My thanks especially to the Evans family for their unwavering support for the group and to all the adult volunteers no matter what part they play in the running of the group on a weekly basis.

The closing of the 2022 / 23 year marks a milestone not only for 1st Helmsley, but also for myself – a connection with the group hitting 25 years since I joined as a shy? Quiet? Timid? Beaver scout aged 6 – we had grey tracksuits back then too! (luckily we didn't have camera phones or Facebook)

The 1st Helmsley Scout Group had a successful year in 2022-2023, overcoming challenges from the previous years and running a full program for all sections. Our group consists of 9 Volunteer Team Leaders, 2 Section Team Members, and 2 Young Leaders, providing guidance and support to approximately 70 young people ranging from Beavers to Explorers. With a strong volunteer leadership team, we have increased the number of leaders with permits to facilitate adventurous activities such as Archery, Air Rifle Shooting, Bush Craft Sessions, and Tomahawk Throwing. We believe in providing every young person in our group with the opportunity to explore and learn these valuable skills.

While our leadership team is strong in all sections, we are currently facing a shortage of leaders, which hinders us from accepting more children into our program. Our waiting lists remain full as we strive to maintain a high-quality program by managing the number of new members. We encourage anyone interested in joining our team to reach out to our leaders or myself to explore the possibilities of making a difference.

We extend our personal thanks to our team of skilled and dedicated volunteer leaders, who have tirelessly provided a regular program of meetings, attended training sessions, organized outings, camps, and activities. Their commitment goes beyond expectations, positively impacting the lives of young people across all four sections.

Throughout the year, our scout group actively engaged in various community events and activities. We had the honour of being the guard of honour at Dean and Catherine's Wedding. Additionally, we organized a Flowerpot Trail in Helmsley and actively supported fundraising for the Ampleforth Playing Field through a Scarecrow Trail and BBQ. Our involvement also extended to the recreation of a 200-year-old mosaic, now proudly displayed in Nawton Memorial Hall. 2023 has been a busy year in which the Scouts have built on our strong foundation of skills, teamwork, and discipline that we created last year following lockdown. Our group size increased from 16 to 18 young people, with Bear and Skip providing support. There has been good regular attendance from the young people, and we have seen a slow but noticeable improvement in uniform compliance and self-discipline. Leaders have updated their basic training and attended additional training in Outdoor Skills (Bear), and Archery (Bear and Skip). Thanks to extra volunteers in the other sections Bear has been able to focus his support on the Scout Section more this year.

We started the year during the summer holidays with a one-night camp in which we built an outdoor pizza oven at Howl Woods, thanks to Bear who had attended a course to learn this skill. In September we did a couple of sessions on tree identification which completed the Forrester Activity badge for most of the group, thanks to Ben from The National Park for his support.

Whilst we were still able to use Howl Woods we did a night of Pioneering in which the young people built a trestle bridge. We did more Pioneering during the summer term including more bridge building (A frame) and a fun night of chariot building and racing with the Explorers. The young people learned square lashing and tourniquet lashing as well as a few knots as well as how to coil and store a rope. Recently we have progressed with the Pioneer badge by learning the skills of splicing and cord whipping (I say we, because Bear and Skip have had to learn it in order to teach it, thanks to Skip's Mum). This badge will be completed at the start of next term (or during the holidays if the Scouts work on their knots at home). Our final session at Howl Woods was a joint Halloween night with Cubs of spooky team work, fun and games, with ghost stories round the campfire by Dracula (Bear). During the winter the Scouts met at the hut, and enjoyed several nights of cooking as well as a bushtucker trial night. We did shooting practice, then had a competition night at Malton Gun Club, thanks for their support. Most of the Scouts earned their Master at Arms badge. Our last session before Christmas was a fun night of Nerf wars.

We started back in January with several sessions each of Navigation and Emergency Aid, in preparation for a Mini Expedition we had planned for mid-February. However due to a family bereavement this was postponed at short notice. We did the activity in June, unfortunately it was not well attended but the 4 Scouts who did the hike worked very well together and proved their ability to navigate independently. We hope to offer this activity again soon for others to catch up their skills. We did a catch up session of safe use of Knife, Axe and Saw, and then a session of axe carving. In which the Scouts each made a mallet. After the Easter break we were able to use Howl Woods again, so in addition to the Pioneering mentioned above, we also did some outdoor air rifle shooting, cut and split wood ready for our next campfire, cooked using Trangia's and back packing gas stoves. We prepared for and attended Link Camp at Scampston in which we joined up with 1 st Kirkbymoorside Scouts again, thanks to Amy Wood (Kaa) and Darren Leaming for their help. Bear and Skip provide Air Rifle shooting for the camp again this year. Our final two sessions of this term are a session of Bike maintenance with The Bike Doctor, and a ride at Sutton Bank.

In addition to all this, the Scouts attended District St Georges Day activity, District Swimming Gala, Group Panto night, Jambowlree, Jamboree on the Trail (with 1 st Kirkbymoorside), and Remembrance Parade and Service. It's no wonder we have given out so many badges this year 214 in total, including 15 Challenge badges, 22 Activity badges, 66 Staged badges, 111 Occasional badges.

Many thanks to Bear who stepped up during my bereavement and during the months since, when I've had to spend a lot of extra time supporting my Mum. As always, thanks to Fran for her continued support and encouragement, and to the Exec committee for making it all possible.

We are looking forward to next year, when we will introduce Archery, and following training we will reintroduce tomahawk throwing into the programme. We will push on towards the Challenge badges, and the Gold Chief Scout award for those in the older half of the group.
