Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Although the activity has slowed down since we launched, we do still get enquiries, and we are still supplying bells to UK hospitals. In total we have distributed over 485 bells (up from just under 450 in the previous year).

We anticipate that we will still get enquiries and distribute bells on a fairly frequent basis, because of the bells more inclusive nature. The Milestone bell and plaque continue to show interest since they were first rolled out in Mar 2020.

We continued to sponsor 'our' special bead through Beads of Courage UK and Ireland for Children for children who are enrolled on their programme to add to their bead collection when they ring 'their' bell.

We continue to supply certificates to centres to give patients as they ring their bell to celebrate their end of treatment or milestones along their treatment path

The number of donations increased versus the previous year, and this can be based on the fact that we received a one-off donation of £1000 from a dance troupe, and a further £500 from our local church. Both are significant donations to a charity like ours.

Our outgoings are minimal, and our costs continue to be attributable to bells, assembly and distribution. People still ask to sponsor a bell, and this gives us a small revenue stream. People have also foregone sending out Christmas cards and have instead, made a small donation to us.

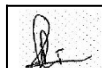

We continue to supply certificates to centres to give to patients as they ring their bell to celebrate their end of treatment or milestones along their treatment path.

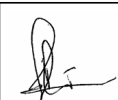

Since 31 January 2022, we have donated a further 25 Oncology Bells, 13 Milestone Bells, 28 Milestone Plaques to accompany bells already placed in hospitals and 7 more Neonatal Bells. This takes our total to 390 bells.

In March 2022, we introduced and rolled out a new bell called the Milestone Bell which we hope will help more people feel they can ring a bell particularly if their treatment may be ongoing.

To complement the Oncology Bells already placed in hospitals, we also rolled out a Milestone Plaque to fit around the existing bell, but which would offer patients a choice of poem.

The addition of a Milestone Bell has been warmly received and we foresee a trend in the number of orders for this due to its more inclusive nature.

We continued to offer extra bells to hospitals who wanted to help families to celebrate more widely outside of the hospital setting.

We have continued to sponsor a special bead through Beads of Courage UK and Ireland for children who are enrolled on their programme to add to their beads when they ring a bell. We believe this is a tangible way for children and families to discuss and process the harrowing procedures they face during treatment.

We continue to supply certificates to centres to give to patients as they ring their bell as a memento of such a significant milestone in their treatment path.

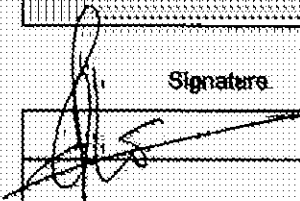

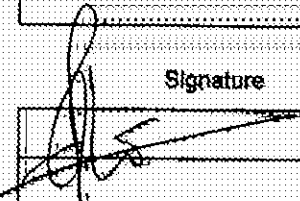

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Between the 11th of August 2021 and 31st January 2022, we donated a total of 9 more bells to oncology wards and 3 more bells to Neonatal Intensive Care Units. This took the total number of bells donated by the charity to 345. Of these, 305 have been donated to oncology wards and 40 have been donated to NICU wards. Whilst this number is low compared to previous years, we believe this is due to the fact that the Covid-19 pandemic forced most hospitals to limit visitors and most treatment centres stopped the tradition of bell ringing at the end of treatment. For most of the pandemic, we loaned bells to families free of charge so they could still ring the bell with their loved ones however, we ceased this in January 2022. As an alternative, we offered extra bells to hospitals so they could loan these out to families who wanted to celebrate the end of their treatment but were restricted due to the limitations of social distancing and the number of people allowed on the ward.

We have continued to sponsor a special bead which is given to children who are enrolled on the Beads of Courage UK programme when they ring one of our bells. Each bead represents a procedure or milestone during a child's treatment and ringing the bell is viewed by many as one of the most significant parts of their treatment. The beads are a tangible way for children to process and talk about the procedures they are having.

We send out patient certificates to units who order one of our bells and we replenish these as and when requested by these hospitals. Certificates are given to patients as a memento of the day they rang the bell.

Fundraising was difficult because of the constraints of Covid-19 but we continued to offer sponsorship of the bells as a way of recouping money spent by the charity.

Donations were scarce during this period. Again, we believe this was due to the pandemic.

Our outgoings are minimal, and we mainly use funds to buy services for the assembling and distribution of bells and certificates. The majority of our costs are for plaques, bells, fittings, certificates, packaging materials and courier costs.

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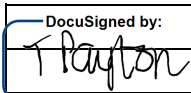
