## TRUSTEES' REPORT

### **FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2025**

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The trustees present their Annual Report and the Financial Statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2025.

#### **1 Constitution**

The charity was formed by its Trust Deed dated 4 December 2019 (registered charity no 1187144).

#### **2 Objectives**

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of poverty and to advance the Christian faith for the public benefit:

- The support, mentoring and training of leaders of Christian churches and NGOs in the Middle East, North Africa and Central Asia
- Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members
- Developing printed and online training materials
- Making grants to churches and NGOs sharing these charitable purposes
- Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas
- Training teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations

#### **3 Governance and organisational structure**

The trustees met five times during the period. They have continued to monitor the impact of the conflict across the region where the charity is operating. There has been no immediate threat to the work of the charity, staff or volunteers. The negotiated ceasefire between Israel and Hamas at the start of the year, whilst fragile and not always observed, has contributed to a sense of less instability in the region.

Throughout the year the trustees have been in regular contact with the employee and volunteers, being proactive in supporting them and contributing to their well being.

The trustees are responsible for recruiting new trustees and to ensure they receive training and have appropriate knowledge and experience for good governance and for delivery of the charity objectives.

#### **4 Review of activities**

##### *Leadership Training and Mentoring*

This has continued mainly through individual coaching in person or online for ministry team leaders in the Middle East, Turkey and Central Asia. The following subjects were covered; personal development, multi-cultural team dynamics, contextualising theology, developing leaders and conflict resolution.

The Charity's employee was seconded voluntarily to a project reviewing the 'Crisis and Risk Policy and Procedures' for a sister charity, Catalyst. The review took place over several weeks and included consultation with overseas ex-pat ministry workers, sending churches and their trustees. This resulted in comprehensive Policy and Procedure documents that will enable the better care of overseas workers and better equipped supporting church trustees.

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**4 Review of activities (continued)**

The charity also had additional volunteer workers visit to train and encourage the other local team members. This development proved particularly exciting as one family has decided to remain in that country longer term.

*Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members*

The charity was involved in two leadership conferences during the period. These were both new initiatives, organised by other organisations. Noor was invited to provide management and coaching for the conference organisers. One event took place in Cyprus, where an informal network of 60 international leaders gathered to discuss and identify fruitful practices in leadership development and disciple making. The second event was hosted in Istanbul and gathered 50 leaders from the UK and the Middle East region. The event focussed on strengthening existing relationships and how ministries in the region can be supported to enable greater effectiveness.

*Leadership Training and Coaching Project in the region.*

The training project was funded by a grant from the Jerusalem Trust.

The Training was delivered in the following ways:

1. Five x 90-minute sessions delivered to the ministry staff team of 40 people. These covered a range of topics including:

- o Role of the Holy Spirit in ministry
- o Centrality of the church in God's plan
- o Maintaining unity whilst living with different visions
- o The importance of accountability in ministry
- o Ministry as a family endeavour, not just a series of tasks

2. Seven sessions of varying length have been held with the senior leader to try to ensure the sustainability of the ministry. These sessions focussed on leadership development, how to build sustainability into the ministry and the need to restructure some aspects of leadership. Areas covered in these sessions include:

- o Usage of job descriptions and appraisals to monitor performance
- o How to document processes and procedures for each main ministry areas
- o The importance of developing other senior leaders to share the load
- o A review and recommendations on improving the ministry reporting system

3. Several review sessions were also held with one of the ministry areas, a Christian Bookshop, which has proven a fruitful ministry space. The aim of the review was help this specific ministry move towards a replicable model by documenting procedures and processes and identifying the areas new personnel will need training in.

*Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas*

Noor was invited to contribute to a new church ministry training program that started in the 2025. The program is based in the UK but participants from other countries join online. Our personnel will continue to contribute especially on the importance of cultural understanding, communicating across cultures and team building in a multi-cultural context.

No grants have been made to churches and NGOs during this period.

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**4 Review of activities (continued)***Public benefit*

Many of the church leaders and ministry team leaders receiving coaching and training are living and working in communities with significant economic challenges including working alongside refugees. These contexts present specific challenges which require ongoing coaching and learning. Also, living in these contexts impacts the people living there in personal ways and providing pastoral care and support to enable people to develop a sustainable lifestyle continues to be a priority for Noor.

The trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

*Personnel changes and impact on charitable activity*

To this point the charity has been served by a single employee based in Cairo, Egypt. In September 2025, this individual resigned their post and returned to the UK. In light of this decision, the trustees have decided to work more closely with a long-term partner, the Catalyst Network of churches, over the coming year and to continue the delivery of its charitable goals with trusted and experienced volunteers rather than a single staff member. The charity continues to support training and ministry delivery across its focussed region and has seen the strengthening of the volunteer team in Cairo.

**5 Financial review**

Total cash receipts during the year were £38,765 (2024: £83,102) and total payments were £79,921 (2024: £62,906). Total cash funds held at 31 December 2025 amounted to £44,498 (2024: £85,654) of which of £44,248 were unrestricted cash funds (2024: £67,327).

The trustees are continuing to monitor the financial support base for the charity.

**6 Reserves**

The trustees have agreed to hold reserves of three months operating costs for future years. The unrestricted cash funds held at the year end exceeded this amount.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT

### *FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024*

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The Trustees present their Annual Report and the Financial Statements of the Trust for the year ended 31 December 2024.

#### **1 Constitution**

The Trust was formed by its Trust Deed dated 4 December 2019. The activities of the Trust were originally carried out within Churchcentral Trust (registered charity no 1118562) as a separate restricted fund. In March 2021 the assets of this fund were transferred to Noor International Trust and the activities have since been carried out by Noor.

#### **2 Objectives**

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of poverty and to advance the Christian faith for the public benefit:

- The support, mentoring and training of leaders of Christian churches and NGOs in the Middle East, North Africa and Central Asia
- Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members
- Developing printed and online training materials
- Making grants to churches and NGOs sharing these charitable purposes
- Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas
- Training teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations

#### **3 Governance and organisational structure**

The trustees met four times during the period. Following the review of policies in 2023, the Trustees approved several new policies improving the governance and operation of the charity.

The trustees maintained regular contact with the employees and volunteers to help ensure delivery of the charities aims and to monitor their personal growth and development. The employee and volunteer based in the Middle East continue to learn Arabic. They invest time in cultural learning through meetings and discussion with local people and like minded NGOs. The trustees continue to support the employees and volunteers and monitor their well being.

Throughout 2024 the trustees continued to assess the impact of conflicts in the region where the charity is operating. Whilst several countries are affected there is no direct threat to the work of the charity or its staff and volunteers.

The trustees are responsible for recruiting new trustees and to ensure they receive training and have appropriate knowledge and experience for good governance and for delivery of the charity objectives.

There were no serious incidents reported to the Trustees.

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**4 Review of activities***Leadership Training and Mentoring*

Approximately 140 church leaders and ministry team leaders in the Middle East, Turkey, Central Asia and the Horn of Africa have received mentoring or training with online coaching sessions or in person.

The coaching and training has included, personal development, conflict resolution, leadership skills, multi-cultural team dynamics and contextualising theology.

*Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members*

Whilst the charity did not directly organise conferences, Noor was involved in planning and participating in three leadership conferences during the period building on the success of the events in 2023. The Pakistan conference gathered local church leaders, their teams and trainees, a total of 50 people. The sessions focused on theological training and leadership skills. Visits were also made to several of the churches enabling us to assess the leaders in the local setting and health and vitality of the church community.

Two further conferences for Christian believers from the Horn of Africa were organised. These events have taken place annually for several years and we have been able to assess the effectiveness of the training and enable an increase of the contribution of the attendees to the program of seminars. In total over 60 different people attended these events.

The charity has been invited to contribute to a new church ministry training program starting in 2025. The program is based in the UK but participants from other countries can join online. Our personnel have contributed to the planning stage in 2024 and will continue to contribute especially on the importance of cultural understanding, communicating across cultures and team building in a multi-cultural context.

No grants have been made to churches and NGOs during this period.

*Training Teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations*

As stated above, approximately 140 people, members of ministry teams and church leaders in Central Asia, Egypt, the Middle East and the Horn of Africa have received coaching and training and the majority of them are involved with projects in their communities providing education, medical care, children and youth programs in economically poorer areas and refugee support.

**5 Public benefit**

Many of the church leaders and ministry team leaders receiving coaching and training are living and working in communities with significant economic challenges including working alongside refugees. These contexts present specific challenges which require ongoing coaching and learning. Also, living in these contexts impacts the people living there in personal ways and providing pastoral care and support to enable people to develop a sustainable lifestyle continues to be a priority for Noor.

The personal support Noor provided to ex-pat ministry individuals who have been impacted by the conflict in the region continued.

A new project this year is helping a large indigenous organisation restructure for longer term sustainability. The organisation is providing many social care programs including refugee support and medical clinics in many communities in the nation in which they are based.

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**5 Public benefit (Cont'd)**

The Charity's employee continues to live in the region and benefits from interacting and learning from other NGO workers and local ministry leaders

**6 Financial review**

Total cash receipts during the year were £83,102 (2023: £87,877) and total payments were £62,905 (2023: £81,238) resulting in an overall surplus of £20,196 (2023: surplus of £6,639).

Cash funds held at 31 December 2024 amounted to £85,654 (2023: £65,457).

The trustees are continuing to monitor the financial support base for the charity and develop strategies to increase the income.

**7 Risk management**

The Trust has considered the risks it may face and confirm that systems have been established to mitigate them.

**8 Reserves**

The Trustees have agreed to hold reserves of three months operating costs for future years. The unrestricted reserves held at the year end exceed this amount.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their Annual Report and the Financial Statements of the Trust for the year ended 31 December 2023.

#### **1 Constitution**

The Trust was formed by its Trust Deed dated 4 December 2019. The activities of the Trust were originally carried out within Churchcentral Trust (registered charity no 1118562) as a separate restricted fund. In March 2021 the assets of this fund were transferred to Noor International Trust and the activities have since been carried out by Noor.

#### **2 Objectives**

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of poverty and to advance the Christian faith for the public benefit:

- The support, mentoring and training of leaders of Christian churches and NGOs in the Middle East, North Africa and Central Asia
- Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members
- Developing printed and online training materials
- Making grants to churches and NGOs sharing these charitable purposes
- Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas
- Training teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations

#### **3 Governance and organisational structure**

The trustees met five times during the period. Following the appointment of the new chair and three new trustees in 2022, during 2023 a review of the charity vision, mission and strategy was undertaken and completed in April 2023. A review of policies and procedures is in progress and essential policies for staff and safeguarding are now in place.

A Special Meeting took place in December 2023 to update the Trust Deed concerning the requirement to meet physically in one location at least once per year. This stipulation was removed, and the Charity Commission informed.

The trustees have continued to monitor the impact of the conflict in the region where the charity is operating and the subsequent increased instability. Currently there is not a threat to the work of the charity or its staff and volunteers.

Throughout the year the trustees have been in regular contact with the employees and volunteers, being proactive in supporting them and contributing to their well-being.

Trustees have reviewed the charity management accounts at regular intervals through the year and emphasised the maintained priority of fundraising via different channels in the coming 12 months.

The trustees are responsible for recruiting new trustees and to ensure they receive training and have appropriate knowledge and experience for good governance and for delivery of the charity objectives. There were no serious incidents reported to the Trustees.

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**4 Review of activities***Leadership Training and Mentoring*

Church leaders and ministry team leaders in the Middle East, Turkey and Central Asia have continued to be mentored through online zoom coaching sessions or in person.

Topics have included, personal development, multi-cultural team dynamics, contextualising theology and conflict resolution.

*Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members*

The charity was involved in three leadership conferences during the period building on the success of the events in 2022. The Pakistan conference gathered local church leaders, their teams and trainees, a total of 50 people. The sessions focussed on theological training and leadership skills. Visits were also made to several of the churches so we were able to assess the leaders in the local setting and health and vitality of the church community.

Two further conferences for Christian believers from the Horn of Africa were organised. These events have taken place annually for several years and we have been able to assess the effectiveness of the training and enable an increase of the attendees contribution to the program of seminars. In total over 50 different people attended these events.

A smaller 'leadership forum' was convened for 3 days attended by leaders working in several different cultural settings. The aim was to facilitate mutual learning from one another about good practice in training and developing local Christian leaders and the skills needed to overcome specific challenges in those settings.

*Developing printed and online training material*

This was predominantly the activity of the 'Unreached' training initiative. For both governance and operational reasons, the work of 'Unreached' was moved to become part of another charity in September 2023 and all related funds were transferred.

The coaching of leaders in the region, undertaken by Noor, does result in the production of theological and cross-cultural resources used in the context the leaders are working in.

*No grants have been made to churches and NGOs during this period.*

*Training Teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations*

Ministry teams and church leaders in Turkey, Central Asia, Egypt, and the Middle East have received training, personal coaching and pastoral support throughout the year. This has been delivered through online coaching sessions, meetings in person and conferences.

**5 Public benefit**

The trustees have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Trust Commission and believe that the objectives and activities of the Trust are for the public benefit.

Many of the church leaders and ministry team leaders receiving coaching and training are living and working in communities with significant economic challenges including working alongside refugees. These contexts present specific challenges which require ongoing coaching and learning. Also, living in these contexts impacts the people living there in personal ways and providing pastoral care and support to enable people to develop a sustainable lifestyle continues to be a priority for Noor.

Significant personal support as been given to ex-pat ministry individuals who have been impacted by the conflict in the region, helping them process the impact of the conflict on their activity and make important decisions.

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**5 Public benefit (cont'd)**

The Charity's employee continues to live in the region and benefits from interacting and learning from other NGO workers and local ministry leaders.

**6 Financial review**

Total cash receipts during the year were £87,877 (2022: £63,846) and total payments were £81,238 (2022: £66,180) resulting in an overall surplus of £6,639 (2022: deficit of £2,334).

Cash funds held at 31 December 2023 amounted to £65,457 (2022: £58,818).

**7 Risk management**

The Trust has considered the risks it may face and confirm that systems have been established to mitigate them.

**8 Reserves**

The Trustees have agreed to hold reserves of three months operating costs for future years. The unrestricted reserves held at the year end exceed this amount.

**9 Future developments**

The trustees have agreed that during 2024 additional time will be given to raising the profile of Noor with the purpose of broadening the donor base and also strengthening existing donor relationships.

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**4 Review of activities**

The charity objectives have been met through the following activities:

***Leadership Training and Mentoring***

Church leaders and ministry team leaders in the Middle East, Turkey and Central Asia have continued to be mentored through online zoom coaching sessions or in person. Topics have included, personal development, multi-cultural team dynamics, contextualising theology and conflict resolution.

Throughout the year training has been provided to several UK church leaders in order for them to support their personnel working in the region.

In addition, mentoring for people undergoing the process of re-entry to their home culture has also taken place.

Input has also been given to UK church leaders who are developing significant strategic ministry relationships in the region.

***Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members***

The charity was involved in three leadership development conferences during the period which the charity employee contributed in the planning and delivery of the events.

In Pakistan 40 local church leaders attended a three day leadership development conference.

In Ethiopia, in May, 35 Christian leaders from the Horn of Africa attended a theology and leadership conference. The sessions were presented in partnership with the leaders and included discussion, problem solving and learning from one another.

In December, in Kenya a second conference was held to continue the teaching and mentoring with the same leaders plus an additional 15 people.

***Developing printed and online training material***

The 'Unreached' initiative has continued to produce training materials for people and churches working in cross cultural settings in the UK and overseas. See: Broadcast – Multiplying the Mission ([thebroadcastnetwork.org](http://thebroadcastnetwork.org))

***Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas***

In person events and meetings with UK based church leaders have been held in order to help produce best practice and compliance for churches supporting volunteers working in overseas in cross cultural contexts.

The 'Unreached Internship' has continued through the period. It is a church-based, one-year cross-cultural placement. Three interns are taking part, combining learning via an online syllabus with projects in their local communities.

Ministry teams and church leaders in Turkey, Central Asia, Egypt, and the Middle East have received training, personal coaching and pastoral support throughout the year. This has been delivered through online coaching sessions, meetings in person and conferences.

Other activities also include regular meetings and cultivating relationships with UK donors.

**5 Public benefit**

The trustees have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Trust Commission and believe that the objectives and activities of the Trust are for the public benefit.

The majority of the church leaders and ministry team leaders who have received personal coaching or attended training events or the leadership conferences are living and working in communities with significant economic challenges including working alongside refugees. One of the main aims of the coaching, training and conferences is to equip people with skills and develop best practices that benefit these communities.

There is significant benefit from the Charity's employee being based in the region providing opportunities for understanding at a deeper issue many of the cultural, religious and economic situations Church leaders and ministry team leaders are working in. In addition to training and mentoring a team, the employee is intentionally learning from other leaders and NGOs in the region and has working relationships with other similar organisations. The employee continues to have Arabic language lessons together with several members of the team in Cairo. Through intentionally developing relationships with many local people of various socio-economic and faith backgrounds the employee and team are continuing to grow in knowledge and understanding of important cultural and world view issues which will enable the charity to fulfil its aims.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT

### **FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021**

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The Trustees present their Annual Report and the Financial Statements of the Trust for the year ended 31 December 2021.

#### **1 Constitution**

The Trust was formed by its Trust Deed dated 4 December 2019. The activities of the Trust were originally carried out within Churchcentral Trust (registered charity no 1118562) as a separate restricted fund. In March 2021 the assets of this fund were transferred to Noor International Trust and the activities have since been carried out by Noor.

#### **2 Objectives**

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of poverty and to advance the Christian faith for the public benefit:

- The support, mentoring and training of leaders of Christian churches and NGOs in the Middle East,
- Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members
- Developing printed and online training materials
- Making grants to churches and NGOs sharing these charitable purposes
- Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas
- Training teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations

#### **3 Governance and organisational structure**

The trustees met three times during the period. They discussed the delivery of the objectives including planned events and online webinars and coaching. The trustees also discussed fund raising and how to recruit more donors. The trustees also assessed the impact of the COVID pandemic on the activities of the charity and what steps should be taken regarding training and leaders conferences and workshops.

The trustees are responsible for recruiting new trustees and to ensure they receive training and have appropriate knowledge and experience for good governance and for delivery of the charity objectives.

This has been delivered through regular online mentoring seminars on zoom to leaders in the Middle East, Turkey, Greece and Central Asia.

##### *Organising conferences and workshops for leaders and church members*

Due to the impact of the COVID pandemic the trustees did not think it was wise to gather international leaders for in-person conferences or workshops.

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*Developing printed and online training material*

Using the title of 'Unreached', online training materials have been developed for people and churches working in cross cultural settings in the UK and overseas. They can be found here Broadcast – Multiplying the Mission ([thebroadcastnetwork.org](http://thebroadcastnetwork.org))

No grants have been made to churches and NGOs during this period

*Training UK churches to support and care for personnel working overseas*

In addition to the developing online materials (see above), several online webinars have been held and forums to discuss best practice and compliance for churches supporting volunteers working in overseas in cross cultural contexts.

A training and practical experience internship has been launched. It is a church-based, one-year cross-cultural placement. Three interns are taking part, combining learning via an online syllabus with projects in their local communities, including support for Afghan refugee families in Leeds, an English conversation club in Birmingham, and support for Ukrainian refugees in Athens.

*Training Teams working for the relief of suffering in different nations*

Through the delivery of online mentoring, training workshops and in person coaching, teams have benefitted in Turkey, Central Asia, Egypt, Greece and the Middle East.

**5 Public benefit**

The trustees have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Trust Commission and believe that the objectives and activities of the Trust are for the public benefit.

The delivery of the charity objectives means many leaders both ex-patriots and indigenous are better equipped to provide good pastoral care and support for the people they are working alongside. In addition, in several locations leaders and teams are better equipped to work alongside refugees and economically poorer people, providing appropriate care and practical help with a greater understanding of the cultural issues and challenges people are facing.

Importantly with the Charity's employee based in Egypt this gives greater opportunity for understanding one of the main regions the charity is working in. As well as training and mentoring a team in Cairo, the employee is intentionally learning from other leaders and NGOs in the region, meeting with their leaders and observing the work of the NGOs.

**6 Review of financial position**

The number of donors increased during the period both with regular donations and one off payments. All in-person training events and the internship program have covered their costs. The closing position of the accounts is strong with £61,152 carried into the next financial year.

**7 Risk management**

The Trust has considered the risks it may face and confirm that systems have been established to mitigate them.

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**8 Reserves**


The Trustees have agreed to hold reserves of three months employee costs for future years.


