Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

The objects of the CIO are

- To promote knowledge and understanding of the important relationship between climate change and design innovation, through partnerships between school children and practising designers.
- To advance the teaching of climate science, climate literacy, and design innovation in state primary schools throughout the UK.
- To increase knowledge and confidence of teaching staff to support children's learning about climate science and design innovation, through provision of age-appropriate teaching resources in schools where climate science is absent from the curriculum.
- To advance the development of creative skills in primary school children by increasing their capacities, capabilities and imaginative thinking at a time when emphasis on design and the arts is in decline.
- To promote climate science and design technology in the primary curriculum as key life and employability skills for children.
- To combat anxiety and feelings of impotence about surviving future global conditions, which have been identified in a growing number of children, and to imbue them with a sense of empowerment to find solutions for living in the changing world of climate change.
- To create diverse and innovative responses to extreme climate situations over a range of design fields by engaging children's views and voices. envisaging their lives in the future.
- To provide professional designers with the imaginative stimulus of working with children from a wide range of backgrounds, and to allow designers to develop mutually inspired proposals to combat extreme climate situations.
- To develop the co-design concepts to a level where they form the core of an inspirational and informative national exhibition covering a wide range of climate change information, dangers and solutions.
- To create a model schools' programme on design for climate change and a public exhibition template that can be replicated or adapted by others elsewhere in the world.

Significant progress has been made on all the Objects listed above through our activities during the year (see detailed summary of activities in Section D below).

2023 was a year of consolidation, planning and making provision for our 2024-27 expansion programme. Building on the five demonstration co-design collaborations of 2022 and KCL's formal evaluation, delivered in early 2023, nine further co-designs were planned to initiate the expansion, the first of which commenced in September 2023.

Each collaboration in the forthcoming programme follows the model demonstrated in 2022, adjusted to reflect recommendation from KCL's Environmental Research Group Centre for Research in STEM Education. Children, teachers, and designers together consider how lives will be impacted by the climate extremes predicted to take effect within the children's lifetimes and ways to mitigate them are imagined through design strategies.

Our target is to complete 80 co-designs across the country reaching 10,400 children by 2027, by which time we intend to have sufficient recognition and demonstrably effective results to influence the national curriculum for state primary schools.

CCAC aims to contribute to developing children's potential, widening horizons and presenting a proven route to the government's stated mission to '...put climate change at the heart of education' ([Education Secretary's Sustainability and Climate Change draft strategy](#), published 5 November 2021)

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Consolidation

Designer procurement

A two-pronged approach to secure designer participation has been implemented:

1. Design practice sponsorship. Leading design practices have agreed to provide young designer(s) and resources to the benefit of their ESG and CPD commitments and at no cost to CCAC.
2. CCAC funded designers specifically from under-represented groups, and those in the process of establishing their careers. CCAC has secured restricted funding to set this in motion with a grant covering five emergent designers over 2024 and 2025.

School procurement

With CCAC programme recognition still modest and primary schools under extreme management and financial pressures, securing participating schools is a time-consuming activity. In 2023 CCAC began to systematise identification of schools and procedures for approaching them. This will continue in 2024.

Co-design resources

In 2023, substantial work to improve and expand CCAC's teaching resources for schools and designers was accomplished. A branded teaching resource pack including an index will be available to all new participating schools and designers in 2024. It will include:

- Climate science and What is Design? teaching resources,
- 6-week classroom work plan (template),
- Weekly lesson plan (template),
- Children's work sheets (template)
- Image library
- Teaching guidelines for designers
- Information leaflet for headteachers

An experienced primary educator joined CCAC in September 2023 to work closely with co-design teams to provide guidance, advice, monitoring, and evaluation.

Visual identity, website, social media, exhibitions, and PR:

CCAC's visual identity was commissioned and delivered in 2023 by 30% Wool; Dreamabstract assisted with the rebuild of CCAC's website. Social media has been reactivated.

A display explaining CCAC's cross-curricular learning programme for Yr5 primary school teachers and children will open in June 2024 at the Victoria and Albert Museum in the John Lyons Community Gallery. The display documents CCAC's co-design collaboration process, featuring the schools and design practices that participated in CCAC's 2022 Demonstration Programme. The display will run for seven months.

In 2023, a strategy for the 2024-27 expansion programme was developed and a cohort of 9 new co-designs agreed. The first project commenced in September 2023 in Manchester and will be completed in March 2024. Eight co-designs are sponsored designer collaborations and 2 are emergent designer collaborations. Sponsorship and Funding:

CCAC was pleased to have received significant funding from two family foundations during the year to support the expansion of our activities. The Linbury Trust confirmed in December their support for designers from under-represented groups and those establishing their careers.

In addition to CAF, in 2023 CCAC enrolled with EasyFundraising and Benevity. Individual giving provides a useful, but sporadic stream of small-scale funding.

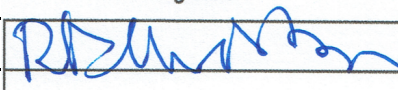
