Our Aims and Objectives

The mission and objectives of Kingdom Come Temple continue to be grounded in our Articles of Association, with a commitment to advancing the Christian faith and the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is carried out through biblical teaching, evangelism, worship, discipleship, and practical demonstrations of God's love.

Our charitable purposes include supporting individuals and communities in poverty or hardship through education, healthcare initiatives, training, and development projects that promote sustainability and empowerment.

Each year, the trustees prayerfully review our goals to ensure alignment with Scripture, the leading of the Holy Spirit, and the needs of our community.

Kingdom Come Temple, founded on **15 March 2018**, continues to flourish as a family-oriented, Spirit-led ministry focused on building a loving, multicultural Christian community. We uphold the full counsel of Scripture and place great emphasis on prayer, worship, teaching, and practical outreach.

Annual Events and Highlights

1. Carols Night (December 2024)

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (as applied to small entities by section 1A of the standard).

Turnover

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discounts and value added taxes. Turnover includes revenue earned from the sale of goods and from the rendering of services. Turnover from the sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have transferred to the buyer. Turnover from the rendering of services is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract. The stage of completion of a contract is measured by comparing the costs incurred for work performed to date to the total estimated contract costs.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulative depreciation and any accumulative impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Our Aims and Objectives

Our Charity's goals and objectives set out in the Church's Article of Association are the advancement of the Christian Religion mainly, but not exclusively, by means of declaring and spreading the Christian message in an evangelistic and teaching nature and method. The efforts to alleviate or address areas of poverty in places of financial hardship, especially in third world countries by providing and assisting in the provision of education, training, healthcare projects and all the necessary support put in place to enable individuals to generate a sustainable income and be self-sufficient. Our goals, objectives and activities are reviewed each year.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

Kingdom Come Temple, established on March 15, 2018, is a family-centered, community-oriented church dedicated to building a supportive and spiritually enriching environment for people of all ages and backgrounds. Our foundation is firmly rooted in a belief in the entirety of the Bible, and our congregation reflects the rich diversity of God's creation, bringing together individuals from various cultures, traditions, and age groups. Together, we worship in unity and joy, celebrating our faith and uplifting each other as we serve God wholeheartedly.

Driven by love, we are committed to actively spreading God's message through both word and deed. We extend friendship and support to our local community, focusing on outreach that tangibly demonstrates our faith. This includes educational support, healthcare assistance, and training opportunities, all geared toward helping individuals achieve self-sufficiency and a higher quality of life. As a charity, we prioritize transparency and compliance, operating within the guidelines of the Company Acts 1985 to ensure our goals remain focused and our resources well-managed. Most of our funding comes from generous donations, which allow us to support our ministries and charitable projects.

Our primary church services are held every Sunday morning, fostering a consistent space for congregational worship. To further support our members' spiritual growth, we hold weekly prayer meetings on Monday and Friday evenings, as well as Bible study sessions each Wednesday. These gatherings take place on Zoom, making participation accessible for all members.

From November 2023 to the present month of November 2024, we have continued our tradition of hosting meaningful events and community activities. The details of these events, which reflect our dedication to service and spiritual enrichment, will be elaborated upon in the sections that follow.

Annual Events and Highlights

1. Christmas Party (December 2023)

The church celebrated its annual Christmas party with a traditional meal catered by local vendors. The event began with a transparent presentation of the church's finances and future, fostering trust within the congregation. Festivities included live music, community performances, and a three-course feast that brought members together in gratitude, joy, and unity, celebrating the season and the church's ongoing mission. The church was able to discuss its yearly income and expenditures with its members for everyone to understand how the churches finances are utilised.

2. New Year's Crossover Service (December 31, 2023)

The crossover service was a deeply spiritual gathering where congregants prayed for the United Kingdom, their families, and upcoming challenges. Held in a reverent, candlelit setting, the event included collective worship, special prayers, and moments of reflection. The service concluded with blessings for the year, encouraging members to approach 2024 with faith, purpose, and the assurance of divine guidance.

3. Workers Workshop (January 2024)

The church hosted a Workers' Workshop, creating a collaborative environment where church leaders and volunteers could come together to discuss challenges and share ideas for improvement. The workshop aimed to provide a space where workers felt comfortable voicing their concerns, exploring the difficulties they face, and discussing the resources or support they need to serve more effectively. Leaders encouraged open dialogue to better understand the day-to-day experiences of those who dedicate their time to the church's mission. Together, they brainstormed practical solutions, focusing on fostering a stronger, more efficient team dynamic. By prioritizing communication and empathy, the workshop reinforced the church's commitment to valuing each worker's contribution, recognizing that a united and well-supported team is essential to achieving the church's goals and positively impacting the community.

4. Couples' Workshop (February 2024)

The "Couples Afternoon Tea" event offered couples an afternoon focused on building strong, enduring relationships. Experienced couples shared insights on managing challenges, while the Senior Pastor highlighted biblical teachings on unity. A lively Q&A allowed attendees to explore relationship concerns, creating a supportive space that fostered renewed commitment and appreciation for marriage as a divine institution.

5. Mother's Day Celebration (March 2024)

Mother's Day was an occasion to celebrate the strength and dedication of mothers within the church. The event included speeches, musical tributes, and heartfelt tokens of appreciation presented to mothers, expressing gratitude for their sacrifices and contributions. Children and youth participated with performances, adding a personal and touching aspect to the celebration, which emphasized the irreplaceable role of mothers in family and faith.

6. 6th Year Anniversary and Easter Celebration (March 29–31, 2024)

To mark the church's sixth anniversary, a three-day celebration coinciding with Easter was held. Activities included worship services, a charity outreach to local homeless shelters, and a donation to Step Together, a charity aiding adults with disabilities. The celebration featured an international guest speaker and a volunteer appreciation segment, underscoring the commitment of Kingdom Come Temple to community service and spiritual growth.

7. Thanksgiving Service (April 28, 2024)

At the Thanksgiving Service, members shared testimonials of faith, recounting divine interventions in their lives, families, and careers. This event emphasized gratitude and the power of faith amidst life's challenges. Personal stories inspired hope in congregants awaiting their own breakthroughs, reinforcing a communal spirit of shared blessings and the profound impact of gratitude.

8. Father's Day Celebration (June 2024)

Father's Day honoured fathers' roles as spiritual and familial leaders within the church community. The day featured tributes from family members, special performances, and words of appreciation from church leaders, emphasizing the guidance and strength fathers bring to the congregation. Activities fostered fellowship among men, strengthening bonds and recognizing fatherhood's influence on the faith and wellbeing of families.

9. Annual Picnic and Community Day (August 2024)

The annual picnic encouraged fellowship, welcoming community members and families to share food, games, and music in a relaxed outdoor setting. Partnering with local businesses, the church organized activities for all ages, including sports games, a bouncy castle, and a shared meal. The picnic strengthened the church's connection with the local community, embodying its mission to spread love and unity beyond church walls.

10. International Day (August 2024)

International Day showcased the church's cultural diversity, with congregants wearing traditional attire and sharing dishes from their homelands. Members from various backgrounds presented music, dances, and traditions, creating a vibrant celebration of unity in diversity. In compliance with the Company Acts 1985 we aim to attain the goals and objectives by providing educational assistance in training, healthcare projects and all manner of support designed to enable individuals. The majority of its fundings is received by donations.

The church was able to continue in its functionality as normal from November 2020 as previously, services were affected by COVID-19. As the church adhered to government guidelines it broadcasted its services online through YouTube and Facebook. Pastors and leaders made themselves available to counselling members over the telephone. The church continued with its aim and objective of serving its community after returning back to complete normality and adhering to government guidelines which included providing details for the track and trace for our weekly services which continued until February 2021. All workers in the church who serve the community have taken the double vaccination to protect themselves and the community they serve.

Various activities have been conducted at the church since its return to normality such as its Sunday service, bible study, prayer meetings, workshop for workers, leaders meeting, youth meeting, Sunday school, water baptism, Picnic in the Park, and international day.

Chruch Anniversary

The Church leaders have agreed to postpone anniversary celebration to April 2023 where the church would be Celebrating 5 years and will continue thereafter to celebrate anniversary in numerical years such as 10 years and 25 years, and so on.

Workshop for Workers

The church organised an early morning breakfast buffet for all workers of the church and treated it as a workshop, where the senior pastor addressed certain ways workers can serve the community better, opportunities were given to all workers to share their opinions and concerns. Some of these opinions and concerns were addressed at the workshop and some were taken back to the church leadership to be reflected on.

Youth Meeting

Opinions raised at the workers meeting included a separate fellowship for youth who graduate from Sunday school at the age of 12. The church leadership had prayed and found this to be an effective fellowship for youths to be part of after graduating till the age of 21, after which they would graduate into the main Sunday service. This graduation process will help the youth through different process of understanding the word of God from their age perspective before maturing into the main service of the church, which some youth felt distanced from.

Sunday School

Another concern that bought a change to the way the Sunday school operated was also raised as a concern during the workers meeting and this is where children were separated from youths and the church agreed that the Sunday school age would cater from 5 to 12 years before the student would graduate to the Youth Meeting.

Water Baptism

The church organised its second water baptism since its inception and hired services from Cippenham Baptist church in slough. The baptism service was offered to everyone who had not been baptised these included youths and adult who were looking to re-dedicate themselves including converts to the faith.

International Day

The church is diversified with members from different parts of the world and agreed to celebrate that through organising a service dedicated to its multi-cultural diversity. The event was colourful as members from different parts of the world dressed in their cultural outfits and shared food of that culture after service. The success of this diversified event made the church to celebrate this on an annual basis.

Leaders Meeting

Church leaders continue to meet on a monthly basis, at times even for a short period to reflect on monthly services and the progress of the church in fulfilling its aims and objectives. This meeting helps the church stay on its path and also plan for the month ahead.

Sunday Services

The Sunday service since its return to normality has seen itself to grow in numbers. The church has continued to broadcast its services LIVE on YouTube to cater for members who feel comfortable being part of the service from the comfort of their homes. The services are informative not just with teachings from the Holy Bible but also community events taking place.

Bible Study

The church has continued to invest in facilities provided by GoTo Meetings as a virtual place for its members to join every week on a Wednesday from 8pm to 9pm. The bible study continues to teach on subjects which are addressed on a broader scale over various weeks and subjects change as per completion of modules.

Prayer Meetings

The church uses its virtual service by GoTo Meetings for its weekly prayer service on Monday and Fridays which take place between the hours of 8pm to 9pm. The end of month or last Friday of every month prayer meeting has also returned to its normality since July 2022, this service is held at the community hall where members spend time in prayer collectively.
