Annual Trustees' Report 2024–2025

Reporting period: 1 April 2024 – 31 March 2025

About Us

Mansfield Wildlife Rescue operates under its constitution and is managed by appointed trustees who are responsible for the governance, strategic direction, and activities of the charity.

Our Mission

To care for injured, abandoned, and orphaned native wildlife across Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, South Yorkshire, and Lincolnshire. The charity focuses on rehabilitating animals and, where possible, releasing them back into the wild, supporting conservation, biodiversity, and animal welfare.

Wildlife Admissions and Rehabilitation

During the 2024–2025 reporting period, Mansfield Wildlife Rescue experienced a significant increase in demand for its services. Wildlife admissions increased by approximately 30% compared to the previous year.

Birds continued to make up the majority of admissions, alongside mammals and other native wildlife species. Despite increased caseloads and operational pressures, the charity maintained strong welfare outcomes.

Overall, approximately 75% of admissions were successfully rehabilitated and released back into the wild. Decisions for animals that could not be released were made based on welfare considerations and veterinary advice.

Facilities Expansion and Habitat Improvement

During the year, Mansfield Wildlife Rescue expanded its facilities, increasing capacity to care for a greater number and wider range of wildlife admissions.

Significant woodland management and improvement works were carried out on site. A pond was created which is now thriving with aquatic life and actively attracting wildlife into the woodland. These improvements have enhanced biodiversity and support both rehabilitation and conservation objectives.

Community Engagement, Education and Wellbeing

The charity continued to strengthen its role within the community throughout the year.

An increasing number of students from various colleges joined Mansfield Wildlife Rescue for work experience placements, gaining practical skills, confidence, and experience in wildlife care and conservation.

The charity also worked closely with disabled support services and mental health providers and has become a valued placement for both adults and children with health, mental health, and additional support needs. These placements provide meaningful engagement and wellbeing benefits while supporting the charity's activities.

Fundraising and Financial Sustainability

A major focus for the charity during the year was fundraising and increasing voluntary donations to support long-term sustainability.

The trustees are pleased to report that significant progress was made towards raising funds to enable the purchase of the land currently leased by Mansfield Wildlife Rescue. Through donations, fundraising activities, and community support, almost all of the funds required for the purchase were successfully raised.

At the time of writing this report, the charity was close to signing contracts and completing the purchase. Completion of the purchase and the associated financial impact will be reflected in the accounts and Trustees' Report for the following financial year.

Community Support

The charity continued to benefit from strong public and community support throughout the year. Donations, volunteer involvement, and local goodwill played a vital role in enabling Mansfield Wildlife Rescue to continue operating during a period of rising costs and increased demand.

The trustees wish to record their sincere thanks to all volunteers, donors, and supporters whose commitment and generosity make the charity's work possible.

Public Benefit Statement

The trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and activities.

Mansfield Wildlife Rescue provides public benefit through the rescue, rehabilitation, and release of injured and orphaned wildlife, contributing to conservation and biodiversity. The charity also benefits the wider public through education, volunteering, and supported placement opportunities that promote wellbeing, skills development, and responsible engagement with wildlife.

Future Plans and Fundraising Narrative

In the coming year, the trustees aim to build on the progress made during 2024–2025 by strengthening financial sustainability, expanding community engagement, and securing the long-term future of the charity.

Fundraising will remain a key priority to support core wildlife rescue activities, rising veterinary costs, and ongoing site development. The charity plans to engage with a wider range of community groups and organisations to increase awareness and support.

The trustees also intend to fully open and operate the onsite community café during the next financial year. This will provide a welcoming space for visitors and placement groups and generate an additional income stream to support charitable activities. Income and expenditure relating to the café will be reflected in the charity's next Annual Accounts and Trustees' Report.

Our Mission:

To care for injured, abandoned, and orphaned native wildlife across Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, South Yorkshire, and Lincolnshire. We focus on rehabilitating animals and releasing them back into the wild to promote conservation and biodiversity.

Key Achievements

Wildlife Admissions & Rehabilitation

- 20% increase in admissions compared to last year, reflecting greater trust in our services.
- Majority were birds, with a rise in mammals and other species.
- 80% of admissions were successfully rehabilitated and released.

- **New Car Park:** Improved accessibility for visitors and supporters.
- **Community Area:** A new hub for education, refreshments, and visitor engagement, generating vital funds.

Mansfield Wildlife Rescue Annual Trustee Report (2022-2023)

Mission Statement

Mansfield Wildlife Rescue, a charitable organisation situated in Mansfield Woodhouse, staunchly upholds its commitment to the welfare of indigenous wildlife. Our primary objective revolves around the provision of assistance to injured, abandoned, and orphaned wildlife, ensuring their safe reintegration into their natural habitats. Operating across Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, South Yorkshire, and Lincolnshire, our dedicated team manages a diverse spectrum of species, encompassing badgers, foxes, hedgehogs, birds of prey, and various other forms of wildlife. In addition to hands-on wildlife care, our organisation actively engages with the community, fostering collaboration with educational institutions, such as schools and colleges, as well as other groups to raise awareness and understanding of wildlife welfare.

Rescue Centre Update

The core activities of Mansfield Wildlife Rescue primarily involve the admission, care, and release of wildlife. In 2022/23, wildlife admissions, notably birds, experienced a decline attributable to the outbreak of Avian Influenza and associated restrictions imposed to curb its spread. Concurrently, larger mammal species were unable to be admitted due to ongoing efforts to prepare the new site with suitable enclosures. Consequently, our focus was directed towards the care of smaller mammals that could be accommodated within our existing facilities, particularly those in recovery and orphaned juveniles.

Regrettably, in May 2022, a severe house fire significantly impacted the founder of the charity, resulting in both personal and charity-related losses. These losses included the founder's cherished pets, household furniture, and essential items critical to the rehabilitation process, such as incubators, medical supplies, and cages. The fire occurred during the transition to the new rescue centre, causing delays in refurbishment and groundwork. However, despite the adversities faced, the community demonstrated exemplary support by contributing to the rebuilding of the founder's home and facilitating the preparations of the new site. The new site successfully opened to casualties in August 2022, marked by a Christmas Fair in December, and a significant achievement in securing a £10,000 grant from the Lottery Fund.

In terms of numerical statistics, total wildlife admissions for the year 2022/23 amounted to 670, representing a substantial 42% increase from the preceding year. This notable surge can partly be attributed to heightened publicity following the unfortunate fire incident and increased awareness surrounding the acquiring and refurbishment of our new premises. Of these admissions, 78% underwent comprehensive medical treatment, care, rehabilitation, and were subsequently successfully released.

Despite the encountered setbacks, the resolve of Mansfield Wildlife Rescue remains steadfast, bolstered by the unwavering support of the community. The organisation remains resolute in its pursuit of wildlife conservation and rehabilitation, looking ahead to further advancements and contributions in the coming year.

Report of the Trustees for year period 12th November 2021 to 11th November 2022.

Aims of the Charity

As stated in our governing document, Mansfield Wildlife Rescue is a charity based in Mansfield Woodhouse that provides help for injured, abandoned and orphaned **native wildlife** with the aim to return those in care back to their natural habitat. Some examples of the wildlife we look after are badgers, foxes, hedgehogs, birds of prey, swallows etc. The areas we cover are Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, South Yorkshire and Lincolnshire. We receive many admissions from members of the public, veterinary services, RSPCA and other wildlife charities.

We aim to provide education in the understanding and welfare of wildlife. To demonstrate how we care for wildlife in order that these skills can be passed on by working with members of the public, schools, colleges and other groups etc. **Note* Skills " Passed on are at the basic end and are not on areas that could pose risk to either the animal or person caring, particularly children..*

Are aim to move to a new site by the end of 2021 with more space in order for us to offer a wider range of wildlife care such as for larger animals, a volunteer and placement facility for colleges and to be a community hub was successful, **see below under move to new site.**

Activities

- **Wildlife admission, care and release** - Wildlife admissions have been lower than expected this year due to a number of factors- COVID 19 and lock downs, Avian Flu outbreak and the work preparing the new site. The Avian Flu outbreak meant many bird admissions had to be refused, despite this before the outbreak we had a great range of native and migratory birds. Admissions for 2021 were 495 compared with 471 for 2020, a small increase of around 5%. We have had a huge number of hedgehog admissions again due to the very bad weather. 87% of the admissions have been treated/fed and released. *(Note these figures are of March 2020 year ending and March 2021 year ending).*

- **Types of Wildlife-** Mansfield Wildlife Rescue cares for all types of native UK wildlife and the very occasional exotics such as parrots. Some examples of the wildlife we look after are badgers, foxes, hedgehogs, birds of prey, swallows etc. Domesticated animals such as cats and dogs are not admitted but members of the public are helped and advised as to the best place for their care. Additionally farm animals such as horses, cows, pigs etc. are not cared for and members of the public are also advised and referred to the best areas for their care.
- **Fund raising** - As for all charities, in these challenging COVID 19 times, it has been more difficult accepting wildlife from members of the public and also it has been difficult to raise funds, as one of our normal fundraising activities is at group wildlife events, which were no longer possible. We have a range of fund raising activities such as regular donations, lottery, raffles etc. However, in recent months, we have moved to more on-line fund raising activities, for example, appeals. We have received great support from donations from many members the public, local councillors and our local community for which we are grateful.
- **Move to New Site** - In December 2021 we finally agreed with Mansfield District Council to take over the previous Nursery - Northfield Warehouse, Shire Road, Pleasley Vale , NG19 8FJ. The first phase was a pre-lease agreement requiring a great deal of work from the charity to pass the sites electric, water, sewage system, loft insulation, wiring repair, window and door repairs etc. and hence obtain an EPC. Having passed the pre-agreement conditions, Mansfield Wildlife Rescue was awarded a 10 year lease on 14th April 2022 We are grateful to the council and in particular to the local Mayor Andy Abrahams, for allowing us the opportunity to apply for the site.

How we have spent this year's money- As in our statement of accounts for 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2022 which stands at year end £11,364.47 , all our costs normally centre around care and treatment of wildlife, for example medical equipment, food and bedding, vets bills etc. However this year costs include charges relating to the move to the new site which include solicitor bills for our council planning application, and also for building repairs to comply with our Pre-Lease agreement - the cost of these items was £5,849.60.

To demonstrate how we care for wildlife in order that these skills can be passed on by working with members of the public, schools, colleges and other groups etc. **Note* Skills " Passed on are at the basic end and are not on areas that could pose risk to either the animal or person caring, particularly children..*

We also aim to move to a new site by the end of 2021 with more space in order for us to offer a wider range of wildlife care such as for larger animals (**refer to types of Wildlife under Activities**) , improved education, and larger volunteer services etc.

Activities

- **Wildlife admission, care and release** - Wildlife admissions, due to COVID 19 and lock downs, have greatly decreased this year. Admissions for 2020 were 471 compared with 632 for 2019, a drop of around 25%. We have had a huge number of hedgehog admissions due to the very bad weather, and a great range of native and migratory birds. 88% of the admissions have been treated/fed and released. *(Note these figures are of March 2019 year ending and March 2020 year ending).*
- **Types of Wildlife-** Mansfield Wildlife Rescue cares for all types of native UK wildlife and the very occasional exotics such as parrots. Some examples of the wildlife we look after are badgers, foxes, hedgehogs, birds of prey, swallows etc. Domesticated animals such as

cats and dogs are not admitted but members of the public are helped and advised as to the best place for their care. Additionally farm animals such as horses, cows, pigs etc are not cared for and members of the public are also advised and referred to the best areas for their care.

- **Fund raising** - As for all charities, in these difficult COVID 19 times, it has been more difficult accepting wildlife from members of the public and also it has been difficult to raise funds, as one of our normal fundraising activities is at group wildlife events, which were no longer possible. We have a range of fund raising activities such as regular donations, lottery, raffles etc. However, in recent months, we have moved to more on-line fund raising activities, for example, appeals. We have received great support from donations from many members the public, local councillors and our local community for which we are grateful.
- **Council Grant** - We are grateful to Mansfield District Council who have provided us with a start-up grant to help with the move and opening of the new site.
- **New Site** - Much of the trustees time has been spent working with Mansfield District Council to expedite the move to the new site, hopefully by Winter 2021. This move is driven by the huge demand for wildlife care and the ability to expand to offer a wider range of services as stated in our aims. Wildlife admissions grew by more than 227% over the past 4 years (figures are as of March 2020).
- We are grateful to the council and in particular to the local Mayor Andy Abrahams, for allowing us the opportunity to apply for the site.
- **Gift Aid** - Mansfield Wildlife Rescue applied for Gift Aid in September 2020. This was granted on 24/9/20.

How we have spent this years money- As in our statement of accounts for April 2020 to March 2021 which stands at year end £5,271.20 , all our costs centre around care and treatment of wildlife, for example medical equipment, food and bedding, vets bills etc. However this year costs include charges relating to the move to the new site which include architects bills for our council planning application, and also for a structural survey and solicitor fees.
