Annual Review 2024–25

January 2025 marked a significant milestone for Waterberg Rhino UK as we celebrated five years of impactful operation. This anniversary coincided with the charity's highest-ever annual revenue of **£145,000**, firmly establishing us as a major contributor to rhino conservation and community development in the Waterberg region.

Protecting One of the Last Wild Rhino Populations

Our top priority remains the security and protection of the Waterberg's critically important rhino population. Over the past year, we continued expanding the network of ANPR cameras across the region, enhancing the detection and deterrence of criminal activity. This data-driven system not only supports security operations but also helps foster confidence among local residents and businesses.

To further strengthen protection, the charity funded targeted ranger patrols in a known poaching hotspot. These patrols led to arrests and noticeably increased community engagement in safeguarding the area.

Ensuring that rangers have the tools they need to operate safely and effectively is vital. In September 2024, we delivered more than **50 pairs of military-grade boots**, alongside bullet-proof vests, tactical webbing, and head-torches, equipment that directly supports their challenging daily work.

Supporting Rhino Rehabilitation and Welfare

Our partnership with the Limpopo Rhino Orphanage continues to thrive. In March 2024, a young rhino calf raised with the support of our donors was transferred to the Orphanage to benefit from essential companionship and social integration. We remain committed to funding its feed and care, thereby assisting other orphans as well, until its successful release back into the wild.

Strengthening Communities Through Education and Food Security

The **Waterberg Rhino Food Gardens Scheme** continues to flourish. November 2024 saw the successful conclusion of our second Gardens Competition, run in collaboration with the Waterberg Biosphere Reserve. The initiative encourages sustainable gardening practices among 22 rural schools and communities, helping promote food security while reinforcing the connection between conservation and livelihoods. Over 3,000 children are fed daily with produce from the gardens.

Additionally, we supported a wide range of educational opportunities, including:

- A grant to the Waterberg Academy bursary fund
- Funding for **60 children** to attend a three-day conservation course at the pioneering Lapalala Wilderness School.
- Sponsorship of a public-speaking competition at Lapalala Wilderness School, focusing on the social, political, and economic impacts of rhino poaching

Fundraising and Partnerships

Our annual fundraising events are now a cornerstone of our income. We were also delighted to receive generous support from **Repton School**, where engagement throughout the spring term helped raise both funds and awareness of our mission.

We remain proud members of the **1% for the Planet** initiative, and are deeply grateful to sculptor **Zoe Carmichael** for her continued dedication and generous contributions through the sale of her artwork.

Looking Ahead

Important progress has been made this year in strengthening collaboration across the Waterberg. By uniting conservation organisations, private landowners, schools, and community groups, we are better equipped to confront the challenges of wildlife crime and the criminal networks that fuel it.

Waterberg Rhino UK is committed to expanding this shared effort, enhancing safety, improving livelihoods, and creating opportunities for both people and wildlife to thrive. From security and schooling to sustainable food supply and economic empowerment, our mission remains clear: **protect the Waterberg's rhinos while supporting the communities that live alongside them.**

Overall view of the year 2023-24

The Trustees are pleased to report that in its fourth year of operation, Waterberg Rhino UK has achieved over £100,000 in receipts for the third year running. With these substantial funds, we have been able to strengthen support for

ongoing projects that are making a real difference to the challenges faced in the region.

Our main priority is the security and protection of one of the last remaining populations of rhino on the planet. Waterberg Rhino has given a significant proportion of funds to update and install new ANPR cameras at strategic points, increasing intelligence and containment of criminal activity in the region. This not only helps protect rhino and other wildlife, but also brings a greater sense of safety to the community as a first alert to crime, medical emergencies and also outbreaks of fire.

We have also given considerable commitment to equipping rangers. This has included bullet-proof vests, mobile cameras, uniforms, boots, medical leg-kits, thermal drone, night-ops torches, battery packs and bivvies, all of which helps anti-poaching teams do their difficult job more effectively and safely.

The Limpopo Rhino Orphanage, the first of its kind in the world, received a grant to install a solar system, improving electrical supply, security and communication. Waterberg Rhino also donated to Waterberg Wild Dogs to help with a collaring project to monitor one of two packs in the region.

Another focus of Waterberg Rhino's endeavours is contribution to the well-being of the community, bringing opportunities through education and environmental projects. At the time of writing, our Food Gardens Scheme, in collaboration with Waterberg Biosphere Reserve, is reaching the culmination of the second Garden Competition. Launched in February 2024, this serves to encourage schools and community groups in the region to enter into various categories, including best garden, most improved and sustainable, to win cash prizes which go back into the gardens. The level of involvement has been inspiring, demonstrating the great dedication of teachers and volunteers to improve the diet and nutrition of children in their schools. The scheme helps feed over 3,000 children.

Our support of established educational organisations continues, with grants to the Waterberg Academy bursary fund, and to the excellent Lapalala Wilderness School for 60 children to attend a 3-day conservation course. On a smaller scale, we have also funded talks on anti-poaching and football coaching in local schools, with plans for greater involvement.

Fundraising through our annual events has seen wider endorsement, with our annual Ride for Rhinos, a 250km horseback safari in the Waterberg, sold out until 2026. We have also been considerably assisted by sculptor Zoe Carmichael, who has donated 15% from sales her bronze of rhino calf Tyson to the charity, by African Horse Safaris Foundation and by the initiative 1% for the Planet.

Plans for the Future

Working with the community to bring greater collaboration is of utmost importance to bring further improvement for both people and wildlife in the Waterberg. It is a question of listening and understanding what will make a difference, and implementing funds with the greatest efficacy. Waterberg Rhino UK is committed to greater security and a sense of well-being overall, whether this be for rhino, for schools and food supply, for education and economic opportunities.

As one of the last remaining populations of rhino in the world, the Waterberg requires united and wide-reaching support to achieve a sustainable future.

Overall view of the year 2022-23

The Trustees are pleased to report that in its third year of operation, Waterberg Rhino UK has again achieved over £100,000 in receipts, consolidating the grants that we have been able to make over the year.

The Waterberg is one of the last viable strongholds of rhino on the planet. One of our main priorities is funding the provision of technology and equipment to improve security across the region. A substantial grant of over one million rand was given to update and install 22 ANPR cameras over the area, to act as an alert for potential criminal behaviour. In conjunction with this, the charity purchased 50 military-grade boots for wildlife rangers, as well as night-vision equipment and binoculars. By bringing together operations, sharing information and kit, the funds spent are maximized to the greatest potential.

Our other main area of concern is projects associated with the improved wellbeing of the community and the environment. Our Food Gardens Scheme, in collaboration with NPO Waterberg Biosphere Reserve, has gone from strength to strength this year, with greater engagement from the 16 schools involved. This was due in the main to our Garden Competition which awarded cash prizes for various categories including best garden, most improved, and most sustainable. Plans are underway for next year's competition.

We have also continued our support of established educational organisations, with grants to the Waterberg Academy bursary fund, and the Lapalala Wilderness School, centres of excellence bringing greater opportunity to children in the Waterberg.

Fundraising events in the UK have included a clay-pigeon team event, a 'wilderness' ball, sales of Christmas cards and specially designed glassware. Our annual fundraiser, Ride for Rhinos, a 250km horseback safari in the Waterberg, was a huge success and raised over £16,000. Rides for 2024 and 2025 are fully booked.

A game-changer for the charity has been the support of filmmaker Harry Hough, who through his incredible talent has made a series of short films on the work of the charity. These can be found on the Waterberg Rhino youtube channel. The benefit brought in creating a wider audience and awareness of what the charity is aiming to achieve has been tangible in the increase of donations.

All 5 trustees have been able to travel to the Waterberg this year, seeing at first hand the projects and organisations with which we are working.

Plans for the future

Waterberg Rhino plans to continue to work together with the Waterberg community in bringing funding and greater co-operation to strengthen the protection of the highly vulnerable rhino population. This includes more camera-tracking technology, further equipment for rangers including drones, radio systems and medical kits. Our support of the gardens, the schools, and other community projects is vital to bring lasting outcomes for the people too.

Overall view of the year 2021-22

The Trustees are pleased to report that overall receipts have doubled over our second year as a charity and as a result we have managed to widen our level of support in the Waterberg.

At the start of the year, April 2021, international travel was still restricted and tourist income to South Africa was negligible. This had a huge detrimental effect on conservation programmes which rely heavily on tourist income.

While poaching of rhino during 2021 had shown decreased levels of activity, it was evident that private reserves were being targeted. Without funds for security, they had become more vulnerable to attack. Our first priority was to provide the necessary funding for the security patrols within the Waterberg.

There was a moment of hope that travel would again be allowed to South Africa as its 'red list' status was lifted in October 2022, only to be imposed again in November destroying all plans for full lodges at Christmas and New Year.

Thankfully, the travel bans were lifted in time for our annual fundraiser Ride for Rhinos 2022. Eleven riders made it out to the Waterberg to spend a week of endurance riding in the region, raising over £17,000.

With the cancellation of Ride for Rhinos 2021, we held a virtual Ride, with participants from all over the world riding virtually 8,000 miles from the UK to South Africa, while logging their distance via Equilab. The combined efforts of over 60 riders raised £16,000.

Fund-raising during the first part of the year relied on online campaigns such as a prize draw which raised £4,786 in July 2021.

By October we were allowed to hold live events again and managed to put together an Art Fair, which raised £9,983.

Our specially designed range of Waterberg Rhino glass has been notably successful contributing £2,605, as well as Christmas cards, shirts, caps and bush straps which have all boosted funds.

Projects supported 2021-22

- The charity's priority is the protection and conservation of rhino in the Waterberg. A substantial proportion of our funds was therefore directed at maintaining the ranger patrols during the pandemic when little or no income was available from tourism. Now home to the second largest population of rhino on the planet, the Waterberg is a target for poaching and the utmost vigilance is required at all times to protect these animals.
- As well as anti-poaching patrols, protection of rhino requires surveillance by both LPR and mobile cameras to alert the presence of possible criminal activity. We are working in collaboration with various security initiatives in the region to supply equipment and technology.
- The charity's other main area of concern is the well-being of the community. We run a Food Garden Scheme in collaboration with NPO Waterberg Biosphere Reserve providing funding and support for 16 gardens (14 schools, a cooperative project and a clinic garden). We have been fortunate to have Daniel Mashasha as our community liaison to coordinate the project in growing vegetables to supplement the children's school lunches, as well as extra produce for the

community. Our chair, Belinda Chaffer was able to visit 6 of the gardens in August 2021 to see at first hand the important contribution they make to the children and the community. Sadly at the time of writing we were shocked to hear of Daniel's untimely death at the age of 47 due to illness. He will be sorely missed.

- Waterberg resident, Jessica Babich has continued as our consultant in the region, overseeing the rollout of funding and the fulfillment of projects. Her role in delivering successful outcomes is a huge benefit to the charity.
- Atherstone is a 25,000 hectare provincial reserve in the Waterberg with a significant population of white and black rhino. We were able to assist the team of rangers there by installing a new digital radio system and repeater, vastly improving communication in this remote area.
- The role of St John's Church at 24 Rivers, near Vaalwater, is vital in bringing the community together, as a place of sustenance and solace. In November 2020 the main building burnt down after being struck by lightning. Due to a generous personal donation and with added funds from the charity, we were able to help them design and build a new structure.
- We have continued in our support of 2 well-established schools in the region: The Waterberg Academy with a contribution to its bursary fund; and the Lapalala Wilderness School with a donation for prizes for the annual public speaking competition on the social, economic and environmental impacts of rhino poaching.

Plans for the future

Since international travel resumed, 3 trustees, Bill Curral, Roger Stringer and Belinda Chaffer, have travelled to the Waterberg and will do so again over the coming months, thus ensuring close contact with the organisations and individuals that work with the charity.

Ride for Rhinos 2023 has a full complement of riders and will take place in the Waterberg in January as one of the main fundraisers.

Other fundraising plans include a clay-pigeon shoot and a drinks reception in London.

We are continuing to expand our horizons as donations have increased, and work with a wider range of organisations all with the intent of protecting and conserving the important rhino population of the Waterberg. Alongside this the charity is committed to the people of the region in bringing opportunity and prosperity to improve their lives.

Aims and objectives

- To fundraise and raise awareness for the protection and conservation of rhino and other endangered wildlife in the Waterberg region of South Africa
- To fundraise and provide support for projects that advance the education and conservation of the environment in the Waterberg
- To support projects that bring social and economic upliftment for the community in the Waterberg
- To raise awareness of the plight of the rhino and other endangered wildlife in the UK

Waterberg Rhino UK (charity no 1187429) received its registration as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation from the Charity Commission on 17 January 2020. We had our first trustees meeting in London on 4th March 2020.

Very soon after, the UK was placed in lockdown. Like everyone else, it was necessary to rethink all strategy on fundraising and events, with no idea how long we were all going to be in this situation.

Projects supported 2020-21

With concurrent lockdown in South Africa, the safari lodges in the Waterberg closed and with that the flow of income from tourism. Our first priority was to act to secure funds for security patrols to protect rhino in the region.

- With all fundraising going online, we organized 2 prize draws raising £13,084.75 in total. The total cost for the year to cover the patrols has been £22,545.92. While recently there has been a trickle of international tourists, who have managed to make it to South Africa, funding is still ongoing to ensure the safety of rhino in the region.
- The charity's other main area of concern has been the well-being of the community during these difficult times, with many laid off work, and children unable to go to school due to closures. During the winter months of August and September 2020, we were able to provide fruit and e-pap to schoolchildren in the Vaalwater area to aid nutrition.
- We have been fortunate to be supported in our endeavours by Jessica Babich who is based in the Waterberg. She works on a consultancy basis for the charity and is able to facilitate and oversee the rolling out of funding for projects.
- To mark World Rhino Day on 22 September, we were able to send a donation to the Waterberg Academy for its bursary fund, which enables as many children as possible from the local area to benefit from the excellent education that is provided by this independent school. We also donated funds for prizes at the Lapalala Wilderness School annual public speaking competition, which aims to encourage conservation champions for the future.
- In November 2020, we were alerted to the fact that the local police station near Vaalwater, had been without water for 3 months, an unsustainable situation during a pandemic. With the help of local landowners who provided a pump, we were able to pay for the installation of a borehole to supply water.
- Other community-based help has included funds to Security Interest Group (SIG), to buy first-aid equipment in its role alongside the South African police in preventing a medical emergency becoming a fatal one in the rural areas in the Waterberg.
- Alongside the Waterberg Biosphere Reserve (WBR), the charity has reinitiated funding for food garden schemes to 8 schools, a clinic and a community co-operative, enabling some 2,885 children to receive fresh vegetables as part of their diet at school. In this we have been fortunate to have the help of Daniel Mashasha to oversee the gardens and support the community. This is an ongoing project with plans for further funding through the WBR.

- In July 2020, Waterberg Rhino UK was approached by the founders of Urban Rhino Gin who chose the charity to support through sales of their premium brand of gin. Despite an unbelievably tough first year for the company, Urban Rhino was able to donate funds for the purchase of binoculars for the rangers working in Atherstone Provincial Park.

With the plans at the start of 2020 to hold live events destroyed by Covid, it has been heartening to have success through online fundraising and the support by so many, much through direct mailing. We have also received funding through sales of Christmas cards, a specially designed WRUK storm lantern, bush straps, sales of artwork and pyjamas.

Plans for the future

In normal circumstances, the trustees would travel to the Waterberg to visit the organizations and individuals with whom we work but again with travel restrictions, this has been impossible. Through the great generosity of a donor through Goldman Sachs Gives, we have been able to take on Jessica Babich as our vital on-the-ground consultant, who oversees projects in the region and acts as our liaison with organisations, thus enabling the charity to give funds with confidence.

At the time of writing, the annual Ride for Rhinos, the charity's main fundraiser, a 300km ride on horseback through the Waterberg, has been transformed into a virtual 8,000-mile hackathon. The idea is that riders from all over the world come together to accumulate the distance from the UK to SA while raising funds for the charity. With the hope that international travel will resume later in the year, the 2022 Ride for Rhinos, scheduled to take place in January in the Waterberg, is sold out, with interest already in the 2023 Ride.

Despite a difficult and testing first year for the charity, the trustees of Waterberg Rhino UK are extremely grateful for the level of support shown in terms of donations. They are confident that the charity will be able to continue to meet the requests for funding from the Waterberg community in order to help it protect the iconic rhino and the environment in which it lives, while bringing support to sustain and improve people's livelihoods.
