TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE FIRST PERIOD ENDED 31ST MAY 2021

Within the space of five years, The Outrunners has developed from being an East London running club to a community group and then to a full-blown charity, under the leadership of its founder Tyler Williams-Green.

As a certified running coach, Tyler started the club in 2015 to direct his passion for running. But he also wanted to use his 17 years of youth work experience to link the club members to the wider community. As membership grew, Tyler found ways for the runners to help support local young people.

Together with early Outrunners' member Laura Murphy, who has 15 years' marketing experience, Tyler founded The Outrunners Community Interest Company (CIC) in 2017 to develop and deliver a formal programme for young people, including careers events and a youth running club.

The CIC was a great success and fuelled the organisation's ambition to help young people across East London. In May 2020, the CIC became a registered charity to extend its youth programmes and expand its volunteer community. There continues to be an adult running club which is a separate entity that provides volunteers for our youth programmes.

Our objective is to: To act as a resource for young people up to the age of 16 living in London and the surrounding areas by providing advice and assistance and organising programmes of physical, educational and other activities as a means of:

a) - Advancing in life and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals; and

b) - Providing recreational and leisure time activity in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons.

What we do

Youth Running Clubs

In partnership with local youth clubs and schools, we host four weekly running groups for 8- to 18-year-olds, to provide support and lend our expertise to under-resourced organisations. Our clubs are run by volunteers and overseen by our paid staff. Our volunteers are DBS checked and given training, as well as regular supervision.

In addition to training for races like the Vitality Big Mile, the running sessions help develop soft skills such as teamwork and communication as well as building confidence. They also provide a fun and safe space for the young people to engage with each other and link up with the wider community.

Mentoring

We provide one-to-one mentoring, matching each young person with an Outrunners volunteer. Pairs meet on a regular basis for an exercise session.

Mentors help to build the young person's confidence, raise their aspirations and support them with any issues. With a focus on achieving their long-term potential, mentors and mentees agree on goals and review them regularly. All volunteer mentors are DBS checked and are given training. Outrunners staff also liaise with mentees schools, so there is a joined up approach to supporting them.

Careers Advice

Tapping into The Outrunners' network, we call on leaders from a diverse range of industries, including fashion, film, music, fitness and law, to help widen aspirations.

Our Run Your Career programme consists of live events, short sprint placements at exciting companies, such as Lacoste, and coaching with industry experts.

The programme is aimed at inspiring and empowering young people to think beyond their current career ambitions and give them the experience and knowledge to expand their post-education plans. It helps build their confidence and develop important connections with people in their chosen career.

Youth Board

It is important to us that young people help direct the work we do and shape our programmes. In order to give them a voice in the decision-making process, we set up a youth board in 2021.

The board is made up of teenagers who have taken part in our programmes over the past year and who are keen to improve their skills and make a difference. A group of 12 young people attend our bi-weekly meetings and they are given specific briefs for projects that help to develop their skills.

What We've Achieved this Year

Becoming a charity in 2020 at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic presented challenges to The Outrunners' work which is built around face-to-face contact. But we adapted our programmes and coordinated volunteers to provide food packages to help people in lockdown, including some of the families of the young people who we work with.

Our achievements from March 2020 include putting on a careers event attended by 177 young people, starting a new youth running club at the Pembury estate, launching our first Youth Board and delivering over 1,000 food packages.

- **March 2020** - organised a careers event attended by 98 young people, with 77 signing up to take part in our work sprint placements and career coaching. Of the young people who attended the event, 95% felt more informed about different career options, 94% better understood the steps required to get the job they want and 87% felt more confident they could get a job they want.
- **April 2020** - During the first UK lockdown of the pandemic, our volunteers delivered over 1,000 food packages in collaboration with The Wickers Charity and Toynbee hall, to help the families in our community, including those we work with.
- **April 2020** - launched a film group and acting coaching programme with actor James Norton. Special guests from different areas of film production attended sessions to talk about their experience and offer advice.
- **May 2020** - we became a registered charity and launched our architecture coaching programme, giving the young people an insight into a real-life architectural project. This was based on the development of Kingsland Locke Hotel. The young people were encouraged to find buildings they admired in their area and produce detailed sketches. They subsequently built to-scale models of their own building design based on their admired building. We provided them with the equipment to make these models.
- **May 2020** - launched our documentary filmmaking group. Each session involved discussions between a professional filmmaker and the young people about a documentary they had watched. They discussed the storyline as well as the technical and editorial decisions. One participant produced a documentary after these sessions about her experience of lockdown, which was showcased by Bertha DocHouse.
- **June 2020** - launched our one-to-one mentoring programme with a young person who was having difficulties in school. He started meeting with this mentor on a weekly basis doing activities like cycling and boxing.
- **July 2020** - created a digital library of three laptops that young people could access to ensure they were able to complete our online programmes.
- **July-August 2020** - worked with The Wickers Charity to deliver a summer programme of sports activities, which culminated in a sports day with the young people and their families. We helped keep over 40 young people active throughout the summer holidays, improving their physical fitness and creating community cohesion.
- **September 2020** - launched a project with fitness app FIIT where young people on our fashion programme designed a T-shirt for them. The T-shirt was developed for FIIT customers and was part of its "Summer burn" range. Eight young people took part in the programme and over 300 T-shirts were sold.
- **October 2020** - ran a full week of online Run Your Career events. We delivered 18 sessions over Zoom with companies and groups of young people. To minimise barriers to access, we hosted two sessions teaching the young people how to use Zoom. Representatives from the companies spoke about their career journeys and what work they do. Young people were given the opportunity to ask questions and gain insight into different roles.

- **November 2020** - relaunched our running club with The Wickers Charity.
- **January 2021** - launched our Youth Board with 18 young people. We started by discussing what skills the young people wanted to develop and they helped to shape our new running club and careers event this year.
- **January 2021** - Author and podcaster Adrienne Herbert started delivering one-to-one coaching sessions online with two mentees during lockdown. She coached them in how to stay mentally and physically healthy and how this would support them to achieve their long-term goals.
- **February 2021** - launched two more one-to-one mentoring relationships with young people aged 10 and 11, matching them with a mentor to do weekly activities.
- **April 2021** - launched a new running club at the Pembury Estate.

Looking forward

This year, we are looking forward to expanding our youth running clubs and inviting new coaches who can put the young people through their paces and provide them with variety and new challenges. We will be supporting our young people to attend races this year, including our own 5k/10k race, which we will organise at the Olympic Park in Stratford.

We are also looking forward to holding more live careers events as part of our Run Your Career programmes, as well as developing partnerships with new companies to deliver sprint placements. Our established fashion programme Ready to Runway will continue to offer young people unique access and experiences within the fashion industry.

We are keen to expand our 1:1 mentoring programme this year alongside our volunteers, as well as growing the variety of activities they can do together.

We are excited to continue working with our Youth Board to help shape our programmes and co-produce projects that help to develop their unique skills. Our growth over the past year has further strengthened our aspirations to support a more equal East London, making it full of opportunities and an exciting place for young people.

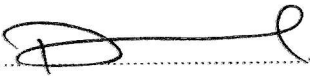
Trustees' Responsibilities

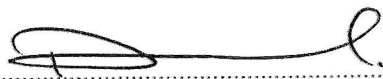

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FIRST PERIOD ENDED 31ST MAY 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation & Assessment of Going Concern

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP - FRS102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Assessment of Going Concern

Preparation of the accounts is on a going concern basis. The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Incoming Resources

Recognition of Incoming Resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Incoming Resources with Related Expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resource and related expenditure are reported gross in the SOFA.

Grants and Donations

Grants and Donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Tax Reclaims on Donations and Gifts

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SOFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SOFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Donated Services and Facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts.

Investment Income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Expenditure and Liabilities

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Governance Costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the trustees meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to a grant which remain in control of the charity.

Investments

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

Unrestricted funds

These funds can be used for the general objectives of the charity as set out in the trustees report. The movements of the unrestricted funds are given in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Restricted funds

These funds are where the donor has specified a purpose for the donation made. These restrictions often arise as a result of appeals for special offerings for specific purposes.

Designated funds

These funds are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for particular purposes or projects.

Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year and cost at least £1,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.

Depreciation Expense

Depreciation is calculated at a rate to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates applied are as follows:

The Charity operate a PAYE Scheme to pay all employed members of staff and no members of staff received emoluments of over £60,000. The Charity also employs members of staff under a contract for services, on a self-employed basis and is therefore not liable for Tax and National Insurance Payment for members under a contract for services.

12. TRUSTEES AND OTHER RELATED PARTIES

During the financial period Georgia Witter (Relative to Trustee Mr Daniel Burnand) received £10,380 in salary related payments under a contract for services in her capacity as a Consultant for The Outrunners Charity in furtherance of the Charity's objects. The Charity Trustees obtained approval from the Charity Commission and all conflicts of interest have been identified, documented and managed accordingly.

No other payments were made to trustees or any persons connected with them during this financial period. No other material transaction took place between the organisation and a trustee or any person connected with them.

13. RISK ASSESSMENT

The Trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated, combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

14. RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the CIO's needs. This is based on the CIO's size and the level of financial commitments held. The Trustees aim to ensure the CIO will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income or unexpected expenditure. The Trustees will endeavour not to set aside funds unnecessarily.

15. PUBLIC BENEFIT

The CIO acknowledges its requirement to demonstrate clearly that it must have charitable purposes or 'aims' that are for the public benefit. Details of how the CIO has achieved this are provided in the Trustees report. The Trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit before deciding what activities the CIO should undertake.

Report to the trustees/ members of The Outrunners Charity on the accounts for the first period ended 31st May 2021 set out on pages 8 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act,
