Purposes and Aims

Our charity's purposes are as follows:

The advancement of health, including the prevention or relief of sickness, amongst underprivileged communities in any part of the world by:

- (a) Providing free surgical and medical care to patients in need of such care;
- (b) Training local medical professionals; and
- (c) Assisting with the development of a sustainable medical infrastructure.

The relief of poverty of children living in underprivileged communities in any part of the world, including children living in orphanages, in such ways as the charity trustees shall think fit.

The advancement of education of such children in such ways as the charity trustees shall think fit.

The focus of our work

Our main objectives continued to be to deliver safe surgical care, free at the point of use. We aim to do this by gathering a team of clinicians and surgical equipment and partnering with a hospital in a lower- or middle-income country (LMIC) to organise a short-duration trip to that hospital. During the trip we are allocated local staff and operating theatres with which we deliver a high volume of surgical procedures to the local population, who have been notified of our arrival in advance and travel far and wide to reach us.

In addition to providing local support, our charity also helps to raise vital funds and coordinate care for individuals with complex medical needs who require specialist services elsewhere in the country. We work closely with families, healthcare providers, and partner organisations to ensure that those facing the most challenging circumstances can access the expert treatment and support they deserve—no matter where it's available.

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Who benefits from our services?

Any community with limited access to safe, timely and affordable surgery may benefit from our services. Today, two-thirds of the world's population do not have such access. There are 1.1 million Specialist Surgeons worldwide, yet less than 20% of those are in LMICs. Communities in Africa and Southeast Asia are particularly affected. Given that the population in LMICs represents almost 50% of the world's population, it is clear that LMICs are severely underserved in the provision of surgical care.

In addition to providing local support, our charity also helps to raise vital funds and coordinate care for individuals with complex medical needs who require specialist services elsewhere in the country. We work closely with families, healthcare providers, and partner organisations to ensure that those facing the most challenging circumstances can access the expert treatment and support they deserve—no matter where it's available.

A **Summary of activities** conducted in 2024 is outlined below.

Craig's Playground at the Techiman Hospital, Ghana

OIUK partnered with the family of a volunteer who passed away during the Covid pandemic to raise funds for a playground at a hospital in Ghana. The hospital runs several paediatric services. Being a rural hospital, patients must travel for many days and stay for a minimum of one night. There were no play facilities on the campus for the children.

Craig was a paediatric anaesthetist. He had joined a mission to this hospital in the past. A memorial in his name is a lasting tribute to his dedication to philanthropy and children's health.

OIUK coordinated the fundraising effort and partnered with the hospital on the due diligence of the planning, design and oversight of the playground build.

Fundraising

In 2024 we were successful in securing a grant from the Royal College of Surgeons of England to the value of £12,000 to help support future missions. A significant proportion of the monies were used to support the 2025 mission.

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Financial Review

The following funds were raised in 2024¹:

1. £12, 000 grant from the Royal College of Surgeons of England
2. £ 10, 000 from donations via our GoFundMe campaign page for Craig's children's playground construction

Principal Funding Sources

We envisage that our primary funding sources will be a combination of grants, GoFundMe campaigns and funding support from our affiliated charity, Operational International Ltd².

Finally, we will submit grant applications for funding from charitable foundations committed to improving global health.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO), registered on 7 May 2020. The company has a constitution which established the objects and powers of the CIO and is governed under its articles of association.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the CIO are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. Under the requirements of the constitution a trustee will serve until i. the trustee dies, ii. if the CIO ceases to exist; or iii. The trustee sends notice of resignation to the charity trustees provided that there shall be at least one trustee after the notice of resignation takes effect.

Due to the nature of the charity's work, the trustees seek to ensure that the needs of this group are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body, as well as the more traditional business and medical skills.

Risk Management

The Trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. These risks and associated mitigants are outlined in the 'Working Overseas' and 'Safeguarding' policy documents that are both available on the trust website (www.oiuk.uk). These policies are reviewed every two years and updated where necessary.

Where appropriate, systems and procedures have been established to mitigate identified risks to the CIO. In other instances, the charity will rely on the risk management procedures of the volunteer's employer. For example, the Director of the charity has been designated as the safeguarding lead to ensure rapid response to any safeguarding concerns.

All clinical volunteers are also required to have undertaken hospital-delivered safeguarding training within two years of joining a surgical mission. This ensures a uniform understanding of overall safeguarding responsibilities. We believe that this requirement, in conjunction with familiarity with our specific safeguarding policy, offers an acceptable control against safeguarding risks.

Organisational Structure

The CIO has three trustees who meet quarterly and are responsible for strategic direction and day-to-day management.

Related Parties

In so far as it is complimentary to the charity's objects, the charity is guided by both the national and the international areas of surgical best practice.

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The CIO also has an affiliate relationship with Operation International Ltd (OI Ltd), who have provided financial and organizational support to establish OIUK. 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2023: Building on our Success

Surgical Mission

OIUK returned to Ghana for the third time with its largest group of volunteers to date. The total of 16 returning and new medical experts provided life-changing medical care to 136 patients during just five operating days at a local hospital. These cases included both general surgery and paediatric care.

Fundraising

In 2023 we were successful in securing an award of £12,000 from the Global Surgery Fund. This Fund is managed by the Royal College of Surgeons of England. The grant will be used for the provision of sustainable surgical care and training in Techiman, rural Ghana in a future mission.

Infrastructure

OIUK was also successful in raising money to build a playground at the Holy Family Hospital in Ghana. The hospital has a very busy paediatric department but no play facilities for the children. It is well documented that having a safe space to play aids in the recovery and healing of children and their families. The playground was dedicated to a dearly departed team member Craig Mastracci, CRNA (1964 – 2021), an anaesthetic nurse and former volunteer.

We aim to do this by gathering a team of clinicians and surgical equipment and partnering with a hospital in a lower- or middle-income country (LMIC) to organise a short duration trip to that hospital. During that trip we are allocated local staff and operating theatres with which we deliver a high volume of surgical procedures to the local population, who have been notified of our arrival in advance and travel far and wide to reach us.

Who benefits from our services?

Any community with limited access to safe, timely and affordable surgery may benefit from our services. Today two thirds of the world's population do not have such access. There are 1.1 million Specialist Surgeons worldwide, yet less than 20% of those are in LMICs. Communities in Africa and South East Asia are particularly affected. Given that population in LMICs represents almost 50% of the world's population, it is clear that LMICs are severely underserved in the provision of surgical care.

2022: A Year in Review

The 2020 - 2021 covid-19 pandemic brought unprecedented disruption to economies and societies globally. This disruption curtailed almost all OIUK activity, from local fund-raising to service provision.

In 2022 we were able to deploy our first mission since the pandemic. A team of clinicians from the UK, Ghana, and the USA travelled to the Holy Family Hospital in Techiman, Ghana. It was an emotional reunion between the OI volunteers and the Holy Family hospital staff, both teams having much to be thankful for.

With extra precautions in place for covid safety the team was able to rise to the challenge of triaging and treating 168 patients within 5 days. A wide variety of cases were performed, from repairing years-long hernias, treating neck tumours & oesophageal disease, to burn contracture.

The mission was held in honour of a dearly departed team member Craig Mastracci, CRNA (1964 – 2021) who had joined the 2019 mission.

Financial Review

The following funds were raised in 2022¹:

1. £900 from our 2022 mission volunteers.
2. £660 from the sale of OIUK themed surgical hats at charitable events.
3. £1,150 from donations via our gofundme campaign page.

Principal Funding Sources

We envisage that our primary funding sources will be a combination of grants from our affiliated charity, Operational International Ltd².

We also aim to organise an in-person fundraiser in 2023.

Finally, we will submit grant applications for funding from charitable foundations committed to improving global health.

Two of our trustees are surgeons working in the UK whose primary focus has been to maintain a minimum standard of care in their respective hospitals. During the initial waves of the pandemic all but trauma and emergency surgeries were cancelled. Staffing levels were drastically reduced from sickness, isolation, and re-deployment to covid wards. In subsequent waves of the pandemic some limited elective surgery was permitted but volumes were vastly reduced, and staff sickness and isolation precluded any extra-curricular travel to run a surgical mission.

Added to this was the material risk of transporting and spreading variants of covid to the donor recipient countries. While covid protocols were created to minimise this risk, the overall level of risk involved, coupled with the severely low rates of immunisation against covid-19 in the donor recipient countries, meant that we were forced to cancel a surgical mission in 2020 and in 2021.

This review does however help us ensure our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes. We plan to deploy a small team of clinicians for a mission in 2022.

Related Parties

In so far as it is complimentary to the charity's objects, the charity is guided by both the national and the international areas of surgical best practice.

The CIO also has an affiliate relationship with Operation International Ltd (OI Ltd), who have provided financial and organizational support to establish OIUK. The chair of Operation International UK is a member of the Board of Directors of Operation International Ltd.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

The trustees are required to prepare statements of receipts and payments for each financial year. As there has been no activity in the CIO in the prior financial year, the financial report is net zero.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the CIO and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the CIO and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
