1. Street Rights' Charitable Purpose

The objects of Street Rights are:

To promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations), particularly but not exclusively for street-connected children, throughout the world by all or any of the following means:

- Monitoring abuses of human rights;
- Obtaining redress for the victims of human rights abuse;
- Relieving need among the victims of human rights abuse;
- Research into human rights issues;
- Providing technical advice to government and others on human rights matters;
- Contributing to the sound administration of human rights law;
- Commenting on proposed human rights legislation;
- Raising awareness of human rights issues;
- Promoting public support for human rights;
- Promoting respect for human rights among individuals and corporations;
- International advocacy of human rights;
- Eliminating infringements of human rights.

In furtherance of that object but not otherwise, the trustees shall have power:

To engage in political activity provided that the trustees are satisfied that the proposed activities will further the purposes of the charity to an extent justified by the resources committed and the activity is not the dominant means by which the charity carries out its objects.

2. Public Benefit

The Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit to review the charity's aims and objectives and ensure its activities and future-planning are focused on achieving the charity's aims and objectives.

3. Activities, achievements and performance in 2024/25

Street Rights' aim is to promote street-connected children's rights worldwide. This year marked a step change for Street Rights as we moved from planning and building our work to action.

Last year we established a multi-year, collaborative partnership with Umthombo and Centre for Child Law in South Africa. Both Umthombo and Centre for Child Law are highly regarded as experts in their fields and together we are working to secure justice for street-connected children in South Africa.

In September, we ran consultations with street-connected children and young people in Durban, on the east coast of South Africa. The consultations represent phase 1 of our programme and enable us to understand street-connected children's lives, the issues they currently face and that they themselves identify to be the most urgent.

In Durban, the consultations highlighted huge poverty, unsanitary living conditions, high youth unemployment and unstable employment in the informal economy, police harassment and violence, high drug dependency (males), children removed from their mother's care (females) and aspirations for a better life.

Participation was embedded into the consultation process. The children and young people were involved in the planning and analysis of the sessions. They determined what questions were asked and in what way, for instance childcare was provided for the mothers with babies so they could focus on the discussion. As street-connected children are a highly marginalised and vulnerable group, we obtained ethical approval from the University of Pretoria for the consultations and our structure and facilitation activities were guided by the award-winning *Growing Up On The Streets* research project. Facilitators were adults who the children and young people know and trust.

One learning from the consultations was that there is limited legal knowledge amongst street-connected children and young people. As a result, we facilitated an additional learning session with the Centre for Child Law and the children and young people in Durban to better understand their rights on the streets and how the law in South Africa addresses their rights. Staff from the Centre for Child Law facilitated a knowledge-sharing session and produced a child-friendly leaflet the children and young people could use as a future reference.

Our aim into next year is to recreate these consultations in different locations to generate a national picture of street-connected children's lives across South Africa.

We remain a member of the Consortium for Street Children – the global network for street children organisations – both to learn from our peers and contribute to the sector.

4. Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees are responsible for the administration of the charity. The Trustees meet quarterly (four times a year) to agree and set the charity's strategic direction, discuss policy matters and review the operational performance of the charity. This includes through reviewing and updating the charity's risk register and putting policies and procedures in place to mitigate those risks.

Street Rights' Constitution sets out how new Trustees are appointed – existing Trustees can appoint new Trustees at any time. When selecting new Trustees, regard is had to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for effective administration of Street Rights. Trustees serve for a period of three years and can be reappointed up to three times.

Street Rights currently has one volunteer, part-time.

5. Financial review 2024/25

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and financial review of Street Rights.

Income and expenditure:

Street Rights' income was £4 and expenditure £3,585 for the period 2024/25. A total of £718 was carried forward.

3. Activities, achievements and performance in 2023/24

Street Rights' aim is to promote street-connected children's rights worldwide. This year marks a step change for Street Rights as we move from planning and building our work to action.

We have embarked on a multi-year collaborative partnership with Umthombo and Centre for Child Law in South Africa to secure justice for street-connected children. Both Umthombo and Centre for Child Law are highly regarded as experts in their fields and we are excited to be working together.

Umthombo has decades of experience working directly with street-connected children and youth in Durban, South Africa to transform their lives. With a multi-disciplinary team of social workers, community workers and former street-connected children Umthombo provides direct support to street-connected children and youth. This ranges from counselling to drug support to skills-based training to family reintegration. Umthombo is an active member of civil society in South Africa and has worked with local government to improve services for street-connected children. Centre for Child Law is a legal advocacy organisation, based at the University of Pretoria, South Africa and has been at the forefront of protecting children's rights nationally in South Africa and, increasingly, internationally in global fora. Centre for Child Law provides legal representation to children in South Africa and has worked on varied issues from education to challenges facing migrant and undocumented children.

This year we received funding to deliver the first phase of our programme in the summer of 2024 – consultations with street-connected children to identify the rights violations that most affect them. As street-connected children are a highly marginalised and vulnerable group, we are seeking ethical approval for these consultations from the University of Pretoria, South Africa.

We remain a member of the Consortium for Street Children – the global network for street children organisations – both to learn from our peers and contribute to the sector.

Please note that Street Rights' sole volunteer took time off for maternity from 21st September 2023 for the remainder of this reporting year and as such our activities were reduced.

4. Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees are responsible for the administration of the charity. The Trustees meet quarterly (four times a year) to agree and set the charity's strategic direction, discuss policy matters and review the operational performance of the charity. Street Rights' aim is to promote street-connected children's rights worldwide. This year, we focused on building the foundations of the organisation both programmatically and from a fundraising perspective.

We have ensured our programmatic model is robust and developed it in consultation with practitioner and researcher peers in the sector. Our key priority remained fundraising and building the information and materials we need to sustainably fundraise for the organisation. This focus has been successful as we received confirmation of our first funding in April 2023 to start our programme in South Africa next year.

We have also increased the expertise on our Advisory Council with the addition of Professor Lorraine van Blerk onto our Advisory Council. Professor van Blerk brings a wealth of expertise on street-connected children. She has conducted research about and with street-connected children, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa, for over 20 years and has significant expertise in ensuring their participation in the research process.

We continued to participate in sector events of relevance to promoting street-connected children's rights worldwide, through the Consortium for Street Children and others.

The Trustees meet quarterly (four times a year) to agree and set the charity's strategic direction, discuss policy matters and review the operational performance of the charity. 3. Activities, achievements and performance in 2021/22

Please note that Street Rights' sole volunteer took time off for maternity this reporting year and the activities of the charity date from October 2021 to March 2022.

Street Rights' aim is to promote street-connected children's rights. The Coronavirus pandemic has severely impacted street-connected children around the world, increasing the discrimination they face and leading to greater numbers of children connecting to the streets as families fall further into poverty. This is happening around the world with non-governmental organisations re-shifting or enhancing their work to respond and deliver immediate relief to street-connected children and their families, such as food distribution. Given this shift in the sector, Street Rights focused its strategy on determining where we could be most impactful in the future and building relationships with key stakeholders to do this, acknowledging that partnerships will take longer to develop as organisations' focus remains on increasing direct support to street-connected children.

This year, we focused on building the foundations of the organisation both programmatically and from a governance perspective. We increased our internal expertise by putting together an Advisory Council, bringing together some of the world's leading experts on street-connected children to enhance our knowledge and inform our direction. Dr Sarah Thomas de Benitez joined in February and brings a wealth of expertise across practice, research and policy for street-connected children at national and international levels. Street Rights also joined the Consortium for Street Children's (CSC) network, a body of 130 organisations working together to promote street-connected children's rights. As a network member Street Rights participated in CSC's events to increase our learning and knowledge of the sector.

The key priority for Street Rights remains fundraising and building the information and materials we need to be able to effectively and sustainably fundraise for the organisation.

4. Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees are responsible for the administration of the charity. The Trustees meet quarterly (four times a year) to agree and set the charity's strategic direction, discuss policy matters and review the operational performance of the charity. This includes through reviewing and updating the charity's risk register and putting policies and procedures in place to mitigate those risks.

Street Rights' Constitution sets out how new Trustees are appointed – existing Trustees can appoint new Trustees at any time. When selecting new Trustees, regard is had to the skills, knowledge and experience

needed for effective administration of Street Rights. Trustees serve for a period of three years and can be reappointed up to three times.

Street Rights currently has one volunteer, part-time. During 2021/22, the volunteer took time off for maternity from March 2021 to October 2021.

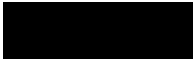
