Para 1.17 and 1.19	<p>We are a recently formed registered charity and have been operating since July 2020, although our activities have been affected by the global COVID-19 pandemic which has limited our ability to raise donations and pursue projects.</p> <p>However, we have raised £13656.06 in funds via donations for a project to build the following in Aframano:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● A pre-school building, and● Teacher accommodation <p>Building work for the project started in February 2022.</p>

		<p>Aframano has a junior school with four or five classrooms, for children aged 5 to 12. This accommodates children of junior school age. The villagers wanted to establish a pre-school for children too young to go to the junior school. This will benefit the children by preparing them for school education, but importantly it will also benefit parents, by freeing them of childcare during part of the day and enabling them to work.</p> <p>Because Aframano is isolated, the villagers also asked for a small building to accommodate teachers who stay in the village during the week, and return home at weekends. This will help attract better teachers who are able to spend more time teaching without worrying about how they will get home each night.</p>

Achievements and Performance

Para 1.20	<p>In January 2021, Professor Mark Ryan made a trip to Ghana to (21 January to 3 February) meet with the builders and community to agree the spec of the Pre-School and Teacher Accommodation. During this visit Professor Ryan agreed the materials that would be used for the Pre-School (concrete floor; walls made from blocks which will be plastered and painted; windows will be wood, with shutters, no glass; the roof will be corrugated aluminium; the ceiling will be plywood). It was also agreed to refurbish two existing buildings (and demolish a third one) for the Teacher Accommodation, rather than build a small building with 3 rooms.</p> <p>Administration processes were also agreed as well as some hardship funds (in line with the Turbo Ghana Sponsoring Education and Hardship Fund Policy). Also potential new projects were also discussed. These include potential future projects (Kontonho, Anyakammamu, and Sereso), which were discussed at a meeting with the trustees when Professor Ryan returned to the UK.</p> <p><u>Aframano Pre-School</u></p> <p>We have begun building the pre-school which is located near the existing school building. The pre-school has two classrooms and two other rooms (suitable as offices or store rooms). The pre-school will comprise two large rooms, each 7m x 6.6m; and two smaller rooms of 4.2m</p>

		<p>x 3.2m. There is also a verandah of 1.8m x 14m. In total, the space is about 150 sq m. The building work is progressing well. The foundations are in place and so is the main structure, and the roofing has started.</p> <p><u>Aframano Teacher Accommodation</u></p> <p>There is currently a small semi-derelict building with four rooms on the site where we are planning the teacher accommodation, some of the rooms in this semi-derelict building are currently used for teacher accommodation. The rooms are very basic: they have some bedding on the floor, a chair or two, and a makeshift curtain covering the window opening. Two teachers share a room, but currently not all the rooms are habitable.</p> <p>The rooms we build will be similar in style, accommodating two teachers per room. We will build to a better standard: there will be shutters that can be closed on the window, and we will also equip the existing rooms with nicer bedding. If we have money left over, we will also improve the quality of the existing rooms.</p> <p>The building we are building will provide 4 small rooms (2 teachers per room) and 2 larger rooms (3 teachers per room) - total up to 14 teachers will be accommodated.</p> <p>Building work for the teacher accommodation is also under way. The foundations and basic structure is in place.</p>

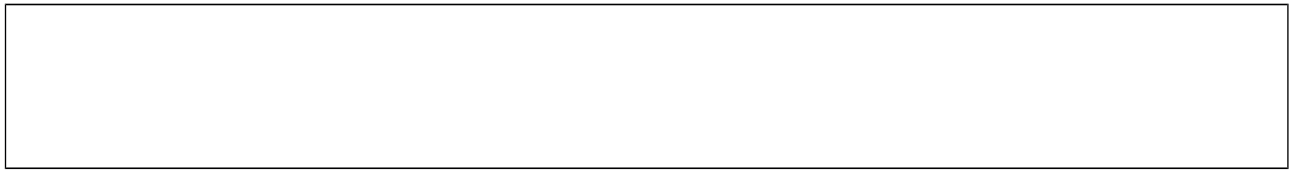
