the globe.



Of course, a project such as this will only run in parallel with existing programs and will not seek to distract from them. Given the sums involved it will be a wonderful effort to achieve this but as usual we are reliant on fundraising to achieve this target.

BARK scholarships

Education in Zimbabwe

Zimbabwe's education system was once the most developed on the African continent. However, the economic mismanagement and consequent hyperinflation in the last 2 decades has seen a resultant decline in public funding. Social expenditures on education decreased by more than half in the first decade of the 21st Century and by the end of 2008, most schools were shut down due to thousands of teachers leaving the profession.

This lack of trained teachers in secondary schools led UNICEF to assert that 94% of rural schools, serving the majority of the population, had closed in 2009. Attendance rates plummeted from over 80% to 20%.

Not only are teachers under-trained and under-compensated, but teaching materials are also allocated less than one percent of the federal budget for education.



What is the Scholarship Fund?

The BARK Scholarship Fund has been set up to help children attend school and undertake an appropriate education. Education in Africa is still the best pathway to a better life in Zimbabwe but many children do not attend school because their parents cannot afford to pay the necessary fees due to unemployment or other reasons. In many cases children are orphaned leaving them little or no support.

Your support can change the life of a child

When you sponsor a child in Zimbabwe, you are helping to ensure they can have access to an education that is currently denied them. Too many children are not getting the opportunities or experiences to allow them to reach their full potential. As a sponsor, you can help change that.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

In the year ending 31 December 2020 Bark Charity has:

25 children were on the sponsorship program.

On the 7th of February 2020 zim children were privileged to partake in Inter House competitions held at Churchill Boys High where new experiences and skills were gained and new interactions.

A fundraising event was held on the 15th and 20th of May to help in the marginalised community of Zimbabwe such as paying school fees and shipping the container with donated essentials to help with the impact of Covid19.

One of the trustees Luigi Mansi undertook a walk in order to fulfil personal challenge and raise funds for BARK between London and Brighton.

PROGRESS WITH OUR OBJECTIVES

There are 3 objectives that have been identified for the purpose of the Charity

Basic Human Needs

Help ensure food stuffs and other basic needs such as leisure and re-creational opportunities are afforded.

BAK Zimbabwe had the opportunity to attend a one-day training workshop on Covid19 in Milton Park – Harare Zimbabwe – a government certified programme which laid out World Health Organisation guidelines for all frontline personnel in fighting the pandemic. This multi-sectoral

approach included social change agents and at BAK Zimbabwe has been at the forefront working in marginalised communities disseminating information as to how the spread of the disease can be controlled. In August 2020 there was the Covid19 outbreak where the Charity gave out hygiene packs to 45 people which included children and the elderly in Epworth to ensure that they are safe. Food hampers were handed out on Christmas to 20 families in Epworth.

Education

We continued with paying school fees to the marginalised community

Stationery was not restricted to children on the programme only but also to some children at a school in Epworth called OTF where textbooks of grades 1 – 7 were handed over.

Sports Careers and Talent Development

2 Soccer tournaments were held during the year.

Tag rugby to small towns like Norton and Chegutu was introduced. Approximately 120 children were trained in the sporting discipline. The organisation also in conjunction with TAG Rugby Zimbabwe, trained coaches to oversee the progress of the sport at local school.

BAK Friday is an on-going programme that is done every Friday throughout the year at the Centre where children are taught academics, games, swimming, sewing, cooking and personal development.
