The Objects of the CIO:

1) The purpose of the Foundation is the promotion of animal and species protection in general and the worldwide protection and conservation of turtles in particular.

2) The purpose of the statutes is achieved in particular by promoting measures with the aim of achieving them

(a) stop the commercial exploitation of turtles;

(b) by means of concrete projects through on-the-spot assistance, to prevent the largest possible number of turtle nests from plundering and adult animals from slaughter;

(c) work with governments and public authorities to demonstrate the long-term environmental value of a healthy population of turtles;

(d) to draw the attention of a wide circle to the problem of commercial plunder of turtle nests;

(e) offer alternatives to those natives who until now have been dependent on the trade in turtles or their products;

(f) The purpose is also to raise funds for the promotion of animal welfare by other entities with similar objectives.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)

Turtle Foundation has established long-standing projects in two areas of the world where various species of endangered sea turtles nest: on Boa Vista in Cape Verde and on several islands and beaches in Indonesia, mainly in Sumatra and East-Kalimantan.

Since 2000 these projects have developed with the co-operation of local conservation organisations and the community in various ways building on a growing track record of successful results.

In Cape Verde our core activities remain to build and staff (mainly with dozens of international volunteers) seasonal beach camps to monitor loggerhead nesting activity, relocate eggs to a secure hatchery where data can be collected and hatchlings released safely into the sea.

A £7,500 grant from our dependable grant provider, the Ernest Kleinwort Charitable Trust, plus a generous £5,000 from the British Chelonia Group, went toward the continued operation of Lacacao Beach camp, the construction and operation of a hatchery and employment of local rangers to ensure that daily patrols could be successfully carried out on 5km of nesting beaches. Besides conservation this project provided a fair income, accommodation and three meals a day for local people involved. The funding employed and accommodated 33 rangers, 5 camp coordinators and 3 fieldworkers from June-November 2024. The beach camp lasted over 5 months with tents, cooking facilities, sustainable energy, supplies, vehicle running costs, and fieldwork items covered by these grants.

£6,558 from private and corporate donations could be spent on our other Boa Vista activities such as our community engagement projects, our other 4 smaller beach camp sites or put towards our work in the Indonesian Berau region.

Our Indonesia projects have required a different approach to turtle conservation and as well as continued awareness-raising to deter the use of shell in jewellery we have begun new activities to attempt to deter through education and campaigning the practice of 'headstarting' or breeding turtles in captivity which does more harm than good and we aim to see it officially banned (see <https://www.turtle-foundation.org/en/program-indonesia/#headstarting>)

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

In the past fiscal year, Turtle Foundation increased the consolidated revenues of all seven sister organizations to 1,310,610 Euros, a slight increase compared to the previous year. As part of this, TF-UK raised £19,058 within the United Kingdom (last year: £14,955).

Here is a brief summary of the main achievements this year across our projects:

- 103 night-time missions were completed by the innovative Boa Vista dog and drone team to deter poaching, working with local police in 12 cases.
- Over 4,000 green sea turtle nests were recorded on the Indonesian islands of Bilang-Bilangan and Mataha, plus 5 nest sites of rare hawksbill turtles.
- 766,800 hatchlings made their way successfully into the sea in Boa Vista.
- 9 team members took part in the 42nd International Sea Turtle Symposium in Thailand.
- 4,130kg of garbage was removed from 3.4km of the beaches of Boa Vista.
- Around 130 people including international volunteers were involved in our Boa Vista project work.
- The 2 leatherback turtles equipped with satellite transmitters on Simeulue in 2023 for research on their migratory routes provided valuable data in West Australia.
- 64 lost turtles were found and rescued on Boa Vista.
- 12 employees were trained as Ranger Trainers in Indonesia to pass on skills.
- 229 nests of leatherbacks were recorded in Indonesia.
- 750 products for sale made from plastic waste, such as turtle-shaped keyfobs and combs, were produced in the upcycling workshop Lixo Limpo on Boa Vista.

In Cape Verde – the main conservation location, Boa Vista island – 19,188 nests of loggerhead turtles were protected (2023: 10,539) – almost double the previous year. Also, more than double the number of lost animals compared to last year were found and returned safely to the sea. Poaching incidents were again in small numbers: 5 reported and with 6 turtles killed.

Our community engagement projects were further developed to support local people in collaborations which benefit them as well as helping to preserve the nearby marine habitat. Building on the successful swimming courses of previous years, which teach children basic swimming techniques and a deeper environmental awareness, we were once again able to offer two blocks of courses in 2024. A total of 43 children took part. We also helped renovate 10 local classrooms.

A British vet, Harrison Watler, was enlisted to support us in the project development of an information and rescue centre for sea turtles on Boa Vista as we currently have no means to treat injured animals which may have fallen into crevices or become disoriented due to light pollution from nearby hotels and in danger of dehydrating.

For the Indonesian region of Berau, our biggest task remains the protection of the nests on the islands of Bilang-Bilangan and Mataha. We were able to commission a new boat this year, which will be available in 2025 so that we can get to the islands at any time, even in unfavourable weather conditions.

In April 2024, a two-year project was launched to strengthen the human and organisational capacities of our partner NGO: Yayasan Penyu Indonesia. Funded by the Darwin Initiative, an international funding programme of DEFRA in the UK, YPI is to be supported in its development into a leading organisation for the protection of sea turtles in Indonesia. Fundraising collaborations continued with several commercial partners based in the UK including ethical clothing manufacturers and other entities who wanted to contribute a share of their profits to helping turtle conservation, subject to regular review.

Additionally, private cash donations from members of the UK public were received in increased numbers. TF-UK continued to increase its online presence and awareness is spreading via various online fundraising platforms - three-fifths of private donations came via Just Giving campaigns including one by 10 year old Ben Campbell raising over £2,400. He trained with his parents to take part in the famous 'Yorkshire Three Peaks Challenge' charity run - a 38.6 kilometre circuit with 1,585 metres of elevation gain over three peaks – having been inspired to raise money to help save turtles after he went snorkelling in Borneo. Other campaigns regularly raise 3-figure sums for TF-UK and some donors have set up monthly direct payments.

Besides conservation this project provided a fair income, accommodation and three meals a day for 10 local people. The funding employed and accommodated 8 rangers and 2 coordinators to conduct daily patrols from June-October 2023. The beach camp lasted 5 months with tents, cooking facilities, sustainable energy, supplies, vehicle running costs, and fieldwork items covered by this grant plus £2,000 from the British Chelonia Group.

£500 from the Marsh Trust together with £2,455 from private and corporate donations could be spent on our other Boa Vista activities such as our community engagement projects (detailed on p20-21 of our Annual Report 2023).

Our Indonesia projects have required a different approach to turtle conservation and as well as continued awareness-raising to deter the use of shell in jewellery we have begun new activities to attempt to deter through education and campaigning the practice of 'headstarting' or breeding turtles in captivity which does more harm than good and we aim to see it officially banned (see <https://www.turtle-foundation.org/en/program-indonesia/#headstarting>)

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

In the past fiscal year, Turtle Foundation increased the consolidated revenues of all seven sister organizations to 1,299,612 Euros, marking a growth of nearly 10% compared to the previous year. As part of this, TF-UK raised £14,955.

Here is a brief summary of the main achievements this year across our projects:

- 114 night-time missions were completed by the dog and drone team over a period of 130 days to deter poaching.
- 5,516 green sea turtles were protected on the islands of Bilang-Bilangan and Mataha.
- 865,200 hatchlings are estimated to have made their way to the sea with our help.
- 17 tons of garbage were removed from the beaches of Boa Vista.
- 60 men and women were employed as rangers on Boa Vista and in Indonesia.
- 2 leatherback turtles were equipped with satellite transmitter for research on their migratory routes on Simeulue.
- 12 people took part in training for seaweed farming in Banggai.
- 532 symbolic adoptions of endangered sea turtles were purchased.

In Cape Verde – the main conservation location, Boa Vista island – 10,539 nests of loggerhead turtles were protected. This is more than double the previous year. Also, 30 lost animals were found and returned safely to the sea. Poaching incidents were again in small numbers: 19 reported and of those just 2 in the areas we monitor – this is due to the intensive efforts of the drone and dog patrols.

Our community engagement projects were further developed to support local people in collaborations which benefit them as well as helping to preserve the nearby marine habitat. Swimming courses for children were again offered, female students from local establishments took part in a 'Women in Conservation' practical project and a new waste up-cycling project was planned via a workshop and research trip.

In Indonesia, TF projects managed from Bali were mainly to protect the rare leatherback turtles, olive ridley and green turtles. Our project in Banggai, Sulawesi, for the protection of the hawksbill turtle, hunted at sea for its beautiful shell, concluded as despite our efforts with local partners and the fishing community too few hawksbill turtles have been sighted to justify the project costs.

In Berau we renovated our ranger stations established in 2008, repairing technical equipment and conducted conservation work and data collection to established standards. In Sumatra we implemented various improvements in personnel structure and general infrastructure such as a ranger station on the uninhabited island of Selaut Besar.

Fundraising collaborations continued with various commercial partners based in the UK including ethical clothing manufacturers and other entities who wanted to contribute a share of their profits to helping turtle conservation, subject to regular review.

Additionally, private cash donations from members of the UK public were received in increased numbers. TF-UK is improving its online presence gradually and awareness is spreading via various online fundraising platforms, especially Just Giving.

Securing a grant for £8,000 from a previous grant-provider – double the amount of their 2021 contribution – was encouraging as it showed TF-UK had made a strong case for ensuring their funding would be spent wisely. This donation went towards building Canto Beach camp for the 2022 nesting season providing full-time accommodation and basic amenities for the international volunteers and scientific base.

We were able to buy equipment for the general running of the camp including solar panels, solar fridge and solar cooker to allow us to be both most sustainable and reduce our carbon footprint for this season and for the future. We also were able to purchase two new tents and kitchen equipment. These can be re-used for the 2023 season.

The grant also secured the 2022 season's salary for our Fieldwork Manager/Biologist responsible for data collection and analysis in our project. The funding also covered the purchase of data collection equipment including tablets, GPS devices, tags, headlamps and writing materials to ensure that we could evaluate our work and monitor the population in terms of biometric data collection, threats and pressures and population trends. We were able to switch to fully digital data collection for the first time this season.

We can measure our success in protecting the turtles from this camp by confirming that along the coastline patrolled by the rangers from Canto camp, ZERO turtles were poached, and 992 nests were recorded. 176 female turtles had biometric data recorded and 6 local rangers received a fair salary for their overnight patrols using drones and dogs during the nesting season.

The other grant of £10,000 together with public donations could be put towards our other existing project work in Cape Verde across 4 other camps and also in Indonesia where TF could begin a new project and restart an old one (see the Annual Report 2022 for full details).

Environmental education and the creation of environmentally compatible income opportunities for locals are also part of our activities. In Cape Verde this includes free swimming courses for children and tailoring workshops for women. In Indonesia environmental education events on Maratua island involved 716 local participants. We continued campaigning against the trade in turtleshell products with our local partner organisations.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Overall, taking all 7 Turtle Foundation non-profit organisations together internationally, 2022 saw the highest consolidated income raised since its creation in 2000. As a part of this, TF-UK raised over £2k more than in the previous year – totalling £19,810.

In Cape Verde – the main conservation location, Boa Vista island – 4,718 nests of loggerhead turtles were protected and 25 lost animals found and returned safely to the sea. Poaching reached a record low of just 10 cases – this is due to the intensive efforts of the drone and dog patrols.

In Indonesia, 4 TF projects were managed from Bali – mainly to protect the rare leatherback turtles, olive ridley and green turtles. In 2022 a new project began in Sulawesi for the protection of the hawksbill turtle. (Various figures and results are detailed in our 2022 Annual Report p.10-15)

Beach litter remains a constant problem hindering the nesting turtles and their free movement, necessitating regular clean-ups in collaboration with local groups. In total 5.8 tonnes of waste were collected in our projects on Boa Vista and Maratua but this is a global environmental issue.

With pandemic restrictions lifted the postponed 2020 meeting of all 7 TF global partner organisations could finally happen in Cape Verde. This week-long celebration was a chance for many volunteer Trustees, staff and current volunteers to meet their counterparts (for some in person for the first time), attend presentations, exchange ideas, see demonstrations of drone and dog patrols in action and of course observe nesting turtles in the protected areas. TF-UK attended for part of the week and no funds were used for this purpose.

Fundraising collaborations were explored with various commercial partners based in the UK including ethical clothing and jewellery manufacturers and other entities who wanted to contribute a share of their profits to helping turtle conservation were discussed and several contract agreements signed, subject to regular review.

Additionally, private cash donations from members of the UK public were received in increased numbers. TF has been established for over 20 years and it is presumed that most of these donors had become aware of the international charity and its project work via www.turtle-foundation.org but TF-UK is improving its presence gradually and awareness is spreading via various online fundraising platforms.





This period was the second year of operation during the unpredictable impact of the global Covid pandemic whereby various lockdowns and travel restrictions curtailed normal activities which might otherwise have raised funds and recruited project volunteers. Given that the bulk of global funding for TF is through conservation grants a concerted approach was made to targeted trusts and foundations based in the UK which would not previously have been possible to approach due to TF being based overseas. Securing three grants for specific projects helped achieve the following results:

Indonesia: on the remote island of Selaut Besar a total of 777 turtle nests were protected and 62,125 hatchlings were assisted. This consisted of leatherback, green and hawksbill species but also olive ridley turtles visited sporadically.

A ranger team of 9 locals could be trained, deployed and paid plus transport and camp equipment purchased as well as materials for data collection.

A hatchery was built and patrols made regularly to deter poachers. The success of this new project has resulted in the decision for it to continue.

Cape Verde: on Boa Vista island - the main TF project site - one grant paid for a hatchery on Lacacao beach (one of four camps).

Overall, a record total of 35,367 loggerhead nests were recorded and protected by TF by our local rangers assisted by patrol dogs and drones.

Additionally, funds contributed to long-term data collection of turtles at sea fitted with tracking devices, plus community engagement projects such as providing swimming courses for children and renovating a school. (see Annual Report p.20)

Fundraising - collaborations were explored with various commercial partners based in the UK including ethical clothing and jewellery manufacturers, eco-friendly straw manufacturers and other entities who wanted to contribute a share of their profits to helping turtle conservation were discussed and several contract agreements signed. It is intended to build on these annually.

The Objects of the CIO:

- 1) The purpose of the Foundation is the promotion of animal and species protection in general and the worldwide protection and conservation of turtles in particular.
- 2) The purpose of the statutes is achieved in particular by promoting measures with the aim of achieving them
 - (a) stop the commercial exploitation of turtles;
 - (b) by means of concrete projects through on-the-spot assistance, to prevent the largest possible number of turtle nests from plundering and adult animals from slaughter;
 - (c) governments and public authorities demonstrate the long-term environmental value of a healthy population of turtles;
 - (d) to draw the attention of a wide circle to the problem of commercial plunder of turtle nests;
 - (e) offer alternatives to those natives who until now have been dependent on the trade in turtles or their products;
 - (f) The purpose is also to raise funds for the promotion of animal welfare by other entues with similar objectives.

This list is not exhaustive.

If it appears appropriate to pursue its objectives, the Foundation may also initiate, conduct or promote research.

Additionally:

We are protecting sea turtles and their habitats (for instance, we protect nesting beaches through beach clean-ups).

We also do education and outreach campaigns to inform people about sea turtles and the global threats they are facing.

As the charity was only incorporated on 7/11/19 this Annual Report covers its first year of operation.

The first objective was to open a UK bank account into which funds can be deposited, although by the time this was done the global coronavirus pandemic had hit which affected every aspect of the charity's initial fundraising efforts as well as operational project aims by TF in Germany due to lockdowns and movement restrictions of volunteers.

This resulted in the first year's activities and fundraising being minimal - just four monetary donations which were deposited for eventual spending on international projects but simply being banked this year - reserved for eventual transfer into TF project funding - with zero spend.

But collaborations with various commercial partners based in the UK including ethical clothing and jewellery manufacturers, eco-friendly straw manufacturers and other entities who wanted to contribute a share of their profits to helping turtle conservation were discussed and a number of contract agreements signed. Additionally, a handful of donations from members of the UK public were received. TF has been established for 20 years and it is presumed that these donors had become aware of the international charity and its project work via www.turtle-foundation.org.




