OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

a) Objectives

The objects of the CIO are:

The relief of poverty in Malawi and Ghana in particular, but not exclusively, by the improvement of the conditions of life in socially and economically disadvantaged communities and providing: grants, items, and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.

The Trustees have reviewed the Charity Commissions general guidance on public benefit and have complied with duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have regard to this guidance. The Trustees always ensure that the projects undertaken by Amplify Action (1190591) are in line with the Charity's Objects.

Amplify Action's Values: Be Heard, Be Together. Be Curious, Be Brave. These values apply across operations and activities in the UK, Ghana, and Malawi, including the ethos that we apply when working in partnership with organisations.

b) Activities and public benefit

What Amplify Action is set up to achieve

- Support locally based change-makers and their organisations (CSOs/ NGOs) in Malawi and Ghana who are supporting communities through education and/or economic empowerment programmes.
- Improve standard of education in rural areas.
- Improve access to and knowledge on sexual reproductive health and rights.
- Improve access to sustainable income through appropriate skills development.
- Advocate for women and girls' rights, and the inclusion of those who are marginalised.

How the charity's purposes are beneficial

- Improve children's, young peoples, and women's opportunity to achieve their potential and claim their rights
- Increase educational access, attainment and achievement of girls and boys at primary and secondary level.
- Increase access and opportunity to earn a sustainable decent income for those facing marginalisation in society due to contextually related factors.

Who specifically benefits from the charity's activities

- Benefits children and their families in Kambwa and Maani Communities, Lilongwe, Malawi.

- Benefits surrounding communities to Bolgatanga, northern-east Ghana, with a focus on Women and Girls.

Specific needs that have been identified (by CIO and partners)

Malawi

- Under-resourced rural primary schools across Malawi lack the education system and quality of education compared to more urban environments within and across country.
- Girls and boys face different barriers that mean there remains a high drop out rate across rural primary schools.

Ghana

- Women and girls in northern Ghana have limited access to sexual reproductive health and rights education, resources (including sanitary towels) and knowledge.
- Women and young adolescent girls in Bolgatanga district of Ghana, who have either accessed and/or completed, never accessed, or dropped out of school have limited opportunity to earn a decent income.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Fundraising Events: Amplify Action was delighted to be invited back to Portsmouth High School for Girls to feature the work of their partner Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) at the school's Spring celebration. Alongside this, Amplify Action participated in Silkstead Sunflower Festival as a stall holder and was also particularly pleased to take part in two festive village events hosted throughout November and December 2024.

Programme Funding: Amplify Action is pleased to have raised restricted funds to support its locally based civil society partner in Bolgatanga, ASIGE to implement a vocational training project to support over 20 young women to gain the skills that will enable them to be financially independent. We also raised restricted funds to support a Goat Farming project and procure desks for two schools through our partner in Malawi, CECESD. Funds raised across all projects included monitoring and evaluation costs.

Networks: Amplify Action continued to value and build its networks and memberships to ensure connections and visibility. Amplify Action also continues to be a member of Bond UK, Girls Not Brides: The Global Partnership to end Child Marriage and the Alliance for Feminist Movements.

Partnership working:

In partnership with Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) who are based in Bolgatanga, north-eastern Ghana, we have;

⇒ **Continued to invest in the economic empowerment of over 420 women who are a part of ASIGE basket weaving cooperative in northern Ghana.**

Since May 2021, Amplify Action has been investing in- and continued to do so during 2024- an existing basket weaving social enterprise initiated in 2018 to support the empowerment of women and girls through education and economic independence in northern Ghana. In 2024 Amplify Action invested over a further £1,300 into this women's cooperative.

⇒ **Supported a vocational training project in partnership with ASIGE with a goal of ensuring that 21 adolescent girls in Upper-East Ghana are economically empowered with skills to earn a sustainable income.**

This project was implemented in 2024, and included the following activities:

21 adolescent girls and young women participated and completed a programme of vocational skills training (in either sewing, weaving, welding, hairdressing) received from master craftspeople.

They also received comprehensive training in entrepreneurship, customer management and technology for modern business.

All trainees had monthly mentor sessions alongside sexual health awareness sessions to ensure they have the information to make informed decisions about their health and futures.

All trainees received the necessary tools and equipment during their training to be able to set up businesses upon completion. They are due to graduate in early 2025.

In partnership with CECESD we have;

⇒ **Facilitated a programme of work with two communities – Maani and Kwambwa- supporting them to implement a Goat Farming Project that will enable holistic outcomes for their households and ultimately support them to send their children to school.**

CECESD have developed partnerships with two schools in Lilongwe; Maani and Kambwa, and we were pleased to be able to continue to support them during 2024 through a Goat Farming Project titled N'tukula Mudzi, which means 'Community Empowering.' In Chichewa.

Activities included:

Grouping community members and providing them with goats. The groups received training from a qualified vet on how to raise them for agricultural farming.

Over twelve months, the goats multiplied and droppings from them were collected as manure to fertilise soil to enable crop growth.

Upon receipt of agricultural inputs, the remaining six months of the project focussed on the cultivation of crops, which, when harvested were split between group members.

Ultimately community members were able to keep multiplying their goats or selling them to support household costs, including supporting their children's education.

⇒ **Raised funds to support the procurement of desks and chairs for two primary schools.**

Both schools explained that basic resources such as desks would go a long way in ensuring children setting their exams were comfortable and able to focus (over being sat on the floor), and girls, particularly those at the upper end of primary would feel more secure and dignified sitting at desks, when wearing a uniform.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

a) Team Structure

Founding and new trustees work with two programme support volunteers and two partners partner organisations (one based in Malawi and one based in Ghana) to plan and coordinate all the projects and interventions supported by Amplify Action.

Operations in Ghana are supported by an in-country programme support volunteer who communicates and coordinates with our partner Advocacy for Social Inclusion and Girls Education (ASIGE) and takes the lead on delivery of operations.

Operations in Malawi are directly planned with our partner, Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD), who directly lead on implementation, management and reporting of activities and operations.

Amplify Actions Board of Trustees comply with Amplify Actions governing document (constitution) and the law. They act in the charity's best interest, manage Amplify Action's resources responsibly, act with appropriate care and skill and ensure that the charity is accountable and operates in a transparent way.

b) Appointment of charity trustees

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

c) Retirement and removal of charity trustees

(1) A charity trustee ceases to hold office if he or she:

(a) retires by notifying the CIO in writing (but only if enough charity trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation takes effect to form a quorum for meetings);

(b) is absent without the permission of the charity trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months and the trustees resolve that his or her office be vacated;

(c) dies;

(d) in the written opinion, given to the company, of a registered medical practitioner treating that person, has become physically or mentally incapable of acting as a director and may remain so for more than three months;

(e) is disqualified from acting as a charity trustee by virtue of sections 178-180 of the Charities Act 2011 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision).

(2) Any person retiring as a charity trustee is eligible for reappointment.

The only persons eligible to be members of the CIO are its charity trustees. Membership of the CIO cannot be transferred to anyone else. Any member and charity trustee who ceases to be a charity trustee automatically ceases to be a member of the CIO.

Amplify Action was also particularly pleased to take part in two festive village events hosted throughout November and December 2023.

Programme Funding:

Amplify Action is pleased to have raised restricted funds to support its locally based civil society partner in Bolgatanga, ASIGE to design, plan and implement a vocational training project to support over 20 young women to gain the skills that will enable them to be financially independent. This was made possible through restricted grant funding secured during 2023 from two UK based Trusts and Foundations.

During 2023 our partner CECESD completed a restricted funded project. We were pleased to share the achievements and stories with the two donors who made this project possible.

Visibility:

Inspired by the work of our partners in Ghana and Malawi, during 2022 Amplify Action looked at ways that we can better amplify the work of the changemakers that we are privileged to be working alongside and learning from. We have talked about them and the people and communities that they serve through our social media platforms, and we have delivered blogs on their achievements and learning.

During 2024, we intend to do more of this by developing our website and communications channels.

Networks:

Building upon our networks and partnerships developed and established in 2021 and 2022, Amplify Action became a member of Bond.

Amplify Action continues to be a member of The Foundation for Social Improvement and Girls Not Brides: The Global Partnership to end Child Marriage and the Alliance for Feminist Movements.

Partnership working:

In partnership with Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) who are based in Bolgatanga, northern Ghana, we have;

⇒ Invested in the economic empowerment of over 400 women who are a part of ASIGE's basket weaving cooperative.

Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) is a well-established social enterprise supporting the empowerment of women and girls through education and economic independence in Bolgatanga, northern Ghana.

We asked ASIGE what type of support they would like from Amplify Action, that would support their mission. They told us they want to continue to expand their Basket Weaving social enterprise cooperative to enable more rural women in northern Ghana to be able to become financially independent and economically empowered.

During 2022, we invested almost £2,690 into ASIGE's cooperative- a 68% increase on our investment in 2022. These investments continue to support the provision of decent work to over 400 women across six communities in and around Bolgatanga.

⇒ **Support a vocational training project in partnership with ASIGE with a goal of ensuring that 20 adolescent girls in Upper-East Ghana are economically empowered with skills to earn a sustainable income.**

Throughout 2023 we successfully secured 50% of the funds required to deliver this project. ASIGE were able to start the recruitment process towards the end of 2023 and we look forward to reaching the full fundraising target and seeing the project progress, in 2024.

In partnership with Beach Art Gallery School (BAGS) based in Mangochi, at the start of the year we;

⇒ **made a one-off donation to support post-cyclone Freddy efforts in Cape Maclear.**

BAGS is a community-based school founded in 2012 by a Malawian youth who calls Cape Maclear home, David Chigalu. BAGS provides basic education and creative arts outlets for children and young people aged 4-16 who do not attend school due to their parents and guardians being unable to pay the associated costs for uniform and school fees.

In partnership with Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD) we have;

⇒ **Facilitated the implementation programme of work at two communities in Lilongwe- Maani and Kambwa, which supported a Family Strengthening approach to ensure inclusive education.**

CECESD have established partnerships with two schools in Lilongwe; Maani and Kambwa, and we were pleased to be able to build upon achievements and learnings from 2021 and 2022 and continue to support them during 2023 to implement a programme with a goal to reduce the rate of school dropouts that have increased since the Covid19 pandemic. It set out to do this by increasing family stability and economic prosperity in order to lessen the burden of costs associated with sending children to school. The activities implemented to achieve this goal included providing 40 households with irrigation farming training and agricultural inputs such as maize, potato, tomato, and bean seeds, along with fertiliser.

The impact of the project was such that families who participated in the farming activities were able to learn a new skill (irrigation farming) and as a result sell a portion of the food they harvested. With the profits they made from selling their vegetables they have been able to pay the school fees for their children. They also kept a portion of the food grown and used it to sustain themselves and their families for approx. 1 month.

Operations in Malawi are directly planned with our partners, Beach Art Gallery School and Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD), who directly lead on implementation, management and reporting of activities and operations.

Amplify Actions Board of Trustees comply with Amplify Actions governing document (constitution) and the law. They act in the charity's best interest, manage Amplify Action's resources responsibly, act with appropriate care and skill and ensure that the charity is accountable and operates in a transparent way.

b) Appointment of charity trustees

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In February 2023, Trustee- Jack Thompsett- resigned following 23 months of service to Amplify Action of which the Trustees are grateful for.

(d) in the written opinion, given to the company, of a registered medical practitioner treating that person, has become physically or mentally incapable of acting as a director and may remain so for more than three months;


(e) is disqualified from acting as a charity trustee by virtue of sections 178-180 of the Charities Act 2011 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision).

(2) Any person retiring as a charity trustee is eligible for reappointment.

The only persons eligible to be members of the CIO are its charity trustees. Membership of the CIO cannot be transferred to anyone else. Any member and charity trustee who ceases to be a charity trustee automatically ceases to be a member of the CIO.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

a) Objectives

The objects of the CIO are:

The relief of poverty in Malawi and Ghana in particular, but not exclusively, by the improvement of the conditions of life in socially and economically disadvantaged communities and providing: grants, items, and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Fundraising Events:

Amplify Action was delighted to be invited back to *Portsmouth High School for Girls* to feature the work of their partner Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) at the school's Spring and Festive celebrations.

Amplify Action was also particularly pleased to take part in a village event hosted by The Shoe Inn, in December 2022.

Programme Funding:

Amplify Action was pleased to support its locally based civil society partner in Lilongwe, Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD) to design and implement a project working with two community based primary schools. This was made possible through restricted grant funding secured during 2022 from two UK based Trusts and Foundations.

We look forward to reporting to these Trusts and Foundations during 2023 on impact, outcomes and learnings demonstrated as a result of their investment.

Visibility:

Inspired by the work of our partners in Ghana and Malawi, during 2022 Amplify Action looked at ways that we can better amplify the work of the changemakers that we are privileged to be working alongside and learning from. We have talked about them and the people and communities that they serve through our social media platforms, and we have delivered blogs on their achievements and learning.

During 2023, we intend to do more of this by developing our website and communications channels.

Networks:

Building upon our networks and partnerships developed and established in 2021, during 2022 Amplify Action became a member of the Alliance for Feminist Movements.

Amplify Action continues to be a member of The Foundation for Social Improvement and Girls Not Brides: The Global Partnership to end Child Marriage.

Partnership working:

In partnership with Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) who are based in Bolgatanga, northern Ghana, we have;

⇒ Invested in the economic empowerment of over 400 women who are a part of ASIGE's basket weaving cooperative.

Advocacy for Social Improvement and Girls Education (ASIGE) is a well-established social enterprise supporting the empowerment of women and girls through education and economic independence in Bolgatanga, northern Ghana.

We asked ASIGE what type of support they would like from Amplify Action, that would support their mission. They told us they want to continue to expand their Basket Weaving social enterprise cooperative to enable more rural women in northern Ghana to be able to become financially independent and economically empowered.

During 2022, we invested almost £1,600 into ASIGE's cooperative- a 15% increase on our investment in 2021. These investments continue to support the provision of decent work to over 420 women across six communities in and around Bolgatanga.

In partnership with Beach Art Gallery School (BAGS) based in Mangochi, Malawi we have;

⇒ continued to support a programme that provides meals to 180 school aged children at a community-based school.

BAGS is a community-based school founded in 2012 by a Malawian youth who calls Cape Maclear home, David Chigalu. BAGS provides basic education and creative arts outlets for children and young people aged 4-16 who do not attend school due to their parents and guardians being unable to pay the associated costs for uniform and school fees.

In partnership with Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD) we have;

⇒ Facilitated the implementation programme of work at two communities in Lilongwe- Maani and Kambwa, which supported a Family Strengthening approach to ensure inclusive education.

CECESD have established partnerships with two schools in Lilongwe; Maani and Kambwa, and we were pleased to be able to build upon achievements and learnings from 2021 and continue to support them during 2022 to implement a programme that, through an inclusive approach, supported children who come from economically poor households to stay and remain at school.

This nine-month programme worked with 40 households in the Kambwa and Maani communities with a particular focus on female headed and single parent households and reached over 150 family members in total.

The programme included providing agricultural inputs and training for 40 families in diversifying farming techniques, provided solar power lighting and energy to schools and households and provided out-of-school life skills lessons and learning resources for children from economically poor households.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

a) Team Structure

Founding and new trustees continue to work with two programme support volunteers and three partner organisations (two based in Malawi and one based in Ghana) to plan and coordinate all the projects and interventions supported by Amplify Action.

Operations in Ghana are supported by an in-country programme support volunteer who communicates and coordinates with our partner Advocacy for Social Inclusion and Girls Education (ASIGE) and takes the lead on delivery of operations.

Operations in Malawi are directly planned with our partners, Beach Art Gallery School and Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD), who directly lead on implementation, management and reporting of activities and operations.

Amplify Actions Board of Trustees comply with Amplify Actions governing document (constitution) and the law. They act in the charity's best interest, manage Amplify Action's resources responsibly, act with appropriate care and skill and ensure that the charity is accountable and operates in a transparent way.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

We became a member of the Girls not Brides Global Partnership to end child marriage. We also established a partnership with Ivy Louise Design who have supported us to invest in an existing social enterprise in Ghana.

However, our proudest achievement in 2021 is undoubtedly the development of partnerships with Advocacy for Social Development and Girls Education (ASIGE), Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD) and Beach Art Gallery School- Chembe (BAGS), and what they have achieved throughout 2021 with and for their communities in Ghana and Malawi

*In partnership with **ASIGE** we have;*

⇒ Invested in the economic empowerment of over 400 women who are a part of ASIGE basket weaving cooperative in northern Ghana.

In May 2021, we were privileged to be able to have engaged with Dorcas Apoore, the Founder and Executive Director of ASIGE, an existing social enterprise initiated in 2018 to support the empowerment of women and girls through education and economic independence in northern Ghana.

We asked ASIGE what type of support they would like from Amplify Action, that would support their mission. They told us they want to expand their Basket Weaving social enterprise cooperative to enable more rural women in northern Ghana to be able to become financially independent and economically empowered. Since September 2021, we have invested almost £1,400 into ASIGE's cooperative, which has supported the provision of decent work to over 420 women across six communities in and around Bolgatanga.

*In partnership with **BAGS** we have;*

⇒ Supported a critical and immediate need of providing meals to 180 school aged children whose lives have been severely disrupted by Covid-19 in Mangochi, Malawi.

BAGS is a community-based school founded in 2012 by a Malawian youth who calls Cape Maclear home, David Chigalu. BAGS provides basic education and creative arts outlets for children and young people aged 4-16 who do not attend school due to their parents and guardians being unable to pay the associated costs for uniform and school fees.

BAGS relied on selling arts and crafts made by children of the school to tourists to generate core funds to provide meals and stationery to children and young people. With Covid-19 bringing a stop to tourism, BAGS explained that they needed immediate support to sustain their feeding programme- a meal, possibly the only that child would have that day, three times a week for every single of the 180 attendees of the school.

Since September 2021 Amplify Action has been supporting BAGS with a monthly contribution towards their short-term feeding project.

In partnership with CECESD we have;

⇒ Facilitated the implementation programme of work at two schools in Lilongwe- Maani and Kambwa, which supported the most vulnerable children to return to school following extended closures due to Covid-19.

CECESD have developed partnerships with two schools in Lilongwe; Maani and Kambwa, and we were pleased to be able to support them in March 2021 to implement a programme that, through an inclusive approach, supported children that are most vulnerable of dropping out of school following Covid-19 related school closures.

The programme included providing basic counselling skills education to 24 members of the Parents and Schools Associations and attaching 40 identified vulnerable children to mentors and regular life skills sessions, books, and pencils. Our partnership also ensured the school was equipped with sanitation resources.

The programmes output impact:

- 40 vulnerable children received an exercise book and two pens each.
- 20 vulnerable girls received sanitary pads.
- 24 parents and teachers received basic counselling skills education to support children who are facing personal challenges.
- Life skills sessions and safe spaces have been created for vulnerable children to access discuss challenges they are facing.
- Maani and Kwamba primary schools received water buckets, handwashing stations and sanitiser.

Operations in Ghana are supported by an in-country programme support volunteer who communicates and coordinates with our partner Advocacy for Social Inclusion and Girls Education (ASIGE) and takes the lead on delivery of operations.

Operations in Malawi are directly planned with our partners, Beach Art Gallery School and Centre for Community Education and Social Development (CECESD), who directly lead on implementation, management and reporting of activities and operations.

Amplify Actions Board of Trustees comply with Amplify Actions governing document (constitution) and the law. They act in the charity's best interest, manage Amplify Action's resources responsibly, act with appropriate care and skill and ensure that the charity is accountable and operates in a transparent way.

b) Appointment of charity trustees

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

c) Retirement and removal of charity trustees

(1) A charity trustee ceases to hold office if he or she:

(a) retires by notifying the CIO in writing (but only if enough charity trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation takes effect to form a quorum for meetings);

(b) is absent without the permission of the charity trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months and the trustees resolve that his or her office be vacated;

(c) dies;

(d) in the written opinion, given to the company, of a registered medical practitioner treating that person, has become physically or mentally incapable of acting as a director and may remain so for more than three months;

(e) is disqualified from acting as a charity trustee by virtue of sections 178-180 of the Charities Act 2011 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision).

(2) Any person retiring as a charity trustee is eligible for reappointment.

The only persons eligible to be members of the CIO are its charity trustees. Membership of the CIO cannot be transferred to anyone else. Any member and charity trustee who ceases to be a charity trustee automatically ceases to be a member of the CIO.
