Structure, governance and management

Charity Status and Structure

Chichester Marks Holocaust Memorial Day (CMHMD) is a charitable incorporated organisation governed by its constitution. It was registered by the Charity Commission in England and Wales on 2 March 2020. The trustees are the members of the Charity. In the event of a winding up the members have no liability to contribute to the payment of CMHMD's liabilities.

Recruitment, Appointment and Training of Trustees

Trustees are recruited from those who share CMHMD's aims and aspirations and must be able to bring a breadth and depth of experience and skills to the trustee body. Prior to appointment trustees are briefed on CMHMD's activities and on appointment complete Fit and Proper Person forms and Declarations of Interests. All the trustees take seriously the obligation to maintain their knowledge.

Risk Management

The trustees have identified the major risks to which they believe CMHMD is exposed and systems have been established to minimise those risks. The risks are reviewed at each trustees' meeting. The principal risks relate to contracts for performances produced to inform and educate the public on matters concerning the Holocaust and genocides.

Governance

The overall responsibility for CMHMD rests with the trustees who meet regularly to both oversee governance and to make operating decisions.

The trustees endeavour to apply the Charity Governance Code, including the updated Code published on 8 December 2020, and the Nolan principles (selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership). Furthermore believing that corruption, bribery and unfair actions hamper development and impede progress they insist on integrity in all CMHMD's activities.

Objectives and activities

CMHMD seeks to both advance the education of the public in the history and experience of the Holocaust and other genocides and, to promote tolerance by local engagement in education and the community.

CMHMD is the successor to an ad hoc committee which had worked to mark Holocaust Memorial Day with activities, including screenings, talks and concerts.

In January 2015 the committee marked Holocaust Memorial Day with a tribute to former Chichester Member of Parliament John Abel Smith, who campaigned for Religious and Political Rights in the mid-1800's.

For January 2016, the same team, now working with the University of Chichester's Music Department and Chichester Cathedral, organised the production of the opera 'Last Train to Tomorrow' conducted by its composer Carl Davis.

Working with the Department of History & Politics at the University of Chichester, the team organised a film screening of 'Conspiracies – the Evil and the Good' at Chichester's New Park Cinema on 27 January 2017.

Performances of the Opera PUSH, composed by Howard Moody, took place at Chichester Cathedral on 27 January 2018 and at St Paul's Church, Chichester on 11 April 2018.

To mark Holocaust Memorial Day PUSH was performed at The Speaker's Apartments, Westminster on 28 January 2019. The invitation only audience was a cross-party selection of MP's, Rabbis, and senior members of Jewish and refugee groups.

Holocaust Memorial Day 2020 was marked with performances of PUSH at Chichester Festival Theatre's Minerva Theatre and, at Westbourne House School, in aid of Sussex Snowdrop Trust.

Covid lockdown regulations prevented planned in person events and so these were replaced by an on line Memorial Service on 27 January 2021, which included a tribute by Gillian Keegan, Chichester's sitting Member of Parliament, to John Abel Smith, Member of Parliament for Chichester from 1831-1859.

On 14 January 2022 CMHMD brought to Chichester Festival Theatre's Minerva Theatre, Sir Michael Morpurgo's the Mozart Question, a holocaust based story narrated by Sir Michael and Alison Reid interwoven with music played by Daniel Piro and The Storyteller's Ensemble. Later in the month the film Waiting For Anya, based on Sir Michael Morpurgo's story of the same name, was shown for schools at Chichester's New Park Cinema.

A conversation on 17 June 2022 with the author and historian Dr Helen Fry was held before a sell out audience as part of The Festival of Chichester.

On 26 and 27 January 2023 the acclaimed film Where is Anne Frank was shown for schools at Chichester's New Park Cinema alongside related workshops for the schools and on 27 January 2023 David Nott, the surgeon noted for his work in war and conflict zones, was interviewed by author Kate Mosse at Chichester Festival Theatre's Minerva Theatre.

Holocaust survivor Steven Frank told his story on 22 June 2023, as part of The Festival of Chichester.

Events in 2024 were:

- 27 January 2024 Women Who Resisted, a one woman show by novelist and historian Kate Mosse, which celebrated extraordinary brave women of World War II.
- January 2024 showings of the film Where is Anne Frank for schools alongside related workshops.
- 19 July 2024, as part of The Festival of Chichester, Peter Lantos told of his experiences under the title a Childhood Journey to Belsen.

Plans for future periods

In line with the trustees intention to continue to stage public events and performances to educate both young and old events were staged in January and July 2025 and other activities are planned for 2026.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and strongly believe in the public benefit of CMHMD's activities.

Volunteers

Almost all of the activities of CMHMD are undertaken by volunteers. No record is kept of the time given on a voluntary basis but without this contribution to CMHMD it would not function.

Financial review

The income from tickets sold for charitable events held during the year totalled £13,493 (2023:£6,883). The event direct costs totalled £3,995 (2023:£6,062) and there was therefore a surplus of £9,498 (2023:£821) from the staging of the charitable activities. This surplus enabled the trustees to commit to the costs of staging the opera *Last Train to Tomorrow* at Chichester Festival Theatre's Minerva Theatre in January 2025.

All events are held in furtherance of the charity's aims of advancing the education of the public in the history and experience of the Holocaust and other genocides and to promote tolerance and for that reason ticket prices are set at a level which will cover the costs without excluding those with limited financial means.

In 2021 an individual known to CMHMD lent £2,500 to the Charity unsecured and interest free. This loan was repaid in February 2024.





Volunteers

Almost all of the activities of CMHMD are undertaken by volunteers. No record is kept of the time given on a voluntary basis but without this contribution to CMHMD it would not function.

Financial review

The funds held by the ad hoc committee at the time CMHMD was established were donated by that group to CMHMD and a grant of £500 was received from a charitable trust. CMHMD had no other income during the year and its only expenditure was a Zoom subscription.

Reserves policy

The trustees believe there is no need to hold substantial reserves but that reserves are needed to fund and underwrite major events. This policy will be developed during 2021 and 2022.

Pay policy and procedures

Trustees do not receive any payment or benefits for their work either as trustees or as volunteers and there are no employees.

Investment policy

Funds not required for current needs may be invested in investments of any kind at the absolute discretion of the trustees.

Fundraising

Raising funds for CMHMD's activities will be vital and will be undertaken both by the trustees and if necessary by fundraising experts. Although, as a small charity, CMHMD is not required to follow fundraising regulations it will at all times abide by the spirit of those regulations.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:


- i. select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;


