Trustees Annual Report 2022

The trustees present their Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2022

Aims and Purposes of the Charity

As an independent, Bible-believing church, as per our statement of faith, City Church Wolverhampton purposes are (as stated in the Church's Constitution) for the public benefit the advancement of the Christian faith in such ways as the Trustees may from time to time decide.

As a church, we are committed to spreading the Bible's message concerning Jesus, to develop people's knowledge of him, and to encourage them to worship, trust and serve him. We seek to encourage as many as possible to follow Jesus's example of love and compassion in serving each other and the wider community.

2022 proved to be an exciting year as we developed our various ministries with the intent of engaging the people of Wolverhampton with the gospel message. We have continued for our Sunday Gatherings in rented facilities at St Peters Collegiate school and are grateful for their welcome to us. We continue to pay a small rental fee for the use of these premises and were able to move into the school auditorium which has given us the room to expand. As a new church, financial giving has increased as more people became involved in our work, so that we have been able to make donations to other Christian work and buy the supplies that we have needed. We started to actively look for a midweek place to lease when we received a grant of £15,000 from another charity that was ceasing to operate.

Objectives and Activities

The Trustees have read the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and are satisfied that the activities described below clearly demonstrate that the charity is providing a benefit to the public.

To fulfil the aims and purposes of the Church as stated above, a variety of activities are provided for both the benefit of church members and for the benefit of members of the public. Our weekly Sunday services at 10.00 am meeting in rented space and a weekly gathering for prayer in somebody's home are central to our church life and are open to the

whole community. They are advertised electronically via our Facebook page and literature distributed in the local communities as well as word-of-mouth.

We seek to encourage attendance by members of the wider community by making these gatherings friendly, informal and joyful occasions. These services are recorded and broadcast later in the week on the church's website, although we firmly believe that meeting in person is critical to the practice of our faith. During most Sunday morning services "Junior Church" is run, which is open to all children aged 3-11.

On Mondays we are regularly in the local community distributing Bibles, gospels and other Christian literature to those who are interested.

In the Autumn, we held an all-church retreat at Cloverley Hall over the half-term weekend.

We were invited to hold a Christmas carol concert in the Mander Shopping Centre, which was well received.

We again held a holiday Bible club during the summer in a local park, gaining the necessary permissions from the local council in regard to health and safety regulations, first aid precautions etc. This again was well received by the wider community, this being advertised through Facebook and fliers in the area. We hosted a visiting team from another church which allowed us to see a greater number of children and their parents participate in activities in Bantock park.

Where possible, we have responded to invitations to speak in local schools who want to hear a perspective on Bible-believing faith in Jesus Christ. We are grateful for the opportunity afforded by St Peters Collegiate school and the Kings school to do this.

We have offered from time-to time courses to all who are interested in finding out more about the Christian Faith.

Individual pastoral and spiritual advice is offered to people living in the church's locality, both to those who attend our meetings and to those making inquiries electronically.

We have informal relationships with several other churches in the Wolverhampton area (Life City Church, St. Luke's, and local FIEC churches) to be supported and to support them in our mutual endeavours to advance the Christian faith.

The Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for all matters of the CIO, both the finance and work of those who are designated as holding positions of spiritual responsibility. We hold insurance for events that we might have both regular and time to time and for the work that is done by individuals as to the propagation of the Christian faith.

The Trustees reviewed and modified a safeguarding policy, and it will continue to be reviewed annually. The Trustees meet four times a year. These meetings are formally recorded, and these records are available for inspection by the Charity Commission and the Independent Examiner.

Achievements and Performance

The Church does not measure the success of its ministries mainly in numbers, including financial numbers, but in less tangible ways like growth of individuals in their Christian faith and in opportunities to share the Christian gospel with members of the community. Such "success" is difficult to measure, but the Trustees rejoice in another year when the Gospel of Jesus Christ has been shared with the city of Wolverhampton. This year we have provided free literature in the City Centre and in the area around Bantock Park. These include Bibles, books and leaflets. These have proved popular, and hundreds of items have been taken. We are encouraged to find that they have not then been dropped in the street and have not contributed to littering.

Our morning attendance has risen to about 35 persons this year, and includes people from multiple different ethnic backgrounds who live in the UK. Our mid-week gatherings would be anywhere from 4 – 10 persons

Much of the work of the church was carried out by a large number of volunteers who, amongst other ministries, serve as musicians, Sunday hosts, hosts for mid-week, children's workers, literature distributors, AV technicians, set and pack down teams, and so on. We give thanks to the Lord for their faithful and fruitful efforts. Our Pastor, Timothy D. Berry and part time associate Andrew L. Berry led the majority of services whilst Timothy D. Berry has done the majority of contacting those in need of pastoral support. Andrew L. Berry chaired the Trustees and the other decision-making meetings. His experience with other Boards is invaluable to the smooth running of the Church. Mr. Jonathan Maggs, also a Trustee, provided vital leadership in establishing the relationship with the St. Peter's Collegiate School where the church meets as well as supporting other ministries of the church such as our Men's Midweek Group and the distribution of literature. We are equally grateful to another Trustee, who likewise has invaluable experience with other boards and is a qualified accountant, in dealing with the financial matters of the church: Mrs Lyn Towers. Mr Timothy Howard, with his experience as chief operating officer has proved invaluable in drawing up various documents and dealing with matters of insurance, risk registers and safety forms.

Treasurer's Report for the year ending 31st December 2022

Summary of the Year

By the end of the year a balance of £34,411 was held in the church's bank account, most of which was generated from offerings and donations and a grant of £15,000. The expenditure of the church was minimal and hence the surplus funds available. This position has given the financial security as the work of the church continues to grow and develop in 2023.

Other Causes

The Trustees have established the principle that City Church Wolverhampton will give proportionately and regularly to other organisations and people who are involved in Christian Gospel related programmes. During 2022 the church gave £900 to other causes which included support to another Christian charity involved in relief work in Afghanistan and support to another church plant in West Yorkshire.

Reserves Policy

Our present reserve policy says that we shall keep £2000 in reserve. This policy is regularly reviewed and we have that amount in reserve. The Charity Commission expects the Managing Trustees to decide, publish, implement and monitor their charity's reserve policy so that they can comply with their legal duties.

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Conclusion

The Church enters 2023 in a financially stable position, having grown in size both numerically and in terms of its activities, positively impacted the local community, and fulfilled its purpose of seeing the Gospel of Jesus Christ shared in our local community and across the City of Wolverhampton.

Structure, Governance and Management

City Church Wolverhampton is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

As such it is solely run by its Trustees (presently 5), with the desire of having 'covenant partners'. Currently the church doesn't have a process for formally recognising these persons, so the body of believers is considered to be those who attend regularly and contribute to the financial needs of the church.

The church is recognised as a church plant with the goal of being affiliated to the Fellowship of Independent Evangelical Churches (FIEC) in due course. As such we adhere to their doctrinal statement and to their other ethos statements which bring clarity to our life and ministry as part of that fellowship.

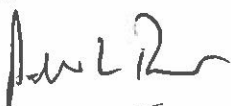

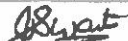
