Introduction

The trustees present their annual reports and accounts for the year ended **31 April 2023**.

The board of trustees are exceedingly satisfied with the performance of the charity during the year and the position at 31 April 2023 and consider the charity is in a strong position to continue its activities during the coming year, and that the charity's assets are adequate to fulfil its obligations.

Objectives and Activities of the Charity

A summary of the objectives of the charity as set out in its governing document.

Objectives

1) To further or benefit the residents of Birmingham, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions by associating together the said residents and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for the residents.

2) To advance in life and relieve needs of young people through:

(a) The provision of recreational and leisure time activities provided in the interest of social welfare, designed to improve their conditions of life;

(b) Providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as mature and responsible individuals.

Achievements and Performance of the Charity

A review of charitable activities undertaken by the charity

The CIO earned £65,940 in grants and donations in the reporting year. The CIO used £55,301 for staffing, administration, consultancy, rent, bills, utilities and marketing for project delivery.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Girls only boxing sessions in Alum Rock

Over 62 young girls participated in boxing sessions for the first time, with 28 girls attending weekly sessions now continuing for over a year.

HAF Programme Kingstanding

We delivered our first Holiday Activities Fund programme in Kingstanding, engaging over 120 young people in positive activities including Muay Thai, boxing, fitness, arts/ crafts, healthy eating workshops, first aid training and team building exercises. The sessions were supported by the Royal Navy.

Student Of The Game Podcast Project

Over 38 young people were upskilled through our Student Of The Game Social Enterprise, learning about podcasting, filming, digital media and social media marketing. In our first season, 10 professional podcasts were filmed, edited and marketed across our social media channels. We had some amazing people from all walks of life, from CEO's, Teachers, Community Leaders, Entrepreneurs, Youth Leaders, Pioneers including the West Midlands Police and Crime Commissioner. All these people who overcame challenges to make it where they are today, helping us to inspire other young people by sharing their stories. Our reach on social media has skyrocketed with 600,000 viewers on YouTube of which 400,000 are young people.

Youth Social Action & mentoring in schools

This year we started working with 2 new schools, Star Bank and Eden Boys school for the first time and have continued to further develop our relationship with Birmingham Youth Service, The Naseby Youth Centre. We have supported over 43 young people with mentoring and workshop support. We have delivered 12 workshops covering employability, drugs/ consequences, county lines, first aid and mental health support. 10 Young people have signed up to our Student Of The Game Youth Social action project who will be working with over the next year to develop their project further, at the same time learning new skills, experiences helping them to unlock their potential.

Celebrating the arrival of the Commonwealth Games

To celebrate the arrival of the commonwealth games, we hosted a sporting event in the community with over 800 people in attendance all enjoying new sports, including football tournaments for young people, cricket, squash, badminton, archery, table tennis and team building exercises. We had a live DJ, magic man, stalls, foods, clothes, face painting and lots of activities which were enjoyed by all.

Contribution made by volunteers

It was an honour for Our Community Foundation to welcome two new Trustees who joined our board. As part of our vision, we wanted to ensure that we had representatives from the Education Sector as part of our team. Mike Tooze is a retired Deputy Head Teacher and comes with huge amount of experience in Education. Haleemah Zafar is a young newly qualified Teacher, therefore comes with a fresh approach and new ideas as to how curriculum should be set so that students would really benefit from our services ensuring we are adding value to the current curriculum and filling gaps in provision. Both are key members of our team who are helping to shape our future vision and we have a great combination of experience and drive, which will help us to unlock the potential of the young people we work with.

We are proud of our diverse Board of Trustees, made up of volunteers from a wide range of backgrounds including young people and are responsible for the overall strategic direction of Our Community Foundation. Our core Trustees all live in the communities we serve, so have a thorough understanding of the local needs & wants. We have more female Trustees than male Trustees, from diverse backgrounds including young people. Overall, we have a wide range of skills & expertise in our management team with over 100 years of experience in delivering youth work, sports & mentoring (Birmingham Youth Service & voluntary sector), education, community/ sport development, social enterprise & speak 6 different languages.

Monitoring

The CIO provided regular monitoring for all projects with adequate systems and processes in place to record impact and provide evaluation.

Structure, Governance and Management

Nature of the Governing Document and constitution of the charity

The Charity is incorporated and governed by its own Foundation constitution.
The trustees have overall control and responsibility for policy and major decision making.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities



Structure, governance and management

Our Community Foundation is an unincorporated charity constituted under a Deed of Declaration of Trust dated 01 Nov 2019. It is a registered charity with a charity number being 1189425 and was registered as a charity on 11 May 2020.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees would be in line with the Trust Deed and with the consent of the trustees. The criteria set for the suitable candidate would be someone who is sensitive to the needs and demands of the organisation.

Basharat Dad is the chief executive officer. The day to day affairs are undertaken by Basharat Dad on behalf of the trustees. All major decisions are taken collectively by the trustees and all the trustees give of their time freely. The trustees are unpaid and details of any related party transactions are disclosed as applicable in the notes to the accounts. The arrangements for setting the pay of the charity's employees are the sole domain of the trustees.

There are policies in place for the induction and training of new trustees.

Risk review

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Trust, and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage our exposure to the major risks.

The risks faced by the trust are principally operational risks from ineffective grant making. These risks are managed by the trustees researching potential beneficiaries before granting donations.

Report back and review procedures strengthen these safeguards to ensure public benefit is achieved from all grants.

Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

The Charity is constituted as a charitable incorporated organisation.

Governing Body

The structure of the Charity consists of Six Trustees and one chair person. The Board of trustees is authorised to appoint new Trustees to fill vacancies arising through resignation or death of an existing Trustee.

Organisational Management

The Trustees of the Charity are legally responsible for the overall management and control of the Charity and meet regularly.

Objectives and activities

The Charity is constituted as a charitable incorporated organisation.

The Charity's objects and its principal of encourage and empower the ambitions of the residents of Birmingham, with a focus on young people (aged 11 to 28) supporting them into sustained education, training and work through our personal development programmes.

The Charity is organised so that the Trustees meet regularly to manage its affairs. The Charity has primarily been using voluntary assistance but going forward it will also be looking to employ staff. Administration of the Charity is dealt with by trustees.

Financial review

The Trustees consider that the performance of the Charity this year has been satisfactory. The charity received donation of £65,940.

The charity distributed a total of £55,301 during the year. The natures of the distributions were in line with the constitution and objects of the Charity.

This is in line with the wishes of the Trustees who constantly review the effectiveness of the Charity and approve the scope of their activities.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is 314 Zeling Building, Custard Factory, Gibb st Deritend, Birmingham B9 4AT

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements did not require management to make judgements, estimates or assumptions that affect the amounts reported.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds held by the charity are funds that can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

4. Limited by guarantee The company is limited by guarantee and does not contain any share capital.



Structure, governance and management

Our Community Foundation is an unincorporated charity constituted under a Deed of Declaration of Trust dated 01 Nov 2019. It is a registered charity with a charity number being 1189425 and was registered as a charity on 11 May 2020.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees would be in line with the Trust Deed and with the consent of the trustees. The criteria set for the suitable candidate would be someone who is sensitive to the needs and demands of the organisation.

Basharat Dad is the chief executive officer. The day to day affairs are undertaken by Basharat Dad on behalf of the trustees. All major decisions are taken collectively by the trustees and all the trustees give of their time freely. The trustees are unpaid and details of any related party transactions are disclosed as applicable in the notes to the accounts. Risk review

Governing Document

The Charity is constituted as a charitable incorporated organisation.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is 314 Zeling Building, Custard Factory, Gibb st Deritend, Birmingham B9 4AT

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements did not require management to make judgements, estimates or assumptions that affect the amounts reported.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds held by the charity are funds that can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

4. Limited by guarantee The company is limited by guarantee and does not contain any share capital.


