Para 1.17 and 1.19	Our primary activity is to rescue poodle cross dogs ("doodles") either from situations where they have been abandoned or from families who no longer want them/ cannot cater for their needs. This can be for many reasons – a change in family circumstances (eg illness/ change of employment status/ new baby/ relationship breakdown) or the doodle has behavioural issues (eg resource guarding/ bite incidents/ health issues), and the family cannot cope or feel that it may be a threat to their family dynamic to keep the dog. These are often very sad situations as owners generally don't wish to give up their much-loved pet but feel they have no alternative. We support those families while finding out as much as we can about the doodle. The doodle is then placed into a carefully vetted foster home to assess them prior to placing them with their adoptive family. This assessment often involves vets and behaviourists as well as the foster family to find ensure that we find them the most suitable "forever home". We maintain a Facebook page so that new owners can provide updates on our ever-increasing doodle family. This is also a place where we can launch fund raisers for dogs with high cost needs (eg surgery) and appeal for both foster and permanent homes.

Para 1.20	We have a very small team of volunteers at any one time who cover all aspects of what we do. This includes governance, financials, fund raising, contracts, correspondence, complaint handling as well as the core operation of rescuing doodles, vetting foster homes and finding forever homes after extensive checks. This year 2 of the 3 Trustees have had to step back from core operations which means that this falls mainly to one Trustee, Susan Green, who additionally is providing an incredibly valuable mentoring service to those who contact us thinking of giving up their doodle. This makes a massive difference as often there are other ways we can support the family, so they are able to keep their much-loved pet. Increasingly we are being contacted by Social Services/ police/ Carers/ neighbours and large dog rescues, such as the Dogs Trust, about vulnerable dog owners to see what support we can provide. Sometimes these doodles have been neglected in recent months and need both physical and behavioural support before they can be placed in their forever home. We are also often involved in the rescue of abandoned doodles and taking into care doodles with serious health issues that could potentially be euthanised. These doodles require even more extensive support involving bringing together a wide network of specialists and volunteers. Often, we need to fund raise for these doodles at the same time to cover vet and behaviourist costs. Sadly, sometimes having put all the wheels in motion and provided the support needed, we can find that the issues have been caused by an underlying health condition so serious that we have no choice but to euthanise, as heartbreaking as this is. One such doodle is Rocco. We received a phone call on a Friday afternoon from a vet where Rocco had been booked in to be euthanised. The vet had called multiple dog rescues who had all declined to assist prior to contacting Doodle Recue. A frantic weekend with all hands-on deck, and a wonderful vet nurse who agreed to foster him so we could fund raise as he had highly contagious ear infections needing bilateral ear canal removal. Trainers were involved to support him with his subsequent hearing loss, and he was placed with some of our most experienced fosterers. Rocco was admitted to The Ralph Veterinary Hospital for the surgery, with his fosterer staying in a nearby Travelodge for the duration. Sadly, there is no happy ending here – he was so traumatised, and once we found a lump on his neck we all knew that we just couldn't put him through any more. This was absolutely the right thing for poor Rocco, and it was heart-warming to see our whole Doodle community pull together to support him. We take comfort from the fact that his last weeks were happy ones with the best possible love and care.

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	Our accounts at the end of the financial year show that we have a balance of £66,243 compared to an opening balance of £52,518. This is good news – thanks to some incredibly generous donations and brilliant fund-raising from our Doodle supporters, we have been able to cover all expenses from donations and adoption fees.
Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held	Para 1.22	As our family of doodles grows, we find ourselves supporting more and more doodles with lifelong conditions for which we put a contingency in place when they are adopted to support their new family with vet bills. Doodles such as little blind Maddie recently started to have seizures requiring an emergency MRI and spay– it isn't always obvious what the underlying condition is, and it can cost more than anticipated. Although we put a limit on each fund, we want to ensure that the family feel confident that they can continue to provide the best level of care possible. Vet fees continue to rise and although we will fund raise for doodles with particular needs, we need to be able to cover these costs on a timely basis.

Explanation of any uncertainties about the charity continuing as a going concern	Para 1.23	We have a very small bank of volunteers and most of our work is from one person only – Susan Green. We acknowledged this last year in our report and stated that we needed to find a way to support her as her voluntary work has not only encroached on, but completely overtaken her time. We looked at several different options and realistically the very best thing we could do was to financially reimburse Sue with a token amount each month to allow her to continue with what she does for our doodles and their families. Sue has been running the rescue charity from her home garden office for the past 10 years and the workload has increased steadily each year. The £100 per month goes some way to compensate for the additional utility costs incurred. We are looking at ways to recognise our most dedicated volunteers, who consistently provide support to the Charity. Once scheme we are looking at is to appoint Ambassadors – both human and doodle. As well as being a way of acknowledging and recognising what they do for us, they are also the "face" of our charity and hopefully will encourage others to donate and support us going forward.

The core operation falls mainly to one Trustee, Susan Green, who increasingly is providing a mentoring service to those who contact us for whatever reason – thinking of giving up a doodle, fosterers, adopters, past and future owners.... The list is extensive and ever-growing and makes a massive difference to those people. In some cases, it enables a family to keep a much-loved doodle and in most cases where a doodle is given up we find that the fosterers will adopt that very same doodle because they have been so well-matched and so much work is put into ensuring the process runs smoothly. Increasingly we are finding that we are involved in the rescue of abandoned doodles and taking into care doodles with serious health issues that could potentially be euthanised. These doodles require even more extensive support involving bringing together a wide network of specialists and volunteers to support both the doodle in question and the families that volunteer to take them into foster and subsequently adopt them. There will often be associated fund raising activities for these very special doodles to cover vet and behaviourist costs. One such doodle that touched the hearts of all our Members is Maddie. Maddie came to us from a breeder and was born blind. She is a truly beautiful doodle both inside and out, and with the support of specialist vets, behavioural advisors providing very individualised training and an amazing foster family this little lady is leading a full and happy life. Her most recent adventure was a sponsored walk to raise funds for Doodle Rescue. Support for her and her family is ongoing and will continue throughout her life- family mentoring, behavioural and veterinary support will enable to lead the full and fulfilling life that she deserves.

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	Our accounts at the end of the financial year show that we have a balance of £52,515,83 compared to an opening balance of £50,258. We were able to cover all of our expenses from donations and adoption fees so maintained our reserves intact.
Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held	Para 1.22	Many of the doodles such as Maddie with lifelong health conditions will have a contingency fund put in place for them on adoption. This will support the dog's new family with future vet bills, ensuring that they will receive the best possible care going forward without being a financial burden to the family. Whilst we will put a limit on the fund, we need to be able to support these and other doodles and we are unable to predict when or how much support is needed. Although we will try to fundraise where we can for specific dogs, this rarely realises the amount needed to cover expensive vet bills. Additionally, we are seeing dogs in foster for longer periods of time which is costly. This financial year we helped 49 dogs compared to the previous year's 72 – and yet our foster costs were almost identical.

With the increase in the “special needs” dogs we are seeing, Sue's time is spread very thin, and the work encroaches onto her daily life and is mentally exhausting. We need to find a way to address this and support Sue to continue to provide the unique mentoring service that makes Doodle Rescue such a success and allows us to offer a chance for doodles that have often been turned away from all other rescues. A further uncertainty is that we are almost a victim of our own success. Unlike other foster-based rescue charities, we don't have a large bank of foster homes – we source each foster home individually, based on the specific needs of the doodle. This means that most doodles are adopted by the same family that fosters them, but that means that we constantly need to find new foster homes and the doodle tends to remain in foster for a longer time while we support with the immediate and often complex health and behavioural issues presented. In this financial year we had a complaint from an owner giving up her doodle who subsequently changed her mind. We always act in the best interests of the dog and in this case the foster to adopt home was far safer than the original home. This case went to Small Claims Court and was dismissed but this sort of action takes up so much time and causes so much stress for our small, dedicated team. The doodle in question is leading a happy life and the previous owner finally accepted that they had made the right decision and made peace with that.

Sadly, in this financial year we have seen an increased number of doodles who have been given up by families due to serious behavioural issues. Even with extensive rehabilitation, it isn't always possible to rehome these doodles as we rehome to families where there could be a potential risk of harm. We sometimes have to suggest alternative options to owners but due to a large donation this year we have been able to provide some of these cases that have been turned away by other rescues, with extensive and long-term rehabilitation so that they can safely be rehomed.

Contribution made by volunteers	Para 1.38	We have a very small team of volunteers at any one time – less than five, who cover all aspects of what we do. This includes governance, financials, fund raising, contracts, correspondence, as well as our core operation of rescuing doodles, vetting foster homes and finding forever homes after extensive checks. We may liaise with behaviourists, vets, kennels, other rescues and dog wardens. We have rehomed over 60 doodles in this financial year as well as offered advice on countless others to hopefully prevent them from being rehomed and we provide ongoing support to any family who adopts one of our doodles. This is a massive ask of our volunteers who do an amazing job. Also our fosterers who are also volunteers and who are absolutely crucial in the early days when a doodle may be quite traumatised and in need of huge amounts of love and support to start them on their recovery journey, as well as playing a major role in the assessment of the doodles in their care to enable us to ensure the dogs' needs will be met in their adoptive homes.

Para 1.20	Doodle Rescue was incredibly fortunate in receiving a massive £10,000 donation from the charitable sector recruitment specialists, Charity Job. This enabled us to offer support to doodles that we may have had to direct elsewhere, simply because we have neither the manpower nor the financial capacity to assist. Indeed, many of these doodles had been turned away by other dog rescues. We were able to donate towards the purchase of a kennel for our behavioural advisor and IMDT accredited trainer so that we can quickly rescue doodles with uncertain or unknown histories without having to first find a suitable foster home. We know for sure that in some cases, these doodles would have been PTS as there was no suitable alternative for them. We also used the donation to support some particularly challenging doodles – for example Goldendoodle Banjo who was at risk of being PTS who we funded on a long-term rehabilitation programme from which he was successfully rehomed with Doodle Rescue support; Mango – another goldendoodle who was locked in a kitchen supposedly suffering from sleep aggression and after round the clock rehabilitation for 8 months was successfully adopted; 7 year old Sam with a bite history who was rescued from an abusive home and needed extensive rehabilitation; and 5 year old labradoodle Wilson who needed extensive vet treatment for Spondylosis which was diagnosed whilst in foster. We also fund raised to support the very challenging rescue and long-term rehabilitation of two dumped young female Irish Doodles Eliza and Lorca who all of our members took to their hearts and who were both eventually rehomed by their fosterers. Their rescue was a huge operation involving multiple rescue organisations, specialist transport teams, vets, and some amazing volunteers. Both dogs were in a dreadful state but are now thriving in their new homes.

A large part of our income of £46,729 was from one large donation of £10,000 – excluding this our income was at a similar level to the previous year. Without the large donation we would have either used up some of our reserves or had to limit our activity as we would have had a deficit rather than a surplus.

We have to review each doodle that we are approached about to ensure that we have sufficient financial resource to cope with the unexpected as well as the known costs.

This can be for many reasons – a change in circumstances (new baby, return to the office after home working, job change, marriage breakdown), or - what we are finding more and more – the doodle develops behavioural issues and the family can no longer cope, or feel that it may be a threat to their family situation to keep the dog. These are very sad situations, as owners generally don't want to give up their much-loved dog, but feel they have no choice. We support those families while finding out as much as we can about their pet, and then place the doodle into a carefully vetted foster home while they are assessed (often involving behaviourists and vets as well as the foster family) so that we can find them the best possible "forever home". We maintain a Facebook page so that new owners can keep everyone updated with our ever-increasing doodle family. This is also a place where we can launch fund raisers and appeal for both foster homes and forever homes. The accounts show "partners Donations" which are payments to some of the other organisations we work with. We had a particularly sad rescue of a family of 4 doodles – Mum Daisy, Dad

		Beanie and 2 pups. We found a small rescue who were willing to work with us and keep them safe and well cared for (Mum was particularly poorly). This involved raising funds for vet fees and to support them in the rescue, so the Facebook presence was particularly helpful in sharing their story that although sad, had a happy ending with all 4 being successfully adopted.

Para 1.20	This has been our first full financial year operating under Charitable Status and the year has seen many changes for rescue charities, and in particular for small, breed-specific foster-based rescues such as our own. Along with our fellow rescue charities, we are continually challenged by the number of people contacting us to rehome doodles that haven't been properly socialised or trained, suffer severe separation anxiety when left alone or have significant behavioural issues often arising from incorrect handling/mismanagement of normal puppy behaviours and just no longer fit into their owners' post Lockdown world. We have placed record numbers of doodles into foster homes, rescued doodles from distressing circumstances, including those where their welfare needs are not being met or where the owners are threatening to euthanise or abandon them if we refuse to take them, and then gone on to rehome them successfully. As the cost-of-living crisis began, donations decreased dramatically whilst vet and behaviourist fees increased. We are fortunate to have a small number of dedicated behaviourists and trainers who provide us with many hours of their "virtual" time and expertise to support our more challenging doodles to help them

		find their way back to a family home environment, but where one to one behaviourist/trainer support is required (as is very often the case with the dogs we are now seeing) these fees have also increased exponentially.

Income (£34,852) is generated from fund raisers (raffles and auctions as well as donations) and adoption fees. 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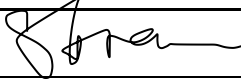

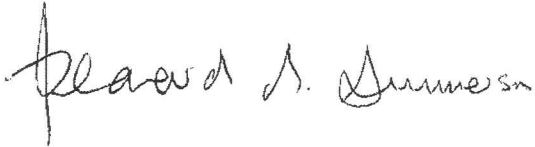

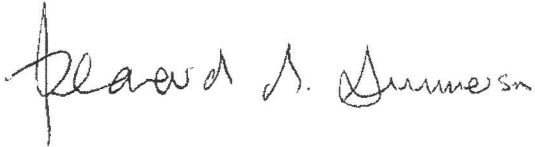

Income was higher than normal in this accounting period due to fund raising for a very special doodle that required and will require ongoing veterinary support. 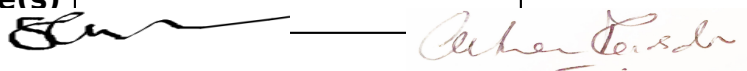
