Trustees' Report
Stormwater Shepherds UK
on the Accounts for the Year Ended 31 August 2025

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 August 2025. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the charitable company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2026 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Objectives and Activities

The policies and objectives of the charity are

- to promote improvements in stormwater management and the introduction and maintenance of sustainable drainage systems
- to advance improvements in water quality, both in rivers and streams, but also in the oceans that surround the UK

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes are

- **Direct action** to remove litter from urban environments and urban streams, in the form of litter picks arranged with partners and Ambassadors.
- **Targeted research** to learn about the extent of pollution and the pattern of pollution to then inform better design and operation of drainage systems to capture pollutants. As the research is completed, we then share our learning and knowledge through educational events such as webinars and conferences.
- **Sharing expert advice** and knowledge with the influencers and Policy makers to help them to manage stormwater pollution and to mandate for the inclusion of pollution prevention in new developments and on existing infrastructure.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

Stormwater Shepherds UK is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association. It was incorporated at Companies House in England and Wales on 24 August 2020, and registered as a charity at the Charity Commission on 5 July 2021.

Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co opted under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

New Trustees are inducted into the workings of the Charity, including policies and procedures, and provided with appropriate supporting information.

Related party relationships

SPEL Products are sponsors of Stormwater Shepherds UK and they created the charity. They are funding the charity's operational costs until such a time as the Charity secures sustainable income from other donors and sponsors. There is one common director, Bryan Pocock. There is no day-to-day professional interaction between the two businesses. SPEL provides support services to Stormwater Shepherds UK.

Achievements and Performance in the year

Review of activities

Stormwater Shepherds UK was incorporated on August 24th 2020 with the appointment of our three Trustees. Jo Bradley took up her post as UK Director of Operations on September 1st 2020. We created a Strategy and delivery against the Strategy is going well. The Strategy was reviewed and updated in September 2025. In early 2021 we also set up Stormwater Shepherds Enterprises Ltd as a 'trading arm' to support the charity.

Our strategic priorities are:

- Secure income for Stormwater Shepherds UK
- Secure a funding mechanism for stormwater management to sustain the pollution reduction that we achieve
- Reduce plastic pollution and urban pollution in rivers, streams and oceans
- Influence others so that they reduce pollution too

2024/25 activities and progress

This year we have been building on the release of the publication about pollution from highway runoff that we published in early 2024. This publication created the foundations that we are now building on, to tackle the problem once and for all. We have focussed on good practice, good training and working with other people who want to reduce stormwater pollution. The publication set out the intricacies and the magnitude of the problem, so now we must focus on fixing it.

Working with others

To that end, Stormwater Shepherds UK have worked with others this year, such as the Ver Valley Society and the Angling Trust, to support them as they gather samples of highway runoff pollution that is affecting the rivers that they work to protect. We are also working with other eNGOs and Charities to amplify our voice and to find solutions. For example, we are working with Earthwatch to create a proposal to help the Environment Agency to monitor stormwater pollution across England using Citizen Scientists. The reason that the Agency often give for not controlling this pollution is that they can't afford it, so we are going to write a proposal that illustrates that by using Citizen Scientists to gather data, the control of pollution can become more affordable. We agreed that it was time to move on from repeatedly complaining about the problem, and to make useful, well-constructed suggestions for solutions.

Guidance and training

Similarly, we have worked with the Greater London Authority this year to publish a guidance document for practitioners who are installing retro-fit Sustainable Drainage solutions across London to reduce pollution from stormwater and to manage surface water flooding. Together with LinkedIn posts and site visits, this storytelling and guidance creation retains our credibility as an authority on SuDS and water quality. This, in turn, gives us the platform to advocate for change and to have our voice heard; this was supported this year when our Director of Operations, Jo Bradley, was recognised in the ENDS Report 'Power List' as an influential campaigner.

To drive forward good practice in drainage design, we are currently working on a guidance document for design engineers to help them to design better treatment schemes for new and existing highways. This is out for consultation at the moment and won't be published until next year, but it is designed to provide a positive outlook for a difficult problem, guiding the engineers through fundamental design criteria and decision-making. We take the time to meet new product manufacturers too, so that we remain knowledgeable about all stormwater management devices available on the UK market. One of the manufacturers that we met this year has developed a new idea for a green wall to manage stormwater in tight urban locations.

During this financial year, we have continued to provide training and presentations at scores of events and, wherever possible, to new audiences. We have avoided saying the same thing to the same people this year, and instead, we have reached out to new organisations such as the London Freshwater Group and the excellent Institution of Environmental Services. These events have reached hundreds of new people and piqued the interest of new academics and scientists who are now investigating this topic for themselves. We've continued to do training and we've done CPD sessions for engineering firms and field-based training with the National Trust.

Expert Witness

Because of the work that we have done to create this draft guidance, and the written submissions that we made to the Environmental Audit Committee two years ago in response to their inquiry into River Water Quality, we have been invited to give oral evidence to the Committee specifically on this topic. This is a great opportunity to influence decision makers and Policy makers to improve stormwater management in England. This invitation is a rewarding reflection on the power of the work that we have done to date, and the reputation of Stormwater Shepherds UK.

Data and evidence

We've continued to do field-work too, gathering evidence and information, and we were lucky to work with Aquawatch earlier in 2025 to install a continuous water quality monitor in the River Darwen, downstream of the highway outfall. This year we have worked with scores of new connections and new river-action groups, helping them to collect their own evidence and to tell the stories of their rivers too.

We have been able to take this to the next level for the River Lostock near Preston, where we have been working for 5 years. We have collected the necessary samples to prove that the highway outfall is causing significant harm, and we have used that evidence to complain to the Environment Agency about their failure to properly and fully uphold the Environmental Permitting Regulations. Since the response from the Agency was inadequate, that complaint has now been escalated to the Office for Environmental Protection and, if they carry out an investigation into the complaint, that will further our cause, and alert government to the extent of this pollution.

From conversations with new people, we have also been doing a little work this year to investigate the harm caused to aquatic invertebrates by stormwater pollution.

Together, these packages of work have reached far & wide, and we are starting to see evidence that our message is working and that government departments are embedding some of our suggestions, and reference to our work in important and influential documents.

Recent successes that have been influenced by our work and, at times, include our recommendations:

1. The Cunliffe review interim report includes reference to pollution from highway runoff. It isn't very detailed, and it is based on flawed data from the Environment Agency, but at least it gets a mention. Following the publication of the report, some commentators in the press made a point of reminding journalists that water pollution comes from urban runoff as well as from sewage.
2. The guidance for the next iteration of the Drainage and Wastewater Management Plans has been issued for water companies and it requires them to, at least, consider highway pollution entering the water environment from their surface water sewers which is a big step forward.
3. Best of all the new Non-Statutory SuDS Standards include a number of 'nuggets' that they seem to have taken from our publication last summer and they firmly put highway runoff pollution in its place – the Standards are great from that point of view, and we were lucky to get our publication out at the perfect time to influence these Standards.
4. Ofwat are still interested in highway runoff pollution and that will help water companies to get money in their next funding round for investigations into this pollution.
5. The Consumer Council for Water have also noted the risk of pollution from highway runoff although that seems to be all they have done for now.
6. Welsh Government are taking more of a firm stance about pollution from highway runoff which is great, and they credit our report from last year for prompting that change. They have already started to consider which outfalls in Wales are priorities for remediation.

Will these changes make a difference?

At Stormwater Shepherds UK, we are confident that these changes will deliver improvements in the management of stormwater pollution. It will be slow, and we must keep the pressure on and continue to advocate for change, but it is gratifying to see proper recognition of the need for stormwater management.

What else will help to manage and control pollution from stormwater?

Although the focus of our work at Stormwater Shepherds UK has been the control of pollution from highway runoff, there are other eNGOs working hard to deliver change for other sources of stormwater pollution and there have been some successes this year which will help.

- Deposit Management Organisation (DMO) responsible for the UK's Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) for drinks containers was appointed in May 2025 and the scheme is still due to be delivered in 2027, so that all plastic bottles and metal cans can be returned and recycled. This will massively reduce stormwater pollution if it delivered effectively.
- The Sewer Overflow Reduction Plan will see water companies investing £56billion over the next 25 years to reduce stormwater pollution across England.
- Government is proposing to introduce some wet-wipe controls, to reduce sewer blockages and the harm that wipes cause in sewer overflows. This is draft legislation at the moment, but we hope that it is successfully enacted.
- Disposable vapes have been banned and it is possible that this will reduce littering with these harmful devices, which often end up in the water environment in our towns and cities.

What are our next steps?

We will respond to consultations about the Planning and Infrastructure Bill, although the current government seem intent on passing it in its current form which will make it even more urgent that we train highway drainage engineers so that they design good schemes to reduce river pollution.

We will progress our complaint to OEP and support other River Action Groups to make similar complaints.

We are planning to sample highway runoff in constituencies of Policy makers and influential people to alert them to the problem and to make it more personal for them.

We will endeavour to influence the new White Paper that DEFRA are preparing in response to the Cunliffe review to make sure that it includes the proper regulation of pollution from highway runoff.

Financial review

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries and given the ongoing support from SPEL Products, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

Reserves Policy

Free reserves at the year end were a deficit of £228,106 (2024 £234,456 deficit). The charitable company's policy is to hold enough free reserves to cover six months working capital which is currently at the level of £42,088. We do not currently hold any reserves but our fundraising plans for the next year include recognition that we must build up our reserves to our target level.

The charitable company agrees a reserves policy annually which addresses these aspects in accordance with Charity Commission guidance.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that, insofar as mitigation is possible, systems and procedures are in place to manage the exposure to those risks.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law, the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**Independent Examiner's Report to the

Basis of independent examiner's report

We report on the accounts of Stormwater Shepherds UK for the year ended 31 August 2025 which are set out on pages 2 -17.

The trustee's (who are also the directors of the company for the purpose of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

(a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities SORP (FRS 102) together with update Bulletin 1.

(b) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purpose, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

(c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to, and certain to receive, the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

(d) Resources Expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the Independent Examiner's fee.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. Floor areas, per capita or estimated usage.

(e) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Impairment reviews are carried out as and when evidence comes to light that the recoverable amount of a functional fixed asset is below its net book value due to damage, obsolescence or other relevant factors.

(f) Investments

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the balance sheet date, unless the value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and presented as 'gains/(losses) on investments' in the statement of financial activities.

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

TRUSTEES' REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2024

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charitable company for the year from 1 September 2023 to 31 August 2024. The Annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the Charitable company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

- to promote improvements in stormwater management and the introduction and maintenance of sustainable drainage systems
- to advance improvements in water quality, both in rivers and streams, but also in the oceans that surround the UK.

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes are

- **Direct action** to remove litter from urban environments and urban streams, in the form of litter picks arranged with partners and Ambassadors
- **Targeted research** to learn about the extent of pollution and the patterns of pollution to then inform better design and operation of drainage systems to capture pollutants. As the research is completed, we then share our learning and knowledge through educational events such as Webinars and conferences.
- **Sharing expert advice** and knowledge with influencers and Policy makes to help them to manage stormwater pollution and to mandate for the inclusion of pollution prevention in new developments and on existing infrastructure.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Achievements and performance

a. Review of activities

Stormwater Shepherds UK was incorporated on August 24th 2020 with the appointment of our three Trustees. Jo Bradley took up her post as UK Director of Operations on September 1st 2020. We created a Strategy and delivery against the Strategy is going well. The Strategy was reviewed and updated in September 2024. In early 2021 we also set up Stormwater Shepherds Enterprises Ltd as a 'trading arm' to support the charity. Our strategic priorities are:

Priority 1. Secure income for Stormwater Shepherds UK

Priority 2. Secure a funding mechanism for stormwater management to sustain the pollution reduction that we achieve

Priority 3. Reduce plastic pollution in rivers, streams and oceans

Priority 4. Influence others so that they reduce pollution too

2023/24 activities and progress

This year we have been almost entirely focussed on pollution from highway runoff. This was influenced by the largest project that we completed, publishing a seminal national report on the topic with CIWEM. This report brought together the results of the research that we have been carrying out for the last few years, together with analysis of the environmental frameworks, the possible solutions and the sources of the pollution. The launch of the publication went well, and attracted almost 400 attendees, but the report also formed a 'springboard' for press articles, podcasts and new connections, all of which are good for the charity. We have continued with research into this topic, to build on the report, and to prove to the doubters that the pollution is as extensive as we know it to be. We are currently bidding for funding for the next project to extend our knowledge, investigating the physical harm caused to aquatic invertebrates by the toxins in highway runoff. We will know if this bid has been successful before Christmas and it will create a foundation for the research work that we'd like to do next year.

The launch of the document also raised our profile and our Zero Pollution Supporters bloomed in number up to 46. We also had more visitors to the webpage and we have over 110,000 impressions on one of our 'Tweets' about the report. The webpage is working well and has recently been upgraded and checked for any problems and updates. We try to add new 'News' items every month and as we are attending events that we know will bring traffic to the webpage, we make sure that there is something relevant and interesting on there.

We have delivered two significant training packages this year, around SuDS and urban drainage. We ran sessions for the National Trust in partnership with Arup, and that was very successful. We combined classroom learning with site visits and the attendees said that they found the event very interesting. We are repeating that for the Trust later in 2024, and adding new sessions at Enfield in London. Secondly, we have run a training course over a number of months for United Utilities. They have a new rainwater management team and we were asked to tell them all about SuDS and to take them on site visits to learn about all the different types, including both good and bad examples. These visits included one to Sheffield to see the excellent SuDS there, and to Wigan to see a minewater treatment scheme. We hope to build on this next year and do some more training with water companies.

The field work and research work, sampling sediments, counting insects and sampling discharges provides us with new data, new information for LinkedIn posts and Twitter stories and protects our credibility, maintaining our reputation as a leading source of knowledge on urban pollution in the UK. Although this work is time consuming and takes up quite a lot of our funds, it is essential for us to build this wealth of knowledge. The sediment sampling in ponds that we did this year, was particularly tough and involved lots of fence-climbing and wading through mud, but the data will be invaluable when it is ready.

The marketing activity that we tried this year, with a marketing professional called Emily, was useful but not very fruitful. Emily has helped us to write letters to possible funders and we got a couple of contacts from them, but no donations. Emily also helped with content for posts and tips on how to use Social Media. Those tips have certainly helped and our LinkedIn posts and Tweets are more successful now. We have had a steady stream of new followers on LinkedIn and that is very useful when we are building our network of contacts. We just wish that some of us would sign up as corporate funders of the Charity! The TV appearance certainly helped too, and brought fresh-faces to our LinkedIn page and webpage.

It was gratifying to see a small manufacturing company called Green Rhino carry out a 'Tough Mudder' to raise funds for Stormwater Shepherds and I hope that we can build on that relationship a little. And we got a few donations on our 'Birthday' which paid for a lifejacket so that we can access a new sample point.

The presentations at conferences and events have been thick-and-fast this year, opening us up to new audiences all the time. And the groups that we sit on, and that we have helped to create, are all working towards better control of urban pollution.

That element of our Charitable Objects is going well, and we are certainly making progress with our aim to see better management of stormwater across the UK. The funding of the improved management remains a difficult topic. The new government seem uninclined to invest in environment protection, and there is no sign of the introduction of mandatory SuDS on new developments. Any new taxation to pay for stormwater management, through product levies or road tax, is a non-starter as they are avoiding additional tax burdens. However, the massive focus on the water companies' performance is useful to us. It means that water companies are investing in retro-fit SuDS and in the separation of highway runoff. And National Highways are negotiating a new funding settlement right now, so the publication of our report might help them to secure more money for the treatment of highway runoff.

Next Steps

Although we will carry on with this work in 2024/25, as we deliver the projects that are already in the pipeline, we would also like to focus on some of the other work detailed in our Charitable Objects. They include facilitating large-scale litter clean-ups in urban catchment locations; encouraging wide-scale awareness and adoption of environmentally conscious behaviours; and educating the public, businesses and others in urban catchment locations on reducing public littering habits. We plan to organise litter clean-up events and to consider ways to promote better behaviours. We have already done a recent LinkedIn post about recycling cups, cans and bottles at festivals and we'd like to build on that.

Although the work on pollution from urban surfaces is our priority right now, we want to retain the breadth of our work and influence and to recognise that there might come a day when urban pollution is properly controlled by the regulator. If and when that happens, the focus will shift to maintenance of treatment devices, and the prevention of plastic litter entering the water environment. We want to lay the foundations for that work now, so that they different work packages run into one another seamlessly.

We are also acutely aware that we are not attracting enough charitable donations and that, although our Trading Arm has done quite well this year, we need to make the Charity more solvent by securing corporate sponsors. Over the Winter period, when the conference season is over and there is less field-work to do, we will focus all our efforts on that.

In conclusion, it has been another busy year, with some high-profile media coverage and some excellent projects completed. There is no question that we have raised the profile of pollution from highway runoff and got people talking. Now we just need them to put their 'money where their mouth is' and to support our Charity and invest in better stormwater management.

b. Fundraising activities and income generation

In this fourth period of operation, the Charity has been continued to be funded by a loan from SPEL Products that has covered our operational costs. Going forward, we will secure donations from partners, sponsorship from other businesses and grant funding to complete specific pieces of work. We have also set-up a trading arm of the Charity that allows us to complete paid work for partners, such as field monitoring, analysis of data, drainage advice and education. Any monies raised by the trading-arm will be transferred to the Charity to meet operational costs.

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries and given the ongoing support from SPEL Products, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

b. Reserves policy

Free reserves at the year end were a deficit of £234,747 (2023 £235,601 deficit) Charitable Company's policy is to hold enough reserves to cover six months working capital which is currently at the level of £42,088. We do not currently hold any reserves but our fundraising plans for the next year include recognition that we must build up our reserves to our target level.

The Charitable Company agrees a reserves policy annually which addresses these aspects in accordance with Charity Commission guidance.

c. Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that, insofar as mitigation is possible, systems and procedures are in place to manage the exposure to those risks.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

Stormwater Shepherds UK is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association. It was incorporated at Companies House in England and Wales, 24 August 2020, and registered as a charity at the Charity Commission 5 July 2021.

b. Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co opted under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

New Trustees are inducted into the workings of the Charity, including policies and procedures, and provided with appropriate supporting information.

c. Related party relationships

SPEL Products are sponsors of Stormwater Shepherds UK and they created the charity. They are funding the charity's operational costs until such time as the Charity secures sustainable income from other donors and sponsors. There is one common director, Bryan Pocock. There is no day-to-day professional interaction between the two businesses. SPEL provide support services to Stormwater Shepherds UK.

Plans for future periods

In line with our Strategy, our focus in the next 12 months will be on fundraising and research. We need to deliver further research to provide a 'launch-pad' for the messages that we are sharing. If we are to change the way that stormwater management is delivered in the UK, we have to alert everyone to the imperative of urban pollution control. We cannot do this without up-to-date data, as the existing datasets are over 20 years old.

We will also continue to expand our network of contacts, supporters and Ambassadors because we recognise that we cannot spread our message on our own. These friends and colleagues add meat to the bones of our story, with local information from their rivers and beaches.

We will also continue to carry out litter-picks and clean-ups with local groups so that we can keep the spotlight on the problem of plastic pollution and its impact on ocean health. Finally, we will continue to work with Trade Associations, water companies and others to keep the messages around urban pollution on-track and honest. There is always a risk that loud 'activists' will take our message and twist it for effect on Social Media so we must continue to share our story and to educate influencers so that the focus on stormwater management remains true and fact-based.

1. General information

Stormwater Shepherds UK is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association. It was incorporated at Companies House in England and Wales, 24 August 2020, and registered as a charity at the Charity Commission 5 July 2021.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Stormwater Shepherds UK meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Going concern

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and the financial statements.

The balance sheet discloses net liabilities of £234,456 as at 31 August 2024. However, in the opinion of the directors, the company can continue to trade despite the net liabilities due to the ongoing support provided by SPEL Products who are providing the charity with a loan covering all operational costs. The loan is interest free and has no set repayment date. The directors of SPEL have provided Stormwater Shepherds with a Letter of Support covering the period to at least 31 May 2026.

The directors have considered the liquidity of the company through to 31 May 2026 and are satisfied on this basis that the company can continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charitable company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the Charitable company to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charitable company's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing £100 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, .

2.6 Investments

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the Balance sheet date, unless the value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and presented as 'Gains/(Losses) on investments' in the Statement of financial activities.

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

2.7 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

2.8 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.9 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Charitable company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

2.10 Financial instruments

The Charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2.11 Pensions

The Charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Charitable company to the fund in respect of the year.

2.12 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charitable company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

TRUSTEES' REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charitable company for the year from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023. The Annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the Charitable company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

- to promote improvements in stormwater management and the introduction and maintenance of sustainable drainage systems
- to advance improvements in water quality, both in rivers and streams, but also in the oceans that surround the UK.

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes are

- **Direct action** to remove litter from urban environments and urban streams, in the form of litter picks arranged with partners and Ambassadors
- **Targeted research** to learn about the extent of pollution and the patterns of pollution to then inform better design and operation of drainage systems to capture pollutants. As the research is completed, we then share our learning and knowledge through educational events such as Webinars and conferences.
- **Sharing expert advice** and knowledge with Influencers and Policy makers to help them to manage stormwater pollution and to mandate for the inclusion of pollution prevention in new developments and on existing infrastructure.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Achievements and performance

a. Review of activities

Our strategic priorities are:

Priority 1. Secure income for Stormwater Shepherds UK

Priority 2. Secure a funding mechanism for stormwater management to sustain the pollution reduction that we achieve

Priority 3. Reduce plastic pollution in rivers, streams and oceans

Priority 4. Influence others so that they reduce pollution too

Our third year has been dominated by work that reflects our position as a recognised technical experts in urban pollution, SuDS design and highway drainage. This reputation is reinforced by our LinkedIn posts and the associated conversations and, to a lesser extent, by our presence on Twitter. Influential publications have also invited us to write content for them, which introduces us to new audiences and allows us to initiate conversations

about new topics. We have been working hard to reinforce this work by keeping our website up to date, so that it contains a lot of technical information, thought-leadership and suggestions for visitors to improve stormwater management.

The topic of stormwater management has never been more prominent across the engineering and political landscapes in the UK; this has been driven by the huge focus on overflows from storm sewers that has appeared across the national press over the past twelve months. Everyone is talking about pollution from storm sewer overflows and both local and national politicians have quickly realised that they must grapple with this problem if they are to secure the support of their electorate. This has been useful for Stormwater Shepherds UK, because it has highlighted the problem of poor stormwater management, where urban runoff is directed into storm sewers, causing them to overflow. Water Companies are under increasing pressure to reduce the spills from their storm sewers and they are seeking solutions to improve the stormwater management. This has been excellent for Stormwater Shepherds UK and we have been in discussions with five water companies to help them to find solutions.

We are doing what we can to highlight the dual opportunity of managing highway runoff more effectively, so reducing storm spills and reducing pollution at the same time, and this message is being well received. We have been invited to work with CIWEM on this topic and we are also talking to the Marine Conservation Society, Greenpeace and an independent journalism firm on the topic of pollution from highway outfalls.

Alongside this, there is also a fierce focus on pollution from nutrients across parts of England as Natural England has imposed new and severe constraints on developments in sensitive catchments, to reduce pollution from phosphorus and nitrogen. These constraints have led to an increased interest in the design of good SuDS for nutrient management and we have been lucky to play a part in this work, helping to develop guidance and presenting at conferences to guide delegates through the technical complexities of nutrient cycles. This work has helped to raise the profile of Stormwater Shepherds UK and we are definitely influencing the design and construction of better stormwater management systems in these areas.

We were lucky to be involved in sampling phosphorus pollution from urban surfaces as this topic evolved so we had our research results to inform the new guidance as it was drafted. The sampling of urban runoff across Bolton, that we carried out in partnership with United Utilities has been very useful for everyone involved in trying to resolve this pollution problem and we are proud to have designed and delivered that sampling programme.

As the public attention on pollution of rivers and seas has gathered momentum, Government have responded with new draft legislation, new departmental plans and new edicts affecting the water companies. This has led to a number of public consultations and Stormwater Shepherds UK has responded to these consultations to reinforce the call for a national Stormwater Utility Levy and better stormwater management. This work is reinforced by our involvement in the projects being led by the Office for Environmental Protection who regulate the activities of the Environment Agency and Natural England; we are pleased to be able to help the OEP to understand the improvements that are needed in stormwater management.

The difficulty that we face amidst all this work, is keeping the profile of pollution from urban surfaces at the same level as that of pollution from sewage. Because the public interest in river pollution is being driven by the desire to swim in rivers, there is less interest in pollution from urban surfaces. This is because the risk of urban pollution to river swimmers is little understood; we are keen to use our influence to alert people to these risks and to see urban pollution take its rightful place alongside sewage and agricultural pollution.

Achievements and performance (continued)

The work that we are doing with CIWEM, creating a narrative about urban pollution, and the thought-leadership that we create on LinkedIn and in publications is helping to raise the profile of urban pollution and we are confident that this will lead to more research opportunities and partnership working. However, we need to urgently turn this influence and interest into financial support and sponsorship for the Charity. We have only received small donations so far, and we have had no offers of corporate sponsorship, apart from that from our primary sponsor, SPEL Products.

This may also be facilitated by the wealth of scientific research that is underway both nationally and globally, into the extent of pollution from microplastic tyre-wear particles that are known to be the largest terrestrial source of marine microplastic pollution. As the research progresses they are finding new manifestations of harm from the microplastics in creatures across the marine ecosystem. They are also uncovering harm to human health from the microplastic pollution in soils and foodstuffs. If we can prove the link between this horrific pollution, and poor stormwater management, at the same time as sharing solutions to the problem, we are confident that the work of Stormwater Shepherds UK can contribute to cleaner oceans with less plastic pollution.

We remain hopeful that this new and intense focus on pollution and on storm overflows will raise the awareness of the need for better stormwater management and encourage businesses to support our charity. We are pleased to be at the forefront of this work.

Overall, we are very pleased with the progress that the charity has made this year, and with the ever-increasing profile of stormwater pollution. Our one failing this year is that we haven't carried out any litter-picks in urban areas with partners. We will review the need for litter-picks with our Trustees and consider if we want to continue with them; they add a large sum of our annual insurance policy costs and we are struggling to find areas to litter-pick that are not already covered by local groups. If we decide not to carry on with litter-picking, we will introduce new types of direct action to fulfil our Charitable objects.

Next steps

To build on the opportunity presented to us by the renewed interest in stormwater management, we are planning a 'Stormwater Roadshow' to be delivered in Summer 2024 to bring together stormwater management contractors and practitioners. Because Stormwater Shepherds UK focusses explicitly on stormwater management, this sets us apart from all the other charities that focus on plastic pollution. We hope that by working with other business who operate in the 'niche' that is stormwater management, we may find that they are willing to sponsor our charity. The stormwater roadshow is our vehicle to reach these people and to work with them so that they can see the opportunities for their businesses, as well as the opportunity to make rivers and oceans cleaner.

As the next year unfolds, there will be more 'noise' about pollution from roads and urban surfaces, from the publication of the CIWEM document and from articles published by Greenpeace, by independent journalists and by the Marine Conservation Society. We are pleased to be involved in the delivery of all of these initiatives. If these publications and promotions coincide with announcements from the Water Companies about their business plans for the next 5 years, and with government announcements about pollution prevention, then we could attract more attention for stormwater management and urban pollution control.

This will help us to promote our roadshow and to attract delegates and sponsors alike.

But we shan't keep all our 'eggs in one basket'. We will continue to undertake environmental monitoring through next year, to build on our evidence base that we can share with our partners. It is only by providing robust scientific evidence to support our theories that we can retain the credibility of Stormwater Shepherds UK that allows us to influence change for the better.

b. Fundraising activities and income generation

In this third period of operation, the Charity has been continued to be funded by a loan from SPEL Products that has covered our operational costs. Going forward, we will secure donations from partners, sponsorship from other businesses and grant funding to complete specific pieces of work. We have also set-up a trading arm of the Charity that allows us to complete paid work for partners, such as field monitoring, analysis of data, drainage advice and education. Any monies raised by the trading-arm will be transferred to the Charity to meet operational costs.

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries and given the ongoing support from SPEL Products, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

b. Reserves policy

Free reserves at the year end were a deficit of £235,601 (2022: £220,227 deficit).

The Charitable Company's policy is to hold enough reserves to cover six months working capital which is currently at the level of £42,088. We do not currently hold any reserves but our fundraising plans for the next year include recognition that we must build up our reserves to our target level.

The Charitable Company agrees a reserves policy annually which addresses these aspects in accordance with Charity Commission guidance.

c. Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that, insofar as mitigation is possible, systems and procedures are in place to manage the exposure to those risks.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

Stormwater Shepherds UK is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association. It was incorporated at Companies House in England and Wales, 24 August 2020, and registered as a charity at the Charity Commission 5 July 2021.

b. Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co opted under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

New Trustees are inducted into the workings of the Charity, including policies and procedures, and provided with appropriate supporting information.

c. Related party relationships

SPEL Products are sponsors of Stormwater Shepherds UK and they created the charity. They are funding the charity's operational costs until such time as the Charity secures sustainable income from other donors and sponsors. There is one common director, Bryan Pocock. There is no day-to-day professional interaction between the two businesses. SPEL provide support services to Stormwater Shepherds UK.

Plans for future periods

In line with our Strategy, our focus in the next 12 months will be on fundraising and research. We need to deliver further research to provide a 'launch-pad' for the messages that we are sharing. If we are to change the way that stormwater management is delivered in the UK, we have to alert everyone to the imperative of urban pollution control. We cannot do this without up-to-date data, as the existing datasets are over 20 years old.

We will also continue to expand our network of contacts, supporters and Ambassadors because we recognise that we cannot spread our message on our own. These friends and colleagues add meat to the bones of our story, with local information from their rivers and beaches.

We will also continue to carry out litter-picks and clean-ups with local groups so that we can keep the spotlight on the problem of plastic pollution and its impact on ocean health. Finally, we will continue to work with Trade Associations, water companies and others to keep the messages around urban pollution on-track and honest. There is always a risk that loud 'activists' will take our message and twist it for effect on Social Media so we must continue to share our story and to educate influencers so that the focus on stormwater management remains true and fact-based.

1. General information

Stormwater Shepherds UK is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association. It was incorporated at Companies House in England and Wales, 24 August 2020, and registered as a charity at the Charity Commission 5 July 2021.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Stormwater Shepherds UK meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Going concern

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and the financial statements.

The balance sheet discloses net liabilities of £250,791 as at 31 August 2023. However, in the opinion of the directors, the company can continue to trade despite the net liabilities due to the ongoing support provided by SPEL Products who are providing the charity with a loan covering all operational costs. The loan is interest free and has no set repayment date. The directors of SPEL have provided Stormwater Shepherds with a Letter of Support covering the period to at least 31 May 2025.

The directors have considered the liquidity of the company through to 31 May 2025 and are satisfied on this basis that the company can continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charitable company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the Charitable company to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charitable company's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing £100 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, .

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

2.6 Investments

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the Balance sheet date, unless the value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and presented as 'Gains/(Losses) on Investments' in the Statement of financial activities.

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.7 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

2.8 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.9 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Charitable company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

2.10 Financial instruments

The Charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2.11 Pensions

The Charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Charitable company to the fund in respect of the year.

2.12 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charitable company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

18. Pension commitments
