Structure, governance and management

RKR is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) who's only voting members are its charity trustees and is governed by its foundation model constitution dated 23 November 2021.

Appointment of charity trustees

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees.

In selecting individuals for appointments as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

Objectives and activities

The main objectives of the charity are:

- The promotion of the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of charitable resources for the benefit of the public in England and Wales by providing support, services and advice to primary schools and their PTA charities regarding the organisation of community sports fundraising initiatives.
- The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the public benefit in England and Wales by assisting in the provision of organised running events for primary school children, their parents/carers and friends.

Run Kids Run seeks to address the significant gap in funding for state primary schools by providing support, services and advice to primary schools and their PTA charities to mobilise the whole community to fundraise for their local schools and improve the education provision for all.

Evidence shows that disadvantaged children generally face additional challenges in reaching their potential at school and often do not perform as well as other pupils. RKR wants to support the Pupil Premium grant by providing another source of funding to improve educational outcomes for disadvantaged pupils in schools in England.

RKR secures corporate sponsorship and provides those corporate sponsors with the opportunity to connect with their local schools and communities to build long-term partnerships. RKR organises running events for primary school children, their parents/carers and friends. Sponsors' donations are used for a specific purpose, chosen by each school, which benefits the whole school community. The children are encouraged to reach out to friends and family for additional sponsorship. Schools report back on the use of the funds and the impact on the pupils.

Achievements and performance

In 2024, RKR put on 5 events in which 52 schools participated. The events supported schools from 8 London boroughs: Camden, Hackney, Islington, Lambeth, Newham, Southwark, Wandsworth, Westminster.

The events took place in Battersea Park (Apr 2024), King's Cross (May 2024), Highbury Fields (July 2024), Southwark Park (October 2024) and Stratford Olympic Park (November 2024). Over 5,800 runners took part raising over £332,000 for their schools (£84,000 of which was fundraising by the schools themselves). This total really shows how mobilising a community can benefit that community. Given the significant school budget constraints, headteachers have confirmed that the funds raised via RKR are invaluable to these underfunded schools.

The aim of RKR is to reach all 32 London boroughs, and more communities within each borough, over the next 5 years, by connecting local corporate sponsors and school communities.

In 2024, the funds invested enhanced the everyday educational experience of the children with investments made in:

Building infrastructure (refurbishing playgrounds, green spaces, building sensory rooms); Learning and play resources (IT & PE equipment, play equipment, learning resources) and Enrichment programmes (extra-curricular activities, specialist teachers, sports clubs, school trips, residential, wellbeing).

Financial review

Total incoming resources for the period totalled £388,821 (2023: £201,446). The charity received £376,361 (2023: £182,372) of income as direct donations to schools and the whole of this income is directly payable to the schools. The remaining income of £12,460 (2023: £19,074) was received through corporate sponsorship of events and a donation of £55,082 (2023: £Nil) from Bohill Partners Limited to cover running costs.

Total resources expended for the period totalled £329,110 (2023: £198,167). The charity paid £258,000 (2023: £176,295) of donations directly to schools. The remaining expenditure of £23,442 (2023: £18,788) was paid for running costs of the events and day to day charity costs.

The financial result for the period was net income of £59,711 (2023: £3,279). Total funds at the end of the period were £77,490 (2023: £17,779). Of the total funds, £63,279 (2023: £20,577) are restricted funds and are due to be paid directly to schools after the period end.

The charity has a cash balance of £791 (2023: £1,296) at the end of the period.

Reserves policy

There is not a specific reserves policy and at present there are no unrestricted reserves. Charity expenditure in the year was covered by a corporate donation from Bohill Partners Limited to ensure funds were not in a deficit position. Any reserves from corporate donations to schools are held as restricted funds to be distributed in the future to schools where there are gaps in funding.

Risk Management

The trustees examine the major risks that the charity faces each financial year when preparing considering future plans.

The trustees continue to consider and review developments, particularly taking into account the loss in real terms on investments compared with inflation.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, of the charity for that period.


In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.



Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 December 2024

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is Bohill Partners, 4th Floor, Kent House, 14-17 Market Place, London, W1W 8AJ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are presented on an accruals basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies *(continued)*

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Financial instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into.

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the profit and loss account in other administrative expenses.

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at transaction price including transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less impairment. If an arrangement constitutes a finance transaction it is measured at present value.

Objectives and activities

The main objectives of the charity are:

- The promotion of the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of charitable resources for the benefit of the public in England and Wales by providing support, services and advice to primary schools and their PTA charities regarding the organisation of community sports fundraising initiatives.
- The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the public benefit in England and Wales by assisting in the provision of organised running events for primary school children, their parents/carers and friends.

Run Kids Run seeks to address the significant gap in funding for state primary schools by providing support, services and advice to primary schools and their PTA charities to mobilise the whole community to fundraise for their local schools and improve the education provision for all.

Evidence shows that disadvantaged children generally face additional challenges in reaching their potential at school and often do not perform as well as other pupils. RKR wants to support the Pupil Premium grant by providing another source of funding to improve educational outcomes for disadvantaged pupils in schools in England.

RKR secures corporate sponsorship and provides those corporate sponsors with the opportunity to connect with their local schools and communities to build long-term partnerships. RKR organises running events for primary school children, their parents/carers and friends. Sponsors' donations (100% of which are directly passed on to schools) are used for a specific purpose, chosen by each school, which benefits the whole school community. The children are encouraged to reach out to friends and family for additional sponsorship. Schools report back on the use of the funds and the impact on the pupils.

Achievements and performance

In 2023, RKR put on events in which 42 schools participated. The events covered 7 London boroughs - expanding from Islington and Camden into Newham, Hackney, Wandsworth, Westminster and Southwark.

These runs - three of which were new events in the Run Kids Run calendar - took place at Battersea Park, Southwark Park and Stratford Olympic Park, in addition to those already established at Highbury Fields and King's Cross Lewis Cubbitt Square. Over 4,450 runners took part raising over £268,262 for their schools (£90,182 of which was fundraising by the schools themselves). This total really shows how mobilising a community benefits that community, with crowds of parents and supporters (representing the incredible diversity of these areas) turning up to encourage the children in their efforts. Given the ongoing economic crisis, headteachers have confirmed that the funds raised via RKR are invaluable to these underfunded schools.

The aim of RKR is to reach all 32 London boroughs, and more communities within each borough, over the next 5 years, by connecting local corporate sponsors and school communities.

In 2023, the funds invested enhanced the everyday educational experience of the children with investments made in:

- Building projects - school libraries, refurbishing playgrounds, building sensory rooms
- Learning resources - IT & PE equipment, educational software, updating IT infrastructure
- Wellbeing programmes - mental health support and counselling
- Enrichment programmes - extra-curricular activities, specialist teachers, sports clubs, school trips

Financial review

Total incoming resources for the period totalled £201,446 (2022: £105,267). The charity received £182,372 (2022: £95,500) of income as direct donations to schools and the whole of this income is directly payable to the schools. The remaining income of £19,074 (2022: £9,767) was received through corporate sponsorship of events and a donation of £Nil (2022: £7,106) from Bohill Partners Limited to cover running costs.

Total resources expended for the period totalled £198,167 (2022: £90,767). The charity paid £176,295 (2022: £81,000) of donations directly to schools. The remaining expenditure of £18,778 (2022: £9,767) was paid for running costs of the events and day to day charity costs.

The financial result for the period was net income of £3,279 (2022: £14,500). Total funds at the end of the period were £17,779 (2022: £14,500). Of the total funds, £20,577 (2022: £14,500) are restricted funds and are due to be paid directly to schools after the period end.

The charity has a cash balance of £1,296 (2022: £14,292) at the end of the period.

Reserves policy

There is not a specific reserves policy and at present there are no unrestricted reserves. Charity expenditure in the year was covered by a corporate donation from Bohill Partners Limited to ensure funds were not in a deficit position. Any reserves from corporate donations to schools are held as restricted funds to be distributed in the future to schools where there are gaps in funding.

Risk Management

The trustees examine the major risks that the charity faces each financial year when preparing considering future plans.

The trustees continue to consider and review developments, particularly taking into account the loss in real terms on investments compared with inflation.



1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is Bohill Partners, 4th Floor, Kent House, 14-17 Market Place, London, W1W 8AJ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are presented on an accruals basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. Resources expended

- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

The events attracted an attendance of 1270 runners and raised over £121k for the participating schools (£40k of which was raised by the school communities themselves), showing the power of mobilising a community. This at a time of great economic uncertainty with spiralling inflationary pressures causing great stress on school budgets and household incomes.

RKR started to expand to new boroughs with Camden and Stratford in 2022 and by the end of 2023 hopes to support schools in 10 London boroughs: Islington, Camden, Hackney, Newham, Waltham Forest, Tower Hamlets, Wandsworth, Westminster, Southwark and Lewisham.

Total incoming resources for the period totalled £105,267. The charity received £95,500 of income as direct donations to schools and the whole of this income is directly payable to the schools. The remaining income of £9,767 was received through corporate sponsorship of events and a donation of £7,106 from Bohill Partners Limited to cover running costs.

Total resources expensed for the period totalled £90,767. The charity paid £81,000 of donations directly to schools. The remaining expenditure of £9,767 was paid for running costs of the events and day to day charity costs.

The financial result for the period was net income of £14,500. Total funds at the end of the period were £14,500. Of the total funds, £14,500 are restricted funds and are due to be paid directly to schools after the period end.

The charity has a cash balance of £14,292 at the end of the period.

Reserves policy

There is not a specific reserves policy and at present there are no unrestricted reserves. Charity expenditure in the year was covered by a corporate donation from Bohill Partners Limited to ensure funds were not in a deficit position. Any reserves from corporate donations to schools are held as restricted funds to be distributed in the future to schools where there are gaps in funding.

Risk Management

The trustees examine the major risks that the charity faces each financial year when preparing considering future plans.

The trustees continue to consider and review developments, particularly taking into account the loss in real terms on investments compared with inflation.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the applicable Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.





Notes to the Financial Statements

Period from 25 November 2021 to 31 December 2022

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is Bohill Partners, 4th Floor, Kent House, 14-17 Market Place, London, W1W 8AJ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are presented on an accruals basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies *(continued)*

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Financial instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into.

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the profit and loss account in other administrative expenses.

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at transaction price including transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less impairment. If an arrangement constitutes a finance transaction it is measured at present value.
