Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The period has seen that our group weekly events have been well attended, with approximately 15-20 members attending each 2-hour event, each member on average filling 2 bags of rubbish along with collecting various items of fly tipping. During the current year 52 members have attended these events. Our total membership has grown to 140 however 24 of these have been non-active.

The idea of small groups and individuals taking responsibility for their own areas has continued and there are around 59 members involved in organising themselves to keep their locality under control. This has enabled weekly event teams to spread wider and focus on areas not previously covered.

The core activities continue to be clearance of litter, reporting fly tipping, cutting back and clearing vegetation and working in woodland to improve the appearance and feeling of unspoilt nature while ensuring pathways are kept accessible and safe for the public to use.

This year we have assisted in cutting-back and clearing vegetation in historic 'St,Leonards Gardens' in conjunction with Hastings Borough Council's Parks department. This may be an ongoing project.

A continued good relationship with our local Council exists. We are often praised in Council documents and removal of collected rubbish is normally within a day of being reported, quite often the same day.

We continued to be involved with Council initiatives such as the Safer Streets partnership and work with third parties such as housing associations. We are still able to rent a housing association garage for safe storage of our tools and equipment.

The membership continues to grow thanks to our visibility in many areas. Our Social Media sites such as 'Facebook' also have attracted more than 1200 online members. More of our members are posting on them all of which raises our profile and aims further.

We encourage our members to report online directly with the council in the reporting of fly-tipping.

The efforts of the Trustees to raise funds from grants and donations from various sources has enabled us to still be financially self-sufficient even in these testing times.

This has enabled us not only to purchase the necessary equipment for our volunteers to carry-out their tasks safely but also to provide continued training in first aid, dealing with sharps (needles) and the safe use of power tools for some of our members.

Maintaining good relationships with local supermarkets has also helped with publicity and funding

This year we provided our services, clearing up at local events organised by :

Hastings Pride, Hastings Roundtable and Hastings Hidden Beach.

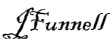

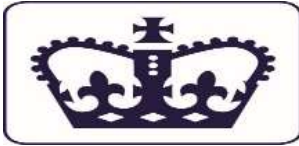

We are often praised in Council documents and removal of collected rubbish is normally within a day of being reported, quite often the same day. We continued to be involved with Council initiatives such as the Safer Streets partnership and work with other third parties such as housing associations. This has enabled us to rent a local garage for storage of tools and equipment.

The membership continues to grow thanks to our visibility in many areas. Our social media sites also have more online members than ever before and more of our members are posting on them, raising our profile even further.

We encourage our members to report online directly with the council in the reporting of fly-tipping.

The efforts of the Trustees to raise funds from grants and donations from various sources has enabled us to still be financially self-sufficient, even in these testing times.

This has enabled us not only to purchase equipment and other essential items but also to provide continued training in first aid, dealing with sharps and use of power tools for some of our members.

Maintaining good relationships with local supermarkets has also helped with publicity and funding.

This period has seen the lifting of the Covid 19 restrictions which enabled weekly events to start up again. The weekly events have been well attended with approximately 18-20 members attending each 2 hour event and each member usually filling 2-3 bags of rubbish along as collecting various items of fly tipping.

The idea of small groups and individuals taking responsibility for their own areas has continued and there are around 36 members involved in organising themselves to keep their locality under control. This has enabled weekly event teams to spread wider and focus on areas not previously covered.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

This period has seen a lot of our event driven activities reduced due to the restrictions of Covid 19. Organised events were not possible in line with national guidelines for a good proportion of the time.

However where members have been allowed to legally venture out they have been working individually or with family members within their bubble to keep their immediate vicinity clean. This way of working has been extended to try and establish small groups of local members across the whole region. The idea being that members can organise themselves and go out in their allocated area on days and at times that suits the members.

As a result of setting this up we now have about 24 individuals or small groups taking responsibility for numerous areas across St Leonards with approximately half the membership taking part.

When allowed organised events have continued to be held on a weekly basis focussing on the areas not covered by the individuals or small groups. Trustees and members have continued to pick litter, tidy streets, report fly tipping, cut back and clear vegetation and tidy and improve woodland. Weekly events continue to attract about 20 members and Trustees each time.

The good relationship with the local Council means reported bags of rubbish and fly tipping is normally removed from the streets within 24 hours.

A close working relationship with the local Council has also meant getting involved in other Council led initiatives such as the Safer Streets partnership working with other charities, local police etc. to make the area safer.

The charity has continued to grow and membership is now at an all time high. The charity has continued to raise it's profile and publicise it's activities through various social media.

The trustees have continued to source funding through various grants and donations to enable the charity to be self-sufficient and to enable new and replacement equipment and other essential items to be purchased.
