Secretary's Annual Report

The past 12 months for the village may only be described as remarkable and the sense of community spirit has been revived and is benefiting the residents of the village. The Festival Cottages Community Room is the principal venue for the village community groups to meet and for all activities to be held, pensioners bingo, coffee morning and art class. The formation of the Pantry has provided a valuable lifeline for families and residents struggling with the cost of living and provides an opportunity for its members to meet and enjoy a cuppa and a chat. Exercise classes have recently been introduced on Fridays, and the feedback has been really encouraging, and the members really enjoy the sessions. Festival Cottages is the heart of the community and hopefully we will be able to secure the necessary funding during the next 12 months to refurbish the building and to create the space to enable the groups to expand and admit new members which will strengthen our community.

The Burradon and Camperdown Community Association and the community depends on the generosity and support of local foundations, trusts and statutory agencies. BACCA has secured £18,283 during the last financial year to improve local amenities and activities for the community groups and residents of the village. The grants received are summarised below:

The feedback from the pensioners, children and the community posts on social media demonstrates that the work of all the groups providing services and activities to the community is valued by the entire village. The public support for the community activities, enables BACCA to demonstrate to funders that all money donated transforms the lives of people living in our village.

Trips to York in September and the Sunderland Empire Pantomime in December 2024 were very popular and was reflected in the resident's feedback forms and the social media posts and comments. Lyn Lambton and Donna Glennie's support and consideration for the welfare of the pensioners on the trips is genuinely appreciated by the residents.

The community attended the Durham Miners Gala in July 2024 Banner which was a proud moment for the group of residents that marched the only banner from the Northumberland coalfields, past the County Hotel to the applause of the crowds.

A series of activities are regularly organised and held in the village, Church Summer and Easter Fairs, Burradon Juniors Rikki Todd Memorial and Remembrance Sunday Service. The events attract support from all sections of the village and raises funds for important causes and services in the village.

The village noticeboard was erected in the New Year and has been an immediate success. The publicising of community events has contributed to the increased membership of the various groups and also people participating in the village activities. A special mention to Alan James for his creative excellence and the wonderful posters that he produces for all groups in the village to promote community events.

The vandalism of the tree planted on Fryers Millennium Green by Don Toon's family in his memory provoked outrage in the village and a fund was established to purchase a replacement tree. Dawn Kelly donated a tree, cultivated by her granddaughter. A plaque was purchased with the funds that were generously donated by the local community. Don's family, friends and neighbours attended the dedication on 1 June 2025. Donna's eulogy regarding Don's life and his contribution to the local community was very poignant. The Facebook article regarding the unveiling of Don's memorial attracted 8,500 visits which exceeded any other previous articles and reflects the deep affection that remains for Don in the community.

A 27-year quest has concluded this year, with the commissioning of a memorial dedicated to the 15 men from the village that died in World War II. The memorial is a replica of the plaque that is dedicated to the men from the village who died in World War I and is exhibited in the village school. The wooden plinth has been manufactured by Bryan Roddham Wood Design Limited, and the steel plaques is being produced by Brunel Engraving Limited.

The generosity of the Barbour Foundation, Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust, Hadrian Trust and the William Leech Foundation, ensured the community was able to create this memorial which will be dedicated to the memory and sacrifice of 15 men who were the sons, brothers and grandsons of families in the village.

The memorial will be unveiled on 11 November 2025 at Burradon Primary School, and hopefully relatives of the 15 men will attend the ceremony with members of the local community to remember their sacrifice on behalf of a grateful village and nation.

North Tyneside Council announced a significant investment to regenerate Fryers Millennium Green and it is hoped that the improvements will encourage the community and visitors to utilise this valuable village amenity.

All of the achievements detailed in this and previous annual reports would not have been possible without the persistence and dedication of the Trustees of the Burradon and Camperdown Community Association. The Trustees should be proud of present and past achievements which has transformed the lives of local residents and will be an enduring legacy for future generations.

The 2023 annual report suggested that the previous period was a time of consolidation and a foundation for future success for the Burradon and Camperdown Community Association (“BACCA”) and local community groups. The subsequent 12 months has vindicated the prediction and all the community groups and associations in the village have experienced incredible success and achievement. There is an increasing sense that a vibrant community spirit is being restored with all the groups working together in partnership.

BACCA has been an integral and important contributor to the recent success and especially the £7,202 of grants that it has secured on behalf of various groups to provide activities and amenities for residents in the village. Funds were received from the trusts and foundations detailed below:

It is apparent from the feedback from the village groups and Burradon school that many pensioners and children would not have had the opportunity to participate in any organised activities. The school reported that only 37 of 176 children actually attended a pantomime with their families last Christmas.

The trusts and foundations have donated funds to BACCA and the Burradon and Camperdown Forum for decades and it is their generosity that has enabled the organisation of community activities on behalf of the residents of the village. BACCA sincerely appreciates the kindness and generosity of the trusts and foundations which has transformed the lives of people in our community.

BACCA secured a grant of £500 for Church of the Good Shepherd to purchase plants for its community garden. A grant of £500 was also secured for Burradon Bowling Club to purchase a specially adapted wheelchair for bowlers with either a disability or restricted movement. It is hoped that the community garden will attract new members to the Church and the availability of a wheelchair will encourage disabled residents to play bowls and its membership will increase.

The pensioners Thursday bingo and coffee morning both experienced a remarkable increase in the number of members from an initial 8-10 pensioners to 25 members at present. A new art class for pensioners recently started and the initial feedback is encouraging and hopefully new members will join.

The groups mentioned provide an essential lifeline to the pensioners in the village and contributed to creating new opportunities to socialise and develop new friendships. Penny Bundy, Joyce Davidson, Val Wilkinson and Irene Gilbert have earned the respect and admiration of the community for all their hard work and dedication.

Festival Cottages is the heart of our community and it is essential that the funding is secured to improve the room and increase its capacity to protect this valuable facility for future generations. The community will have to be vigilant, as there are suggestions that North Tyneside Council wish to convert Festival Cottage into residential accommodation. Festival Cottages is the last community amenity and its loss would have a detrimental effect on the provision of activities for all groups in our community.

Stephen Byers (former North Tyneside MP and founder of the Burradon and Camperdown Forum) donated £500 to pay for the coach hire for a group of 43 residents to attend the Durham Miners Picnic in Durham on 13 July 2024. The Burradon Colliery Banner was marched at the picnic to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of the miners' strike. The atrocious weather did not dampen the spirits of the village contingent (included an octogenarian and a 3-year-old child). The reaction and applause of the assembled crowds to the Burradon Colliery Banner (the sole representative of the Northumberland coalfield) as we passed the County Hotel was overwhelming. It was a proud day for our community.

There has also been a series of community events held in the village this year, Remembrance Sunday Memorial Service at the Nurses Cottage, Easter Coffee mornings, Summer Fayres and Christmas Carol Services at the Church of the Good Shepherd. The events are important and bring people together and contributes to creating a genuine sense of community in the village.

Sadly, the village has experienced incidents of crime and anti-social behaviour recently with the vandalism of the memorial to the 76 men and children killed at Burradon Colliery in 1860, the tree planted in memory of Don Toon and the nature reserve on the former Burradon Colliery site. Although, the incidents are regrettable, the reaction of the residents in the village on our Facebook page is evidence that the community has a resilient spirit.

Northumbria Police's crime commissioner attended a public meeting with local residents in 2023 and provided the residents with a commitment to create neighbourhood policing teams to reduce crime and disorder. The neighbourhood teams have not been established and the police do not engage with the communities of the Northwest or patrol our villages. It is an issue which we will have to address at future meetings.

The project to create a memorial to the 15 men from the village that perished in World War Two has experienced various setbacks and disappointments and has not progressed as anticipated. Sculptor, Andy McDermott withdrew from the project for personal reasons and Kath Smith emigrated to Australia and it was necessary to form a new team. Cameron Ayling and Tom Maley were subsequently engaged on the project. Disappointingly, their initial enthusiasm dissipated and the promises of a design and costs for the project which were to be provided in early Spring 2024 did not materialise. The eventual costs for the memorial significantly exceeded the initial predictions and were considered to be totally unreasonable. It was decided not to proceed with Cameron and Tom on the project.

Local resident, Alex Rowntree recently sketched a design of the proposed memorial and we were able to engage with Simon Richmond, Richmond Memorials regarding the provision of the stone base for the memorial. Simon Richmond attended a site meeting recently and agreed to provide a cost estimate which should be received imminently. A meeting was also held with Andy McDermott and he has agreed to resume his role in the project and is also preparing an estimate of the costs for the metal sculpture. Applications for funding will be prepared and submitted to trusts and foundations in October 2024 to commence the memorial project.

North Tyneside Council ("NTC") has a plan for North Tyneside to improve amenities, environment and employment opportunities to enhance the quality of life of local people. NTC has invested significant funds to improve and regenerate Whitley Bay, Tynemouth, Cullercoats, North Shields and the Fish Quay. NTC has also submitted bids for substantial funding to regenerate Wallsend. A £1.5m centre is proposed for Killingworth Lake and the villages of the Northwest have been offered entrance signs.

During the residents meeting with the police and crime commissioner in June 2023, Cllr Hallway insisted that significant funds would be available and invested in the village and the recent disappointment which is not unexpected and is consistent with the ward councillors' historic performances.

I trust that this report demonstrates the positive affect of the hard work and dedication of BACCA's trustees and the other community groups in the village which has improved the quality of life of local residents. It is essential that we all continue with these new partnerships and work together for the benefit of the community.

The past 12 months has been a period of consolidation and will be used as a solid foundation for future progress with our effort to enhance local amenities and activities to improve the quality of life of local residents. The Trustee's previously agreed to pursue the implementation of the following projects on behalf of the community:

- 20mph speed limit and a traffic management plan to improve road safety
- Memorial for the men in the village killed in WWII
- The refurbishment of the Festival Cottage
- The clearance of the land next to the village green to improve the appearance of the area
- Virtual heritage trail
- Ban dogs from the football pitches at the welfare
- Activities for children and pensioners of the village

It was extremely pleasing that BACCA has successfully developed new strategic partnerships with a number of officers within North Tyneside Council (environment, highways and housing) during the past 12 months. BACCA continues to work with Daren McVeigh, Environmental Services and is developing an effective partnership with Andrew Flynn and John Kermode, North Tyneside Council's Highways team in respect of projects to improve the local environment and schemes to improve road safety.

S services and Highways support has delivered genuine progress regarding improvements to the appearance of the village and road safety. Highways has secured funding for the creation of a traffic management scheme on Front Street/ Fryers Terrace, Burradon. Highways agreed to investigate the possibility of a traffic management scheme on Station Road, Camperdown and the introduction of a 20mph speed limit within the village. Andrew and John both agreed to attend a future meeting to discuss the results of the recent traffic surveys in the village and to report any progress regarding the completion of the road safety scheme on Front Street, Burradon.

It is important that we persevere with our efforts to develop a constructable dialogue and relationship with our ward councillors on behalf of the community.

It was disappointing that Andy McDermott withdrew from the project to create a memorial in honour of the village men who perished in WWII. However, a new team has been assembled to develop the project. Local sculptor and former soldier, Cameron Alwyn has agreed to work with the community to design a memorial. Alex Watson, Remembering the Past will work with the community to develop the project and secure the funding. Trustee's will recall Remembering the Past's valuable contribution to the Burradon Colliery Banner restoration project and it is hoped that their expertise will ensure similar success.

Meetings will be organised and held during Autumn 2023 and Spring of 2024 to discuss preliminary designs and possible sources of funding with a view to completing the project in Summer 2025 which will coincide with the 80th anniversary of both VE and VJ days.

Historically, an important aspect of our work has been to raise funds for projects for the benefit of the pensioners and children of the village. BACCA has applied for grants to fund the following activities for 2023/24:

Should the grant applications be successful, hopefully, it will be possible to arrange a trip for the pensioners early Autumn and the Christmas events for the children and pensioners.

The physical regeneration of the village's infrastructure has been an integral aspect of our campaign during the past 26 years and there has been a remarkable transformation of the dilapidated areas of the village. The recent refurbishment of the Halfway House and the planting of the flowerbed at the Pit Wheel Memorial has enhanced the appearance of this area of the village. North Tyneside Council has improved the maintenance of the Station Road roundabout and the new meadow is a significant improvement compared to the situation in 2022.

Local residents have completed a number of litter picks in the village during the Summer and collected a significant amount of rubbish which has been recognised and welcomed by the entire community. A small team of volunteers is supporting the Church of the Good Shepherd and are completing regular grass cutting, tree pruning and flowerbed maintenance. Chris Lowes and Paul Morrell repaired the memorial chairs which had been vandalised and should be recognised for their efforts.

The dilapidated appearance of the Grey Horse is undermining the appearance of the village and there has been no progress regarding NTC's compulsory purchase of the former police house on Station Road, Camperdown. It is essential that these issues are pursued and NTC should be pressurised to consider compulsory purchasing the Grey Horse in order that the site maybe sold to a developer to complete the conversion of the building.

We also wish to remember John Robson, the church warden following his recent and unexpected passing and in particular his dedication and commitment to the welfare of the congregation of the Church of the Good Shepherd and the wider community.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to all BACCA's Trustees for your contributions during the meetings in the past 12 months and the residents in the village are beginning to benefit from your commitment and dedication. I am confident that we will experience and celebrate similar progress in the future and hopefully we will be able to create a village that people are proud to live.

2022 Annual Report

Don Toon’s passing on 4 April 2022 was mourned by his family, friends and the wider community of North Tyneside. Don was a founder and dedicated member of the Burradon and Camperdown Forum and he made an overwhelming contribution to the successful revival of the village and community spirit.

The member will recall that the 2021 annual was rather pessimistic and it was apparent that Covid had devastated community spirit in the village and that we were presented with a significant challenge to address the issues created by the lockdown and its effects on the residents.

Ironically, it was the community’s disaffection with a series of issues affecting the village and its rapid decline in the past 4 years which provoked a reaction from the residents and galvanised public opinion. The residents demanded change and improvements to services and amenities in Burradon and Camperdown and included the following:

- The neglect of the flowerbed at the pit wheel memorial
- The appearance of the wildflower meadow on the roundabout
- The proposed confiscation and conversion of the Festival Cottage
- The evaporation of the water at Burradon pond
- The low level of attendance at the Remembrance Sunday Service at the Nurse’s Cottage

There has been a significant increase in people being active in the village and residents cleared the pit wheel for North Tyneside Council to plant, groups of people have volunteered to join a Friends of Burradon Pond Group, flowerbed at Burradon Church has been weeded and replanted (councillor Hallway contributed £200 from the councillors community fund) and the wagonway signs have been painted. The children at Burradon School conducted a community litter pick at the recreation ground and down the “gutter”, during really hot conditions.

The preservation of the Festival Cottage as a community facility provides the village with a foundation to rebuild a sense of community with the provision of a range of amenities and activities. The Brownies, BACCA and Burradon Juniors are using the resource at the moment and it is envisaged that a regular coffee morning will be organised for retired members of the village which will provide a valuable lifeline for one of the most vulnerable groups in any community. The residents deserve genuine praise for the successful campaign and the support of the ward councillors was crucial for the protection and refurbishment of the Festival Cottage.

BACCA has been a beneficiary of the recent resurgence in volunteering in the village, with a significant number of new members joining the group in the past 12 months to contribute and support the superb work and achievements of the existing members.

A survey has been prepared for distribution to the community and copies will be provided to the children of Burradon School, Burradon Juniors and BACCA to canvass people's views regarding the proposed projects to increase community amenities & activities and projects to increase public safety and the physical regeneration of the village. The projects include:

- 20mph speed limit and a traffic management plan to improve road safety
- Memorial for the men in the village killed in WWII
- The refurbishment of the Festival Cottage
- The clearance of the land next to the village green to improve the appearance of the area
- Virtual heritage trail
- Ban dogs from the football pitches at the welfare
- Activities for children and pensioners of the village

The members have selected the creation of a war memorial to formally commemorate the memory of the men from the village who made the ultimate sacrifice during WWII. The members have appointed Andy McDermott to work with the residents and the children of Burradon school to design and an appropriate design for the memorial. Marion Toye deserves a particular mention for providing details of the servicemen which had previously eluded our previous efforts to create a memorial.

The new members comprise people born in Burradon and Camperdown and also residents that decided to make the village their home and it is evident from their contributions at recent meetings that the future of BACCA and the village is secure for the foreseeable future.

Football matches have recently commenced on the newly laid pitches at the welfare and the entire facility is testimony to the dedication and commitment of Burradon Juniors management committee, coaches, players and parents and the club is the envy of most visiting teams.

Burradon Juniors also organised the first post-covid tournament in memory of Rikki Todd and was a tremendous success. Burradon Juniors wishes to expand the event and organise a village Summer carnival to generate more community spirit.

The longterm strategy for the physical regeneration of the dilapidated buildings and land in the village has progressed recently, with revised plans being submitted for the conversion of the Grey Horse. Although it is anticipated that NTC planning department will reject the present scheme for the overdevelopment of the site and highways issues. It is hoped that revised plans will be submitted for a more sensitive and appropriate development of the building and adjoining land.

The owner of the former Halfway House is refurbishing the building and it will transform the appearance of area and has preserved an important historic building in the village.

North Tyneside Council are to compulsory purchase the former Police House site on Station Road and a scheme will be developed for the site.

The events of the past 12 months clearly demonstrated that most people have genuine pride in the village.

The Burradon and Camperdown Community Association ("BACCA") was officially registered on 5 October 2020. BACCA has suffered the loss of one of its founder members, Gladys Haskins who sadly passed on 13 December 2020. Councillor Ray Glindon also passed on 20 April 2020. Gladys and Ray were both important contributors to the campaign to revive the village and create new amenities and opportunities for the community. Gladys and Ray will be sadly missed.

June and Ken Roddam have also moved to Ireland and both were popular members of the community and will be greatly missed, however, they leave with the goodwill and best wishes of BACCA members and the local residents. Fred Moxon also moved to live near his family.

In the period since the registration of BACCA, the community had to contend with the Governments' Covid restrictions and most of the activities in the village have been suspended due to the precautionary closure of the venues.

There is a genuine possibility that the community activities may not resume which would have a devastating effect on the lives of many of the most vulnerable residents in the village. Furthermore, events both pre and post covid demonstrated the importance of a community organisation to represent and protect the interests of the residents. Although the present crisis within the community may not be as serious as 1997, both BACCA and the other groups in the village will have to confront and overcome the challenge. 
