KFF Summer Tournaments – We were to attain sufficient facilities to delivered Four Summer football Tournament’s across the UK which took place in Walsall, Birmingham, Leicester and Derby.

Each event provided the opportunity for structured Asian football teams playing amateur football in local FA leagues to compete in a knock-out tournament. Events were attended by in excess of 1,500 participants in the form of players, coaches and spectators with

participants in the following age groups U8's, U9's, U11's, U13's, U15's. Adult and Vets football.




