The charity secured donations of £227,835 during the period. It had expenditure of £222,119 for the year, which was mainly grants (£176,595) and direct project and administrative costs (£45,524). This generated a surplus of £5,716 which was added to prior year surpluses. The charity held £29,332 as reserves to pay for liabilities due in the coming year and for future charitable expenditure. There is no policy to retain reserves and all surplus funds will be spent on future charitable activities and administrative costs.


