Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2021

The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 December 2021, which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes. The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2013).

Objectives and activities

Objectives

Around the world we see minority groups being discriminated, demonised, dehumanised. Their rights eroded, paving the way to mass atrocities. This is not a new story. It is predictable. It is also preventable.

Rights for Peace was established in 2018 to prevent mass atrocity crimes in fragile states, in collaboration with local organisations. It provides targeted training, research and advocacy on countering the steps that lead to genocide, starting with countering hate speech and discrimination. The need for a new human rights organisation focusing on peace as the end game was clear, with coinciding calls from UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres for new approaches prioritising *prevention*.

Rights for Peace is a founding member of the UK Civil Society Atrocity Prevention Working Group (whose members adopt a 'mass atrocity prevention lens' in their work) and an active partner of GAAMAC (Global Action Against Mass Atrocity Crimes). At the same time, Rights for Peace is deeply committed to bottom-up approaches, collaborating with and investing in the capacity and agency of community groups and local actors pursuing long term change.

Mission

- To prevent mass atrocity crimes through the pursuit of justice and human rights;
- To address the drivers of mass atrocities, particularly prejudiced or hate based ideology;
- To strengthen local capacities and resilience for long term prevention.

Strategic Focus: Countering Identity Violence through training, research and advocacy.

Activities

1. Thematic Advocacy (influencing narratives)

a. Countering Hate Speech and Discrimination

Key Message: we need to counter the steps that lead to genocide

Our approach to countering identity violence includes countering the steps to genocide. Our *Guide to Hate Violations in International Law*, launched in January 2021, provides a legal analysis of human rights violations that are based on a hate or bias motivation, starting with incitement to discrimination, hatred or hostility through to the commission of the ultimate hate crime: genocide. The virtual launch event involved a panel of speakers chaired by Judge Silvia Fernández de Gurmendi, former President of the International Criminal Court.

We picked up this theme again at the UN Minority Rights Forum in October 2021, making both oral and written submissions, outlining how an identity lens to human rights reporting can contribute to countering the steps to genocide. We reiterated that "Genocide is a process, not an event. The Holocaust did not start with the gas chambers, it started with hate speech" (in the words of Sheri Rosenberg).

a. Countering Sexual Violence in Conflict

Key Message: the culture of tolerance around conflict related sexual violence (CRSV) must end

In collaboration with a range of partners from the South Sudan Transitional Justice Working Group and the UN Development Programme (UNDP), we undertook research, raised awareness through a Country Briefing on CRSV in South Sudan and organised a “Survivors’ Speak” event at UNDP in Juba, South Sudan. Survivors of conflict-related sexual violence from across the country as well as from refugee camps in Northern Uganda spoke out at the event attended by policy officials, UN staff and diplomats.

In order to prevent, it is necessary to acknowledge and condemn wrongdoing. Silence and tolerance can normalise wrongdoing, creating an emboldening environment.

The “Survivors Speak” event put the **culture of intolerance and impunity** on policy agendas. CRSV was previously denied by the government, being brushed off as “isolated incidents”. Our Country Briefing on CRSV in South Sudan, launched with the Global Survivors Fund at the UN General Assembly in September 2021, showed that CRSV is widespread and endemic, affecting thousands upon thousands of women, girls, men and boys. CRSV is a form of identity-based violence: it is committed because the victims belong to a certain group, perceived as ‘the enemy’. Women are singled out with particular hate as they represent the reproductive and social fabric of the group being targeted. Seeking recognition, accountability and measures to repair the harm through transitional justice processes contributes to prevention, not least because guarantees of non-recurrence can be requested by victims as a form of reparation.

As a result of Rights for Peace’ work, the concept of CRSV is talked about in South Sudan and survivors of CRSV are no longer invisible. Both are now frequently mentioned by policy makers and influencers, demonstrating how the issue has risen up the political agenda.

2. Country Projects

a. Sudan

Countering Hate speech and Discrimination

The military takeover on 25 October 2021 has resulted in an increased vulnerability to conflict, superimposed on pre-existing identity-based violence in different parts of Sudan. Sudan’s history of genocide has seen repeat mass atrocities, with recent explosions of violence in West Darfur in January 2021, April 2021, and in West, Central and North Darfur in November 2021.

Building on the Network for Countering Identity Violence initiated by Rights for Peace remotely during the pandemic, we conducted further remote trainings and consultations on hate narratives and structural discrimination, leading to the publication of *Discrimination and Hate Speech Fuel Violence in Sudan* in March 2021. The Network includes community actors from Darfur (North, East and Central), Port Sudan, Kassala and Al-Gadarif, South Kordofan and Blue Nile.

The report *Discrimination and Hate Speech Fuel Violence in Sudan* identifies widespread hate speech, incitement to violence and even incitement to genocide. It provides a granular understanding of how divisive and hateful narratives continue to feed into patterns of violence, based on a history of discrimination and centre-periphery subordination. Coupled with ongoing instability, there are now overlapping risk factors. Hate speech statements can be traced back to divisions to colonialism and ‘Arabisation’ policies of the Al-Bashir regime, such as:

- “we need to clean the State from black plastic bags”, expressed by Arab elites towards ‘black Africans’,
- “the Beni Amer are a cancer that need to be cut off”, heard in Eastern Sudan.

The work on training, monitoring and advocacy around hate speech in Sudan continued into a second phase that started in September 2021 (funded by a second KAICIID grant). The military coup of 25 October had a detrimental impact on the project timeline due to internet and phone outage in Sudan for

some 6 weeks. A scoping visit to Khartoum was able to take place before the coup, with follow up consultations, monitoring and research, gathering data about violence and post-coup narratives, undertaken remotely in last months of the year. Activities on the ground were able to recommence in 2022.

For the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) of Sudan, in March 2021 we made a submission in collaboration with TASAMI (Organization of Sudanese Solidarity for Elimination of Racial Discrimination), proposing concrete recommendations to the Government of Sudan in relation to Anti-Discrimination, Hate Speech & Freedom of Expression and Prevention of Mass Atrocities.

Countering Sexual Violence in Conflict Project

We commenced research on the scale and scope of conflict-related sexual violence in Sudan, including a scoping mission to prepare for field research and focus group discussions with survivors – this took place just before the coup in October 2021. Field research was still able to start in early 2022 despite daily pro-democracy protests and a sudden shrinking of civic space with brutal crackdowns against activists.

a. South Sudan

Youth Counter Identity Violence Project

In South Sudan we concluded our 2-year project with SSYPADO, supporting Youth Leaders to design and implement initiatives to counter identity-based violence with a final workshop in Juba in June 2021. The booklet of counter narratives *Write for Peace*, written by South Sudanese youth, was launched, and disseminated by the Dean of Studies at Juba University in June 2021. The report *Learning from Youth as Peace Builders*, presenting lessons on what worked, and how youth countered identity violence was published in October 2021. Outputs included:

- Final Training for youth leaders including an evaluation of their youth initiatives funded through the DFID project to identify what worked and why, as well as lessons learned, June 2021
- Publication of Youth Declaration on 10th Anniversary of South Sudan, July 2021
- Launch of counter narratives book *Write for Peace* and Juba University, South Sudan

Countering Sexual Violence in Conflict Project

In collaboration with *Dialogue and Research Initiative* (DRI), *Centre for Inclusive Governance Peace and Justice* (CIGPJ) and the *Global Survivors Fund* (GSF), we undertook training, research and advocacy on the status and opportunities for reparations for Survivors of Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV) in 2021. Activities included:

- Roundtable on Scale and Scope of Conflict Related Sexual Violence at UNDP, January 2021
- Training of Trainers on CRSV and Reparations
- Workshops with survivors of CRSV in 6 locations across South Sudan
- Survivors Speak event, UNDP Juba, September 2021
- Country Briefing, with preliminary findings on CRSV and reparations in South Sudan, launched with Global Survivors Fund in September 2021 for the United Nations General Assembly

We also made submissions to the UN Human Rights Council UPR on South Sudan with partners *Centre for Inclusive Governance, Peace and Justice* (CIGPJ) and *Dialogue and Research Institute* (DRI) in relation to the epidemic proportions of sexual and gender-based violence in South Sudan, including CRSV (July 2021).

b. Ethiopia

The conflict in Tigray and other parts of Ethiopia is based on deep divisions. Rights for Peace has started an initial scoping review of hate narratives in different parts of the country.

Financial review

Members of the management committee meet regularly to review the financial position of the charity. As a result of this information, they have confidence in realistically reviewing and adjusting budgets. During the year funding continued to increase with the support of the Global Survivors Fund Partnership and other partners.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted reserves held by the charity should be at least £5,000. At this level the trustees consider that they would be able to accommodate any fundamental funding changes as core costs are minimal.

As at the balance sheet date the charity's unrestricted reserves were slightly less than the policy target, at £4,694.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is constituted as both a company limited by guarantee and as a registered charity. The directors of the company serve also as the trustees of the charity. Reference and administrative details are shown in the company information page. The directors have the power to appoint additional trustees.

- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant information of which the charity's Independent Examiner is unaware; and

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Rights for Peace meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Income

(i) donations and similar income

Donations and similar income is recognised when received.

(ii) revenue grants

Revenue grants are recognised in the period in which the expenditure to which they relate is incurred.

(iii) capital grants

Capital grants are recognised as the corresponding expense is incurred.

(iv) other income

All other income is recognised in the period to which it relates.

Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.
