Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

For the public benefit to relieve poverty or financial hardship among individuals in the Tees Valley and North Yorkshire by providing such persons with goods or services which they could not otherwise afford through lack of means.

In planning our activities for the year, we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our trustees meetings.

The main activities are Crisis Requests, Holiday Hunger Campaign & Christmas Hamper Campaign.

Our Crisis Request referrals run throughout the year and demand is increasing year on year as we become more prominent in the community. We accept referrals from professionals working with the most vulnerable in our area and offer support to those in crisis due to their personal circumstances. This could be due to circumstances such as a bereavement, a relationship breakdown, unemployment, domestic violence etc. Our main support is beds, bedding and food but is not limited. Our bed campaign continues to grow and we have had support from the community to provide much needed beds and bedding. The importance of a clean and comfortable place to sleep cannot be understated. Sleep is vital for maintaining good mental and physical health and helps to repair and restore the brain as well as the body. Children who have a good night's sleep perform better at school thus impacting positively on their educational outcomes.

Our Holiday Hunger Campaign ran at Easter and Summer school holidays with more schools requesting food for their families in need. Poverty is rife in our community and our donated food bags are vital to enable parents to feed their children during the school holidays when they don't have access to free school meals or school based food clubs. Basic store cupboard food items are provided as a base for a nutritional meal which can help prevent malnutrition. Children with malnutrition are more susceptible to infection and more likely to access NHS services.

Our Christmas Hamper Campaign continues to grow each year with nominations from our referral partners such as schools, local authority teams and other local charities. We do not accept self-referrals but rely on the professional judgment of our partner agencies targeting those in financial hardship who would not be able to provide food and gifts for their family alleviating some of the stress and having a positive effect on health and well-being. Past recipients of the hampers continue to contact us to support not just our Christmas Hamper Campaign but also with our Crisis Requests reaching out to help those now in need as they were once. The support from our community has been amazing and continues to bind the community together. Local college students continue to volunteer and this year also organised the collection and making of their own hampers to be donated in support of other young people who we support in the community. This has benefited the students to understand the social make up of their community and understand the differing needs of the wider community.

We continue to be well supported by the local community who recognise the value of what we do.

Our team of dedicated volunteers are invaluable to us and we hope to develop further the roles within the organisation to involve more people.

We cannot thank our supporters and volunteers enough for their continued support throughout the year.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Our Crisis Referrals continuing to increase year on year as we support families in crisis across Teesside. We continue to receive an average one referral per day requesting support for a variety of items including beds, bedding, wardrobes, drawers, small household items and food. We anticipate the need for our support will continue to grow as household budgets are stretched due to the cost of living.

Our Holiday Hunger Campaigns continue to provide support for families who struggle to feed their children during the holidays. We supported around 35 local schools with either food bags or supermarket vouchers and this number continues to rise as other schools become aware of our support for families.

Our 2024 Christmas Hamper Campaign was the largest so far and around 1850 families were nominated across the TS postcode area. Many local businesses now support us year on year, for which we are very grateful. We continue to receive ongoing free support with our website and hamper portal.

Our fundraising activities continued this year. We would like to thank local company Applebridge for choosing us as their Charity of the Year. The company and staff contributed massively to our Bed & Bedding campaign and we offer our sincere thanks. We also have a small number of regular personal donations, plus many other individuals who donate to us on a one off basis. We also receive donations from businesses and other local charities which are a lifeline for us.

We held 3 fundraising events during the year:

In May 2024, instead of our Ball, the trustees decided on an Afternoon Event at Middlesbrough Golf Club. Over 100 people attended and we were blessed not just with fantastic weather but also good food and lovely entertainment. A lovely afternoon was had by all and the event raised much needed funds.

In October 2024 we held a fundraising Charity Night at North Ormesby WMC. Once again it was a fantastic evening of fun and music and we thank the venue for supporting us both with the room and DJ.

Our Afternoon Tea was held in March 2025 and continues to be a very popular fundraising event with the tickets selling out within 2 days. We continue to be supported by Stainton Memorial Hall who allow us to use the venue for free and the local music group provides entertainment, again free of charge. Their continued support is very much appreciated.

Our network of volunteers continues to grow with more businesses contacting us to become involved. We would like to thank Suez for their continued support throughout the year.

We would also like to thank the small number of volunteers who help us on a week to week basis with our Holiday Hunger Campaign and Crisis Requests. We also have a large number of volunteers that support us with our Christmas Hamper Campaign and we are extremely grateful for such amazing support.

In September 2024, we were extremely proud to be recognised at the Teesside Businesswomen Awards for our work in the community when we were awarded the Charity / Voluntary Award.

Cash at bank at 05/04/2025 was £56184 in unrestricted funds plus £947 in gift vouchers. The main financial risk to the charity is loss of donations due to personal financial uncertainty due to the continued current economic crisis. We continue to fundraise but this is only a small part of our income – we rely on local individuals and business for the majority of our income and we continue to pursue the involvement of local businesses.

The funds are held as the Trustees continue to plan priorities for the short, medium and long term future of the Charity. The trustees, who are all volunteers with other work / personal commitments, continue to support whenever requested and foresee that the need for support will increase as the charity status becomes more prominent in the community.






We have again supported over 300 families/individuals by providing a variety of items including beds, bedding, wardrobes, drawers, small household items and food. As the cost of living crisis continues to have an impact on local families, we anticipate the need for our support will continue to grow.

Our 2023 Christmas Hamper Campaign was the largest so far and we had around 1800 families nominated across Middlesbrough, Stockton, Redcar & Cleveland and Hartlepool local authority areas. We have ongoing support with our website and hamper portal and we are extremely grateful for that. Many local business now support us year on year and we could not provide the number of hampers we do without this ongoing financial support.

Our Holiday Hunger Campaigns continue to provide support to local schools by providing food bags for families who struggle to feed their children during the holidays. We support around 30 local schools with either food bags or supermarket vouchers and this number is rising each year.

We continue to fundraise and would like to thank the Endeavour Partnership for choosing us as their Charity of the Year. Their staff have worked tirelessly over the year to fundraise for our Charity and we will be forever grateful for their contribution.

We held 4 fundraising events during the year:

An Afternoon Tea in July 2023 was very well supported and everyone had a lovely afternoon of tea, cake, chat and singing.

Our second Ball was held at Kirkleatham Walled Garden in May 2023. The event was attended by over 200 people and it was a fantastic evening raising lots of much needed funds. We look forward to the next event in May 2024.

In October 2023 we held a fundraising event at North Ormesby WMC. Over 100 people attended. It was a wonderful evening with a very popular local artist providing the entertainment.

Our second Afternoon Tea of the financial year was held in March 2024 and continues to be a very popular fundraising event with the tickets selling out within 2 days. We continue to be supported by Stainton Memorial Hall who allow us to use the venue for free and the local music group provides entertainment, again free of charge. Their continued support is very much appreciated.

Our network of volunteers continues to grow with more organisations contacting us to become involved. We hope to further expand our network as the charity becomes more well known in the wider community.

In December 2023, we began renting a room at MyPlace in Middlesbrough on a month-by-month contract. The Trustees agreed that this was the best way forward with the least risk to the Charity. The room is being used as an office and a small storage area and provides a focus point for the Charity. It is envisaged that as part of the Charity development, some volunteers will be able to undertake further duties and relieve the Trustees of some of the day-to-day tasks. The Trustees continue to give up their time freely and take no remuneration or expenses from the Charity.






For the public benefit to relieve poverty or financial hardship among individuals in the Tees Valley and North Yorkshire (TS postcode area) by providing such persons with goods or services which they could not otherwise afford through lack of means.

In planning our activities for the year, we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our trustees meetings.

The main activities are Crisis Requests, Holiday Hunger Campaign & Christmas Hamper Campaign.

Our Crisis Request referrals run throughout the year and demand is increasing year on year as we become known to more organisations. We accept referrals from professionals working with the most vulnerable in our area and offer support to those in crisis due to their personal circumstances. This could be due to circumstances such as a bereavement, a relationship breakdown, unemployment, domestic violence etc. Our main support is beds, bedding and food but is not limited. Our bed campaign continues to grow and we have had support from the community to provide much needed beds and bedding. The importance of a clean and comfortable place to sleep cannot be understated. Sleep is vital for maintaining good mental and physical health and helps to repair and restore the brain as well as the body. Children who have a good night's sleep perform better at school thus impacting positively on their educational outcomes.

Our Holiday Hunger Campaign continues to run in the February, Easter and Summer school holidays with more schools requesting food for their families in need. Poverty is rife in our community and our donated food bags are vital to enable parents to feed their children during the school holidays when they don't have access to free school meals or school based food clubs. Basic store cupboard food items are provided as a base for a nutritional meal which can help prevent malnutrition. Children with malnutrition are more susceptible to infection and more likely to access NHS services.

Our Christmas Hamper Campaign continues to grow each year with nominations from our referral partners such as schools, local authority teams and other local charities. We do not accept self-referrals but rely on the professional judgment of our partner agencies targeting those in financial hardship who would not be able to provide food and gifts for their family alleviating some of the stress and having a positive effect on health and well-being. Past recipients of the hampers continue to contact us to support not just our Christmas Hamper Campaign but also with our Crisis Requests reaching out to help those now in need as they were once. The support from our community has been amazing and continues to bind the community together. Local college students continue to volunteer and this year also organised the collection and making of their own hampers to be donated in support of other young people who we support in the community. This has benefited the students to understand the social make up of their community and understand the differing needs of the wider community.

We cannot thank our supporters and volunteers enough for their continued support throughout the year.

Our Crisis Request referrals continue to rise and we have supported around 320 families/individuals by providing a variety of items including beds, bedding, wardrobes, drawers, small household items and food.

Our 2022 Christmas Hamper Campaign was the largest so far and we had over 1700 families nominated across Middlesbrough, Stockton, Redcar & Cleveland and Hartlepool local authority areas.

With the help of a local business and one of their employees (who was a previous recipient of a Cause hamper more than 20 years ago), we now have a new professional website with ongoing free support. This has enabled us to reach a wider audience in terms of what we do including the hamper campaign where donors can register via the website but also our fundraising events and a means to donate electronically which has increased our income.

We also now have a bespoke hamper portal which has saved much time in the organisation and smooth running of the hamper campaign making it easier for people to sign up and donate which has resulted in us being able to invite more organisations to nominate families in need,

Our Afternoon Tea was held in May 2022 with all the tickets being sold and those attending enjoying a lovely afternoon of food and entertainment. We also held a music evening to raise funds and our second Charity Ball after a long break due to COVID will be held in May 2023.

Our network of volunteers continues to grow with more of the community contacting us. We hope to further expand our network as the charity becomes more well known in the wider community.

The Development Plan has not progressed yet due to unforeseen circumstances but we are hopeful this will be completed within the next reporting year.

Cash at bank at 05/04/2023 was £44886 in unrestricted funds, slightly down from last year. The main financial risk to the charity is loss of donations due to personal financial uncertainty due to the continued current economic crisis. This has been borne out as our fundraising raised £4420 which if we hadn't been able to do would have meant a reduction in our cash at bank.

The funds are held as the Trustees still plan to undertake work on a Development Plan to set out priorities for the short, medium and long term future of the Charity including if there is a need for the charity to employ staff and/or secure premises. The trustees, who are all volunteers with other personal commitments, continue to support whenever requested and foresee that the need for support will increase as the charity status becomes more prominent in the community.






The main activities are as follows:

- Crisis Requests
- Holiday Hunger Campaign
- Christmas Hamper Campaign

Our Crisis Request referral scheme runs throughout the year and supports the most vulnerable within our area, who are often in a 'short term' crisis due to personal circumstances e.g. breakdown of relationships, unemployment, caring for relatives and find themselves unable to provide basic items. Our main support is with beds, bedding and food but is not limited. Our bed campaign intervention enables parents and carers to concentrate on their own well being without worrying if their children have a bed to sleep in. In addition, according to the National Sleep Foundation's web page, whether a child gets an adequate amount of sleep has direct impact to their overall physical and mental development. It also helps with their concentration at school and impacts their educational outcomes.

Our Holiday Hunger Campaign runs in the school holidays when families struggle with the additional cost to feed their children. Supplying bags of food for schools to distribute to their most in need families is vital to enable them to eat regularly and can help prevent malnutrition. Children with malnutrition are more susceptible to infection and more likely to access health services.

Our Christmas Hamper Campaign runs from September – December and referrals to receive a hamper come from our referral partners such as schools, local authority teams and other local charities. The scheme is targeted at those in financial hardship who would not be able to provide food and presents due to their lack of funds. The financial pressure at this time of year has a detrimental effect on health and well-being and this is alleviated by our intervention. More past recipients of hampers are contacting us to become involved with the charity fostering a real community spirit and willingness to help. Once again, local college students volunteered with our campaign and the college is keen to develop this further next year.

We are extremely grateful for the continued support of our donators and of our volunteers. Our dedicated volunteers are invaluable to our organisation and are always full of enthusiasm and energy. We simply could not help as many people as we do without them. Our donators and volunteers are the backbone of each and every thing we do and we cannot thank them enough.

Throughout the year, our responding to Crisis requests have supported 109 families by primarily providing beds, bedding, wardrobes, small household items and food.

Our 2021 Christmas Hamper Campaign provided hampers to 1437 families across the whole of Teesside.

In January 2022, the Charity approached a local company who supports us with our Christmas Hamper Campaign requesting assistance to develop a new website and we continue to work with the company to develop our website. We are also developing a bespoke online system for our 2022 Christmas Hamper Campaign which will not only save the Charity time but will provide a professional platform for the future and provide better communications and experience both for our supporters and volunteers.

During our 2022 February Half Term Holiday Hunger Campaign, we provided local schools with supermarket vouchers for distribution to families in need.

In March 2021, we held an information coffee morning for anyone interested in volunteering with us and continue to develop our network and volunteer list to further develop the Charity.

During the year, due to ongoing Covid restrictions, our fundraising has been limited to donations from our supporters. For the coming year, we are planning two fundraising events: an Afternoon Tea and a Charity Evening which will not only raise much needed funds but also greater awareness of the Charity within the local community.





