
1. **Support for Vulnerable Families and Individuals:**
 - o **Food Security Initiatives:** Distribution of food packs (£2,940), Iftar packs (£44,355), breakfast and hot meals (£13,100).
 - o **Seasonal Support:** Provided Eid gifts (£3,830) to celebrate special occasions with those in need.
2. **Community Welfare and Livelihood Support:**




