2 Structure, Governance & Management

2.1 Type of Governing Document

2.2 Charitable Objects

As defined in the TPEA constitution, the objects of the charity are to advance education for the public benefit by:

- promoting research and effective practice in the use of digital technologies, particularly, but without limitation, in schools; and
- supporting initial and continuing teacher professional development, in particular in the field of the effective use of educational technologies.

2.3 Trustee Selection Methods

There must be at least three charity trustees. The maximum number of trustees is 12.

In accordance with the Constitution, Trustees are appointed or re-appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees.

In appointing Trustees due consideration is given to ensuring that the Trustees have, between them, the skills and experience necessary to manage the charity effectively and in accordance with charity law.

3 Activities

3.1 Statutory Declaration

The Trustees of the Technology, Pedagogy and Education Association confirm that they have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

3.2 Summary of Main Activities

In 2024-25, TPEA continued to promote research and effective practice in the use of digital technology and to support effective teacher professional development through publications and events.

We continued our face-to-face events through our 36th Annual Conference held in Manchester in July 2024 which brought together researchers and practitioners from across the UK.

TPEA continued to publish our successful, international journal and to support research and effective practice in technology education. We also began a partnership with NAACE to produce the Advancing Education practitioner journal.

4 Achievements & Performance

4.1 Outputs and Outcomes for the Charity's Beneficiaries

Over this period, the charity has produced a number of outputs. These include:

- Publication of an internationally recognised, peer-reviewed journal, Technology, Pedagogy and Education that disseminates internationally excellent research relating to technology in education. Five issues are published each year.

The journal achieved a 2024 Impact Factor of 2.5 which puts TPE in the highest quartile for Impact factor and CiteScore. It has a national and international audience with over 186,000 downloads. The journal continues to maintain a very high standard of articles published - our acceptance rate for articles is just 8%.

- Our face-to-face Annual Conference in Manchester. This was our 36th conference and took the theme "Facing the future: Are we ready for change?". It was held at The Friends' Meeting House in Manchester on 2-3rd July 2024 and featured keynote speeches, panel discussions, and presentations by renowned experts in the education and research field. The conference was designed to bring together professionals, researchers, teachers, and students who are passionate about EdTech and digital skills in the curriculum, providing a platform for exchanging ideas, discussing new developments, and networking with peers. - Awarded a TPEA Research and Development Grant
- Members have contributed to a number of research articles, publications and books
- Members have led and contributed to international research projects including in collaboration with MESHGuides and ICET
- Published blogs and newsletters relating to digital technology in education
- Been active members of CfSA and MESH and supported responses to consultations via CfSA
- Engaged with government colleagues on research and policy roundtables
- A key development this year has been our partnership with NAACE to publish 'Advancing Education' – a leading practitioner journal comprised of an eclectic mix of academic and action research papers and reports from members, sponsoring partners and other expert guests on the innovative uses of digital technologies in education. As such it reflects the wide-ranging interests of TPEA and NAACE members and sponsors and all those passionate about educational technology in all phases of education. 4.2 How the Public Have Benefitted.

Teachers and educators have benefitted from our work by learning about best practice in educational technology. In turn, this has benefitted the public through improved educational practices. We remain concerned about the low levels of participation in Computing and Technology and seek to promote ways to address this.

5 Financial Review

5.1 Details of Any Funds Materially in Deficit

The Charity has no funds which are materially in deficit.

5.2 Policy on Reserves

The Charity's policy on reserves is to generate and maintain a balance which is sufficient:

- a) to preserve the financial viability of the Charity in the event that unforeseen and/or unavoidable circumstance precipitate a short-term fall in its income;
- b) to enable the Charity, in the interests of meeting its objectives, to undertake from time to time the setting up of new and innovative projects on a pilot basis to demonstrate the viability and potential benefits of such activities as a precursor to securing the external funding necessary to maintain such projects on an on-going basis.

For these purposes the Charity will endeavour to generate and maintain reserves which are at least one year's annual turnover. In 2024-25, the reserve was set at £25,000. This will be increased to £30,000 for 2025-26.

5.3 Principal Sources of Funding and Outgoings

The principal sources of funding are publishing royalties from our journal: Technology, Pedagogy and Education, income from our conference, and subscriptions from members.

5.4 Remuneration of Trustees

All Trustees act in a voluntary capacity and receive no remuneration or other material benefits from their services to the Charity, with the exception of the journal editor who received a payment agreed by the Trustees in accordance with the relevant regulations.

Out-of-pocket expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by Trustees in promoting the purposes of the Charity are reimbursed at cost.

5.5 Financial Status

TPEA's current resources from unrestricted donations are more than sufficient to meet its outgoings for at least next year.

All the indications are that this will remain the case for the foreseeable future.

6.3 Notes to the Accounts

a) Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 Section 133, using the Receipts and Payments basis available to small charities and the charity's own Accounts Spreadsheet.

b) Reimbursement of Out-of-Pocket Expenses

Out-of-pocket expenses incurred necessarily, reasonably and incidentally in the course the charity's activities are reimbursed at cost.

c) Salaries & Professional Fees

Only one trustee receives any payments for the services they provide to the charity (journal editor).

In the current financial year the charity employed no staff or external contractors;

d) Fixed Assets

The charity has not purchased or disposed of any fixed assets in the current financial year;

e) Creditors & Debtors

Cheques for goods or services purchased, or invoices for goods or services delivered, which are issued prior to the end of the financial year but not appearing in the end of financial year bank statement are reported as outstanding creditors or debtors respectively.

f) Rounding Discrepancies

All amounts are recorded to the penny.

g) It was agreed to keep a reserve of approximately one year's income (£25,000, rising to £30,000 in 2025/26).
