Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2024

The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 December 2024, which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes. The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2013).

Objectives and activities

Objectives

Rights for Peace is a human rights organisation working to strengthen the rights and resilience of communities to prevent mass atrocity crimes in fragile states, in collaboration with local partners. Rights for Peace focuses on countering identity-based violence, including gender and ethnic violence. Our goals are achieved through training, front-line actions with partners, and advocacy.

Rights for Peace is a founding member of the UK Atrocity Prevention Working Group (whose members adopt a 'mass atrocity prevention lens' in their work) and a member of GAAMAC (Global Action Against Mass Atrocity Crimes) as well as the UK Working Group on Sudan, the Justice Advisory Group on South Sudan and the Victims' Rights Working Group focused on the International Criminal Court.

Rights for Peace is deeply committed to bottom-up approaches, collaborating with and investing in the capacity and agency of victims and affected communities pursuing long-term change.

Mission

To strengthen the rights and resilience of local communities to prevent mass atrocities.

Programme Areas

A. Countering Hate-Speech and Identity Violence

Violent extremism based on identity is on a global increase as nationalist and other 'group identity' sentiments provide a rallying point for those disaffected by globalisation, worsening social or economic conditions or who feel aggrieved.

Strong democratic institutions can help protect human rights in the face of increased hate. However, in fragile states, identity-based divisions can easily translate into violent conflicts that involve mass atrocities. Institutions may not be robust enough to protect minorities or marginalised groups, and local populations have little resilience to divisive propaganda or economic or political pressures that incentivise violence. Today 1 in 5 people lives in a conflict state. The number of displaced people worldwide is at a record high, which in turn drives poverty and migration.

Disproportionately few resources go into trying to prevent identity-based violence and strengthen social cohesion. Human rights violations are both the cause and manifestation of identity divisions. At the same time human rights and protection mechanisms embody unifying language and values, as well as practical frameworks and tools for intervention. Rights for Peace was set up to take on a human rights approach to preventing identity-based violence that can lead to mass atrocities.

B. Survivor-led Prevention and Access to Justice

In collaboration with a range of partners in Sudan and South Sudan we have been working with survivors of conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV) to address challenge harmful cultural norms and to put justice and reparation higher up on policy agendas, supporting transitional justice processes that could provide building blocks for truth, reconciliation and sustainable peace.

In South Sudan, conflict-related sexual violence was not known or talked about amongst civil society activists or policy makers when we first started our *Study on Opportunities for Reparation for Survivors of CRSV in South Sudan*. Both are now mentioned frequently by policymakers and regarded as critical within transitional justice debates and agendas. The Survivors Network South Sudan (SUNS), that we brought together as an informal group for the first time in 2022 registered as a national-level non-governmental organization in 2023 and has continued to grow in 2024. Our joint engagement with parliamentarians and ministers influenced the adoption of two landmark laws on transitional justice.

Activities

1. Sudan

Lobbying and Advocacy for the Renewal of the Independent International Fact-Finding Mission for Sudan at the UN Human Rights Commission South Sudan in Geneva

Our Legal Adviser Najlaa Ahmed attended the 56th and 57th Sessions of the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva, where she briefed UN delegates about the Sudan crisis at the “One Year On” side event led by Human Rights Watch, REDRESS and other partners on 20 June 2024. Najlaa Ahmed highlighted the continued escalation of sexual violence since the conflict in Sudan erupted on 15 April 2023. The Human Rights Council was renewed for a further year, in part attributable to civil society lobbying of voting States.

Documenting Identity-based Violence

- During 2024, we developed and published “**Documenting Identity-Based Violence: A Manual for the Sudanese Context**,” funded by Matrix Causes Fund, benefiting from pro-bono input from experienced international criminal law practitioners Steven Powles KC and Nikila Kaushik from Doughty Street Chambers. The Manual was translated, printed and disseminated in the region and to human rights defenders operating outside Sudan, in both Arabic and English.
- In November 2024, we held a hybrid workshop in Kampala for selected Sudanese lawyers interested in documenting Identity-Based Violence, benefitting from the manual. Preparation of real-life case studies for us to analyse together was done by a Open Source Intelligence organization (OSINT). Two members of the ICC Office of the Prosecutor made presentations at the multi-day workshop.
- A Documenting Identity-based Violence Working Group was established, with follow-up online clinics for lawyers wishing to collaborate on documentation initiatives focused specifically on violence based on ethnic, gender or other basis of discrimination.

Other training materials and tools were also created in 2024, including shareable social media info-cards at the end of the Abd Al-Rahmen (Ali Kusheyb) Trial at the International Criminal Court, as well as a mapping of the violations and charges in the case and the publication of a training package on trauma-informed and survivor-centred approaches to working with survivors of CRSV for human rights practitioners.

2. South Sudan

In 2024, we continued our advocacy and technical support concerning the rights of survivors of conflict-related sexual violence in relation to the transitional justice process in South Sudan and saw our inputs on two draft Bills finally be adopted into law on 11 November 2024. In particular, we had lobbied for the recognition of victims as active participants and decision makers in the transitional justice process, resulting in a specific position for a victims' representative to be on the Selection Panel for the Commissioners of the future Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing.

We also reformulated our advocacy work as part of a new Consortium of partners, funded by the Global Survivors' Fund, including the Centre for Inclusive Governance, Peace and Justice (CIGPJ) and Active Youth Agency (AYA) and SUNS, the Survivors Network South Sudan, which we helped establish.

Advocacy and Technical Assistance

Rights for Peace supported the continued capacity strengthening of policy officials and parliamentarians on issues surrounding conflict-related sexual violence and the right to justice and reparation through an effective transitional justice process.

- Internal reviews and lobbying at the National level on the Draft Bills on the establishment of the Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and the establishment of the Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA).
- Comparative Study and Training partners on the establishment and running of Truth Commissions from a survivors' perspective.
- Development of awareness-raising materials in the form of a new *Pictorial Guide* and a new *Citizens' Handbook* on the two new Transitional Justice laws establishing a Truth and Reconciliation Commission and a Compensation and Reconciliation Authority.

Financial review

Members of the management committee meet regularly to review the financial position of the charity. As a result of this information, they have confidence in realistically reviewing and adjusting budgets. During the year funding continued to sustain the charities' work with the support of the Global Survivor's Fund, the Matrix Causes Fund, Doughty Street Chambers and Redress.

It is the long-term goal of the charity that unrestricted reserves held by the charity should be at least three months of operating costs. At this level, the trustees consider that they would be able to accommodate any fundamental funding changes as core costs are minimal.

As at the balance sheet date the charity's unrestricted reserves were £1,870. This shows a marked improvement over the 2023 deficit of £2,017 which had been necessary as the Trustees decided to use the unrestricted reserves and access some short term funding from a director to ensure that operations were able to continue despite adverse impacts of the conflict in Sudan on funding. Income in 2024 was lower than previous years due to a difficult fundraising environment, however, due to financial controls, we were able to operate a surplus. The charity has also put in place a Growth Strategy (2024-8) and is rebuilding unrestricted reserves.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is constituted as both a company limited by guarantee and as a registered charity. The directors of the company serve also as the trustees of the charity. Reference and administrative details are shown in the company information page. The directors have the power to appoint additional trustees.

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Rights for Peace meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Income

(i) donations and similar income

Donations and similar income is recognised when received.

(ii) revenue grants

Revenue grants are recognised in the period in which the expenditure to which they relate is incurred.

(iii) capital grants

Capital grants are recognised as the corresponding expense is incurred.

(iv) other income

All other income is recognised in the period to which it relates.

Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.
