Veterinary care is provided by local veterinarians with particular expertise in the animals the sanctuary cares for and the practice not only provides veterinary care, but also ongoing advice and professional support to the charity. The charity welcomes all volunteers, but its animal welfare policy has specific requirements, to ensure both people and animals are kept safe, and provides initial induction, and on-the-job training and ongoing supervision.

The main aim of the charity is to ensure that the animals taken in are given the best possible treatment and are kept in the best possible accommodation suitable to that particular species of animal so that whatever the type of animal, dog, goat, sheep, pony, the needs, comfort, care and wellbeing of that animal are met and indeed exceeded. The contentment and happiness of all of the animals in the charity's care is paramount.

The charity has a small band of experienced volunteers who fully understand the needs of the rescued animals in its care. They help with day to day tasks such as feeding the animals and keeping the barns and paddocks clean and maintained to a high standard. The charity has welcomed volunteers taking part in The Duke of Edinburgh Awards and actively encourages the young volunteers who are suitably supervised. They are encouraged to interact with the animals as well as taking part in the more mundane tasks like 'mucking out

VOLUNTEERS.

Again we are pleased to report that we have a small number of dedicated volunteers who strive, as we do, to look after the animals in our care to a very high standard.

We now also have the support, on a voluntary basis, of Martec, a company helping young people to learn new skills to help them to become 'work ready'. The company do a fantastic job with this and we are incredibly lucky to also have their support especially as times are changing and things have become more difficult for everyone.

ACHIEVEMENTS

FENCING. More stretches of fencing have been replaced/repared as have more gate posts and gates, again ensuring the ongoing safety of the animals in our care.

GOING FORWARD

Like many other charities the current climate is having an impact on donations and so we are extremely fortunate that Martec continue to help us with maintenance and repairs at the Sanctuary for which we are extremely grateful. We now hope to complete more improvements to the housing for the goats along with any other repairs that arise.

GATE POSTS AND NEW GATEWAYS. Again more fencing, gate posts and gateways will hopefully be replaced/repared, this is an ongoing part of maintenance at the Sanctuary.

We aim to do more fundraising events and bring in new ideas for fundraising activities and events

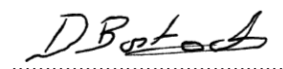

GOAT PEN ROOF.

As planned, all sections of the sky lights in the Goat Pen roof, have been replaced and other areas where deterioration had occurred has been made good.

DIVIDING GATES IN THE MAIN BARN.

The ponies and sheep share a very large Barn. The metal dividers, which gave the sheep an

area that the ponies do not have access to which enables the sheep to have their own feeding area, have now, as planned. been replaced. These new 'half gates' allow the sheep to get under but the ponies cannot. These are opening gates to allow the Barn to be cleaned out with ease.

Several wooden gate posts have now been replaced ensuring the ongoing safety of the animals in our care.

FUNDRAISING EVENTS.

More fundraising events have been held here at the Sanctuary, including Afternoon Tea's and a Christmas Carol Supper which have proved successful and very popular.

ACHIEVEMENTS

FENCING. Long stretches of fencing, as planned, were replaced. The wooden fence posts and rails had become rotted over time and we are pleased to report that much of the worst lengths have now been replaced ensuring the ongoing safety of the animals in our care.

VOLUNTEERS.

We are pleased to report that we have a small number of dedicated volunteers who strive, as we do, to look after the animals in our care to a very high standard.

GOING FORWARD

REPAIR TO THE GOAT PEN ROOF. All sections of the sky lights in the indoor/outdoor area of the goat roof are starting to leak through deterioration due to the age of these panels. We aim to have all the panels replaced and any areas of the roof that has deteriorated, made good.

DIVIDING 'GATES' IN THE BARN.

The ponies and sheep share a very large Barn. The present metal dividers, which give the sheep an area that the ponies do not have access to which enables the sheep to have their own feeding area, need replacing. These will need to be 'half gates' which the sheep can get under but the ponies cannot. These gates will need to be opening gates to allow the Barn to be cleaned out with ease.

GATE POSTS AND NEW GATEWAYS.

Lots of the gate posts are becoming rotted and also new gateways need to be created to allow better access in various areas to make cleaning out easier for helpers and volunteers.

ACHIEVEMENTS

Areas that had become extremely wet and excessively muddy the previous winter due to the charity taking in a far greater number of animals, namely sheep, have been successfully turned into hardstanding in 'high traffic' areas, particularly in gateways, walkways and the entrance to the large barn which is the main shelter

area for most of the outdoor animals. These improvements were essential for the animal's welfare to guard against hoof and foot problems such as foot rot and of course the general wellbeing of the animals. A proportion of the goat herd had become very elderly and necessary improvements had to be made to their accommodation to ensure added protection from the elements and the ability to provide smaller individual quarters for the animals to be kept in pairs for their comfort and wellbeing.

GOING FORWARD

FENCING. Sections of fencing need to be replaced as lots of 'stretches' of posts and rails have become rotten. Also sections of wire fencing need replacing, improving. This work needs to be carried out to ensure the continued safety of the animals in the charity's care.

If funds permit, once the fencing maintenance has been achieved, more areas of 'soft standing' need to be replaced with more areas of hardstanding again to maintain/improve welfare standards.

VOLUNTEERS & FUNDRAISERS. We hope to increase volunteer numbers through events such as our main Open Day which we hope will lead to more people willing to fundraise for the charity.

COMMUNITY GROUPS. Our aim is to encourage more community groups to visit i.e. WI Organisations, School Groups, equally to raise funds for the charity and also to raise awareness of how to properly care for animals especially amongst the young. We need better facilities to enable us to better welcome such groups and this is something we will strive to achieve in the future.

OUR ETHOS. To help as many unwanted, ill treated animals as possible whilst maintaining and not compromising on our very high welfare standards and to give the animals that come our way happy, contented, tranquil lives free from fear and neglect. Also, through education where possible, raise awareness of the needs and correct care of all animals.

On a final note, everyone's time is given freely at the sanctuary for all day to day activities such as feeding, cleaning out, vet trips and all the other activities that are needed to give all the 'residents' at the sanctuary the best possible care, comfort, love and attention. We go to great lengths to ensure that the animals, where needed, are rehabilitated with however much time, patience and understanding is necessary to give them the quality of life that they all deserve and to make sure that this is maintained for the remainder of their lives.

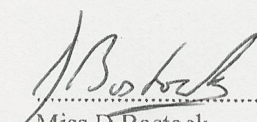
