Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.	Para 1.20	This report covers the first eleven months of the CIO operations. The trust was established on 30 April 2021, taking over the activities previously undertaken by St Chad's and St Oswald's church in Middlesbrough from 2002. Under the CIO the activities of the centre have expanded and the Trust provides considerable community care and support: Eco shop/Clothes bank/Household items During this period we supported on average 109 families weekly through our eco shop and clothes bank with an average of 10-12 new families attending each week. We ask for and receive donations from beneficiaries for the food each week which consists of grocery items, fruit and vegetables and freezer meals or sandwiches. Since the date of this report

		the number of families we support has doubled. Through the food and clothes provision we have met many families and individuals in need and have also been able to help them with wider issues as well such as re-housing, addictions and accessing social support. Children's club/Youth clubs/School visits; this part of our work is vitally important for the future of our local communities. We employ a part-time children's worker and also a part-time youth worker to run free to access children's and youth groups which consist of fun and games, food and encouraging chats together, this is important to give children in the local community access to support and activities which are not otherwise available to them. We also help to run groups at a local community hub to support children/youth/families in the wider community. This particularly builds relationships with some families who are harder to reach. We have a good working relationship with three local primary schools who welcome us going in to run clubs, take assemblies and provide teaching on Christian beliefs. Parent & Toddler Group; our parent and toddler group has been running successfully for more than 20 years. We offer support to many families and including single young parents. This past year has seen an increase in numbers and also enthusiasm to meet with other people to the point that that we are oversubscribed, we believe this is due to the times of lockdown we have all experienced recently. Community Garden; this part of our project was started during one of the lockdown periods. We saw a space that could possibly be of great value to people with mental health issues. This was proven to be right as we were able to offer a safe place for people to meet outside. Volunteers have worked with people from the community to develop the garden and maintain it.
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		Gym; space is provided for basic fitness equipment that has been donated and refurbished, encouraging people to take responsibility for their health and wellbeing. Advice and ‘signposting’; the charity works with local councils and other partners to help families and individuals to get access to the support that is available to them. Christian ministry: everything that the charity undertakes is based upon Christian ministry, sharing the love of God in the community. Where families and individuals seek to learn more about the Christian faith, the charity has provided consultation, discussion, prayer and worship opportunities.

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	The charity's funds have been steady through the period with constant vigilance on fund raising for products and equipment provided through personal donations, local business, targeted fund-raising activities. In addition staffing costs were supported through grants provided by the Henry Smith Foundation, the Rank Organization and school holiday funding support provided through Together Middlesbrough and Cleveland. The average monthly operational expenditure has increased by 15 % since becoming a registered charity this is a reflection of the expansion in the scale of the work and impact of the charity during the reporting period. Fund raising and monitoring of spending commitments to achieve objectives will continue to be a key focus for the charity, with an emphasis on flexing approach to how we meet our objectives with available resources.

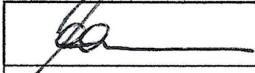
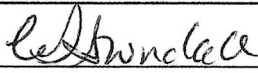

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF GENESIS PROJECT MIDDLESBROUGH

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner
